With reference to the announcement of the award of the Distinguished Conduct Medals in the Honours Supplement to the London Gazette dated 3rd June, 1916, the following are the acts of gallantry for which the decorations have been awarded:—

9894 Pnr. Sjt. A. G. F. Ackary, 2nd Bn., S. Lan. R.

For consistent good work as pioneer serjeant since the commencement of the campaign. He has done fine work in the trenches.

8959 Sjt. A. Adams, 2nd Bn., Welsh R.

For conspicuous gallantry when leading his platoon to the attack. He also rallied men of another unit who were retiring.

271 Sjt. (Actg. Coy. S/M) T. Aitken, 5th Bn., Bord. R. (T.F.).

For organising and consistent gallantry when organising and directing dangerous work in front of the parapet. He has set a fine example.

960 Actg. Bombr. A. Allan, C. By., 68th Bde., R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry in repeatedly repairing telephone wires under continuous shrapnel fire.

9558 Coy. S/M. A. Alldridge, 2nd Bn., S. Lan. R.

For consistent good work throughout the campaign. He is always cheery and reliable and has set a fine example.

15770 Cpl. A. E. Allibone, 7th Bn., North'n R.

For conspicuous gallantry when, after part of the trench had been blown in, he rescued a wounded man from over the parapet and tended all the other wounded. He then fetched stretcher bearers under heavy machine-gun fire in broad daylight. He has also proved himself a daring bomber on several occasions.

M2/077136 Pte. G. R. Allport, M.T., A.S.C. (attd. L.A.C. Batteries).

For conspicuous good service in the field.

P.W. 2982 Sjt. J. Anderson, 18th Bn., Midd'x R.

For conspicuous gallantry. When the enemy shelled his working party and inflicted casualties, he rallied his men, got them into safety and then returned to assist the wounded. He carried one man on his back. He has been wounded working under shell fire.

139 Sjt. N. E. Andrews, Dorset Yeo. (T.F.).

For conspicuous gallantry in a successful charge and pursuit of the enemy.

118 Sq. S/M. J. Archibald, 1/3rd Sco. Horse (T.F.).

For consistent gallantry and good work, notably when on reconnaissance.

4 Sjt. (Actg. Coy. S/M.) J. Armstrong, Ches. Fd. Coy., R.E. (T.F.).

For conspicuous and consistent good work throughout the campaign. He has set a fine example of cool gallantry when dangerous work had to be done.

1119 Pte. H. D. Ashley, Dorset Yeo. (T.F.).

For conspicuous gallantry in a successful charge and pursuit of the enemy.

570 Cpl. T. S. Askin, 1/3rd W. Rid. By., R.F.A. (T.F.).

For consistent good work as signalling N.C.O. He is always cheery and full of courage. On one occasion during operations he was mending wires under shell fire for 50 consecutive hours.

45251 Sjt. H. Atkin, 64th Bde., R.F.A.

For consistent good and gallant work when laying and mending telephone lines under heavy fire.

2403 Actg. Cpl. T. W. Atkins, 1st Bucks Bn., Oxf. and Bucks. L.I. (T.F.). (attd. 145th Bde. Machine Gun Coy.).

For conspicuous gallantry on many occasions, notably when, although he had one leg shattered and the other fractured by shell fire which wrecked his gun emplacement, he crawled some distance to get help for the other men of the team.

21826 Pte. A. Ault, 1st Bn., Notts. and Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry on several occasions, notably when he assisted a serjeant to bring in wounded men from in front of the parapet under very dangerous circumstances. He has always volunteered for any hazardous work and has shown complete contempt of danger.

2013 Coy. S/M. (Actg. S/M.) F. F. Bailey, 6th Bn., Lond. R. (T.F.).

For consistent good work and for conspicuous devotion to duty in action.

9408 Coy. S/M. H. Baker, 1st Bn., L'pool R.

For consistent good work since the commencement of the campaign. He has taken a gallant part in every action in which his battalion has been engaged, and has proved himself a cool and capable leader.

2191 Pte. C. Banham, 1/3rd E. Anglian Fld. Amb., R.A.M.C. (T.F.).

For conspicuous gallantry. He was wounded while assisting two wounded men from the firing line, but, in spite of this, he rendered first aid to a third wounded man, and then got all three to the field ambulance.

79 Sjt. (Actg. Coy. S/M.) H. Banks, 1/6th Bn., W. York. R., T.F.

For consistent good work. On one occasion, when his company had suffered severely, his coolness and presence of mind were the means of saving the lives of several

wounded men. Later on the same day he helped to dig out some buried men under heavy fire and in full view of the enemy.

