Falmouth, September 21.

He 19th instant came in here the Black Eagle, a ship belonging to Amsterdam, in abou 28 days from Sally, telling us, that a Man of War formerly belonging to Algiers, but lately set out with a Commission from Sally, hadseised some sew English Merchants ships, and carried them in thither; where were also brought in one Spanish and one French, Merchant Ships. They farther tell us that in a day or two after their departure, there went out to sea from Sally sour step gave out for the Canaries and other Islands thereabouts.

Naples, Sept. 4. Here is lately arrived a Galley from Genous. with the new President of the Council, the Regent Ullos, and Sebastiano Cortiz from Spain; in her way hither she took a Feluca which belonged to Messina, and with 4 others were roving upon the seas, committing several acts of Pyracy; and for the secuing the Coasts against the rest of them, several Felucas are armed and sitted out, and tis believed may in sew dayes be able to give a good account of them.

On Thursday in the Evening departed hence two ships, whereon were embarked four hundred Italian foot, to be sent to Barcellona.

The Vice-Roy Don Pedro d'Arragon is preparing for his Embaffy to Rome, to perform the folemnity of Rendring Obedience to the Pope in the name of the Crown of Spain; and 'tisfaid the Duke d' Albuquerque is to leave his Vice-regency of Sicily, and to succeed him here

Malaga, Sept. 11. Yesterday arrived here Captaint Vander Saen with 5 of the States Ships under his Command, with whom joyned three or four others, which he found here in Port, and are all put to Sea, intending for the Levant.

From Tripoli we had some dayes since advice that the Corsairs of that place had lately brought in thicher sour ships, vit. the St. Laurence, taken neer Cape Colomna in Calabria, bound for Maltha; one ship of Marseil'es lader with Oils, a Tartane with Salt, and a Petache from Alexandria, tek n in the Gulph of Venice.

From Tunis we are tol 1, that fix great ships were sent from thence with Ammunition for Candia, and that four of their Gallies had taken a large Bark richly laden from

Smirha; which they have fent into Tunis.

Umbstadt, Sept. 11. The Lorrain forces confisting of about 6000 men, having passed the River de Man, were for three dayes closely attended by those of the Prince Elector Palatine; who finding no opportunity of taking advantage on them on their march, encamped themselves the first instant upon a rising ground near Illversbeim. The Lorrainers being then at Okenheim, having the Rhine upon their left hand, the River of Setz on the right them the Nau, and the Enemy before them : in this posture passed several skirmishes between them; wherein some sew men were killed. Since this Monsieur de Lillebonne rettenched himself at Rudesheim neer Bingen, where he lay upon his Guard, expecting a supply of Victuals, for which his Army is somewhat strained. The 5th instant Color nel Chauvet having laid an Ambuscado of horse and foot; went out with a small party of his Cavalry, with an intention to have engaged them into action; but the Lorrainers kept themselves vpon their Gnards.

The 7th instant a party of 200 of the Lorrain Cavalry, being sent abroad, were suddenly engaged by a party of the Palatines, but after some dispute made their retreat, with the loss of one Captain, one Lieutenant, and about 12 or 15 men killed upon the place; leaving 25 of their horses to their Bnemy. Of the Palatine party one Captain was killed, and 3 soldiers hut. Several succours are day artiving at the Prince Palatine's Leaguer from Brunswick. The 8th instant came to him a Troop of 60 horse well equipped, under the Command of Reitmaster Winter.

Venice, Sept. 14. From aboard the Ship called the Sifler, lying before Candia, we have this following advice, bearing date Aug. i. That the with feveral other ships laden with supplies of provisions and other necessaries for the desence of Candia, had, though with much difficulty, and that by night, put into the Port and unladen their freight. That the Turks are from their Batteries continually playing upon the Port, rendring thereby their entry in the Port very dangerous: That by several assaults, and the Ioss of many men on both sides, the Turks had lodged themselves upon the walls of Candia, from whence the besieged had not at present been able to remove them.

They write farther, That the Admiral of the Venetian Armata had given order to all his Ships and Gallies to repair to him with all convenient speed, to the end he might be able to engage the Turkish Fleet which was riding near Canta, their whole force being accounted above one hundred Gallies, with 30 Men of War be onging to Barbary; that they had already landed 3000 men at Gira Petra, and 6000 at Canea, to recruit the Visiers army, which was extreamly diminished by the many assaults he had lately made upon the Town of Candia: That the loss of the besieged was also very great, having besides a consider; ble number of common soldiers, lost many Officers of note, particularly the Colonel Portario a Sicilian, the Engineer Quadruplano, Serpeant Major General Motta Colonel Gamba, the Marquis Carlotti, and as it was (though doubtfully) reported General Spar.

Rome, Sept. 15. On Monday morning last the Pope held a Congregation of Rites and Ceremonies, in which they resolved upon the Canonization of Beata Magdalena idi Pazzi, a Noble Family of Florence the solemnity whereof is to be held in St Peters di Alcantura, for which all sorts of preparations are making accordingly.

