Temp. 2nd Lt. David George Miller, Arg. & Suth'd Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and ability in keeping his communications going and repairing his lines. He set a splendid example throughout.

2nd Lt. Ronald Fife Miller, Arg. & Suth'd Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He assumed command of and handled his company with great courage and determination throughout. He assisted in the capture of a Battalion Commander, 4 officers and 45 men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Frederick William Millward, W. Rid. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although severely wounded, he assisted another officer to force a passage through the enemy wire and continued to command his men. He was again wounded.

2nd Lt. George Milner, E. Surr. R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although wounded, he continued to lead his men with great courage and initiative, gained his objective and consolidated the position.

Capt. Alexander William Simpson Mitchell, Arg. & Suth'd Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He consolidated an advanced position, advancing our line 600 yards, and held it under very heavy fire. He set a splendid example throughout.

Temp. Lt. Hugh Roger Greville Montgomery, Norf. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. When the company was held up by uncut wire he got his men into shell-holes close to the wire and gallantly encouraged them to keep down the enemy's fire, although himself wounded in the head.

Capt. Guy Murton Moore, R. Berks. R. and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He brought in much valuable information by flying at 500 feet over the enemy's trenches. On another occasion he engaged enemy troops with his machine gun and scattered them.

Lt. William Dawson Munro, Arg. & Suth'd Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Accompanied by another officer and a few men, he captured an enemy Battalion Commander, four officers and 45 men. Later, he supervised the consolidation of the position won and set a splendid example to his men.

Temp. Lt. William James Neilson, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and determination in

establishing and maintaining telephone communication under very heavy fire. This communication greatly assisted the success of the operations.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Robert Blackstock Ovens, R. Scots.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He carried out a valuable reconnaissance. Later, he displayed great courage and determination in laying a trench railway under most difficult conditions.

Temp. Capt. John Campbell Page, E. Kent R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He kept crossing "No Man's Land" under intense fire to reorganise the companies, thereby materially assisting in the captured ground being held until reinforcements arrived.

Capt. George Alec Parker, D.S.O., North'n R. and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He attacked a hostile scout machine and forced it to land after a long combat. He displayed great courage and skill in out-mancœuvring this machine.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) William Gordon Pender, Spec. Res., R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. On three occasions he flew over the enemy's trenches for long periods at a height of 500 feet, enabling his observer to gain valuable information.

Temp. Lt. Alexander Gordon Peter, M.B., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He tended and dressed the wounded under very heavy fire, displaying great courage and determination throughout.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Norman Batey Pigg, North'd Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led a successful raid against the enemy's trenches with great courage and determination. He was severely wounded.

2nd Lt. Frank Pitt, Manch. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and fine leadership during a raid on the enemy's trenches, and himself captured five prisoners.

Temp. Capt. Charles Godfrey Morris Place, E. Surr. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his men in the attack with great courage and initiative, captured his objective and consolidated the position. He set a splendid example throughout.

Temp. Surg. Frank Pearce Pocock, R.N., attd. R.N.V.R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination in dressing the wounded and leading stretcher parties. He worked continuously for three days under heavy fire.