1535 L/C A. Barclay, Ayr Yeo. (T.F.).

For conspicuous gallantry. He went out under heavy fire to erect wire in front of a captured trench, and remained on duty 24 hours without relief.

16/419 Sjt. B. K. Barnes, 16th Bn., North'd Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry. On one occasion he dashed out under heavy shell fire and brought in a wounded man. On another he rescued four buried men while heavy shells were falling round him. On another, when his platoon had suffered severe casualties, he sent the men away to a safer place and himself remained in an exposed position dressing the wounded.

1737 Sjt. C. Barnes, 5th Bn., Manch. R., T.F.

For conspicuous good work during operations; also during heavy bombardments by the enemy.

3/7676 Cpl. E. Barnes, 1st Bn., Bedf. R.

For conspicuous gallantry. He has frequently led bombing parties against the enemy and has done very good work on patrols and with wiring parties. He has set a fine example of coolness and courage.

84/12762 Cpl. J. Barrett, 4th Bn., S. Wales Bord.

For conspicuous gallantry during a heavy bombardment by the enemy. He moved up and down the trench encouraging the men quite regardless of his own danger.

2290 Sjt. W. H. Barrett, 2nd Bn., Lond. R., T.F.

For consistent gallantry and good work as Company Grenade N.C.O. He is a fine instructor and leader.

25847 Bomr. E. Bartlett, 21st Trench Mortar By., R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and skill on several occasions, notably when, under a very heavy shell fire, he ably supported his officer and continued to fire the trench mortars till all the ammunition was expended.

14985 Cpl. W. Barry, 1st Bn., R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry. Although wounded in the head, he went across the open to withdraw a bombing post which was being heavily shelled. He bound up eight wounded men, and refused to be attended to himself till their wounds had all been dressed. He is an expert bomber and has done fine work.

4607 Pte. G. Barton, 11th Hrs.

For conspicuous good service in the field.

26363 Coy. S/M. C. J. Bastable, 104th Fd. Coy., R.E.

For consistent good work. He was in charge of a section for several days after his officer had been killed and carried out work in the front trenches with skill and bravery.

1198 Sjt. C. A. Batham, 1st Bn., Lan. Fus.

For conspicuous devotion to duty when in

charge of stretcher bearers. He made five journeys up to his waist in freezing water to assist the wounded. He carried one wounded man on his back to the Dressing Station.

7172 L/Sjt. G. J. Batley, 1st Bn., Norf. R.

For conspicuous gallantry when repeatedly repairing breaches in our parapet during a heavy bombardment. He has set a fine example and has been wounded.

8909 Actg. Boimr. F. Batt, R.F.A. (attd. 109th Hy. By., R.G.A.).

For consistent good work as a linesman. He has patrolled lines in a heavily shelled area almost daily for a year, and maintained the communications. On one occasion by gallantly crossing over an area which was being heavily shelled he got a comrade to safety.

36537 Pte. H. Baulcomb, R.A.M.C.

For consistent good work and devotion to duty. On one occasion he worked day and night for four consecutive days.

3545 Actg. S./M. (now Qrmr. and Hon. Lt.) R. Baxter, P.S., 1/5th Bn., W. Rid. R., T.F.

For consistent good work. He has always set a fine example to N.C.O.'s and men. He has been wounded.

16644 Cpl. B. Baynes, 10th Bn., York and Lanc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and initiative on several occasions, notably when he kept his men working steadily under hostile bomb fire, and when he cleared a wrecked post under snipers' fire.

1137 L./C. A. St. J. Beale, Bucks. Yeo., T.F.

For gallantry and devotion to duty when on patrol.

8696 Sjt. J. Beards, 5th Bn., S. Staff. R., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry at a critical time. He opened rapid fire on the enemy, who were counter-attacking, and at the same time drove off their bombers. Although wounded in the head he stuck to his post all the afternoon.

S/2085 C.Q.M.S. E. S. Beech, 7th Bn., Sea. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry. At a critical moment Coy. Q.M.S. Beech and L.-Corporal Vickery steadied the men by getting up on the parapet and playing tunes on mouth organs, although exposed to heavy fire.

6561 Spr. J. Beech, 1/2nd W. Lancs. Fld. Coy., R.E., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry. He continued to build a parapet for five hours under heavy rifle and machine gun fire.

2871 Coy. S./M. E. P. Bell, 1/14th Bn., Lond. R., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry and good work. He led his platoon with great skill in the attack. On another occasion he reconnoitred the enemy's lines under heavy fire, and later rallied his men and tended the wounded at great personal risk.

