BY THE KING. A PROCLAMATION

FOR SUSPENDING IN IRELAND THE OPERATION OF SECTION ONE OF THE DEFENCE OF THE REALM (AMENDMENT) ACT, 1915 (RIGHT OF BRITISH SUBJECT CHARGED WITH OFFENCE TO BE TRIED BY CIVIL COURT).

GEORGE R.I.

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WHEREAS by subsection (7) of section one of the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) Act, 1915, it is enacted that in the event of invasion or other special military emergency arising out of the present War, We may, by Proclamation, forthwith suspend the operation of the said section, either generally or as respects any area specified therein:

And whereas the present state of affairs in Ireland is such as to constitute such a special

military emergency as aforesaid:
Now, THEREFORE, We, in pursuance of the powers so conferred on Us, do hereby order that the operation of the said section be suspended in Ireland until We see fit to revoke this Our Proclamation.

BY THE KING. 'A PROCLAMATION

Amending the Trading with the Enemy (NEUTRAL COUNTRIES) PROCLAMATION, 1916. GEORGE R.I.

THEREAS it is desirable to amend Our Proclamation of the twenty-ninth day of February, 1916, called the Trading with the Enemy (Neutral Countries) Proclamation,

Now, THEREFORE, We have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation declaring, and it is hereby declared, as follows:-

- 1. Paragraph 4 (a) of the Trading with the Enemy (Neutral Countries) Proclamation is hereby revoked, and in lieu thereof the following paragraph shall, as from the date hereof, be inserted in the said Proclamation:
 - "4. (a) Any person or body of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, resident, carrying on business, or being in the United Kingdom, who is engaged in any non-enemy country in the business of Insurance from carrying on in that country such business (other than the business of Marine Insurance or of the Insurance against fire or any risk of goods or merchandise during transit from shipper's or manufacturer's warehouse until

deposited in warehouse on the termination of the transit, if any part of the transit is by sea), with or through the agency of any of the persons or bodies of persons mentioned in the Statutory List."

2. The said Proclamation of the twentyninth day of February, 1916, shall be called "The Trading with the Enemy (Statutory List) Proclamation, 1916."

3. This Proclamation shall be called "The Trading with the Enemy (Statutory List) Proclamation, 1916, No. 2," and shall be read as one with the Trading with the Enemy (Statutory List) Proclamation, 1916, and that Proclamation and this Proclamation may be cited together as the Trading with the Enemy (Statutory List) Proclamations, 1916.

PROHIBITING THE EXPORTATION OF ALL ARTICLES TO LIBERIA.

GEORGE R.I.

HEREAS by the first Section of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, it is enacted that We may, by Proclamation, prohibit the exportation of the articles mentioned in that Section to any country or place named in the Proclamation whenever We shall judge such prohibition to be expedient in order to prevent such articles being used against Our forces, or against any forces engaged or which may be engaged in military or naval operations in co-operation with Our forces:

AND WHEREAS by the first Section of the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1914, it is enacted that the above recited Section of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, shall have effect while a state of war in which We are engaged exists as if in addition to the articles therein mentioned there were included all other

articles of every description:

AND WHEREAS by the first Section of the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1915, it is enacted that Our power under Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, as amended by the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1914, by proclamation to prohibit the exportation of articles to any country or place named in the Proclamation shall, during the continuance of the present war, include the power to prohibit the exportation of any article to any such country or place unless consigned to such person or persons as may be authorised by or under the Proclamation to receive such article:

Now, THEREFORE, We have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation declaring, and it is hereby declared, as follows:

(1) The exportation of all articles to Liberia is prohibited unless the articles are consigned to some person or persons authorised by the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs. or by the Board of Trade, to receive the same;

(2) The Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs or the Board of Trade shall notify, by order to be published in the London, Edinburgh, and Dublin Gazettes, a list of the persons authorised as consignees of articles exported to Liberia, and may from time to time by any order so published alter, vary, or add. to, such List;

(3) This Proclamation shall be called the Exportation to Liberia Prohibition Proclama-

tion, 1916.

