A PROCLAMATION

PROHIBITING THE EXPORTATION FROM THE
UNITED KINGDOM TO SWITZERLAND OF
CERTAIN ARTICLES.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS it is provided by section one of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, that We may by Proclamation prohibit the exportation of all or any of the following

articles, namely, arms, ammunition, military or naval stores, and any article which We shall judge capable of being converted into or made useful in increasing the quantity of arms, ammunition, or military or naval stores, to any country or place therein named whenever We shall judge such prohibition to be expedient in order to prevent such arms, ammunition, military or naval stores, being used against Our subjects or forces or against any forces engaged or which may be engaged in military or naval operations in co-operation with Our forces:

And whereas it is provided by section one of the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1914, that section one of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, shall have effect whilst a state of war in which We are engaged exists as if, in addition to the articles therein mentioned, there were included all other articles of every description:

And whereas by Our Proclamation dated the tenth day of May, 1916, certain articles were prohibited to be exported from the United Kingdom to, among other destinations, all destinations in Switzerland:

And whereas Our said Proclamation has been varied or added to by various Orders of Council, and may hereafter be varied or added to by other Orders of Council, or We may hereafter think fit to revoke Our said Proclamation and to issue another Proclamation in lieu thereof:

And whereas We judge it expedient that, in addition to such articles as may for the time being be prohibited to be exported to destinations in Switzerland under Our Proclamation aforesaid or under any like Proclamation which We may hereafter issue in lieu of Our said Proclamation, the articles hereinafter specified should also be prohibited to be exported to all destinations in Switzerland:

Now, therefore, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, in pursuance of the said Acts and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf do hereby declare, and it is hereby declared, as follows:—

1. As from and after the date of this Proclamation, the articles specified in the Schedule hereto shall be prohibited to be exported to any destination in Switzerland.

2. Our Proclamation made the twenty-second day of December, 1915, relating to the exportation of certain articles to Switzerland during the present war is hereby revoked.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-eighth day of November, nineteen hundred and fourteen, His Majesty was pleased to make regulations (called the "Defence of the Realm Regulations,") under the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914, for securing the public safety and the defence of the realm:

And whereas the said Act has been amended by the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) Act, 1915, the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) (No. 2) Act, 1915, and the Munitions of War Act, 1915:

And whereas the said regulations have been amended by various subsequent Orders in Council:

And whereas it is expedient further to amend the said regulations in manner herein-after appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following amendments be made in the said regulations:—

1. In Regulation 2m the following amendments shall be made:—

For paragraph (b) of subsection (1) there

shall be substituted the following paragraph:—

"(b) take possession of any machinery, implements of husbandry or plant (other than machinery, implements or plant in the possession or under the control of a dealer or manufacturer), or any farm produce, stock or animals, which, in the opinion of the Board, are required for the cultivation of land or the increase of the food supply of the country."

After paragraph (e) there shall be inserted the following paragraphs:—

"and

(f) by notice served on the tenant of any land which or part of which, in the opinion of the Board, is not being so cultivated as to increase as far as practicable the food supply of the country, determine his tenancy of the land on such date as may be specified in the notice, or on the application of the landlord by order authorise him in any such case to determine the tenancy in accordance with the terms of the order; and

(g) after entry on any land arrange for its cultivation by any other person whether by contract of tenancy or otherwise."

2. In Regulation 2n, the following amendments shall be made:—

In subsection (1) after the words "by game birds" there shall be inserted the words "or hares or to securing for the food supply of the country any migratory kind of wild bird."

In paragraphs (b) and (c) of subsection (1) and in subsection (2) there shall be substituted for the words "game birds" the words "birds or hares."

3. At the end of Regulation 7A the following paragraph shall be added:—

"A like power may be exercised by the Minister of Munitions with respect to agricultural exhibitions whereat the exhibits do not include any such products, machines, tools or implements as aforesaid where it appears to the Minister, after consultation with such other Government departments as appear to him to be interested, that by reason of the demand on labour and plant required for the transport of exhibits to and from the exhibition and otherwise in connection with the holding thereof, it is in the national interest that the holding of the exhibition should be prohibited; and the foregoing provisions of this regulation shall apply accordingly."

4. In Regulation 9g for the words "the Coal Mines Act, 1911," there shall be substituted the words "the Coal Mines Acts, 1887 to 1914."