3/3218 Sjt. (actg. Coy. S./M.) B. P. Bellamy, 6th Bn., York. and Lanc. R.

For consistent good work and for the fine example he has shown to his men.

9/11885 S./M. G. P. Bennett, 9th Bn., W. Rid. R.

For consistent good work and gallant conduct under trying circumstances.

12133 Pte. W. G. Bennett, 8th Bn., Glouc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry when rescuing a wounded man from in front of the fire trench. With another private he dragged the wounded man back through the wire under a hot rifle fire.

1374 Pte. C. Bent, 7th Bn., Lanc. Fus., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry during the occupation of a crater made by a mine explosion and during a counter-attack carried out later.

40802 Actg. Sjt. J. Bentley, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and good work in dangerous positions.

4865 S./M. R. Bertram, 11th Bn., Arg. and Suth'd Highrs.

For consistent good work and zeal throughout.

S/19453 Sjt. (Actg. Staff S./M.) W. G. Bews, A.S.C.

For excellent work as Acting Senior Warrant and Confidential Clerk.

17843 Q.M.S. (Actg. S./M.) R. C. Blair, R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous devotion to duty. On one occasion he remained on duty during operations for 96 consecutive hours. He has also been brought to notice for marked bravery.

2137 Sjt. G. Blyth, 5th Bn., Manch. R., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry on several occasions, notably when in charge of a party of snipers, he fearlessly exposed himself in order to set an example at a critical moment.

10337 Actg. Sjt. W. C. Bodycott, 6th Bn., Leic. R.

For conspicuous good work on patrol and when in charge of wiring parties in dangerous places.

5474 Actg. S./M. L. Bonney, 9th Bn., R. Suss. R.

For consistent good work and devotion to duty, notably during three days of operations and during a period of mining activity.

S/16147 Staff S./M. A. E. J. Booth, A.S.C.

For consistent good work, zeal and ability as a Chief Clerk. He displayed great coolness when the Headquarters was heavily shelled.

15537 Staff Sjt. F. Booth, R.A.M.C.

For excellent work. He was in charge of an advanced depôt of medical stores for a

considerable time and kept up supplies to troops and hospitals often under shell fire.

7846 Sjt. (Actg. Coy. Q.M.S.) J. W. Booth, 1st Bn., W. York. R.

For conspicuous and consistent gallantry and good work as Signalling Serjeant since the commencement of the campaign. He has laid and repaired telephone wires under heavy fire, and has always set a fine example.

2276 Sjt. D. N. Borthwick, 7th Bn., Durh. L.I., T.F.

For consistent good work as Transport Serjeant. He has shown great courage in trying circumstances.

44 Sjt. W. Boyd, 1/6th Bn., Arg. and Suth'd Highrs., T.F.

For consistent good work. He has proved himself a good and fearless leader.

S/579 Staff S./M. W. Boyer, 42nd Divl. Train, A.S.C., T.F.

For conspicuous devotion to duty. He set a fine example of coolness when his depôt was heavily shelled.

6897 Coy. S./M. A. Boyle, 6th Bn., R. Sc. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry when reconnoitring an enemy trench by daylight at a time when our guns were shelling the trench. He obtained valuable information.

624 L./C. C. Bradley, Dorset Yeo., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry in a successful charge and pursuit of the enemy.

96385 Bomr. J. Bradley, "C" By., 53rd Bde., R.F.A.

For consistent good work as telephonist and linesman. He mended wires during a gas attack by the enemy.

62115 Spr. W. Bradshaw, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and good work until wounded. He frequently repaired telephone wires under fire.

1714 Coy. S./M. J. Brammall, 5th Bn., York. R., T.F.

For consistent good work and ability as Coy. Serjeant-Major. He has repeatedly volunteered for and undertaken dangerous work, and has inspired all under him with confidence.

N.R. 35 Cpl. W. Branson, 1/4th Bn., Leic. R., T.F.

For consistent gallantry and good work. On one occasion he attacked four of the enemy and bayoneted three. Later, though wounded, he continued bombing.

8011 Actg. S./M. J. Brass, 7th Bn., R. Sc. Fus.

For consistent good work throughout.

511 Coy. S./M. J. Brennan, 8th Bn., Manch. R., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry when establishing a post within a few yards of an occupied enemy trench. He refused to leave the post for thirty-six hours till the work was finished.

