His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the appointments of the undermentioned Officers to be Companions of the Distinguished Service Order in recognition of their gallantry and devotion to duty in the field:—

2nd Lt. Arthur Gerald Knight, M.C., R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led four machines against 18 hostile machines. Choosing a good moment for attack he drove down five of them and dispersed the remainder. He has shown the utmost dash and judgment as a leader of offensive patrols.

Captain (temp. Lt.-Col.) Charles Bayard Messiter, L. N. Lan. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his battalion with great precision and determination. He secured his objective and consolidated his position very rapidly, taking a large number of prisoners. By his splendid example the whole operations were conducted in a most orderly manner.

Temp. Maj James Allin Methuen, K.R.R.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He showed untiring energy, sound judgment and fearlessness. He reorganised the line and consolidated the position, thereby enabling his men to endure a heavy barrage with little loss. He successfully evacuated many wounded under trying conditions.

Capt. (temp. Maj.) Robert John Morris, S. Staff R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He personally rallied men of other battalions who were near by, and, reinforcing his own battalion at a critical time, enabled them to capture the village. He displayed the greatest courage and initiative throughout.

Maj. (temp. Lt.-Col.) Edward Pius Arthur Riddell, Rif. Brig.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He showed the greatest skill and foresight in assembling his battalion and subsequently launching them to the attack without a casualty, in broad daylight, en ground observed by the enemy. His personal bravery,

energy and example exercised great influence over all ranks.

Temp. Capt. Henry Abrahall Robinson, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although wounded, he assisted in consolidating the position and getting other units up to the line. Later, he assisted in the capture of three enemy guns with their crews. He displayed the greatest courage and initiative throughout.

Temp. Capt. (temp. Maj.) Leonard Sawyer, York and Lanc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He organised and led a successful attack of two companies, displaying the greatest courage and determination. He directed his men from the top of the enemy trench, and was eventually wounded whilst throwing bombs into the enemy trench.

Capt. (temp. Maj.) Charles Edward Turner, Glouc. Yeo.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He commanded his squadron with the greatest courage and skill. He defended an important point for over three hours, without support, against vastly superior numbers.

CANADIAN FORCE.

Maj. Philip Burnett, A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took over the command of the bearers at the front and for 48 hours carried out his duties with great skill and determination under very heavy fire.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to confer the Military Cross on the undermentioned Officers and Warrant Officers in recognition of their gallantry and devotion to duty in the Field:—

Lt. George Ryder Airey, R.N.V.R. For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led a successful raid against the enemy trenches with great courage and determination, penetrated the enemy's trench, and bombed several dug-outs.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) John Arnold, R.F.A.
For conspicuous gallantry in action. He
moved a gun to a forward position, and successfully cut the wire in front of the enemy's
trenches under intense shell fire. He has
invariably shown very great personal
courage and coolness in action.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Ernest William Atkinson, Durh. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his men with great courage and initiative. Later he took out patrols and carried out most valuable work. He was wounded, but remained at his post until the captured position was consolidated.

Temp. Capt. Mark Blakiston Baines, M.D., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He tended the wounded under very heavy fire, displaying great courage and determination. He rescued several men who were buried. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Temp. Lt. Henry William Eddison Bainton, R. W. Kent. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He brought up rations on pack ponies during an intense bombardment, thus saving the men in the trenches. Later he organised water carrying parties and helped to carry away the wounded.

2nd Lt. Geoffrey de Gruchy Barkas, Lond.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He showed marked courage and initiative during the consolidation of the position. He established a bombing post on his exposed flank and maintained his position for 32 hours until relieved.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Geoffrey Barker, Cambs. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He organised and led a bombing party with great courage and determination, killing 10 of the enemy and capturing 30 prisoners. Later he superintended the wiring of the new position under very heavy fire.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Herbert Barnes Barnes, York & Lanc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led a raid against the enemy with great courage and determination, killing some 30 of the enemy and capturing 4 prisoners.