On Wednesday morning ceparted hence the Duke de Chaulnes, Ambassadour from his most Christian Maiesty, much satisfied with his Reception in this E ourt, having been dismissed by the Pope with much kindness, and several Presents for himself, and the Royal Family of France, and conducted out of Town by the Cardinals Orsino, Mancini, and Maidalchino, with the Venezian Ambassadour and other persons of quality.

The last week arrived here a Courier from spain, and is this Evening returning again; the Pope having been pleased to give out his Brief, impowring her Catholick Majesty to impose a Tax upon her Ecclesiastical Subjects, to

the value of two millions.

On Thursday last the Venetian Ambassadour Cavaliere Grimant received an Expre's from Osranto, with letters bearing date from Candia the 18. past, and from Santo Teodoro the 28, advising that the Turks had made their way to the Forts of Sabionera and Santo Demetrio, and were come to hand-stroaks with the besieged in the Ditches, and that the Getteral of the Venetian Gallyes had with 10

Galis.

Gallies put into Candid by night, and landed all his Soulviers and Gally-flaves for the present relief of the Town, till fresh Succours should arrive, their greatest want being of men, which being represented to the Pope, he immediately gave Order to Cardinal Rospigliosi to remit a considerable sum of moneys, to pay off 3000 German Souldiers, which liè ready at Triefte, and to order their speedy embarking for the relief of that place.

Madrid, Sept. 19. This day his Excellency the Count de Miranda, the Portugal Ambassadour, had his Publick Audience from the King and Queen, with the Ordinary Solemnities. The Baron de Battaville, who has been Jong deligned to be sent into Portugal with the same Charafter , 'tis believed may fet forwards towards the end of this moneth, for which he is making his necessary pre-

parations,

The Prince Ludovisio is lately arrived here with the Widow of the late Vice-Roy of Sardigna, with intentions to have follicited His Majesty that he might succeed in that Employment; but was prevented in his design, His Majesty having before his arrival conferred that Charge upon the Duke de St. German, who is gone to take possession

From Gadiz we are advised by Letters of the 9th in-flant, that his Excellency the Earl of Sandwich was fafely arrived at Tangier; of which place he had taken an account, and left it in a good posture, and embarked him-

felf the 5th instant for England.

Dântzick, Sept. 22. Two dayes fince atrived here an Expressirom Warfaw, with Letters to the Sénate, bearing date the 16th instant, advising that His Majefly of Poland had that day in the Castle with much Solemnity deposited his Crown and Scepter, in the presence of the Scriators and Deputies from the several Counties. The Ceremony began at One of the Clock, and continued till Five, wherein His Majesty made to them a Pathetick Speech, which drew zears from the eyes of all the Auditory, infishing principally upon his misfortune in meeting with such unhappy times, which had not only caused troubles to himself, but given cause of jealousies to others 3 desiring pardon for what had been done amiss during the time of his Reign, and that they would impute his errors to humane frailty: wishing his Successor might prove more fortunate, both as to his own concernments and those of the Republick. His Speech ending, the Archbishop answered and complemented him in the name of the Senators, and the Mareful or Speaker in the name of the Provincial Deputies; which ended, they wou'd have attended him out; but this he refuled, faying, He was now only a private person; and so taking his Coach, lest the Castle his usual place of Residence, and went to a private house of his own in the City.

The D. puries have agreed with him to allow him 150 thousand Gilders yearly for his maintenance during his life; which he defired might be legally affured to him from the whole Republick; but was answered, that having not been instructed in that particular, they should endeavour to promote it in their several Conventions, and doubted not

but it would be effected according to his delire.

We daily expect to hear of the Publication of the Interregnum, and of the time prefixed for the meeting of a Con-

vocation, in order to a new Election.

Hague, Sept. 30. The Prince of Orange is returned from Zealand to Breda, and has appointed the Heer Van Odyck to take his place in the Assembly of the States General as his Substitute, as lately qualified with the Title of first Noble and President of the States of Zealand, and by them deputed to the States General, who has accordingly taken his place; his military charges will be suddenly dispoled of

The Bishop of Munster and Count de Bentem have lately written to the States, to acquaint them with their willingnels to luffer the Lunenbourgh Forces dismissed from their service, to pass quietly through their Dominions, according to the States desires: 3000 of the said Forces are in the Island of Ens, ready to embark upon 6 ships, which will in few dayes be in readiness to fail with them for the fervice and affistance of the Venetians.

Paris, Oct. 3. The Count d'Estrees has accepted of the Emploiment propoled to him, to command four of His Majesties Men of War in a Voyage to America, to take care for the strengthening of our Colonies, and settling all affairs in those parts.

For the advantage of our East-India Trade, Monsieur Colbert has summoned all the Receivers-General of the respective Provinces which are to be found in Paris, to communicate to them His Majesties defires that they would ad-Vance each of them the sum of 20000 Livres, to be emploied for the benefit of the East-India Company; a Decree is also publishe from the Council, by which all those persons who have interessed themselves in the Trade, and made their first payments of such sums as were agreed upon a are or-dered forthwith to make their second payment, or else to acknowledge the forfeiture of the first.

The Chamber of Justice is to be continued for three years longer, and tis said is making some inquiry after the heirs of leveral of the Surintendants of the Finances.