5. After Regulation 9g the following regulation shall be inserted:—

"9gg.—(1) Where the Minister of Munitions is of opinion that for securing the public safety and the defence of the realm it is expedient that this regulation should be applied to any metalliferous mines, or to any mines of stratified iron stone, shale, or fire clay, not being coal mines, or to any quarries, he may by order apply this regulation, subject to any exceptions for which provision may be made in the order, to all or any of

WHEREAS it is enacted by the Suspensory Act, 1914, that notwithstanding anything in the Government of Ireland Act, 1914, no steps shall be taken to put that Act into operation until the expiration of twelve months from the date of the passing of that Act, or, if at the expiration of those twelve months the present War has not ended, until such later date (not being later than the end of the present War) as may be fixed by His Majesty by Order in Council; and that the provisions of that Act shall have effect accordingly:

And whereas by Order in Council dated the 14th day of September, 1915, His Majesty was pleased to order that no steps shall be taken to put the Government of Ireland Act, 1914, into operation until the expiration of eighteen months from the date of the passing of that Act, unless the present War has previously ended, nor, if at the expiration of those eighteen months the present War has not ended, until such later date, not being later than the end of the present War, as may hereafter be fixed by Order in Council:

And whereas His Majesty was pleased, by Order in Council dated the 29th day of February, 1916, to extend by six months the time mentioned in the said Order of the 14th day of September, 1915, and by Order in Council dated the 7th day of September, 1916, to extend that time by a further period of six months:

And whereas it is expedient to extend further the time mentioned in the said Orders:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that—

No steps shall be taken to put the Government of Ireland Act, 1914, into operation until the expiration of a period of six months after the termination of the eighteen months and two periods of six months mentioned in the recited Orders, unless the present War has previously ended, nor, if at the expiration of that period the present War has not ended, until such later date, not being later than the end of the present War, as may hereafter be fixed by Order in Council.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by Section 214 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, it is amongst other things provided that a Local Authority hereinafter mentioned whose dis-

trict includes a seaport may, with the approval of the Board of Trade, make bye-laws relating to Seamen's Lodging-houses in their district, and those bye-laws shall be binding upon all persons keeping houses in which seamen are lodged and upon the owners thereof and persons employed therein, and further that such bye-laws shall amongst other things provide for the licensing, inspection, and sanitary conditions of seamen's lodging-houses, for the publication of the fact of a house being licensed, for the due execution of the bye-laws, for preventing the obstruction of persons engaged in securing that execution, for the preventing of persons not duly licensed holding themselves out as keeping or purporting to keep licensed houses, and for the exclusion from licensed houses of persons of improper character, and shall impose sufficient fines not exceeding Fifty pounds for the breach of any bye-law, and that whenever His Majesty in Council orders that in any district or any part thereof none but persons duly licensed in pursuance of bye-laws under this section shall keep seamen's lodging-houses or let lodgings to seamen from a date therein named, a person acting in contravention of that Order shall for each offence be liable to a fine not exceeding One Hundred Pounds:

And whereas it is also provided by the said Section that the expression "Local Authority" means in the administrative county of London the County Council and elsewhere in England the Local Authority under the Public Health Acts, and the expression "district" means the area under the authority of such Local Authority:

And whereas the Council of the Urban District of Margam is the Local Authority under the Public Health Acts and a Local Authority within the meaning of the said Section:

And whereas the said Local Authority have with the approval of the Board of Trade made the bye-laws set out in the Schedule hereto:

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council, by virtue of the powers vested in Him by the said Act, doth order that, from and after the date hereof, none but persons duly licensed in pursuance of the said bye-laws shall keep seamen's lodging-houses or let lodgings to seamen in the district of the Urban District of Margam or in any part thereof.

SCHEDULE referred to in the foregoing Order in Council.

1. In the construction of the following bye-laws, unless the context otherwise requires, the following expressions have the meanings hereby assigned to them, that is to say:—

"The Council" means the Council of the Urban District of Margam.

"The District" means the Parish of Margam.

"Seaman" means any male person other than the holder of a certificate of competency or service as master, mate, or engineer, in the merchant service who within four weeks immediately preceding the date of any transaction or occurrence within the scope of these bye-laws, has been employed in any capacity whatsoever on board a ship, whether British or foreign, but shall not include a person engaged upon a fishing boat or trawl boat.

"License" means a license granted or which may be granted by the Council in pursuance of these bye-laws to a person authorizing him to

keep the house specified therein as a seamen's lodging-house.

"Licensed keeper" means a person to whom a license has been granted in pursuance of these bye-laws.

"Keeper" means and includes both a licensed keeper and a person who keeps a seamen's lodging-house or a house in which seamen are lodged to whom a license has not been granted in pursuance of these bye-laws.