Temp. Lt. William Arnold Batty, Durh. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. On attaining the first enemy trench he brought his rifle grenademen into action with good effect, and materially assisted the advance. He then led the bombers with great gallantry, taking an officer and several men prisoners. He was wounded.

2nd Lt. Frederick Noel Hamilton Beamish, War, R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He commanded two companies and reorganised them, consolidated and held the position under intense fire. He has previously done very fine work.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) John Stanley Beck, Norf. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led a party of men against an enemy strong point with great courage. The attack was completely successful, his party killing one officer and 20 men, and taking 4 prisoners.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Vernon Savile Beevor,

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his men in the attack with great courage and coolness, captured the enemy trench, and consolidated the position with marked skill

Temp. 2nd Lt. Rodney Knight Beswick, Lan. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He took command of the men in his vicinity, He organised and led a bombing attack with great courage and determination, himself killing four of the enemy.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Harry Birkett, M. Gun Corps

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He fought his machine gun for three days and nights under intense fire, establishing a sniping post near his gun and accounting for a large number of the enemy. He set a splendid example to his men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Edward D'Arcy Birnie, Bord. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. led a successful bombing attack against an enemy strong point, himself killing at least 8 of the enemy.

Temp. 2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) John Lyon

Booth, Sea. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his company in the attack with great courage and initiative, capturing the position and maintaining it against very heavy odds for five hours.

2nd Lt. Duncan Norman Brampton, Midd'x R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He assumed command of and led his company with great courage and skill, captured the enemy strong points, together with two officers, some sixty men, and two machineguns.

Temp. Lt. Frank Leslie Brown, K.R.R.C. For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although wounded in three places, he continued to organise his consolidating parties and to direct the work of his company.

Capt.. Frederick William Brunker, R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He continuously went into the open under very heavy fire and attended to the wounded. He displayed great courage and determination throughout.

2nd Lt. Julius Hildebrand Cæsar, Shrops. L.I. and M.G. C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He placed his machine-gun in position, and then personally assisted another officer in clearing the trench. He set a splendid example throughout the action.

Temp. Capt. Arthur Barrett Cardew, M.B., F.R.C.S., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He tended the wounded under heavy fire throughout the action, displaying great courage and determination.

2nd Lt. Robert Carr, R.E. For conspicuous gallantry in action. Under very heavy fire he collected his men, organised their work and supervised it with a total disregard for his personal safety until the consolidation of the position was completed. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. Lt. Anthony Clark Chamley, R. W. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He organised and led a raid against the enemy trenches, displaying great courage and determination throughout. He set a splendid example to his men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Albert Coles, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He organised and led rescue parties under Later, although himself intense fire. wounded, he continued his work, displaying great courage and determination.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Arthur Corbridge, L'pool R. For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led a bombing attack with great courage and skill, capturing an enemy trench and seventy-two prisoners. He set a splendid example throughout the operations.

Temp. 2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Philip Aubrey Cornish, Hamps. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his company with great courage and determination. He set a splendid example to all ranks by his courage and cheerfulness.

Temp. Lt. Kenneth Christopher Crosbie, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He went to the rescue of the men of his battery, whose shelters were being heavily shelled. Later, although himself wounded, he organised rescue parties and attended to the wounded.

2nd Lt. Thomas Francis Cunningham, R. Highrs, and M. Gun C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He brought his machine gun to within 30 yards of an enemy trench, thereby enfilading the trench and assisting the infantry to advance. Later, he was wounded, but continued to control the fire of his gun.

2nd Lt. Walter Bradley Dalrymple, Sco.

Rif. For conspicuous gallantry in action. He organised an ammunition carrying party under heavy fire. He led his platoon over the open, and, though wounded, made three journeys, until he was hit a second time.

