

# The London Gazette.

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Cadix, January 29.

Yesterday came into this Port two Ships richly Laden from Buenos Ayres. This day arrived here the Fleet of English and Dutch Men of War and Merchant Ships, consisting of above 90 Sail, under the Command of Sir Francis Wheeler, and Vice-Admiral Calleburg, in Twenty three days from St. Helens Road near Portsmouth. Sir Francis Wheeler being informed, that six French Privateers were Cruising off Cape St. Vincent, detached several Men of War to look after them. Orders are come from Madrid for fitting out the Spanish Armada with all possible diligence.

Madrid, Febr. 4. By an Express from Cadix we have Advice of Sir Francis Wheeler's arrival there on the 29th of the last month with the Fleet under his Command bound to the Straights. The new Levies are continue in all parts of this Kingdom for reinforcing the Army in Catalonia, which tis designed shall consist the next Campaigne of 19000 Foot and 5000 Horses. Tis said that a considerable number of Recruits will be likewise sent to Flanders.

Torin, Febr. 6. The Duke of Savoy returned hither the 28th of the last month from Cour, where his Royal Highness took a Review of the Garrison, and gave Orders for the adding some new Works to the Fortifications of that place. The Preparations are continued both here and in the State of Milan for an early Campaigne; The Officers use all diligence to complete their Recruits, and a large Train of Artillery is preparing with proportionable Store of Ammunition, and a great quantity of Bombs. The Vaudois took some days ago several Mulas going with Provisions to Pignerol, which are much wanted there, especially Corn, insomuch that a Pound of Wheat or Beans is sold in that place for 10 Sols, as we are assured by some Persons come lately from thence; who report also, that the Garrison is very sickly. His Royal Highness has ordered all the Corn which is brought to the Market at Casy to be bought up, and brought hither, to prevent the carrying any part thereof to the Enemy. A good Body of his Royal Highness's Troops is posted at Carignan for the security of the Neighbouring Country against the incursions of the French Parties from Pignerol, none of which have since appeared abroad. Orders are given for burying the Dead Bodies that still remain upon the place where the last Battle was fought, to prevent the Infection of the Air.

Copenhagen, Febr. 16. The King of Denmark has lately taken a Review of his Guards, and ordered 7 Men to be Retired out of every Company, as has been already done out of all the other Troops in his Service. The last Letters from Flackeven tell us, That Capt. de Bant was still in that Part with 6 or 7 Frigates, and about 20 Merchant Ships bound to France under his Convoy.

Vienna, Febr. 10. On Saturday last General Hensler, Count of Heydenheim, returned hither from Hungary, the coming on of the Thaw having broke the Design upon Gyula. The Danube being now open, a great many Vessels are lading here with Provisions and Stores for Hungary; And the Recruits that have been raised in the Country hereabouts will be speedily sent thither by Water. The Duke de Croÿ being continued in the Command of the Emperors Forces against the Turks, has, upon that Consideration, with his Imperial Majesties leave, resigned his Government of Caricsthat in Croatia to the Count of Aversberg, reserving to himself a yearly Pension of 15000 Florins to be paid out of the Profits of it; And he is gone thither to deliver up the possession to his Successor. And the Regiment lately commanded by the said Count of Aversberg is given to the Duke of Wurttemberg Momygard. Count Leopold of Aversberg, who is named by the Emperor to go in the Quality of his Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of England, will part from hence in few days on his Journey thither. And the Count de Kamille is going with the same Character to the States General of the United Provinces.

Vienna, Febr. 17. The Emperor has Conferred the place of Chancellor of the Court, vacant by the Death of Count Straatman, upon the Count of Buccellini; And that of Vice-Chancellor of the Empire, void by the Death of the Count de Comingsbecke, upon the Count de Simitzgrats, lately his Imperial Majesties Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary at the Hague. The new Levies go on in the Hereditary Countries with good Success; and all things are preparing, to the end the Imperial Troops (which will be considerably augmented the next Campaigne, as well in Piedmont, as in Hungary, and on the Rhine) may go betimes into the Field. Our Advices from Turkey continue to speak of the great preparations that are making by the Enemy; and tell us, that they design to set out this Summer with two Armies against the Imperialists, one on the Danube, and the other towards Thrace; And that they have already drawn together some Troops on the Frontiers, with a design to make an Invasion into that Principality. Some of the Enemies Parties have likewise pillaged the Save, in order to fall into Schumla; but the Imperial Troops are every where in good posture to receive the Enemy, that we are under no apprehensions of any attempt they can make.

Frankfurt, Febr. 25. There passes at present nothing of moment in these Parts, besides the Recruiting of Troops, filling of Magazines, and making the other necessary Provisions for the next Campaigne. They write from Alsace, that the French Officers have time allowed them till the month of April to complete their respective Companies.

Cologne, Febr. 26. Two Troops of Brandenburg Dragoons, and one of Horse, who were posted near Bedbur, came hither this day, and being joined by a Detachment of Foot out of this Garrison, and furnished with Bread for 4 days, they passed the Rhine here, but we know not what design they are gone upon. About 130 Troopers of the Cologne Regiment, that Mutined lately, are come together again in this Diocess, and in few days will march towards Nimeguen. The Prince of Neuburg, Great Master of the Teutonick Order, passed through this City on the 21th instant, going to Liège, to assist at the Election of a new Bishop. We are told that an Army will be formed of the Troops of the Electors of Cologne, Palatine, and Brandenburg, and of the Bishops of Munster and Padoborne, to the number of 24 and 30000 men, which is to act during the next Campaigne between the Meuse and the Moselle.

Liege, Febr. 26. The Chapter met here this day, and appointed the 20th of April next for their proceeding to the Election of a new Bishop. The Cardinal de Bouillon came to Huy on the 23th, and from thence has sent two Messengers hither to desire Passports for himself and his Attendants, but tis not believed they will be granted him. The Chapter has ordered some new Works to be added to the Citadel, which are already begun.

Paris, Febr. 19. The French King went the 17th to the Castle of Marli to pass the rest of the Week there. The Troops of the Household are preparing for their march towards Compiègne. The Price of Corn is somewhat abated by reason of the Supplies come from abroad; but the scarcity of Money encreases every day; of which People of the best condition are very sensible. We are told, that a Proposal has been made by the Sieur Pointu, a Sea Captain, and approved by the Court, for the fitting out to Sea ten Frigates in the nature of Privateers; The Ships, Guns and Rigging are to be furnished by the French King, and the Men and Provisions by the Sieur Pointu and those concerned with him, who for this purpose are to raise a Fund of 800000 Livres, and in consideration thereof are to have a certain proportion of the Prizes that shall be taken. The Count d'Estree is preparing for his return to Toulon to Command the Ships that are fitting out there.

Paris, Febr. 25. The French Kings Journey to Compiègne, for the taking a Review of the new Regiments of Carabiniers, and other Regiments of his Guards, continues.
