At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 3rd day of October, 1916.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the Parish of Wrestlingworth, in the County of Bedford, and of the Parish of Harwell, in the County of Berks, 10 days' previous Notice of their intention in that behalf, have, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by the Burial Act, 1900, made Representations to His Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new Burial Ground in the Civil Parish of Wrestlingworth aforesaid, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, and Burials discontinued therein as hereinafter provided; and that, for the like reason, burials should be discontinued in the Civil Parish of Harwell aforesaid as hereinafter provided; that is to say:—

WRESTLINGWORTH.—Forthwith and entirely in the Parish Church of St. Peter, Wrestlingworth, in the County of Bedford, and in the Churchyard attached thereto:

HARWELL.—Forthwith and entirely in the

Wesleyan Methodist Chapel, in the Parish of Harwell, in the County of Berks, and also in the Chapelyard: Provided that in the said Chapelyard the burial may be allowed of the bodies of Mrs. Ellen Allen, Mrs. Sophia Day, Mrs. Fanny Greenaway, and Miss Sarah Turner, at their decease, in grave spaces in which no interments have heretofore taken place, and which have been reserved and appropriated as burial places with the exclusive right of burial therein, subject in each case to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than 3 feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave:

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give Notice of such Representations, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 14th day of November next.

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the Churches or Chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the Parishes affected by such Representations one month before the said 14th day of November.