2nd Lt. Thomas Henry Clifford Davis. R.F.A

For conspicuous gallantry in action. When his O.P. was blown in and himself wounded he remained and dressed a severely wounded telephonist and brought him in. On another occasion he sent back valuable information and carried out a daring reconnaissance.

Temp. Capt. William Hathaway Davis, M. Gun C.

Gun C. For conspicuous gallantry in action. He personally supervised the working of eight

machine guns under heavy fire. He greatly assisted in consolidating the new line and rendering it secure against attack.

Temp. Lt. Joseph William de Burgh. York & Lanc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. led his company in a bombing attack with great courage and determination, bombing up about 600 yards of the enemy trenches, killing a large number of the enemy and capturing a machine gun.

2nd Lt. Edward Gerald Joseph Denvir, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He brought back valuable information from the front line under very heavy fire. He disfront line under very heavy fire. He displayed great courage and determination throughout the operations.

Temp. Lt. Albert Godfrey Niven Dixey, Manch. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although very severely wounded, he continued to encourage his men to resist an enemy counter-attack.

Temp. Lt. Malcolmson Gardiner Donahoo, Yorks. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his company with great courage and determination, capturing and holding the position for thirty hours. He set a splendid example to his men.

2nd Lt. Archibald Ballantine Henderson

Dunlop, Cambs. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. organised and led a bombing party, driving the enemy down the trench and capturing 30 prisoners. Later, he assumed command of and handled his company with great courage and skill.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) Frank William Dust,

For conspicuous gallantry in action. commanded and handled his battery with great courage and ability throughout the operations. Later, he retried two guns from the front lines trenches under heavy fire and most trying conditions.

Rev. Mervyn Saxelbye Evers, temp. Chapl. to the Forces, 4th Class, A. Chapl. Dept.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion

to duty. He worked continuously for 18 hours in "No Man's Land," carring for and carrying in wounded under heavy fire. He displayed great courage and determination throughout.

Temp. Lt. Archibald Douglas Foster,

For conspicuous gallantry in action. showed marked courage and determination throughout the action. He maintained the position gained, about 250 yards in front of the original trench.

Temp. Capt. Ralph Annesley R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led stretcher-parties and

tended the wounded under intense fire. displayed great courage and determination throughout the operations.

Lt. John Gaffney, R. Dub. Fus.
For conspicuous gallantry in action. led his men with great courage and determination, himself killing many of the enemy. Later, although wounded, he remained at his post until the consolidation of the position was complete.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Lancelot Augustus Hand Gingell, R.W. Kent R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. led a patrol under heavy fire and obtained most valuable information. On another occasion he assumed command of and led his company with great courage and determina-

Temp. 2nd Lt. Donald Thomas Gorman,

Hamps. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He determinedly led bombing counter-attacks and not only drove the enemy out of the trench but established the bombing post about twenty-five yards further up the sap.

2nd Lt. Ernest Edward Greenough, Yorks.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. showed marked courage in going up to the front line during a severe bombardment to ascertain the situation. Later, he led a party to construct a new bombing block.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Durham Donald George Hall, York. R. and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He has flown in the worst of weather and often at very low altitudes. On one occasion he flew very low under a heavy fire from the ground, in order to range our artillery.

Temp. Capt. Allen Coulter Hancock, R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a rescue party in the open under heavy fire, and rescued twenty-eight wounded men. He displayed great courage and determination throughout the operations.

2nd Lt. Henry Harrison, R. Ir. Reg.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Scout Officer he supplied valuable information throughout the operations. occasion he rallied some men and successfully attacked a party of the enemy. Later, although wounded, he continued to carry out his work.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Frank Henry Harrod, Hamps. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. When a battalion on his right was forced to retire he showed marked courage and initiative in making his own flark secure, thereby repelling several hostile counter-attacks.

2nd Lt. John Ernest Hartington, Lan. Fus. and M. Gun C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He fought his machine guns with great courage

and determination, continually passing through enemy barrages to supervise the efficient working of his guns.

