He Duke of Savoy intends to go the next week to Milan. The Vaudois continue to be very trouble-fom to the French; about 10 days ago they went out in a strong Party, and forced one of the Enemies Posts in the Valley of Peronse, killing 10 or 12 of these that guarded it, and making the rest Prisoners; and since this they were abroad again, and laid an Ambush, in order to have intercepted some Money, which the french were carrying to the Castle of Boia; but the Enemy having notice or it, got a reinforcement, and by that means were much too strong for the Vaudois; however the latter conducted their delign so well, that they silled to of the French, and took 20 Prisoners, with 15 Mules. General Caprara parted from hence last Tuessay for Milan; and from thence will go to Viems.

Vinite, Febr. 19. The Senate have received Advice of the death of the Doge Marosini, by Letters of the 10th of the list month from Napoli di Romania, which give an account, that his Serenity having been sized with an intensiting Fever, died there on the 7th patt, after a sickness of several days; Some hours before he dictated and signed a Letter to the Senate of Venice, acquainting them that he was drawing very near to the last period of his Life, with this satisfaction, that he should end it in the service of the Republick, wherein he had spent almost his whole time. This News has interrupted the Diversions of the Carneval, and instead thereof a publick Sorrow has on this occasion, been expressed by shuting up of all Houses and Shops, and the Knelling of Bells, and preparations are made for carrying the Statue of the Deceased Doge, after it has been exposed for three days to publick view, in a solemn Procession, at which all mc Clergy Secular and Regular are to affirt, to the Dominian Church of St. John and St. Paul. In the mean time all things are disposing for a new Election of a Doge, and that the Publick Affairs abroad may not be Captain-General of the Forces of this State; and Signior Marin Michiel, Proveditore-Extraordinary of the Arma mior Marin Michiel, Proveditore-Extraordinary of the Armada, is made Proveditore or Governor of the Mores.

The new Levies that are making in the Hereditary Countreys advance so successfully, that 'its not doubted but the Imperial Regiments will be all com-pletted by the end of the next month. The Militia of Hungary is also putting into 2 positive to come early into the Hungary is also putting into a posture to come early into the Field, and in a greater Body than they have yet done since the War, in order to join the Imperial Army. The Emperer continues his Resolution to find two Regiments of Heydakes to Picamont; as well as to augment the number of Hallist that served the last year on the Upper-Rhine. Count Lupid of Augment went hence two days ago, in Quality of the Emperor's Envoy Extraordinary for England; and Count Cauntz will set out in sew days, with the same Character for Holland. The last Letters from Upper-Hangary give an account, that the Turks were drawing together beyond the River Theysfe, and that Teckeley did include also make an incursion towards Lugor and Carmsters; and that General Veterani, who commands the Emperors Forces in Transituania, had given Orders to all the Governors of our Frontier places on that side, to witch the Enemies Motions; and had commanded Goland Anthony with his Radzins to secure the Passes. The Duke of Luxemburg is to have again the Command in Flanders; and the Marefehal de Boufflers on the Meuse. The Marefehal de Catinat is gone for Predmont but has leave to they several days at his Estate that lies in the way. The Count d'Estres is on his departure for Toulon. The King took this day a Review of the Regiment of Frenc's Geards in the Plain of Oville near S. Germann; And there is to be speedly a Review also of the Suifs Guards and Musketters.
