

Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal Consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal Wisdom shall seem meet.

“The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

“The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John, Belmont, comprising:—

“All those contiguous portions of the Parish of Cheam, and of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Christ Church, Sutton, both in the County of Surrey, and in the Diocese of Southwark, which, taken together, are bounded upon the west by the Parish of Cuddington, upon the south by the Parish of Banstead, both in the said County of Surrey, and in the Diocese of Winchester, upon the east by the Parish of Carshalton, in the said County of Surrey, and Diocese of Southwark, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the north, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said Parish of Carshalton from the said New Parish of Christ Church, Sutton, at a point due east of the junction of Banstead Road with Brighton Road, and extending from such point in a straight line due west for a distance of 41 chains or thereabouts to the junction of Banstead Road with Brighton Road, and extending thence south-westward in a straight line (thereby crossing the Epsom Down Line of the London Brighton and South Coast Railway) for a distance of 14 chains or thereabouts to the south-eastern corner of the building known as the Fulham Parish Workhouse, and extending thence in a straight line due west (thereby passing to the south of the said Workhouse) for a distance of 3 chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Christ Church, Sutton, from the said Parish of Cheam, and extending thence first northward, then westward, and then again northward, along such boundary for a distance of 7 chains or thereabouts to a point due east of the junction of Burdon Road with the road called Holland Avenue, and extending from such point in a straight line due west for a distance of 10 chains or thereabouts to the junction of Burdon Road with Holland Avenue, and extending thence westward along the middle of Burdon Road for a distance of 14 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Burdon Lane, and extending thence south-westward in a straight line (thereby crossing Sandy Lane) for a distance of 40 chains or thereabouts to the point upon the boundary which divides the said Parish of Cheam from the said Parish of Cuddington which lies at the north-eastern corner of the plantation which has been made at a bend in the same boundary.”

And whereas the said Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Southwark.

WHEREAS it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation or Order in Council made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, as amended by the Act now in recital, may, whilst a state of war exists, be varied or added to by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade:

And whereas it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation made under Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, may, whether the Proclamation was made before or after the passing of the Act now in recital, be varied or added to, whilst a state of war exists, by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade:

And whereas by a Proclamation, dated the 28th day of July, 1915, and made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, and Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, and Section 1 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, the exportation from the United Kingdom of certain articles to certain or all destinations was prohibited:

And whereas by subsequent Orders of Council the said Proclamation was amended and added to in certain particulars:

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Board of Trade to the following effect:—

That the Proclamation, dated the 28th day of July, 1915, as amended and added to by subsequent Orders of Council, should be further amended by making the following amendments in and additions to the same:—

(1) That the exportation of the following goods should be prohibited to all destinations:—

Gum tragacanth;
Silica bricks.

(2) That the heading “Silk, Shantung, in the piece” in the list of goods the exportation of which is prohibited to all destinations should be deleted.

(3) That the exportation of the following goods should be prohibited to all destina-