"Licensed house" means a seamen's lodging-house in respect of which a license has been granted in pursuance of these bye-laws.

"House" means and includes both a licensed house and a seamen's lodging-house or a house in which seamen are lodged in respect of which a license has not been granted in pursuance of these bye-laws.

2. A person who shall apply to the Council for a license shall furnish, on the application form to be supplied by the Council, a true statement of the particulars therein required to be specified.

3. The Council shall cause a register to be kept of all licenses granted under these bye-laws, and the suspension or revocation of any license shall be noted in such register.

4. A person who, not being entered in the Council's register as a licensed keeper, shall himself or by means of any agent or servant hold himself out as keeping or purporting to keep a licensed house, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds, and to a further penalty of £10 for every day during which he shall continue to do so after conviction for so doing.

5. A license shall not be granted in respect of a house or part of a house until it has been inspected and approved as fit for the purpose of a licensed house by the Medical Officer of Health or the Inspector of Nuisances of the District, and any person who applies for a license shall produce to the Council evidence to its satisfaction of his fitness to be licensed.

6. A licensed keeper shall not transfer or lend a license to any other person.

7. A license shall be subject to such conditions specified therein, or endorsed thereon, and not being inconsistent with the laws, bye-laws or regulations for the time being in force in the District, as the Council sees fit, and a licensed keeper, or any person employed in a licensed house shall not commit a breach of, or fail to observe such conditions.

8. A license shall continue in force (subject to suspension or revocation as in these bye-laws provided) for one year from 1st January. The Council may at its discretion refuse to renew any license.

9. A house or part of a house which is in connection with any public house or beer house shall not be licensed as a seamen's lodging-house.

10. A license shall not be granted to a person who holds a license for the sale of intoxicating liquor, or who is engaged or interested in the business of a clothier, outfitter, or slop-dealer; nor shall a license be granted in respect of any house or part of a house where intoxicating liquor is sold nor in respect of any house or part of a house occupied or used for the purpose of the business of a clothier, outfitter, or slop-dealer; nor shall any licensed keeper sell or be engaged or interested in the sale of intoxicating liquor, nor be engaged or

interested in the business of a clothier, outfitter, or slop-dealer.

11. A licensed keeper shall affix and keep undefaced and legible a notice with the words "Licensed Seamen's Lodging-house" in the most conspicuous place on the outside of the main entrance from any street to the licensed house, and also the full name and address of the licensed keeper.

12. A keeper and any person employed in a house shall at all times, by day or night, when required by the Medical Officer of Health or the Inspector of Nuisances of the District or by an Officer appointed by the Council for the inspection of seamen's lodging-houses, or by an officer of the Board of Trade, or of the police, give him or them or any of them free access to all parts of such house and to the register of seamen lodgers hereinafter referred to.

13. A keeper shall not at any time receive, cause, or suffer to be received into a house, or permit to sleep in any room therein, any greater number of lodgers than shall be from time to time allowed by the certificate of the Medical Officer of Health or the Inspector of Nuisances of the District. Such certificate shall state the total number of lodgers allowed to sleep in each room of such house, as well as the total number such house may receive, and shall be supplied by the Council to the keeper; and he shall produce such certificate whenever required by any officer appointed by the Council for the inspection of seamen's lodging-houses.

14. A keeper shall fix and keep fixed in a conspicuous place in each room a ticket signed by the Medical Officer of Health or the Inspector of Nuisances of the District stating the number of lodgers allowed to sleep in such room.

15. A keeper and any person employed in a house shall not at any time conceal, deface, alter, or obliterate, or permit or suffer to be concealed, defaced, altered, or obliterated any letters or figures on such ticket.

16. Notwithstanding that the maximum number of lodgers to be received in a house or in any room therein may not have been fixed by the Council as hereinbefore provided, a keeper shall not cause or suffer a greater number of persons than will admit of the provision of 400 cubic feet of free air space for each person to occupy at one time as a sleeping apartment a room which is used for that purpose.

17. Whenever the Council shall consider it necessary to reduce the number of lodgers to be received in any room in a house, the keeper shall, upon receiving notice in writing to that effect, under the hand of the Medical Officer of Health or the Inspector of Nuisances of the District, cease to permit such room to be occupied by any greater number of lodgers than that specified in such notice.

18. A keeper shall not at any time cause or suffer any room which may be appointed for use as a kitchen, scullery, or sitting room, or any underground room which does not comply with the provisions of the Public Health Acts, to be used as a sleeping apartment.