9331 L./Sjt. A. G. C. Bridger, C. Gds. (attd. 1st Gds. Bde., Machine Gun Coy.).

For consistent and conspicuous gallantry, notably when in charge of his gun in an important but exposed position. The emplacement was three times blown in by the enemy's bombardment, but, although slightly wounded, he rebuilt it each time, and was fully prepared to meet the enemy when the attack came on.

511 Coy. S./M. (Actg. S./M.) J. G. Brooker, 8th Bn., E. Kent R.

For conspicuous gallantry. He carried his officer, who was severely wounded, under heavy fire to a place of safety, and then took command of the company and carried on with great efficiency.

7361 Pte. G. Brown, 5th Bn., R. Sc. Fus., T.F. (attd. 8th Corps, Mining Coy.).

For conspicuous gallantry when rescuing an officer and N.C.O. after the explosion of a mine under very dangerous conditions.

S/10978 Sjt. P. Brown, 6th Bn., Cam'n Highrs.

For consistent good work. On two occasions he has extricated buried men under heavy shell fire.

2471 Pte. W. Brown, 1/9th Bn., Arg. and Suth'd Highrs., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry. He assisted to bring in two wounded officers and to extricate some buried men when exposed to heavy shell fire.

3785 Pte. H. Bryant, 5th Bn., Bedf. R., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry. When wounded he got together a party of about thirty men for an attack on a hill, and continued at his post till wounded a second time.

2043 Cpl. J. T. Bryant, 1/1st Bn., Lond. R., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry. When his company commander was wounded in an advance over the open under heavy fire, he remained with him for an hour, bound up his wounds, and then carried him to safety.

84102 Actg. Bomr. F. Buckingham, "C" By., 125th Bde., R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry. Although badly wounded by a shell, which killed one driver and wounded two others, he managed to assist in unhooking the horses and getting the teams into safety, and also in removing the wounded men. He worked until he became unconscious.

260 Sqdn. S./M. F. Bunker, Hert. Yeo., T.F.

For conspicuous devotion to duty. When wounded by shrapnel he refused to report himself sick, and stuck to his duties in the trenches. He has done fine work with stretcher-bearers.

3/2520 Coy. S./M. G. Burnop, 9th Bn., Essex R.

For consistent good work. He set a fine example of steady discipline in the trenches, and it was a great loss to his battalion when

he was severely wounded, losing a leg and an eye.

12252 Pte. W. J. Burns, 8th Bn., R. W. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry as a stretcher-bearer. He went out to assist a man wounded by a shell, and remained with him after a second shell had wounded him a second time.

10188 Pte. H. Burrows, 3rd Bn. (formerly 2nd Bn.), R. Berks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry. During operations he jumped up on the parapet of a captured enemy trench and shot down their bombers till he was eventually severely wounded.

2308 Sjt. J. Bury, 1/6th Bn., W. Rid. R., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry. When the enemy bombed a post of which he was in charge, causing some casualties, he stuck to the post and bombed the enemy back single-handed. This is not the first occasion on which he has shown great courage.

210 By. S./M. A. W. Bush, 1/6th County of Lond. By., R.F.A., T.F.

For conspicuous good work when with his battery, frequently under heavy fire.

5346 S./M. C. H. Buss, 6th Bn., Som. L.I.

For consistent good work and gallant service. He has set a fine example to those under him.

139138 Sjt. H. T. Byles, 177th Coy., R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and good work on several occasions, notably when he tried to rescue some men in a wrecked shaft under heavy shell fire, and when he volunteered to take rations up to the trenches, also under heavy shell fire.

115 Coy. S./M. P. P. Byrne, 1/9th Bn., L'pool R., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry during an attack. When his officers had become casualties, he took command and pushed forward. Later he brought in under fire a wounded man of another regiment.

1601 Sjt. W. Cadden, 2/5th Bn., Lan. Fus., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry and resource. He organised and led a bomb attack, and has shown great ingenuity and daring when reconnoitring.

98 Actg. S./M. W. Callow, 1/7th Bn., R. War. R., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry. He picked up and threw out of his trench a live enemy bomb which had hit him on the chest. The bomb exploded a few seconds later. He thereby probably saved casualties.

1088 Sjt. E. Catherall, 1/5th Bn., R. W. Fus., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry and good work, notably when in charge of wiring parties and risky patrols.

1359 Cpl. W. B. Chambers, 1/2nd W. Rid. Fd. Coy., R.E., T.F.

For consistent good work in the mainte-

nance of bridges. On one occasion he effected repairs under heavy shell fire, and set a fine example to those under him.

