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Algiers, June 20.

OUR Dey is marched into the Dominions of Tunis, against *Mahomet Beg*, with whom he is now in War. About a Month ago a Letter was dispatched to him from the French King; The Subject of it was to let him know, that his Fleet, consisting of 50

Ships of the Line of Battle, 20 Bomb Vessels, and 44 Gallies, was to set this Summer on the Coasts of *Catalonia* and *Italy*, with Orders to Bomb all the Maritime Places of *Spain* that would not compound to save themselves from being burnt, and to exact great Sums of Money from *Genoa* and *Leghorne*; and because they might want Provisions, he desired the Dey to supply them with what they should send for from hence; and concluded his Letter with new Offers, to oblige him to break with the English. Since this the *Marschal de Tourville* sent a small Man of War hither from the Coast of *Cassania*, with Letters to our Dey; which returned this day. Two Months ago 2 Fishing Privateers took and carried into *Alexandria*, a Merchant Ship of this place, bound hither from *Alexandria*, estimated to be worth in Goods and Passengers above a Million of Pieces of Eight.

Rome, June 26. The Business about the Election of *Lige* meets with great delays here, the Congregation of Cardinals and Prelates who are appointed by the Pope to examine this Matter, not being to meet till the 12th of the next month. The Popes Gallies are sailed from *Croisa Vecchia* to join the Venetian Fleet in the *Levant*.

Genoa, June 28. On the 24th arrived here from *Naples* 7 Gallies commanded by the Duke of *Tursis*, having in their Company 4 Vessels laden with Bombs and Ammunition, and 3 laden with Salt, all bound to *Final*; Whither they continued their Voyage the same day; These Gallies returned hither on the 26th; and will Sail again in 2 or 3 days for the Coast of *Spain*.

Turin, July 1. The Marquis de *Leganez*, Governor General of *Milan*, is come hither, to Confer with the Duke of *Savoy*, and the General Officers of the Imperial Forces, about the Affairs of the Campagne. The Spanish Troops are on their march towards *Piedmont*. The Imperial Forces are come to *Orbassan*, except those that were quartered in *Montferrat*, who still continue there. The Troops of his Royal Highness assemble at *Candiale*. The *Marschal de Catinas* continues to intrench his Camp near *Fenestrelle*.

Milan, July 7. The Forces of this State are marched to *Piedmont*, making together about 10000 Men. General *Palfi* parted hence last Monday for *Turin*. Great quantities of Ammunition and Provisions are sent from hence to *Final*. We have Advice of the death of Cardinal *Cicero* Bishop of *Como*, by which a Twelfth Place is become vacant in the Colledge of Cardinals.

Turin, July 9. The German Troops are marched this day from *Orbassan*; and those of his Royal Highness from *Candiale*; and they are to encamp together between *Orbassan* and *Marsaglia*. The Spanish Forces arrived yesterday within a mile of this place; and are since marched to *Millesiori*; From whence they will in a day or two move nearer to *Pignerol*. A Detachment is made of 2000 Spanish and German Foot, and 500 Horse, under the Command of Major General *Geswin*, to block up *Casal*. The Marquis de *Leganez* is returned to *Milan*, but will be here again on the 11th or 12th of this month. The Duke of *Savoy's* Equipage went hence this day to the Camp; Whither his Royal Highness will be going himself in few days. The German Troops are marching this way from *Montferrat*.

Venice, July 3. The Senate has received Advice from *Dalmatia*, that *Cicuta* on the River *Narenta* is surrendered to the Proveditore General *Delfino*, the Turkish Garrison, to the number of 500 Men, marching out with their Arms and Baggage; The taking of this place (for which *Te Deum* has been Sung in all the Churches of this City) is the more considerable, because it is a Pass into *Bosnia*, and into the County of *Arcegovina*.

Vienna, July 10. The Velt-Marschal *Caprara* is still here, but will set out in a day or two for *Hungary*; From whence we have Advice by our last Letters, that the Imperial Forces, which drew together at *Baya*, were marched higher up towards *Peter-Waradin*, near which place they delighted to form a Camp. The Report we had lately, that a Body of 6000 Turks had passed the *Sava*, and pitched themselves near *Semlin*, proves a mistake. Some of their Troops are Encamped near *Belgrade*; but we have yet no certain Advice when the *Vilier* is expected there. General *Veterani* is drawing together the Imperial Forces in *Transylvania*, and will march with part of them towards the *Iron-Gate* to secure that Pass.

Hailbron, July 10. Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* is at present Encamped near *Hockenheim*, from whence the Army reaches within two Leagues of *Philipsbourg*: We are assured that he will pass the *Rhine* so soon as the rest of the Saxon and Brandenburg Forces have joined him. The French Army lies on the other side the *Rhine* near *Oppenheim*, and have begun to intrench themselves; 'Tis said the *Marschal de Luige* has Orders to send a Detachment to *Flanders*, and another to *Piedmont*; and to be himself upon the Defensive during the remaining part of the Campagne.

From the Confederate Army under the Command of Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* near *Hockenheim*, July 14. We decamped the 10th from *Swetzingen*, and came to this place, which is between *Hydelberg* and *Philipsburg*. The 11th Prince *Lewis* went out with a strong Party of Horse to *Manheim*, to give the necessary Orders about laying a Bridge there over the *Rhine*. The French Army lies on the other side of that River between *Oppenheim* and *Worms*; They have not yet made any Detachment for *Flanders* or *Piedmont*.

