THE Duke of Savoy went hence the 23th instant for Milan, to pass a few days there. The French make Preparations for an early Campaign on this side; and seem by the great quantities of Provisions they lay up at Nizza, to have some design upon *Comi*; At the same time all possible care is taken to put that place into a good condition of Defence, as well by working without Intermision upon the new Fortifications, as by augmenting the Garrison, and supplying it with Ammunition, Provisions, and all other Necessaries; His Royal Highness has given Orders to all his Troops to be in a readiness to march by the end of the next month.

Milan, Feb. 26. The Duke of Savoy arrived here last Night, and had this day a Conference with our Governor about the Affairs of the Campaign. The German Recruits arrive every day; And the Officers in the Service of this State, have received repeated Orders to compleat their Troops by the middle of March. The French buy up all the Corn they can in *Italy*; and we hear that the Pope has given them leave to Transport a good quantity out of the Ecclesiastical Dominions.

Venice, March 5. The new Doge *Silvestro Falier* was Crowned on Saturday last with the usual Ceremonies. On Monday parted from hence a great Convoy for the *Levant*.

Vienna, March 3. There have been some Proposals made to the Emperor for lessening the number of Barks and Gallies employed on the *Danube*, in order to save part of that Expence, but upon consideration of their great usefulness, and the Force the Enemy are preparing by Water, the Emperor has resolved to have as great a Fleet on the *Danube* this year as he had the last, and accordingly Orders are given for refitting the same. We have Advice from *Hungary*, that some Turkish Troops were drawing together near *Semerdrina*, to conduct a Convoy of Provisions to *Temeswar* and *Gyula*. The Count *de Kaunitz* parted from hence this Week with the Character of the Emperors En-

voy Extraordinary to the States General of the *United Provinces*. The Count *de Marwitz*, who went lately in the same Quality to *Poland* to assist at the Diet of that Kingdom, is returned hither.

Francfort, March 11. The Elector of *Cologne* arrived here on Tuesday last, and having in the usual manner been presented with Wine and fresh Provisions by the Magistrates of this City; His Electoral Highness proceeded yesterday on his Journey towards *Cologne*. All Things are preparing in these Parts for the approaching Campaign; The Officers of the Confederate Troops are very diligent in making their Recruits and the Committaries to provide Magazines in this and other places for the use of the Forces that are to act on the *Upper Rhine*. The French make Magazines likewise in all their Frontier Towns; 'Tis written from *Alsace*, that they have almost compleated their Infantry, but that they still want a great number of Hories to remount their Cavalry.

Cologne, March 12. Prince *Lewis of Baden* passed yesterday through this place in his way to *Francfort*; whither General *Thungen* is gone from *Mentz* to meet and confer with his Highness. The Elector of *Cologne* came yesterday in the Evening to *Cobientz*, and is expected this night at *Bon*.

Paris, March 15. The French King set out this morning for *Chantilly*, where he designs to stay two days, and to be the 18th at *Compiègne*, to take a review of the Troops of the Household, and the new Regiments of Carabiers; after which the Court will return to *Chantilly*, and thence to *Versailles*; and 'tis reckoned that the whole Journey will be of 16 or 17 days. All the Colonels that had leave to come hither are ordered to repair forthwith to their respective Commands. Divers Troops are marching towards *Dauphine* to form the Army under the Command of Monsieur *Gatignat*; and we are told, that among others, 20 Battalions are ordered thither from *Alsace* and *Burgundy*. They write from *Picardy* and *Champagne*, that those Provinces had received Orders from their Intendants to furnish a great quantity of Corn for the use of the French Forces, and to carry the same to such Places as were appointed by the Committaries, to whom it was to be delivered, which had occasioned very heavy Complaints and Murmurs of the People, by reason of the great scarcity there is among them of Corn, and that this will raise the Price yet higher; and besides, the Owners of what is now exacted do not know when they shall be paid for it. Though the many Creations of Offices that have been projected of late have been very burthensome to a great many People, and withal have not answered the expectation of the Court, yet the present Necessities they are under force them still to have Recourse to the same Methods;