966 L./C. C. J. Chapman, Bucks. Yeo., T.F.

For gallantry and devotion to duty when on patrol.

1416 Cpl. H. Chasney, 1/1st Berks. Yeo., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry when leading a section in an attack. He also did good work rallying men who had become scattered in the darkness.

431 Coy. S./M. G. Christie, 1/1st Lowland Fd. Coy., R.E., T.F.

For consistent good work and devotion to duty throughout the campaign.

107432 Sjt. T. Christie, 30th Divl. Sig. Coy., R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and good work throughout. He showed great bravery in several actions and has been wounded.

19238 Staff Q.M.S. (Actg. Staff S.M.) R. Clayton, A.S.C.

For excellent work as Senior Clerk.

7 Coy. S./M. T. F. Clements, 1/1st N. Mid. Fd. Coy., R.E., T.F.

For consistent good work, notably on one occasion when he was in charge of a party which repaired a blown-in parapet, working under fire for several hours.

5407 Sjt. D. J. Clow, 2nd Sco. Horse, T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry in standing by his wounded officer under heavy fire after the party had been ordered to seek cover, and later in assisting both the wounded officer and a wounded man into safety.

18/16709 L./C. A. Cohen, 18th Bn., L'pool R.

For conspicuous gallantry. When an enemy bomb fell in the trench he rushed forward and detonated the fuse with his feet, thus stopping the explosion of the bomb and saving several casualties.

3116 L./C. A. Collens, 8th Bn., Manch. R., T.F.

For conspicuous devotion to duty. He worked for seven hours in the construction of a trench under a sustained rifle fire.

826 L./Cpl. C. Collins, Dorset Yeo., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry in a successful charge and pursuit of the enemy.

2477 Sjt. C. A. Collins, 29th Divl. Cyclist Coy., A. Cyclist Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry, notably when carrying ammunition across the open. He has proved himself a capable leader, and has set a fine example.

46555 Sjt. C. B. Colston, R.E.

For consistent good work and devotion to duty.

18191 Cpl. W. H. Corkish, 20th Inf. Bde., Machine Gun Coy. (formerly 2nd Bn., Bord. R.).

For conspicuous and consistent gallantry

and resource with his machine-guns during several actions.

7214 Sjt. P. Costello, 2nd Bn., S. Gds.

For conspicuous gallantry. He was in charge of the leading party in an attack on the enemy's barricade. He kept his party well in hand, and showed great coolness and bravery throughout the fight.

906 Cpl. (Actg. Coy. S./M.) C. Couchman, 1/2nd E. Anglian Fld. Coy., R.E., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry when assisting to rescue miners after the explosion of an enemy mine and when exploiting the extent of the damage.

5350 Pte. W. Coulter, 2nd Sco. Horse, T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry in standing by his wounded officer under heavy fire after the party had been ordered to seek cover, and later in assisting both the wounded officer and a wounded man into safety.

1003 Actg. Coy. S./M. J. A. Cox, 6th Bn., Lond. R., T.F. (attd. 140th Inf. Bde. Machine Gun Coy.).

For consistent good work. He has shown great coolness and promptness of action in action on more than one occasion.

10234 L./Sjt. S. A. De Ste Croix, 11th Bn., R. War. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and skill on patrol. On one occasion with only two men he drove off, with bombs, a large enemy working party. On another occasion he led a party of four men and destroyed with bombs, under heavy fire, some loopholes in an enemy emplacement.

3051 Coy. S./M. F. Croome, 10th Bn., Glouc. R.

For consistent good and gallant work in the trenches. He has set a fine example.

333 Coy. S./M. T. Cumming, 1/4th Bn., Sea. Highrs., T.F.

For conspicuous and consistent gallantry and good work throughout the campaign.

12269 Sjt. W. H. Cunnington, 7th Bn., Norf. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and skill as Bombing Serjeant on several occasions. On one occasion during an enemy attack he bombed for eight consecutive hours, most of the time on the top of a crater.

17418 Pte. H. Curtis, 10th Bn., Glouc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry as a stretcher-bearer. He has done fine work under heavy shell, machine-gun and rifle fire.

14678 Pte. W. H. Curtis, 1st Bn., Dorset R.

For conspicuous gallantry in picking up and throwing over the parapet a live bomb, thus saving casualties. On several occasions he has done fine work on patrol.

1675 Flight-Sjt. H. G. Dudley, R.F.C.

For consistent good work as Senior Clerk. He is cheerful and painstaking, and no hours are too long for him.

