

Vienna, Feb 27. The Design upon *Gyula* in the Upper Hungary is wholly laid aside for the present, not to harass our Troops before the opening of the Campagne. Great Provision is made in the Arsenal here of Artillery, Bombs, &c. and at the same time particular care is taken to fill the Magazines in *Hungary* with Provisions, and other necessaries for the Imperial Army : This is not yet known to whom the Emperor will commit the chief Command of it this summer; some talk of General *Caprara*, but with much uncertainty. The piece of Marechal or the Court, which was lately held by the Count de *Vindobonensis*, Vice-Chancellor of the Empire, continues still vacant; Among the Prelates thereunto, the Prince of *Ripoli* seems to stand the first to obtain it. The Ambassador of *Venice* has communicated to this Court the News he received from *Paris* by an Express of the Death of the Duke *Albret*, which happened at *Naples* *de Romana* in the Night between the 6th and 7th of the last month. The last Letters of the *Emperor* tell us, that the Parties from thence and from *Potzdam* are in advance frequently as far as the *Sava*, without meeting Ambition of the Enemies' Troops, who keep a strict watch over Winter Quarters.

Bavaria, March 3. The Elector of *Bavaria* intends to regard about 3 Weeks hence towards *Cleves*. The Troops belonging to the Affection of the Duke of *Savoy* have their Head-quarters at *Munichberg*.

Cologne, March 3. The Count *de Cossel*, who went hither to *Prague* to receive the Elector of *Turku*, returned thither with several other Persons of Quality, but in daily expectation of his Return, but that date's arrival, which has been somewhat delayed by a slight indisposition that happened to him in his Journey. From *Bohemia* his Electoral Highness will come hither, and make a short stay in this City previous to his return thither. All is at present quiet on the *Rhine*; but preparations are making for the Campaign. We are assured that the Confederates will have an Army of 150000 and 30000 Men to set between the *Mosel* and the *Rhine*. The Elector of *Potzdam* has caused a general Order to be issued from his County of *Brandenburg*, to banish within his Territories.

Louisiana, March 3. The Duke of *Württemberg* arrived here on Saturday last, took yesterday a Review of our Garrison, which he found in a very good condition, and returned this Evening to *Stuttgart*, to meet the Duke of *Württemberg*, who is coming hither from *Melsungen*. The neophyte P. participated in his Review for the Election of a new Bishop. The Great Master of the Teutonic Order has been here some time, and is making an Inspection among the Canons. The Baron *Edler* is come hither in the Quality of the Emperor's Envoy Extraordinary, and Monseigneur *Duc de Rohan* is expected here on the part of the States General of the *United Provinces*. One of our Parties defeated some days ago a French Party, and took a Captain and 15 private soldiers prisoners.

Augsburg, March 3. The Deputies of the States General of *Holland* are arrived at *Louvenstein*, and have had Audience of the *Sovereign* of that Province. The Danish Ships continue under Arrest at *Amsterdam*, as we do in the *Savoie*; but in all probability this matter will be speedily accommodated.

Berlin, March 6. Their Majesties Ship the *Foerwe*, and over 400 Men of War, with the fleet of our word bound Marching under their Colours, sailed yesterday out of the Harbour with a very fair Wind, and a strong Tide, which has continued ever since. Yesterday about a hundred French Sailors embarked here on a Transport Vessel, who will probably go to St. M^r.

Prussia, March 6. Rear Admiral *Nicobelli* arrived in the *Prussian* Harbour from the *Wth Edward*. The day before I had two Dutch Men of War with 6 Merchant Ships bound to *Catania*.

Rome, Mar. 6. His Majesty went this day to *Verona* near *Mincio*, intending to pass 3 or 4 days there.

The Mail from Holland of *Feb 28* last is not yet come in.

The Hague, *Wth Edward* and *Officer of Trinity House*, *Mar 6*. A few hours ago, Masters of Ships, or others of the Order of Red-Cross in the Service of *James*, which includes Loyal Servants, were put into a breakwater between the *Hoorn* and *Maas* and *Amstel* a Lady Day, where they have been waiting since that Officer will be ready to *Trinity House* to be paid.
