

Vienna, Feb. 27. The Design upon Gyula in the Upper Hungary is wholly laid aside for the present, not to harrass our Troops before the opening of the Campaign. Great Provision is made in the Arsenal here of Artillery, Bombs, &c. and at the same time particular care is taken to fill the Magazines in Hungary with Provisions, and other necessaries for the Imperial Army: 'Tis not yet known to whom the Emperor will commit the chief Command of it this summer; some talk of General Caprara, but with much uncertainty. The place of Marshal of the Court, which was lately held by the Count de Windtze-gratz, now Vice-Chancellor of the Empire, continues still vacant; Among the Princes less than so, the Prince of Savoy seems to stand the finest to obtain it. The Ambassador of Venice has communicated to this Court the News he received from Hungary by an Express of the Death of the Duke Albert, which happened at *Napoli di Romania* in the Duke's last Journey, on the 7th of the last month. The last Letters received from the Parties from thence and from *Peter Varadin* advance frequently as far as the Siege, without any Interruption of the Enemies Troops, who keep themselves in their Winter Quarters.

Germany, March 6. The Elector of Brandenburg intends to be going on the 3^d Week hence towards Clero. The Treaty of Peace on the Affairs of the Duke of Savoy have not yet been concluded at *Monsieur*.

Colony, March 9. The Count de Courgfeld, who was lately appointed to receive the Election of *Bohemia*, is at present with several other Princes of Quality, in a daily expectation of his Election; but that which is desired, which has been somewhat delayed by a slight indisposition that happened to him in his Journey from *Bonn* his Electoral Highness with an intention of returning to his City present towards *Leipsic* and *Hildersheim*. All is at present quiet on the Rhine; but great preparations are making on the Campaign. We are told that the Confederates will have an Army of 200000 and 30000 Men to set before the *Meuse* and the *Mein*. The Elector of *Palatinus* has caused several of the Troops that he led lately from Count de *Joachim's* Regiment, to be quartered within his Territories.

Italy, March 9. The Duke of *Wuerttemberg* arrived here on Saturday last, to have a Review of our Garrison, which he found in a very good condition, and returned his Thanks to *Madam*, to meet the Duke of *Modena*, who is coming thither from *Messina*. The necessary Provisions are making for the Election of a new Bishop. The Great Master of the Teutonic Order has been here some time, and is making an Interest among the *Catholics*. The Baron de *Albani* is come hither in the Quality of the Emperor's Envoy extraordinary, and Monsieur *Duclos* is expected here on the part of the States General of the *Netherlands*. One of our Parties defeated some days ago a French Party, and took a Captain and 15 private Soldiers Prisoners.

Spain, March 12. The Deputies of the States General are arrived at *Leipsic*, and have had Audience of the Emperor at that Province. The Danish Ships continue under Arms at *Amsterdam*, as we do in the *Straits*; but in all probability this matter will be speedily determined.

Phoenicia, March 6. Their Majesties Ship the *Comet*, and several other Men of War, with the best of our ward bound Merchants, under their Command, sailed yesterday out of the Harbour with a very fair Wind, and a strong Gale, which has continued ever since. Yesterday about a hundred English Prisoners were taken here on a Transport Vessel, and sent away to St. *Martin*.

Italy, March 6. Rear Admiral *Mitchell* arrived in the *Princess* with 1200 Men on the 1st of the Week. The day before he had two Dutch Men of War with 6 Merchant Ships bound to *Cadix*.

London, March 9. His Majesty went this day to *Windsor* near *Winchester*, intending to pass 3 or 4 days there.

The Mail from *Holland* and of *Tuesday's* is not yet come in.