27526 Sjt. L. G. Dance, "C" By., 51st Bde., R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to

duty on several occasions under heavy shell fire.

8319 L./Sjt. J. S. Darks, 2nd Bn., C. Gds.

For consistent good work, notably as Brigade Bombing Serjeant, both in action and as an Instructor. He has proved himself a most reliable and gallant N.C.O.

S/12962 Staff S./M. W. L. Dargan, A.S.C.

For consistent good work and devotion to duty since the commencement of the campaign.

1859 Sjt. H. E. Davey, 1st Bn., Herts. R., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry. He dug out a buried man, although exposed to the enemy's fire during a heavy bombardment and bomb attack. He also showed great coolness when leading up his platoon to reinforce the front line during a bomb attack.

7037 Spr. J. H. Davey, R. Mon. R.E. (Spec. Res.).

For conspicuous good work under continual shell fire day and night.

1095 Coy. S./M. H. M. Davies, 1/2nd E. Lancs. Fld. Coy., R.E., T.F.

For exceptional ability and good work. He turned out a large quantity of grenades to meet an urgent need.

For conspicuous good work as telephonist. He has repeatedly mended lines under fire and has been wounded while carrying out this work.

For conspicuous gallantry. When a shell fell in a hut causing casualties, he left his own shelter under heavy shell fire, rescued and carried into safety a wounded man.

71376 Actg. Bomr. G. Pateman, 123rd By., 28th Bde., R.F.A.

For conspicuous and consistent gallantry and good work when in charge of signallers in a much-shelled area.

8731 Coy. S./M. P. Pattison, 2nd Bn., R. W. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty since the commencement of the campaign.

23556 Sjt. R. C. Payne, Cav. Corps Signals, R.E.

For consistent good work throughout the campaign. He never spared himself day or night.

57121 Sjt. E. M. Pearce, "B" By., 94th Bde., R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry. During a heavy bombardment when the gun teams had been withdrawn he remained at the guns with a gunner who was mortally wounded. He brought him water at very great personal risk.

For conspicuous and consistent gallantry and good work in mining operations, notably when he worked for 18 hours in a gallery two-thirds full of water, without food or rest, and successfully laid a charge at a critical period. He has always set a fine example in similar duties.

For consistent devotion to duty at all times. He has shown great coolness and disregard of danger in the trenches.

For conspicuous gallantry under fire, not-

ably when by his promptness and energy a Serjeant and two men were rescued who had been buried by a shell. He has done good work in charge of snipers.

3265 Pte. S. T. Peet, 8th Bn., E. Kent R.

For conspicuous gallantry. When a retirement was ordered and his Officer was severely wounded he remained behind bandaging his wounds under heavy fire, and refused to leave him till ordered by the Officer himself to do so.

For conspicuous good work and gallantry under fire. He frequently visited gun detachments, took messages and brought up ammunition under heavy fire.

M1/6808 Coy. S./M. H. R. Phelps, A.S.C.

For consistent good work and devotion to duty. He has shown great ability in times of difficulty and has rendered great assistance to his Officers.

11156 Pte. H. F. Pickering, Depôt, R. War. R. (formerly 9th Bn.).

For gallantry and devotion to duty. He stuck to his post when, of his party of three men, one was killed and another wounded.

9031 Actg. Coy. S./M. D. Pickford, 9th Bn., Notts. and Derby. R.

For consistent good work and devotion to duty.

94874 Bombr. N. Pigot, B. By., 68th Bde., R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry when repeatedly repairing telephone wires under continuous shrapnel fire.

3727 Pte. J. Pittendreigh, 1st Sco. Horse, T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry. When forming one of a listening post which was attacked at close quarters he carried back a wounded man and, on his return, found two other men wounded. He took back one and, returning, was unable to move the other, but made gallant attempts to do so.

14900 Pte. W. G. Polain, 9th Bn., Worc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. After rescuing a wounded man he took him back to the dressing station under heavy fire and then at once ran back again to the firing line.

4629 Coy. S./M. D. N. Pollock, 1st Bn., Cam'n Highrs.

For conspicuous and consistent good work, notably on one occasion when, during the bombing of an enemy communication trench, he kept up the supply of bombs, collected bombers from other units to fill the places of casualties, and reorganised his company in the fire trench while a barricade was being built.

For general good work and efficiency.

254 S./M. E. Porter, R.F.C.

For consistent good work. He has shown great zeal and has never failed to carry out his duties successfully.