Temp. Capt. Wilfrid Graham Haslam, Ches.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He assumed command of and handled his battalion with great courage and skill, gained his objective, and captured many prisoners.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Charles Graham Haynes, K.R.R.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led bombing attacks with great courage and determination, and finally, after bombing for one and a-half hours, was able to capture two officers and fifty men.

Temp. Lt. George Dunnett Henderson, R.W. Kent R

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He took out a party and reorganised the men of his battalion under intense fire, and consolidated the ground taken.

2nd Lt. Alfred George Herbert, Lond. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He showed marked courage and initiative in bombing his way along the enemy's trench and establishing touch with the battalion on his left. He worked a machine gun himself until other men came up and commenced bombing.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Auberon Sidney Scott Herbert, Rif. Brig.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He rallied his men under intense fire, displaying great courage and initiative. Later, although wounded, he remained at his post until he had reorganised the defence of the position.

Temp. Capt. Robert Welton Hogg, M.B., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. With a party of stretcher-bearers he searched the forward area under very heavy fire and brought in many wounded. He has previously done fine work.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Rex Hope West Hope, Midd'x R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He kept his men well in hand under intense fire; went forward alone to ascertain the positions of the companies in the captured trench; sent forward reinforcements and arranged for the consolidation of the position.

2nd Lt. Charles Leonard Hore, N. Lan. R. For conspicuous gallantry in action. He took command of another company and, in spite of very trying circumstances, secured and maintained touch with the division on his right throughout the operations. He has previously done fine work.

Lt. Hubert John Gough Icke, Hamps. R. For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his company with great courage and

initiative. Later he returned across "Ne Man's Land" under intense fire, and organised a bombing party and sent them forward to reinforce a party in the enemy trench.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Robert Stuart Mark Inch, Norf. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. When his right flank was exposed he steadily withdrew his men, and, although wounded in three places, he stuck to his post, inspiring his men with confidence by his personal courage.

2nd Lt. Stopford Brooke Ludlow Jacks, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He, assisted by a Serjeant, organised a party to extinguish a fire in a bomb store. Although burnt in several places he continued at the work until the fire was extinguished

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Harold Jameson, R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He attacked a hostile kite balloon under very heavy fire. Later, his machine descended to within 150 feet of the ground, when he got the engine going again and recrossed our lines at 1,300 feet and returned safely. He has on many occasions done fine work.

Temp. Capt. Edmund Basil Jardine, R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He tended the wounded continuously for three days and nights under heavy fire, displaying great courage and determination. He has done fine work throughout the campaign.

Temp. Lt. Robert Johnstone, Gen. List and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He has shown marked courage and initiative in turning our artillery on to columns of enemy infantry. On one occasion he carried out counter battery work in cloud and mist at 800 feet under heavy fire from the ground.

2nd Lt. Gwynne Mervyn Jones, E. Kent R. For conspicuous gallantry in action. He assumed command of and led his company with great courage and initiative. Later, he organised a successful bombing party and carried out the consolidation of the position with great skill.

Rev. Hugh Keegan, Temp. Chapl. to the Forces, 4th Class, A. Chapl. Dept.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He tended and dressed the wounded under very heavy fire, displaying great courage and determination.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Geoffrey Arthur King, Midd'x R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He established a post in advance of the front line and held it for two nights until relieved. Later, he took command of the front line and

maintained his position for thirty-six hours until relieved.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Sidney Arthur William Knights, York & Lanc. R.
For conspicuous gallantry in action.

During a raid on the enemy's trenches he showed marked courage and determination in leading his men. example throughout. He set a splendid

Temp. 2nd Lt. John Henry Langdon, Glouc, R. and Mach. Gun C.

For conspicuous bravery and ability Though wounded in the during an attack. arm he stayed with his guns, bringing one of them up unsupported by infantry, thereby breaking up a counter-attack. He remained with his guns until again wounded.

