

Temp. Lt. John Black Stevenson, M.B., R.A.M.C., attd. L'pool R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. On four separate occasions he personally conducted stretcher bearers through very heavy fire to succour wounded men. Later, although himself wounded, he continued to carry on his work.

Capt. Gordon Sheffield Stirling, R. of O., Arg. and Suth'd Highrs., attd. K.A.R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and skill when covering the retirement of two companies. On another occasion he seized a commanding position on the enemy's flank, thereby materially assisting in the success of the operations.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Clive Wailes Taylor, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and coolness on several occasions. On one occasion, when the enemy were throwing bombs, he charged them with the bayonet. He was severely wounded.

2nd Lt. James Norman Taylor, I.A.R.O., attd. Rif., Ind. Army.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and devotion to duty in attending to the wounded under very heavy fire.

Temp. Lt. (actg. Capt.) William Turner Thomson, Arg. and Suth'd Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led a portion of the attacking party and succeeded by his example and courage in capturing part of the enemy's position. He was subsequently wounded in nine places.

2nd Lt. Reginald Trelawny Thornton, I.A.R.O., attd. Pathans, Ind. Army.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great coolness and initiative when heavy machine-gun fire was opened on his regiment which was acting as advance guard. He rendered valuable service during the coast operations.

2nd Lt. Noel Viney, H.A.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He assumed command of and handled his company in the attack with marked courage and ability. He set a splendid example to all ranks.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Edward Welbourne, Durh. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He carried out several dangerous reconnaissances under heavy fire and obtained valuable information. Later, he led a raid with great courage and skill. He was severely wounded.

Temp. Capt. (actg. Maj.) Spencer Vaughan Percy Weston, R. Berks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He showed marked courage and ability in guiding companies to their positions previous to the attack. Later, he led a stretcher party to the captured trenches under heavy fire. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. Capt. Roger Llewellyn Williams, R.A.M.C., attd. S. Staffs. R.

For conspicuous courage and devotion to duty. He displayed marked courage and determination in tending the wounded under very heavy fire. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

2nd Lt. John Pares Wilson, R.F.A., Spec. Res., attd. Hdqrs.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and determination in organising and maintaining a telephone line under very heavy fire. He has previously done fine work.

Lt. (actg. Capt.) Thomas Needham Furnival Wilson, K.R.R.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He reorganised a few men and led them forward with great gallantry, capturing an enemy trench together with 60 prisoners.

Temp. Lt. Rodney George Wright-Nooth, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He made a very gallant attempt to blow up a bridge under most difficult conditions. He was wounded. He has since done fine work.

2nd Lt. Arthur Ivor Wynne-Williams, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and determination in extinguishing a fire in a burning ammunition pit, thereby undoubtedly saving many lives.

13222 C./S./M. (actg. R./S./M.) Richard Atkinson, Bord. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although wounded he continued to direct the clearing of a dug-out which had been blown in. He set a fine example of courage and devotion to duty.

7502 C./S./M. William Cox, S. Staffs. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. Although wounded he continued to lead his men with great courage and determination. Later, he rendered most valuable assistance in organising the defence of the position.

32508 By. S./M. Charles William Harvey, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He repaired a telephone wire in the open under heavy fire, thereby enabling his battery to turn at once on to their objective. He has at all times set a fine example.

6002 C./S./M. Charles Healey, Yorks. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and resource during the attack and when the officers in his part of the line became casualties, he took command until he was wounded.

2361 C./S./M. Richard Charles High, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He assumed command of his company in the enemy's trench and showed marked ability in consolidating the captured position. He set a splendid example to all ranks.