For conspicuous gallantry. When the enemy were firing heavily on his trench with rifles and machine guns, he repeatedly mounted his machine gun on the parapet and opened fire at 200 yards' range. There was bright moonlight and he was fully exposed to the enemy.

For consistent good work since the commencement of the campaign.

For excellent work carried out under difficult conditions in Engineer Stores.

3826 Sq. S./M. (Actg. S./M.) W. J. Reeves, 2nd Dns. (attd. P.S., 2nd County of Lond: Yeo., T.F.).

For consistent good work and devotion to duty. He is always cheery and full of zeal.

For consistent gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried ammunition to the firing line across the open. He volunteered for grenadier work when grenadiers were few, owing to casualties. For consistent good work often under trying conditions. He was wounded when consolidating a position.

For conspicuous gallantry on patrols and bombing raids. He has been badly wounded.

67117 Sjt. J. J. Richardson, R.E.

For consistent good work frequently under shell fire.

3457 Sjt. A. C. Riddett, 2nd Bn., Rif. Bde.

For conspicuous gallantry in an assault on the enemy's trenches. He was the first man in the trench, and led a bombing party into the enemy second line trench. Later he organised a blocking party after the withdrawal from the second line trench. He also picked up a live bomb and threw it over the parapet. He set a fine example all through.

For conspicuous gallantry when his sec-

tion maintained steady and accurate fire under a very heavy bombardment by the enemy, until one gun was knocked out and the other ordered to withdraw.

For conspicuous gallantry and good work during operations. When left without an officer or senior N.C.O., he collected men, pushed forward, and made good the position gained. His fine personal example inspired confidence.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although seriously wounded when in charge of a machine-gun, he refused to be removed by the stretcher-bearers till he could hand his gun over. When the machine-gun officer of another battalion arrived he was ordered to be removed.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when maintaining lines. On one occasion a telephone pole was cut from his hand by a shell, but he coolly got another and erected it under heavy fire. On another occasion he was blown into a trench by a shell, but got out, completed his work, and later brought in a wounded man.

S/15927 Staff S./M. J. W. Rose, A.S.C.

For consistent good work and devotion to duty as a Chief Clerk.

1806 Sjt. S. W. Roshier, 17th Lrs. (attd. No. 3 L.A.C. By.).

For conspicuous gallantry. He advanced with his unarmoured car and machine-gun in line with the armoured cars, and was actually first in the enemy's gun position.

86500 Sjt. A. Ross, 176th Tunnel'g Coy., R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during mining operations on several occasions, notably when he worked for 18 hours in a gallery two-thirds full of water without either food or rest in order to lay a charge at a critical period. For consistent good work. He has set a fine example of coolness and courage in action.

For conspicuous devotion to duty in exposing himself freely when rallying men for the assault. He set a fine example.

M2/120794 Pte. H. A. Sawyer, M.T., A.S.C. (attd. No. 1 L.A.C. By.).

For conspicuous good service in the field.

12652 Sjt. T. Scothorne, 7/Bn., Leic. R.

For consistent good work as Platoon Sergeant and for daring and valuable reconnaissance work.

For conspicuous gallantry. He kept his gun in action under a heavy bombardment, and continued accurate fire until it was put out of action by a direct hit.

For conspicuous gallantry and good work. On one occasion, when a platoon had suffered very heavily from a bombardment, he went up and rescued some of the wounded single-handed, and then began to rebuild the parapet himself till a few men came to help him.

For conspicuous gallantry when in charge of a patrol. After completing his work in a very skilful manner under fire, he carried a wounded man back to safety under very heavy rifle fire.

For consistent good work. He has also displayed great gallantry in action.

For conspicuous gallantry and consistent devotion to duty. On several occasions he has shown fine pluck in rescue work after mine explosions.

For conspicuous good service in the field.

For conspicuous gallantry under fire on many occasions, notably when he continued the construction of a bridge until a shell burst in the middle of his party.

For consistent good work. He is an excellent patrol leader and always sets a fine example.

For conspicuous gallantry when rescuing an Officer and N.C.O. after the explosion of a mine under very dangerous conditions.

For conspicuous and consistent good work, notably when he kept his men well in hand in a trench, which was very heavily shelled, until the arrival of an Officer to assume command.

For conspicuous devotion to duty. By his fine example and cheerfulness he kept the garrison of an advanced post alert and efficient under trying conditions and

For conspicuous gallantry and good work when in charge of patrols night after night. He has been wounded on patrol.

For excellent work at a depôt.

49055 Gunr. C. G. Street, 21 Y. Trench Mortar By., R.G.A.

For conspicuous gallantry under heavy shell fire. After his corporal was wounded, he worked his gun single-handed till assistance arrived, and materially assisted in the success of the operations.

