

Paris, Aug. 6. On the 26th past the Enemy began again to Bombard *Havre de Grace*, and so continued till the next morning. The Mareschal de Choiseul, who commands the Troops for the Guard of the Coasts, repaired immediately thither, to encourage the Inhabitants, and to give the necessary Orders for the security of the place, and for quenching the Fires occasioned by the Enemies Bombs, but notwithstanding all this care, a great many Houses are burnt or beaten down, and the whole Town very much shattered. On the 31th the Enemies Fleet parted from before *Havre de Grace*, and appearing afterwards off *Honfleur* 'twas feared they would likewise have bombarded that place, which made the Inhabitants retire from thence in great confusion; as they have done from several other Maritime Places, where they are under the same apprehensions. The like alarm is, since the news of Admiral Ruffell's being entred into the *Streights*, spread all along the Coast of *Provence*, from which even *Marseilles* and *Toulon* are not exempted; The Mareschal de Tourville continues with the French Fleet in the last of these Ports, having posted the Men of War so as that they may be best secured against any attempt. They write from *Flanders*, that the Dauphin was still encamped on the 3d Instant at *Vignamont*, where he would stay as long as he could subsist, and for that reason had intrench'd his Camp. The Letters from *Germany* say, that the Mareschal de Lorge intended to decamp the 28th of the last Month from *Obersheim*, and to march towards *Creuznach*, leaving a Detachment of his Troops to guard the Intrenchments, which he had caused to be cast up on the side of the *Rhine*. From *Catalonia* we are told that the French Forces under the command of the Mareschal de Noailles had on the 18th past attack a little Town called *Ostalic*, which they made themselves Masters of on the 19th, there being about 150 of the Garrison killed, and 400 made Prisoners. The Advices from *Pignerol* of the 25th inform us, that a fire happened there that morning in a great Magazine of Hay; That above 40000 Rations were burnt, and that the fire was with much difficulty prevented from spreading farther. These Letters add, that there was still a talk of the Duke of Savoy's marching into *Provence*.

From the King's Camp at *Mont St. Andre*, Aug. 9. The two Armies continue in the same Camps, and are like to do so for some time, the great and continual Rains we have had of late having made the Ways impracticable for a march. Since the Account we gave you in our last that the Garrison of *Liege* had fallen upon the Enemies Foragers; We have Advice that they have in another Rencounter taken a considerable number of Horses from the Enemy. This afternoon a Gentleman came hither with a Present of Five fine Horses for His Majesty from Prince *Lewis* of *Baden*.

Hague, Aug. 10. The Government of *Bergen op Zoom*, vacant by the death of the late General *Sceauwenmore*, being given to Major General *Winbergen*; he took this day the usual Oath in the Assembly of the States-General. On Friday last arrived in the *Texel* several Dutch Merchant Ships, who came lately with the English Convoy from *Cadiz*. The last Letters from *Paris* do own that the greatest part of the Town of *Havre de Grace* is destroyed by our Bombs, and say likewise that two French Men of War were burnt in the Harbour; and that the People on that Coast are in

such a fright and consternation, that all the Sea Port Towns are in a manner deserted.

Plymouth, July 31. Yesterday sailed hence the *Betty Ketch*, with 250 French Prisoners for *St. Malo*. The same day came in here their Majesties Ship the *Prince of Orange* and *Quaker Ketch*, with several Merchant Ships under their Convoy, bound to the Westward.