WHEREAS by the Isle of Man (War Legislation) Act, 1914, His Majesty has power to extend to the Isle of Man any Act which, in the opinion of His Majesty, was passed for the purpose of meeting any emergency created by the present War, subject to adaptations for the purpose of making the Act applicable to the Isle of Man:

And whereas by Order in Council dated the 17th day of December, 1914, His Majesty was pleased to order that the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914, and the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, should extend to the Isle of Man subject to the

adaptations therein contained:

And whereas the said Act and Regulations have been amended by certain other Acts and Regulations, which said Acts and Regulations have been extended to the Isle of Man by various subsequent Orders in Council subject to the adaptations therein contained:

And whereas the said Regulations have been further amended by Orders in Council dated the 22nd day of December, 1915, the 3rd day of February, 1916, the 15th day of February, 1916, the 29th day of February, 1916, the 21st day of March, 1916, and the 30th day of

March, 1916:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Regulations amending the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, issued by His Majesty in Council dated the 22nd day of December, 1915, the 3rd day of February, 1916, the 15th day of February, 1916, the 29th day of February, 1916, the 21st day of March, 1916, and the 30th day of March, 1916, shall

extend to the Isle of Man, subject to the following adaptations:-

1. In the Regulations of the 3rd February, 1916

In Regulation 39 c, after the words" United Kingdom' there shall be read the words 'or the Isle of Man."

In paragraph 2 after the words "nineteen hundred and sixteen" there shall be read the words "(made applicable to the Isle of Man by Order in Council dated the 10th March, 1916)."

2. In the Regulations of the 15th February, 1916.

In the first paragraph of Regulation 7, for the words "Lord Chief Justice of England" to the end of the paragraph, there shall be substituted the words "Lieutenant Governor."

In the new paragraph (14) of Regulation 56, for the words "Director of Public Prosecutions, the Lord Advocate, or the Attorney General for Ireland, as the case may be" there shall be substituted the words "Attorney General for the Isle of Man.'

3. In the Regulations of the 29th February, 1916.

In Regulation 44 a after the words "Munitions of War Acts, 1915 and 1916," there shall be read the words "(being Acts of the Imperial Parliament)."

Clause 8 shall be deleted.

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the proposals set forth in the annexed Schedule, with effect as from the 30th March, 1916.

"SCHEDULE.

"RATES OF EXTRA PAY FOR OBSERVERS IN THE ROYAL NAVAL AIR SERVICE.

(1) Trained Observers:

Commissioned Officers and Midshipmen when actually detailed as Observers, 5s. a day continuously.

Warrant Officers, 3s. a day for days of

ascent only.

Petty Officers and Men, 2s. a day for days of ascent only.

Note.—These rates to be issued continuously to Warrant Officers, Petty Officers, and Men employed as Observers in an area of operations.

"(2) Officers, Warrant Officers, Petty Officers, and Men under training as Observers:

Commissioned Officers and Midshipmen,

3s. a day for days of ascent only.

Warrant Officers, 2s. a day for days of ascent only

Petty Officers and Men, 1s. a day for days of ascent only.

"(3) Officers, Warrant Officers, Officers, and Men not graded in the Royal Naval Air Service when required to ascend on duty as casual Observers or passengers:-

Commissioned Officers and Midshipmen, 5s. for each day of ascent.

Warrant Officers, 3s. for each day of ascent.

Petty Officers and Men, 2s. for each day of ascent.

"(4) Graded Officers, Warrant Officers, Petty Officers, and Men to be eligible for the above rates of extra pay unless entitled as qualified Pilots to Flying Pay at higher rates."

DEFENCE OF THE REALM (LIQUOR CONTROL).

ORDER OF THE CENTRAL CONTROL BOARD (LIQUOR TRAFFIC) FOR THE WELSH AREA.

