Genova, Febr. 27.

Divers Conferences have of late been held here to consider about the Contributions that are demanded of this Republick by the Comissary General of the Emperors Forces in Italy, but there is yet nothing determined in this matter. In the mean time 'tis said, that a German Regiment is marching towards the Frontiers of this State.

Turin, Febr. 27. We hear that 3 Regiments of Brandenburgers are to come hither against the next Campaign; and that his Royal Highness has bin taken into his Service a Regiment of *Saxe Eschenbach*. His Royal Highness is expected back from *Milan* in few days. Divers Defectors are lately come over to us from the French.

Milan, March 3. The Duke of Savoy parted from hence the first Instant on his return to *Turin*, having, during the short stay he made in this City, been present at several Councils that were held about the Affairs of the War. The Marquis de *Leganes* has appointed a general Muster of our Troops, to be on the 10th of this Month. The Duke of *Mantua* has agreed to pay 50000 *Dublaens* by way of Contribution to the German Troops, besides what's demanded of the Duchy of *Mantferat*; But the Sums are not yet adjusted with the Great Duke of *Tuscany*, the Duke of *Parma*, and the Republick of *Genova*. The Duke of *Modena* refuses to pay any. We have an account by the last Letters from *Naples*, that the new Levies went on with good success in that Kingdom, and that a considerable number of them would be speedily sent hither to recruit the Troops in this Service.

Venice, March 5. The Coronation of our new Doge *Silvestro Valier* was performed with all the usual Pomp and Solemnity; and the Publick Rejoycings are still continued on this occasion; but at the same time the Care of the War is not omitted. A great Convoy failed some days ago for the *Levant*; and another will follow in a short time. The new Levies are continued; and several Gallies and Men of War are fitting out in the Arsenal here.

Warsaw, Feb. 28. The Letters from *Zeliew* of the 10th Instant gave an account of the King of *Poland's* Recovery, and of his Intention to return hither so soon as the Weather was a little better, but by the Letters of a few days since, we understand that his Fever was returned, and had again confined him to his Bed. A Party of our Troops departed on the 4th Instant a small Body of Tartars, killed divers of them, and took several others, with the Officer that commanded them, Prisoners.

Lisbon, Feb. 22. There are now in this River 3 French Men of War and a Fireship, under the Command of Monsieur *Rinzur*, with a Venetian and two Genovese Ships which they have brought in; They depart for *France* with the first fair Wind.

Madrid, March 4. We have an account from *Cadix*, that Sir *Francis Wheeler* sailed from thence the 19th of the last Month with the Fleet of Men of War and Merchant Ships bound for the *Streights*; but that they were put back again by contrary Winds. Don *Pedro Corbette* has resigned the Command of the Spanish Armada, which, 'tis believed, will be given to Admiral *Papachino*. The new raised Troops march for *Catalonia*.

Vienna, March 10. The Cardinal de *Collonitz* has resigned his place of Treasurer, or Chief Intendant of the Emperors Revenues; but his Successor is not yet declared. The Duke de *Croy*, who is to Command the Imperial Army again this year in *Hungary*, is expected here this Evening or to morrow. The *Sieur d'Assenberg* is continued in the Command of the Fleet on the *Danube*, which is to consist of the same number of Barks and Gallies it did the last year. The Letters from the Frontiers tell us, That the Workmen, who of late have been employed on the Fortifications of *Essticke*, were all sent to *Peter Waradin*, to hasten the perfecting the Works of that place, upon which the Enemy seem to design some attempt at the opening of the Campaign. We hear from *Transylvania*, That the Tartars have made an Incurision into the Province of the *Syculus*; who being exempted on account of their former good Services, from quartering of Soldiers, had themselves undertaken to guard the Passes on that side; but not taking the care that was necessary to secure them, the Tartars upon Information thereof sent out a Party of 300 men, who found the said Passes very slightly guarded, and easily forced them; These were followed by a Body of 3000 Tartars, who plundered several Villages, and then retired with their Booty. General *Schoning* continues still under Arrest, and even under a stronger Guard than was set upon him at his being first brought hither.

Francfort, March 17. Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* arrived here on the 12th Instant, and having had a long Conference with the Count de *Thunigen*, Governor of *Mentz*, the Count de *Stirum*, and other General Officers, who came hither to meet him, he parted from hence again the 13th for *Hailbron* and *Guntzburg*. 'Tis said that from the last of these places his Highness intends to go to *Vienna*, and to return thither about the middle of the next month. By his Highness's Order they are making some new Works at *Hydsiberg* for the better defence of that place.

Cologne, March 19. The Elector of *Cologne* went hence the 17th for *Maesricht*. They write from *Alface*.

Alsace, That 20 Battalions were ordered from thence to Piedmont, and that they would begin their march about the 20th of this month.

Paris, March 19. The French King arrived at Chantilly the 15th instant in the Evening; The 16th and 17th he took a Review of the 4 Troops of his Guards du Corps, and went thence the 18th to Compiègne. The Dauphin is to Command again this Summer the French Army on the Rhine; And the Duke of Orleans the Troops appointed for the Guard of our Coasts. The Colonels and other Officers that were here are all gone to their respective Commands. The Project for Creating more new Offices goes on; and here is even a talk of augmenting those at the Court, which are to be Sold as the rest have been. In Picardy and Champagne the People are highly Discontented at the Orders of the Court obliging them to furnish great quantities of Corn for the Army; The scarcity whereof still continues, and occasions great Misery and Complaints in all parts of this Kingdom.

Maastricht, March 19. The Electors of Bavaria and Cologne arrived here yesterday in the Evening, accompanied by the Duke of Holstein Plœn, General Tercas, and other General Officers who went out to meet them; Their Electoral Highness's were received by the whole Garrison in Arms, and Saluted with a discharge of all the Cannon of the place. This Morning they viewed the Fortifications, and in the afternoon went from hence to Liege.

Brussels, March 21. His Electoral Highness of Bavaria parted from hence the 18th instant, intending to be the same Evening at Maastricht, and to go the next day to Liege; His Electoral Highness at his going away, appointed the Marquis de Bedmar to Command here during his absence. The Duke of Wirtemberg is returned hither from Liege and Maastricht, having taken a Review of those Garrisons, as also of all the Confederate Troops that are quartered near the Meuse. A Camp is going to be formed between Liege and Maastricht, and another near Louvain. Orders are given for adding some new Works to the Fortifications of Leeuwe, and for making Baraques to lodge 2000 Soldiers. They write from Mons, That the Marschal de Boufflers is expected there this day; They say the French Foot is for the most part recruited; but that their Cavalry is in an ill Condition, and that they shall have 12000 Horse less this year in the Field than they had the last.

Hague, March 23. N. S. The Duke of Brunswick Wolfenbutzel returned hither on Saturday, and went this morning to Amsterdam. Monsieur Geldermassin is come back from Bommel, and has given the States an account of the number and condition of the Horses appointed for the Train of Artillery. The States have taken into their Service 3 Regiments of Hesse-Cassel, who are accordingly on their march towards Flanders. The Allies are preparing to form a Camp near the Meuse.