19. A keeper shall cause all such means of ventilation as may be provided in, or in connection with, any room or passage in a house, and in, or in connection with, any water-closet belonging to a house to be maintained at all times in good order.

20. A keeper shall cause the windows of

every room and of the passages and water-closets in a house to be kept fully open for such time on each day, as may be necessary for the purposes of ventilation, and shall cause the windows of every room which may be appointed for use and occupation as a sleeping apartment to be kept fully open from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. in winter, and 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. in summer.

Provided that such keeper shall not be required in pursuance of this bye-law to cause any window in any room to be opened or to be kept open at any time when the state of the weather is such as to render it necessary that the window shall be closed, or when any bed in such room may be occupied by any lodger in consequence of sickness or of other sufficient cause.

21. A keeper shall, in the first week in the month of April, and, if required in writing by the Medical Officer of Health or the Inspector of Nuisances of the District, in the first week in the month of October, in every year, cause every part of a house to be cleansed and shall, at the same time, except in such cases as are hereinafter specified, cause every area, the interior surface of every ceiling and wall of every water-closet belonging to the premises, and the interior surface of every ceiling and wall of every room, staircase, and passage in the house, to be thoroughly stopped, cleansed, and lime-washed or distempered. Provided that if any such interior surface is painted or covered with material which is such as to render the lime-washing thereof unsuitable or inexpedient, this Bye-law shall be deemed to be satisfied, so long as such surface is thoroughly cleansed, and the paint or other covering thereon is renewed, if such cleansing or renewal be necessary for the purpose of keeping the house in a cleanly and wholesome condition.

22. A keeper shall, as often as may be necessary to keep the same in a clean and wholesome state, cause all rooms, passages, stairs, floors, windows, doors, and walls of a house to be thoroughly cleansed and freed from vermin, and shall also cause the floors of every room to be thoroughly swept daily, before the hour of ten in the forenoon, and to be well and sufficiently washed on Friday in each week before the hour of twelve noon.

23. A keeper shall cause all bed clothes and bedding and every bedstead used in a house to be thoroughly cleansed as often as shall be required for the purpose of keeping such bed clothes, bedding, and bedsteads in a clean and wholesome condition, and free from vermin.

24. A keeper shall cause the bed clothes of every bed in his house to be removed from such bed as soon as conveniently may be after such bed shall have been vacated by any lodger, and shall cause all such bed clothes, and the bed from which such bed clothes may have been removed, to be freely exposed to the air for one hour at least in the forenoon, or for one hour at least in the afternoon of every day.

25. A keeper shall cause every room in his house, which may be appointed for use and occupation as a sleeping apartment, to be furnished with such number of beds and bedsteads, and with such a supply of bed clothes and necessary utensils as may be sufficient for the requirements of the number of lodgers received in such room.

26. A keeper shall, for the use of the lodgers received into a house, cause to be pro-

vided a sufficient number of chamber utensils and a sufficient number of washing basins or other proper receptacles for water, of adequate capacity and suitably placed, and a sufficient supply of water, and a sufficient number of towels for use in connection with such washing basins and other receptacles, and shall cause such basins or receptacles to be kept clean and in good order, and the supply of towels to be renewed as often as may be requisite.

27. A keeper shall cause all solid or liquid filth or refuse to be removed once at least in every day before the hour of ten in the forenoon from every room in a house, and shall once at least in every day cause every vessel, utensil, or other receptacle for such filth or refuse to be thoroughly cleansed.

28. In the event of any inmate of a house, whether a lodger or otherwise, being attacked by any infectious disorder, the keeper shall forthwith give intimation of the same to the Medical Officer of Health of the District.

29. A keeper, immediately after being informed or having ascertained that any inmate of a house, whether a lodger or otherwise, is ill of any infectious disease, shall adopt all such precautions as may be necessary to prevent the spread of such infectious disease. Such keeper shall not, at any time while such inmate is suffering from such infectious disease, cause or allow any other person, except a person voluntarily in attendance and authorized to attend on such inmate, to use or occupy the same room as such inmate.

(a) Where, in pursuance of the statutory provision in that behalf, the sanitary authority may order the removal of such inmate to a hospital or other place for the reception of the sick, such keeper, on being informed of such order, shall forthwith take all such steps as may be requisite on his part to secure the safe and prompt removal of such inmate in compliance with the order of the sanitary authority, and shall, in and about such removal, adopt all precautions as, in accordance with any instructions which he may receive from the Medical Officer of Health of the District, may be most suitable for the circumstances of the case.