Temp. Capt. James La Fayette Lauder, D.S.O., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He repeatedly with different parties of stretcher bearers searched the forward area under intense fire and brought in many wounded men. He has previously done fine

Temp. 2nd Lt. Harry Leighton, M. Gun C. For conspicuous gallantry in action. He showed marked courage and skill in handling his machine guns, which he got forward with the assaulting troops, thereby greatly contributing to the successful holding of the captured trench.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Alexander Henry Tudor Lewis, R. Berks, R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. assumed command of a company of another unit, reorganised bombing sections and successfully dealt with the enemy at a critical

2nd Lt. Robert Gordon Lindsay, Gord.

time. He set a splendid example.

Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led a daring raid with great courage and skill, killing or wounding eight of the enemy and capturing a prisoner.

Temp. Lt. Walter Robert Low, K.R.R.C. conspicuous gallantry in action. During an enemy attack he showed marked courage and ability and was largely instrumental in driving back the enemy and capturing thirty prisoners.

Lt. Reginald John Lowcock, Notts. & Derby.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. beat off an attack by four enemy machines and continued his ranging. Later, he flew under 1,000 feet, in a zone full of our shells, in order to silence hostile batteries.

Capt. Charles Mackay, Leins. R., Spec. Res., and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. In very unfavourable weather he obtained most valuable photographs of the enemy's position. He fought four hostile machines for ten minutes, until assistance arrived and they were driven off; afterwards he continued hiswork with the artillery.

Temp. Lt. Daniel Mackay, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. showed marked courage and initiative in removing many wounded men of his battery to the dressing station under heavy fire. Although himself badly shaken he remained at duty.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Francis Alleyne Marr, Cambs. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. assumed command of and handled his battalion with great courage and ability. He set. a splendid example throughout the operations.

Capt. Edward Cuthbert de Renzy Martin,. Yorks. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. set a splendid example of courage and ability and was largely instrumental in the successof the operations. Later, he twice patrolled the brigade front and greatly assisted in: reorganising the line.

Capt. Thomas Francis Vivian Matthews, Worc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. led his company with great courage and skill. Later, he led a small party against a large force of the enemy, dispersed them and captured one officer and twenty-five other ranks.

Capt. Robert Gerald McElney, R.A.M.C. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led stretcher parties and worked in the open under heavy fire continuously for-He set a splendid exthirty-four hours. ample of courage and determination.

Temp. Capt. Wilfred McFarlane, M.B., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion toduty. He led a stretcher party across "No-Man's Land " and attended to the wounded. He worked unceasingly throughout theoperations under heavy fire, and set a splendid example.

2nd Lt. Ralph Knowles Milne, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. When: in command of a working party he carried out his work under heavy fire with great courage and skill. Later, he continued, after his party had been relieved, to supervise the work of the relieving party throughout the night.

2nd Lt. Charles Ronald Muras, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Hefought his trench mortar battery under intense fire with great courage and skill, thereby materially assisting the success of a raid on the enemy's trenches.

2nd Lt. George Anthony Murray, R.F.A. For conspicuous gallantry in action. established and maintained communication

with his battery under heavy fire, remaining at the O.P. for twenty-four hours and sending in valuable information.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Robert Nevill, S. Lan. R. For conspicuous gallantry in action. He took command in the front line and handled his men, both in the attack and during the consolidation of the position, with great courage and ability.

Temp. 2nd Lt. George Crawford Odom, M. Gun C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He himself brought forward a machine gun over the open under intense fire. He displayed great courage and determination throughout the operations.

Temp. Lt: Herbert Stanley Openshaw, E.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He rendered most valuable assistance in the organisation and digging of new trenches. On two occasions he voluntarily took out patrols to get into touch with our flanks under intense fire.

2nd Lt. Isla Scott Paterson, R. Highrs.
For conspicuous gallantry in action. He reorganised his company under intense fire, displaying great courage and determination. He was severely wounded. He has previously done fine work.