Any person contravening any provision of this Order or of the Liquor Control Regulations is liable to imprisonment for six months with hard labour and a fine of £100.

We the Central Control Board (Liquor Traffic) in pursuance of the powers conferred upon us by the Acts and Regulations relating to the Defence of the Realm hereby make the following Order:—

Limits of Area.

1. The area to which this Order applies is the Welsh Area, being the area comprising the Principality of Wales, the County of Monmouth and the County Borough of Newport.

Hours During which Intoxicating Liquor May be Sold.

A .- For Consumption ON the Premises.

2. (1) The days and hours on and during which intoxicating liquor may be sold or supplied in any licensed premises or club for consumption on the premises shall be restricted and be as follows:—

On Weekdays:

The hours between 12 noon and 2.30 p.m. and between 6 p.m. and 9 p.m.

Except on the days and between the hours

aforesaid no person shall-

(a) Either by himself or by any servant or agent sell or supply to any person in any licensed premises or club any intoxicating liquor to be consumed on the premises; or

(b) Consume in any such premises or club

any intoxicating liquor; or

(c) Permit any person to consume in any such premises or club any intoxicating liquor.

B.—For Consumption OFF the Premises.

(2) The days and hours on and during which intoxicating liquor may be sold or supplied in any licensed premises or club for consumption off the premses shall be restricted and be as follows:—

On Weekdays:

The hours between 12 noon and 2.30 p.m. and between 6 p.m. and 8 p.m.

Except on the days and between the hours

aforesaid no person shall-

- (a) Either by himself or by any servant or agent sell or supply to any person in any licensed premises or club or (except as hereinafter is expressly provided) dispatch therefrom any intoxicating liquor to be consumed off the premises; or
 - (b) Take from any such premises or club

any intoxicating liquor; or

(c) Permit any person to take from any such premises or club any intoxicating liquor.

Additional Restrictions as to Spirits.

3. In addition to the above general restrictions as to hours during which intoxicating liquor may be sold or supplied, the sale and supply of spirits in licensed premises and clubs shall be subject to the following special restrictions, that is to say:

(a) No orders for spirits to be consumed off the premises shall be given by or accepted from any person actually present in any licensed premises or club except on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays and during the hours between

12 noon and 2.30 p.m.

(b) Spirits to be consumed off the premises must not (except as hereinafter expressly provided) be dispatched from any licensed premises or club, nor must they be taken therefrom by the person to whom they are sold or supplied or by any person acting on his behalf, except on the days and during the hours aforesaid.

- (c) Spirits to be consumed off the premises shall not be sold or supplied or taken from any licensed premises or club in any bottle or other vessel not bearing a label showing the name and situation of the premises or club, or in any vessel of a capacity less than one reputed quart, or in any less quantity than one reputed quart, or in any open vessel.
- (d) No spirits to be consumed off the premises shall be sold or supplied in or taken from any refreshment room in any railway station.

Conditions as to Distribution.

4. No person shall either by himself or any

servant or agent-

(a) Sell, supply, distribute or deliver any intoxicating liquor from any van, barrow, basket or other vehicle or receptacle unless before the liquor is dispatched it has been ordered and the quantity, description and price thereof together with the name and address of the person to whom it is to be supplied has been entered in a delivery book or invoice, which shall be carried by the person delivering the liquor, and in a day book which shall be kept on the premises from which the liquor is dispatched.

(b) Carry or convey in any van, barrow, basket or other vehicle or receptacle while in use for the distribution or delivery of intoxicating liquor, any such liquor not entered in such delivery book or invoice and day book.

(c) Distribute or deliver any intoxicating liquor at any address not specified in such delivery book or invoice and day book.

- (d) Refuse to allow any constable to examine such van, barrow, basket or other vehicle or receptacle or such delivery book or invoice.
- (e) Solicit or canvass for orders for, or collect or receive payment for, intoxicating liquor except at the licensed premises.

