For conspicuous gallantry in action. He made two trips to the front line under very heavy fire, and obtained most valuable infor-

Lt. Louis William Kilinguer, Can. Engrs. For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and determination when in charge of a working party under Later, he brought in very heavy fire. several wounded men at great personal risk.

Lt. Fred Lister, Can. Inf.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. established an advanced post on the right Later, he personally assisted in bombing up the enemy's trench and in establishing a block there. He set a splendid example throughout.

Lt. James Watt Lowe, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and determination in leading his men in the attack and consolidating the position under most trying conditions.

Lt. Gavin Scott MacFarlane, Gen. List,

frmly. Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although wounded, he continued to lead his men, and captured an enemy machine gun, with its crew, himself killing one of the enemy.

Lt. Frederick George Herbert Manville,

Can. Infy., and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He has done exceptionally brilliant work, often under most difficult conditions. On one occasion he flew for three hours at a low altitude far over the lines, ranging on active enemy batteries.

Lt. Robert Pope Matheson, Can. Inf.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his company in the attack with great courage and determination. Later, although wounded, he continued to remain at duty and to encourage his men.

Capt. Walter Robert McGee, Can. Inf.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although wounded he continued to lead his men with great courage, and remained in the front line until his battalion was relieved some 'thirty hours later.

Capt. Harry Frederick Victor Meurling, Yukon Motor M. Gun By., Can. M. Gun Serv.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. commanded a group of machine guns with great courage and skill throughout the action, materially assisting in the success of the operations.

Lt. Henry George Napper, Can. Inf.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. displayed great courage and devotion to duty in carrying a wounded officer four hundred yards across the open under heavy fire.

Lt. Forest Millen Pratt, Can. Engrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. succeeded in locating and completing a strong point under very heavy fire. He has on several occasions carried out dangerous recon- \mathbf{and} obtained valuable information.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although buried and badly shaken by a shell he continued to carry on his work and set a fine example throughout.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although in an isolated position he collected six men, killed ten of the enemy and captured nineteen prisoners. He set a splendid example of courage and coolness throughout.

2nd Lt. Theodore Victor Van Ryneveld, S.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his men with great courage and determination in the attack, himself killing one of the enemy and capturing six prisoners.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He displayed great courage and determination in organising and leading stretcher parties under very heavy fire.

The undermentioned have been awarded a Bar to their Military Cross for subsequent acts of conspicuous gallantry:-

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Alan Duncan, Bell-Irving, M.C., Gord. Highrs., S.R. and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. displayed great courage and skill when escorting a bombing raid. He engaged several enemy machines and drove them off. Afterwards, although his own machine was damaged, he continued to fight against superior numbers of the enemy

(The Military Cross was awarded in the London Gazette dated 20th Oct. 1916.)

Capt. Arthur William Henry Dean, M.C., $\mathbf{R}.\mathbf{E}$

For conspicuous gallantry in action, blew a mine under the hostile front line which killed 280 of the enemy. He went at once over to the enemy front line with one servant, bombed a dug-out and took three officers and forty-six men prisoners.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Clive Griffin, M.C., R.F.A., T.F.

Showed great bravery and coolness as Section Commander under heavy shell fire.