Lt. Robert Thomas Patey, L'pool R.
For conspicuous gallantry in action. He
led his company with great courage and skill.
He organised a bombing attack, which captured a trench and seventy-two prisoners.
Later, he captured a further sixteen
prisoners and carried out the consolidation
of the position with great skill.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Harold Aubrey Pearson, R.F.A. and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He flew with another officer under 1,000 feet in our shell zone in order to silence hostile batteries. He has rendered the most valuable services throughout as an artillery observer.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Hugh Castell Pearson, K.R.R.C. and M. Gun C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He assumed command of and handled a company with great courage and skill. Later, when relieved, he reported the situation and returned to take charge of his machine gun.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Samuel Frederick Peshall, K.R.R.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led a small bombing party against the enemy and drove them back at a critical time. Later, he barricaded the trench and held it against repeated attacks. He was wounded.

Temp. Lt. Robert Albert Plimpton, Arg. & Suth'd Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. When a gun emplacement was set on fire he assisted another officer to extinguish the fire, and, though scorched by an enemy shell, continued to do so, remaining under heavy fire on the work until the fire was out.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Heorganised clearing and consolidating parties
under intense fire, and by his personal
example inspired his company to excellent.

led a wire reconnaissance patrol with great courage and skill. On two occasions he sent back for artillery support, himself remaining in "No Man's Land." Finally, he rushed the enemy trenches and captured a sentry point.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. With one man he advanced over the open under intense fire and established a substantial block, thereby materially assisting the consolidation of the position.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led a raid on the enemy trenches with great courage and determination, and repelled an attack on his right flank. He set a splendid example to his men.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although twice buried and slightly wounded he continued to lead his company with great courage and determination. Later, he was again wounded.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He showed marked coolness and good leadership when in charge of a raiding party. It was owing to his personal example that the raid was a success.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He tended the wounded under heavy fire, displaying great courage and determination. He twice went back under heavy fire to get stretcher bearers. He set a splendid example throughout the operation. He has previously done fine work.

2nd Lt. James Reginald Stratton, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He handled his section with marked courage and skill, and greatly assisted in the consolidating of the position. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Robert Strong, Bord. R. For conspicuous gallantry in action. He organised a party and made a block and held it with a machine gun for an hour until reinforcements arrived. Later, he led a patrol and captured twelve of the enemy.

2nd Lt. Edgar William Sussex, Sco. Rif.
For conspicuous gallantry in action. He showed marked courage and initiative in leading his men over the parapet on the flank of the attack, in order to stop a machine gun which was enfilading the line of attack.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He assumed command of and handled his company with great courage and ability, repulsing an enemy counter-attack.

2nd Lt. Alfred Harry Thomas, R.G.A.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He organised a working party to dig out some buried men and personally worked under heavy fire for over two hours until the men were extricated.

Lt. James Andrew Baird Thompson, R. of O.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. On several occasions he led reconnaissance patrols and obtained most valuable information. Later, he led his platoon in the attack with marked courage and initiative.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his platoon and cleared the enemy trench and constructed fire bays, working for five hours under heavy fire. He displayed great courage and determination throughout.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led stretcher parties and tended the wounded under intense fire. On one occasion he rescued eight wounded men in the open.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although wounded he led a raid and forced his way through the enemy wire under heavy fire, entering the enemy trench. He showed marked courage and determination throughout the operations.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He assumed command of and led his company with great courage and initiative. Later, with a few men, he repulsed an enemy counter-attack.

2414 C.S.M. James Allison Free, L'pool R. For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led two platoons in the attack with great courage and determination. Although twice buried and much shaken, he continued to encourage his men and to consolidate the position.

On the return journey he met another runner who had been buried by a shell and

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He worked at rescue operations under heavy fire in full view of the enemy, thereby saving the lives of three men who were buried.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Three times he carried most important messages under intense fire. Later, with two men, he captured one officer and thirteeen men prisoners.
