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Rome, June 5.

**T**HE Cardinals and Prelates appointed to Examine the Business of *Liege* have had several Meetings, but are not come to any Resolution thereupon; at least, 'tis not yet made publick; but in the mean time 'tis very confidently said, that the Pope has sent a Brief to the Chapter of *Liege*, and particularly to such of them as chose the Great Master of the *Teutonic* Order to be their Bishop, forbidding them to proceed to another Election upon the occasion of his death. The Popes Gallies will Sail the next week for the *Levant*; And those of *Malta* are to meet them at *Messina*.

*Milan, June 9.* General *Caprara*, who parted from *Turin* on the 3d Instant, arrived here the 4th at night in his way to *Vienna*, being sent for by the Emperor to Command his Army against the Turks; He stayed here two days, and during that time had several Conferences with our Governor the Marquis *de Leganez* about the Affairs of the Campaign. The German Troops, who have Wintered in the Dutchies of *Manius* and *Parma*, are come within the Territories of this State, in their march towards *Piedmont*, and the Spanish Forces have Orders to begin their march thither in few days.

*Venice, June 11.* The last Letters from *Dalmatia* inform us, that the *Proveditore General Delfino* was drawing his Troops together, and at the same time was making other preparations for some Enterprize, which is thought to be designed against *Narenta*, a place of good strength in the possession of the Turks, who from thence do greatly annoy the Venetian Territories. General *Stein* is Embarked in order to his passing to the *Morea*, where he is to Command the Land Forces of this State; and with the same Convoy will be sent thither 2000 Soldiers, to reinforce the Venetian Army, which, according to our last Advices from thence, consisted of 20000 Men, of which 5000 are Greeks and Albanians, who have been raised this Winter.

*Turin, June 12.* The Duke of *Savoy* has ordered all his Cavalry to Encamp near *Poncallier*, and several Regiments are already arrived there; but the Foot are not to leave their Quarters, till the German Troops, and those of the *Milaneze*, are come into *Piedmont*. In the mean time things continue very quiet on our Frontiers. The Ma-

reschal *de Catinar* has been at *Pignerol* to view that Garison, and is since returned towards *Susa*; near which place the French have drawn some Troops together; but have not yet begun to form their Army.

*Warsaw, June 10.* The last Letters from *Zolkiew* inform us, that the King of *Poland* has declared his Resolution of returning to this place with the whole Court, to be present at the Ceremony of the Marriage between the Princess his Daughter, and the Elector of *Bavaria*, which is to be performed here about the middle of *August*. The Forces of this Crown have Orders to march into the Field, their Rendezvous being appointed on the Frontiers of *Podolia*; and in the mean time the Crown General has sent strong Reinforcements to the Troops who are posted about *Caminiec*, that they may be the better enabled to observe the Enemies Parties, and prevent their receiving any Relief from *Moldavia*, where the Tartars seem to be very busie again in providing a Convoy for that purpose. The Advices from *Lemberg* say, that there has been lately some Commotion in the *Grimce*, which may hinder the march of the Han to *Hungary*, at least his beginning it time enough to be of any great use to the Turks this Campaign.

*Vienna, June 16.* They write from *Hungary*, that several Imperial Regiments were come to the Rendezvous at *Baia* on the *Drave*, and that the rest are marching thither with all expedition. The Turks begin to assemble likewise about *Belgrade*; though the Grand Visier is not expected there till the beginning of *July* at soonest. But amidst these Preparations for War, there is much talk of setting on foot a Treaty of Peace on the Frontiers of *Hungary*; And 'tis reported, that Letters are come from *Belgrade*, expressing the desire of the Turks that Passports may be dispatched from hence for their Ambassadors who are to assist at it. The Letters from *Transilvania* say, that General *Veterani* had drawn together the Imperial Forces who have had their Winter Quarters on that side, and 'tis not unlikely but they may make some attempt upon *Ginla* before the opening of the Campaign.

