Genoia, May 16. The Governor of Milan arrived here yesterday, being accompanied by the Count de Breiner, Commissary General of the Emperors Forces in Italy; His Excellency has been Complimented by 6 Gentlemen in the Name of the Republick, and is lodged in the Palace of the Duke de San Pietro. And from hence he intends to go to Final to view the Garison and Fortistications of that place. A considerable Supply of Money has been lately remitted hither from Spain, for the Service of the State of Milan.

Venice, May 21. The Count de Steinau, who is going to serve this kepublick as General of their Land Forces in the Levist, designs to piss thither with the next Convoy, which may be ready to Sail towards heend of this month; About which time, the Popes Gallits, and those of Malka, are expected at Missia, where they are to joyn, and so proceed together to the Levint.

Therin, May 24. The Marquis de Legiskez is come hither from Final, to concert with his Reyal Highness several Marters relating to the Campagne; and to Morrow his Excellency returns to Milan; From whence the Spanish serves will in few days begin their march towards Piemont. The Vaudois defeated the last week a French Party in the Valley of St. Martin, of whom several were killed, 22 taken, and about 70 drowned in a River which they endeavoured to pass; and since that they have cutoff another French Party, that was conducting the Buggage of some French Officers to Pignarol. The French Troops are drawing together about Susa.

The fame Letters say, that the ceremonies of the Marriage are to be performed in this City about the beginning faugust; and that the King and Queen of Poland intend to accompany the Princess as far as Dantzicke, where she will be received by the Ambassidors of his Electoral Highness, and conducted by Sea to Flanders.

Vienna, May 26. The Rendezvous of the Imperial Forces in Hungary is appointed to be at Basa on the River Drave, where as we are assured by the Advices from those Parts, the whole Army will be assembled by the middle of the next month. General Caprara, who is to Command them this Campagne, is shortly expected from Preamont; and in the mean time, General Staremberg, Governor of Esseke, has the care of ordering all matters, with relation to the incamping of the Troops as they arrive, and the making the necessary Provision for them.