For conspicuous gallantry in standing by a man who had become incapacitated under heavy fire, and carrying him to a place of safety. Later he performed a similar gallant act.

For consistent good work as Superintendent at Corps Headquarters Signal Office, often under trying conditions.

63111 Actg. Bombr. F. Taylor, "Y" By., R.H.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when laying and repairing telephone wires under heavy fire.

72039 Coy. Q.M.S. F. Tebbs, R.E.

For excellent work in connection with the disembarkation of signalling stores.

818 L./C. J. Temple, 4th Bn., R. Scots., T.F.

For conspicuous pluck and presence of mind. When a lighted bomb slipped into the sap, he shouted to the men to get away, and

dropped a sandbag on the bomb. It exploded, and shattered his foot.

7723 Sjt. J. Thelwell, 1/4th Bn., R.W. Fus., T.F.

For consistent good and gallant work as a bomber and when on patrol.

1067 Cpl. A. J. Thomas, 1/1st Lond. Sig. Coy., R.E., T.F.

For conspicuous good work as motor despatch rider. He showed great gallantry under fire.

1860 Cpl. L. Thomas, 1/1st Berk. Yeo., T.F.

For conspicuous gallantry when defending his officer, who was mortally wounded. He shot two of the enemy, and then, although himself shot through the lungs, assisted his officer to a dressing station.

7408 Pte. S. E. Till, 2nd Bn., S. Staff. R.

For conspicuous gallantry. During operations he assisted a wounded officer to cover in a shell hole, and dressed his wounds and also those of a wounded private. He erected cover from flanking machine-gun fire. When it was dark he went back and guided up a rescue party. He was slightly wounded, but remained at duty.

5219 Sjt. A. J. Tilney, 4th Dn. Gds.

For conspicuous and consistent gallantry; notably when, after the explosion of a mine, he directed a working party under dangerous circumstances.

102722 Cpl. J. Tindle, 178th Tunnel'g Coy., R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and good work during mining operations. When the enemy exploded a mine, he at once went down a shaft and rescued a wounded man without any rescue apparatus. He has frequently worked under circumstances of great personal risk.

For conspicuous gallantry when rescuing a wounded man from in front of the fire trench. With another private he dragged the wounded man back through the wire under a hot rifle fire.

For conspicuous good work when making

valuable reconnaissances in front of our line previous to an advance.

For conspicuous gallantry. He collected wounded men under heavy fire. On another occasion, when he with a party had lost touch with their regiment, he joined another unit and went into action with it.

8322 Coy. S./M. W. Wright, 2nd Bn., S. Staff. R.

For conspicuous and consistent good work. He is always ready to volunteer for dangerous enterprises. On one occasion he voluntarily joined a bombing party to deny a crater to the enemy, and by his courage and good example helped to save a critical situation.

8516 Coy. S./M. E. Yates, 9th Bn., Sco. Rif.

For consistent good work in the trenches. He has also carried out fine patrol work.

G/2326 Sjt. T. H. Young, 8th Bn., R. W. Surr. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and skill when leading his platoon after his Officer had been wounded.

G/5567 L./C. W. Young, 8th Bn., E. Surr. R.

For conspicuous gallantry. He voluntarily went out by daylight and rescued a wounded man from within 20 yards of the enemy's trench.

556 Pte. A. Croft, 6/Bn., Australian Imp. Force.

For conspicuous gallantry when assisting to work his gun under heavy shell fire, thus rendering valuable assistance during an attack. The gun was hit and damaged by the enemy's fire.

For consistent good work and determination, frequently under shell fire.

1745 Pte. W. Goudemey, 2/Bn., Australian Imp. Force.

For conspicuous gallantry. With another private, who was killed, he assisted an Officer by holding up a machine-gun, which was being fired from their shoulders, until the gun was knocked out and the Officer wounded. Even then he continued to assist in repelling the enemy's attack.

1529 Cpl. W. M. Green, 24th Bn., Australian Imp. Force.

For conspicuous gallantry in leading a party into an enemy trench. He drove out the enemy, killing one and wounding and capturing three others. By his prompt and courageous action he prevented an enemy attack from developing.

For conspicuous gallantry and good work, notably when holding a particularly isolated position. By his energy and skill he prevented the enemy gaining any information.

For conspicuous gallantry. He threw his greatcoat over a bomb and held it down till the bomb exploded, thereby probably saving several casualties.

For conspicuous good work and zeal, notably in connection with engineering works.