and here is now a talk of erecting two Presidents a Mortier, and divers new Counsellors in the Parliament of Paris, as also at Bourdeaux. Monsieur de Vauban is gone to St. Malo, with a design to build some new Works on the Rocks and little Islands, to secure the entrance into that Port. Orders are given to take 200 Officers and 800 private Soldiers out of the Hospital of the Invalides, or those that are fittest for Service, who are to be employed with the Militia and some other Troops, as they were the last year for the Guard of our Coasts. The Marechal de Tourville took yesterday his leave of the French King, in order to his departure for Brest.

Brussels, March 14. The Marechal de Boufflers, who went to Versailles, that he might appear as the Head of the Regiment of French Guards, whereof he is Colonel, at the late Review in the Plains of Quille, is returned to Lille, with Orders to take a general Review of all the French Troops quartered in those Parts. The French continue to make great Provision of Forage, &c. between the Sambre and the Meuse, which confirms the Report of their designing to draw a Body of their Troops together against the time of the Election at Liege; The Allies to observe their motions are likewise preparing to form a Camp near the Meuse; And there is besides a very good Garrison in the Town. Two days ago a Spanish Party of 150 Dragoons of the Garrison of Alost, met a French Party of 80 Men, near Aische, about 3 Leagues from hence, of whom they killed 20, and brought in the rest Prisoners.

Brussels, March 17. The Elector of Bavaria intends to set out from hence to-morrow, to meet his Brother the Elector of Cologne at Liège, and to employ his Interests in order to his being chosen into that vacant See; to which the Great Master of the Teutonic Order, with several others, are also Pretenders. His Electoral Highness has ordered a third payment to be made to the Spanish Troops for this year. Frequent Parties are sent out from our Garrisons to seize upon all Wagons and Horses going either empty or laden, towards the French Frontiers. We have Advice, That Captain de Barr arrived at Dunkirk the 12th instant, with 7 or 8 Men of War, or Privateers, and 22 Merchant Ships.

Hague, March 16. The States of Holland meet again to-morrow. The Deputies of the Admiralties are come hither to Confer with the Secretary of the States General about our Sea Affairs. The Sieur de Geldermassen has been at Bonnatch by Order of the States to view the Horses that are to be employed in the Train of Artillery, and is expected back this Evening. The French by the motion of their Troops towards the Meuse, and the Stores they have provided at Namur seem to design some attempt upon Liege; On the other hand, the Confederate Forces that are quartered on that side will draw together so soon as 'tis found necessary, and in the mean time all things are put into a readiness for that purpose.

Hague, March 19. The Deputies of the States General to the States of Pruzeland returned hither the 17th instant, and this morning made Report of their Negotiation in the Assembly of the States General, of which we know not the particulars, but in general it is said to have been successful. The Duke of Hessein Plon is gone from Mechelen to Maastricht; from whence he designs to accompany the Elector of Bavaria to Liège. The last Letters from Copenhagen tell us, That the matter about the Dutch Ships stop in the Sound, and the Danish Ships at Amsterdam, would according to all appearances be suddenly accommodated. Prince Lewis of Baden arrived the 12th instant at Frankfurt; And the Elector of Cologne the 14th at Bonn.

Plsmouth, March 11. On the 7th arrived here the America of and for London, John Browne Master from Jamaica but last from Islands. The St. Lewis of O Porto from Havana, laden with Wines for London. The Flying Hart of Middleburg, with Hides and Dyewood from Curassow. And the St. Anthony from O Porto bound to Rotterdam. The 8th was brought into this Port by two Dutch Captains a French Prize, called the Swallow of Bayona. The 10th arrived here the St. John Baptist from Venus. And this day sailed hence to the Eastward a Dutch Man of War with 7 or 8 fil of Merchant Ships under his Command. This Evening came in about 20 Sail of outward bound Merchant men, under Convoy of 3 English Men of War.

Kensington, March 13. His Majesty returned hither this Evening from Stratton near Winchester.