(f) Send or cause to be sent or leave or cause to be left to or at any premises, or to or with any person, any order form for intoxi-

cating liquor.

(g) Cause or permit any payment for intoxicating liquor to be made on his behalf by any person in the service or employment of the vendor of the liquor, or, being a person in such service or employment, make any such payment as the agent or on behalf of the purchaser of the liquor.

Hours of Opening for the Supply of Food and Non-intoxicants.

- 5. Notwithstanding any provisions of this Order or of the Law relating to licensing or the sale of intoxicating liquor:-
 - (a) Licensed premises may be opened for the supply of food and non-intoxicating liquor at the hour of 5.30 in the morning on all days and be kept open for this purpose from that hour until the evening closing hour prescribed by the general provisions of the Licensing Acts, and until the hour of 10 p.m. on Sundays; and
 (b) Refreshment houses may be kept open

for this purpose at any time during which they may be kept open under the general

provisions of the said Acts.

Saving Provisions.

6. Nothing in the foregoing provisions of this Order shall be deemed to prohibit, in cases where the same is otherwise lawful;

(a) The consumption of intoxicating liquor by any person in any licensed pre-

mises or club where he is residing; or (b) The consumption of intoxicating liquor at a meal by any person in any licensed premises or club at any time within half an hour after the conclusion of the afternoon and evening hours during which the sale or supply of intoxicating liquor is permitted by this Order;

Provided that the liquor was sold or supplied and served during such hours at the same time as the meal and for consumption

at the meal; or

(c) The sale or supply of spirits to any person producing a certificate in writing dated and signed by a duly qualified medical practitioner that the spirits are immediately required for medicinal purposes and specifying the quantity of spirits required;

Provided that the quantity sold or supplied shall not exceed the quantity specified

in such certificate; or

(d) The dispatch from licensed premises for delivery at a place more than five miles distant of any spirits or other intoxicating liquor in the forenoon of any day on which the sale of the same for consumption off the premises is permitted by Article 2 (2) and Article 3 of this Order as the case may be;

$Treating\ Prohibited.$

7. No person shall either by himself or by any servant or agent sell or supply any intoxicating liquor to any person in any licensed premises or in any club for consumption on the premises unless the same is ordered and paid for by the person so supplied; nor shall any person order or pay for or lend or advance money to pay for any intoxicating liquor wherewith any other person has been or is to be supplied for consumption on the premises; nor shall any person consume in any licensed premises or club any intoxicating liquor which any other person has ordered or paid for or agreed to pay for or lent or advanced money to pay for

Provided always that if such intoxicating liquor is supplied or served for consumption at a meal supplied at the same time and is consumed at such meal the provisions of this regulation shall not be deemed to be contravened;

if the person who pays for such meal also pays

for such intoxicating liquor.

For the purposes of this regulation consumption on the premises includes consumption of intoxicating liquor in or on any highway open ground or railway station adjoining or near to the licensed premises or club in which the liquor was sold or supplied; and any person consuming intoxicating liquor in or on any such highway open ground or railway station shall be deemed to consume the liquor in such licensed premises or club as the case may be.

Credit Prohibited.

No person shall—

(1) (a) Either by himself or by any servant or agent sell or supply in any licensed premises or club or dispatch therefrom any intoxicating liquor to be consumed either on or off the premises; or
(b) Consume any intoxicating liquor in or

take it from such premises or club;

unless it is paid for before or at the time when it is supplied or dispatched or taken away.

Provided always that if the liquor is sold or supplied for consumption at a meal supplied at the same time and is consumed at such meal, this provision shall not be deemed to be contravened if the price of the liquor is paid together with the price of such meal and before the person partaking thereof quits the pre-

(2) Introduce or cause to be introduced into the area any intoxicating liquor unless it is paid for before it is so introduced.

Long Pull Prohibited.

