Temp. 2nd Lt. John Stanley Hancock, D. of C.L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. Although badly shaken by the explosion of a torpedo he led his men forward to their objective, and personally captured a prisoner. Later, he effected a skilful withdrawal under heavy fire.

Temp. Lt. George Cleverdon Hartley, M.B., R.A.M.C., attd. E. Surr. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination in assisting to rescue a wounded man from the open under very heavy fire.

Lt. John Thomson Hayward, Gen'l List.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although well knowing that the enemy were already in his rear, he single-handed destroyed several important works. Later, he marched some 60 kilometres through hilly native paths to regain safety, and suffered much privation.

Temp. Lt. William Carlile Hill, R. Ir. Rif., attd. T.M. By.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He succeeded in moving his guns to defensive positions under very heavy fire. Later, in spite of heavy fire, he continued to fire a gun himself. He set a splendid example of courage and determination throughout.

Temp. Lt. (temp. Capt.) Peter Townend Hough, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He, with a few volunteers, entered the workings of a mine which were ablaze, and for several hours combatted the flames, fully conscious of the imminent danger from further explosions and falling ground.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Alvert Edward Hughes, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a successful raid in daylight against the enemy's trenches and penetrated their support line. He was severely wounded.

Temp. Lt. Sedgebert Herschel Joelson, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded, he led a raiding party with great gallantry, and successfully entered the enemy's trenches. He carried out most valuable reconnaissance work previous to the raid.

Capt. Robert Millington Knowles, Norf. R., Spec. Res., and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when acting as observer. He showed throughout the greatest courage in the face of very superior forces, and a high standard of marksmanship.

Temp. Lt. Patrick Robert Koekkoek, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He handled his trench mortars with marked courage and ability throughout, and thereby materially assisted the infantry. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Frank Light, S. Wales Bord.

For conspicuous gallantry when in charge of a small party which attempted to cross a river in a pontoon. He displayed great coolness and judgment under heavy fire during the embarkation and in directing the retirement and bringing in the wounded when ordered to withdraw.

Temp. Lt. Gordon Parmiter Lindsay, Bord. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and initiative during a raid, and was the last to leave the enemy's front line trench. Later, he made a gallant attempt to rescue a wounded man.

Temp. 2nd Lt. William Henry Lindsay, E. Surr. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He assumed command of a company and led them in the assault with great gallantry. After his objective had been gained, he took a party forward and captured many prisoners.

2nd Lt. Donald Clements Logan, L.N. Lan. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He led his party to their objective with skill and intelligence, inflicted severe losses on the enemy, and captured six prisoners.

2nd Lt. Arthur Denis Worsley Lowe, S. Wales Bord.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When the attack was temporarily held up by machine gun fire, he led his party to this place and successfully bombed the enemy gun team, thus enabling the attack to push on. Later, he himself captured six prisoners.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Patrick Joseph Lyne, R. Mun. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He reorganised all the men of his company and supported the troops advancing to the second objective, leading them with great gallantry and capturing many prisoners.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Sidney Albert Macey, Devon. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a patrol 400 yards in front of the line, and obtained most valuable information. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Donald MacLeod, attd. Bord. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his men through their first objective, and himself with his platoon captured some gun pits which were very strongly held. Later, he assisted in digging a strong point under very heavy fire.