*Cologne, June 25.* The Advices from the *Upper-Rhine* tell us, that the Saxon and Hessian Forces were marching to join the Confederate Army which lay at *Sintzheim*; The French moved towards the *Neckar*; and when these Letters came away, were Encamped at *Wiesloch*.

Liege, June 22. The Brandenburg Forces which lay at Viset, are broke up; The Baron de Heyden is come hither with 5 Regiments of Foot, and 3 of Dragoons, and has posted them in our Lines; The rest are marched to Maeftricht; And from thence it's thought they will be ordered to join the Army of the Allies, which is Encamped near Roofsbeck, fronting to Tillemont. The French Army lies near St. Tien.

From on Board the *John and Susanna* in Milford-Haven, June 22. On the 20th Instant we made the Land, which was the Skellick, and two hours after espied 3 Sail, which proved to be two English Men of War, the *Weymouth* and *Dunkirke*, with a French Privateer, which they had taken the 17th Instant, being Sunday; The *Weymouth* came up with her about two in the morning, and fought her till Sunset, when the *Dunkirke* coming in, the Privateer Struck; She is a new Ship called the *Grand of St. Malo*, had 56 Guns mounted, and 320 Men, of whom 50 were killed, and 45 wounded; The *Weymouth* had but one Man killed, and 15 or 16 wounded, but was extremely disabled in her Sails, Masts, Yards, and Rigging; Both our Frigates are gone with their Prize to Kinsale.

This Ship (the *John and Susanna*) came from Virginia on the 20th of May, together with the *Richard* and *John* of Bristol, and a *Biddiford* Ship, which are with her in Milford-Haven, and a Londoner called the *Cadiz Merchant* who went into Kinsale.

Falmouth, June 21. On the 19th put into this Port the *Edward and Jane*; The *John and Sarah*; and the *Heritage*, all 3 laden with Wines from O-Porto, and bound to London, having been separated from the O-Porto Fleet which is gone up the Channel.

Plimouth, June 24. Yesterday sailed out of this Port a great many outward bound Merchant Ships with their several Convoys. The same day came in the *Sancta Clara* of and from O-Porto for London; and a Dutch Man of War from Rotterdam, and under her Convoy the *Mary* of that place.

Yarmouth, June 25. This day arrived here Their Majesties Hired Ship *Bonadventure*, with Twenty six Sail of English and Dutch Merchant Ships from *Hamburgh*: And about 40 Sail of Vessels from *Hull* and other Places sailed out of this Road for *Holland* under Convoy of two Dutch Men of War.

The Letters from Holland of Friday last are not yet come in.

London, Thursday, June 28. The Commissioners appointed by Their Majesties to take Subscriptions for the Bank of England, continue to meet at Mercers-Hall in Cheapside, from day to day till the whole Sum of Twelve hundred thousand Pounds be Subscribed, of which Nine hundred ninety five thousand three hundred and fifty Pounds was Subscribed last night.

Whereas by an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, the Honourable Commissioners appointed to Examine, Take, and State the Publick Accounts of the Kingdom, are Empowered to State the Account and Adjust the Debts to the Transport Ships for the War of Ireland, which Account so Stated, they are to prepare against the next Session of Parliament; In Consequence thereof they have Directed and Required the Commissioners of Transports to State, with all possible Expedition, the said Accounts, and to lay the same before them; and that in order thereto the

said Commissioners of Transports do give publick notice to all Persons concerned to bring in forthwith all Charter-parties, Discharges, Certificates, and other Papers relating to the said Accounts. In pursuance therefore of the Direction of the said Commissioners, all Persons concerned are hereby desired to bring in speedily by themselves or Agents, by them sufficiently Authorized, to the Transport Office in Seething-Lane, all such Charter-parties, Discharges, Certificates, and other Papers necessary to the Adjusting the said Accounts.