9. No person shall either by himself or by any servant or agent in any licensed premises or club sell or supply to any person as the measure of intoxicating liquor for which he asks an amount exceeding that measure.

Dilution of Spirits.

10. The sale of whisky, brandy and rum reduced to a number of degrees under proof which falls between 25 and 50, and of gin reduced to a number of degrees under proof which falls between 35 and 50, is hereby permitted, and accordingly, in determining whether an offence has been committed under the Sale of Food and Drugs Acts by selling to the prejudice of the purchaser brandy, whisky, rum or gin not adulterated otherwise than by the admixture of water it shall be a good defence to prove that such admixture has not reduced the spirit more than 50° under proof.

Explanatory Provisions.

(a) Nothing in this Order authorises any licensed premises to be kept open for the sale of intoxicating liquor except during the hours permitted under the general provisions of the Licensing Acts.

(b) The prohibition under this Order of the sale supply and consumption of intoxicating liquor except on and during certain days and hours is not subject to the exceptions provided for in the Licensing Acts with respect to bona fide travellers and the supply of intoxicating liquor at railway stations or any other provisions in those Acts enabling intoxicating liquor to be supplied during closing hours in special cases.
(c) The expression "licensed premises"

includes any premises or place where the sale

 of intoxicating liquor is carried on under a licence.

(d) This Order does not affect the sale or dispatch of intoxicating liquor to a trader for the purposes of his trade or to a registered club for the purposes of the club.

(e) This Order does not affect the sale or supply of intoxicating liquor to or in any canteen where the sale of intoxicating liquor is carried on under the authority of a Secretary of State or of the Admiralty.

Provisions as to previous Orders for Parts of the Area.

12

(a) This Order shall be substituted for the Orders of the Central Control Board (Liquor Traffic) made respectively on the 7th day of August, 1915, for the areas of Newport, Barry and Cardiff, and on the 11th day of November, 1915, for the Pembroke Area, which said Orders are hereby revoked.

(b) The Order of the Central Control Board (Liquor Traffic) made on the 5th day of February, 1916, for the Lancashire and Cheshire Area, as amended by a General Order of the Board made on the 20th day of March, 1916, shall, in so far as the said Order affects any part of the County of Flint, be re-enacted by this Order and remain in full force.

Exhibition of the Order.

13. The Secretary of every club to which this Order applies and every holder of a licence for the sale of intoxicating liquor shall keep permanently affixed in some conspicuous place in the club or in each public room in the licensed premises a copy of this Order and any other notice required by the Board to be so affixed: Provided always that in that part of the County of Flint, to which the said Order of the Board made on the 5th day of February, 1916, applies, it shall be sufficient to continue to keep affixed a copy of the said last mentioned Order, and the said amending Order, as provided by the terms thereof respectively.

Commencement of Order.

14. This Order shall come into force on the eighth day of May, 1916.

All ships (other than British ships of less than 3,500 tons gross tonnage, when trading coastwise or to or from the Channel islands and not carrying passengers) whilst bound from, and whilst navigating in the waters from, the Downs Pilot Station to Gravesend or vice versa, must be conducted by Pilots licensed by the London Trinity House.

Area C.—Enclosed by a line joining Chewton Bunny to Christchurch ledge buoy, thence to a point 3 miles, 180° (S. 15° W. Mag.), from St. Albans head, thence to St. Albans head.

- 2. The term craft as used herein includesships, barges, boats and vessels of all descriptions, and the orders apply to all fishing and pleasure craft.

Pagham: Within one mile radius from

the coast watching hut.

Selsea: Within one mile radius from Coastguard station.

Sandown bay: Inside the line joining Culver cliff and Dunnose head.

Ventnor: Within one mile of Ventnor pier.

Christchurch: Inside the line joining Chewton Bunny to Christchurch ledge buoy, and thence to Christchurch head.

Christchurch head to Sandbanks: Within

500 yards of low water mark.