Frankfort, July 18. The Army of the Allies is Encamped at *Hockenheim*, within two Leagues of *Philipsburg*. The rest of the Saxon Forces that are to serve on the *Upper-Rhine* this Summer arrived the 16th of this month at *Vacha*, 3 miles from *Fulda*; when they have joined Prince *Lewis*, it's believed he will pass the *Rhine*; and there is a Discourse as if he would undertake some Siege. The French Army lies still near *Oppenheim*, and have cast up some Intrenchments along the River side; Their Men continue to desert in great numbers.

Cologne, July 20. The Bishop of *Breslaw*, Brother to the Elector *Palatin*, was on the 12th Instant chosen Great Master of the *Teutonic* Order, and was invested with that Dignity in the Cathedral Church at *Mergenthal* with the usual Ceremonies.

Paris, July 19. The Letters from *Catalonia* inform us, that the French Army, commanded by the Duke de *Noailles*, was separated and gone into their Summer Quarters. 'Twas generally expected they would have besieged *Barcelona*, which seem'd to be the principal design of this Campagne, all things being provided to attack it by Sea and Land; but the news of the English Fleet's being gone to the *Streights* altered these Measures, and thereupon the *Marschal de Tourville* instead of Sailing to *Barcelona*, according to his first Orders, was directed to return with all the haste he could to *Toulon*. By Letters of the 10th of this month from *Perpignan*, we have Advice, (which is confirmed by those

those of the 12th from *Marseilles*) that the Fleet under the Command of Admiral *Ruffell* was seen the 7th off *Barcelona*, composed of 78 Men of War. The *Marschal de Tourville* arrived the 4th with the French Fleet at *Toulon*; and had posted the Gallies before the Ships, and caused the Cannon to be taken out of the Men of War to make Batteries on the Shore, on which they worked day and night, fearing an Attempt might be made upon them in that Port. Lieutenant General *Justin Maccarty* is lately dead at the Waters of *Bavege*.

Brussels, July 21. The Elector of *Bavaria* came hither the 17th, with his Brother the Elector of *Cologne*, from his Camp at *Neder-Ische*, and the next day assisted at a Solemn Procession, upon the occasion of the Annual Feast of the Sacrament; after which they returned to the Camp. The Army of the Allies continues encamped near *Roosbeck*; but there is a Discourse of their marching to-morrow. The French Army lies between *Tongres* and *Warren*, having the River *Jarre* or *Tecker* in their Rear. The Prince and Princess of *Vaudemont* arrived here last night from *Italy*. The King of *Spain* has lately sent an Order hither to dissolve the two Councils of the Admiralty; That of this City, and that of *Ostend*, declaring all the Powers and Prerogatives that were vested in them, to be now in the Duke of *Avery* Admiral of these Provinces. They write from *France*, that the English and Dutch Fleet was come into the *Mediterranean*; That the *Marschal de Tourville* was returned to *Toulon*; and that the Duke of *Vandosme*, who was marching with 7 Regiments to join the *Marschal de Cassin* in *Piedmont*, was ordered to go with the said Forces to *Provence* to guard those Coasts.

From His Majesties Camp at *Roosbeck*, July 19. On Friday last arrived at *Dieft*, near the Left of our Camp, 3500 *Brandenburg* Horse under the Command of Lieutenant General *Delwitz*, who are now cantoned in the adjacent Villages, expecting His Majesties farther Orders. Yesterday two of our Parties beat two of the Enemies, and brought in several Prisoners. This morning the Baron de *Srein*, Brigadier of the Dutch Forces, was sent Express from the King to Prince *Lewis* of *Baden*. The French Army continues Encamp'd near *Tongres*.

From the Camp at *Roosbeck*, July 22. On Monday night last a Party of the Garison of *Liege* took 300 Horses from the Enemy, with several Prisoners, and yesterday a Party from our Army brought in a French Colonel, 3 Captains, and an Engineer with about 60 other Prisoners, whom they took the night before, as they were going from *Huy* to *Namur*, with a Party of about 150 Men, several of whom were killed. On Tuesday in the Evening the Prince of *Vaudemont* came hither to wait upon the King, being newly arrived from *Italy*. Orders are given for the Army to march to-morrow; and the Foot will begin to file off about midnight. Part of our Horse which lay in the Villages came into the Camp this morning; The rest will join us to-morrow in our march; as will also the Elector of *Bavaria* with his Troops. Our Army is provided with Bread for 6 days.

Postscript, July 23. about Two in the morning. The King is on Horseback, and part of the Army marching towards the River *Mehaigne*, which may give occasion to a Battle, in case the Enemy do not avoid it.

Hague, July 23. N. S. The States of *Holland* are separated for 6 weeks, unless some extraordinary Business does occasion their meeting sooner. The Prince of *Friseland*, who has been here some

days, parted hence this morning on his return to *Leewerden*. We hear from *Flanders*, that our Army is marching towards the Enemy, the heavy Baggage being sent away towards *Louvain*.

Plimouth, July 13. On the 11th came in here Their Majesties Ship *Germon* from cruising on the French Coast, where she took two Fishing Boats, and brought away 7 or 8 Frenchmen from *Camaret-Bay*, who say that the Enemy continue to fortify that place, and to make what other provision they can for the security of their Coasts, which are kept in continual Allarms by the Motions of our Fleet.