(b) Where, in consequence of the illness of such inmate, there may be reasonable grounds for apprehending the spread of infection through the admission of a lodger to any room or rooms in a house or through the admission to such room or rooms of the maximum number of lodgers authorized to be received therein, such keeper, after being furnished with the necessary instructions from the Medical Officer of Health of the District, and until the grounds for apprehending the spread of infection shall have been removed, shall cease to receive any lodger into such room or rooms or shall receive therein such number of lodgers, being less than the maximum number, as the exigencies of the case may require.

(c) Such keeper shall, immediately after the death, removal, or recovery of an inmate who may have been ill of any infectious disease, give written notice thereof to the Medical Officer of Health of the District.

(d) When a registered medical practitioner has certified that any inmate of a house is suffering from any dangerous infectious disorder, and can be safely removed to hospital, such inmate shall not obstruct the sanitary authority in effecting his removal.

to any hospital or infirmary with the consent of the authorities thereof.

(e) When the Medical Officer of Health of the District certifies that the cleansing and disinfecting of any house or part thereof, or of any articles therein likely to retain infection or the destruction of such articles, would tend to prevent or check any dangerous infectious disease, such keeper shall give the sanitary authority such facilities as may be necessary to enable such authority to carry out such works of cleansing, disinfection, or destruction as such Medical Officer of Health may deem to be necessary.

(f) Unless and until by such cleansing and disinfection the necessary precautions for preventing the spread of disease shall have been duly taken, such keeper shall not cause or suffer any other lodger to be received into the room or rooms which, in the case herein before specified, may have been exposed to infection.

30. A keeper shall provide, in a suitable and convenient situation for the use of lodgers, properly constructed water-closets, in the proportion of one such water-closet for every twelve lodgers; and shall cause such water-closets and every part of the apparatus of such water-closets to be kept clean, and shall cause the same and every drain or means of drainage with which they or either of them may communicate, to be maintained in good order and efficient condition.

31. A keeper shall cause every part of the structure of a house to be maintained at all times in good order.

32. A keeper shall cause the yard, area, fore-court, or other open space within the curtilage of a house to be maintained at all times in good order and thoroughly clean, and free from any accumulation of filth or other refuse.

33. A keeper and every person employed in a house shall not receive any female lodger into such house.

34. A licensed keeper and every person employed in a licensed house shall not knowingly lodge, or knowingly harbour, any thief or reputed thief, any prostitute or reputed prostitute, or any person of improper character.

35. A keeper shall keep a register and shall enter therein, the name, age, and nationality of every seaman lodger received into a house, the name of the last vessel from which such seaman lodger was discharged, and the port of discharge, with the name and port of registry of any vessel he may join while resident in such house, and his declared destination on leaving.

36. A keeper shall put up or affix and keep up or affixed a copy of these bye-laws in a suitable and conspicuous position in the common sitting-room of a house in such a manner that the contents of such copy may be clearly and distinctly visible and legible, and shall enter upon the space left for the purpose at the foot of that copy, a scale of the charge per day for board, lodging and necessities, made in such house, and shall not make a higher charge than is provided by the scale on any pretence whatever.

37. Upon the Council being satisfied that any licensed keeper has been guilty of a breach of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, or the Acts amending the same, or that such keeper has kept, or is keeping, or is allowing to be kept, a house in which drunkenness, gambling, or immoral or fraudulent practices prevail, or

is or has been a party to such proceedings, or neglects to remove from such house any person of improper or immoral character who may have entered therein, or has failed, or is failing to comply with these bye-laws or any of them, the Council may suspend or revoke all licenses granted to such keeper.

38. No person shall obstruct any officer or person engaged in securing the execution of these bye-laws.

39. Every person offending against any of the foregoing bye-laws, except where otherwise expressly provided, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds for every such offence, and in the case of a continuing offence, to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds for every day during which the offence may be continued after conviction for the first offence.

40. These bye-laws shall come into force on the 1st day of March, 1917.

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Regulations amending the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, issued by Order of His Majesty in Council, dated the 24th day of January, 1917, shall extend to the Isle of Man, subject to the following adaptations:—

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John Augustine, Bishop of the said Diocese of Lichfield, (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme or Representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend, and propose, that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme or Representation, and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the boundaries of the said New Parish of Saint Mary, Calton, shall be altered so that all that portion of the Parish of Ilam, in the said County and Diocese, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, and is delineated and set forth upon the *Map or Plan* hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured *pink*, shall be dis severed from such Parish, and shall be annexed to and shall in future form part of the said New Parish of Saint Mary, Calton.

"And we further represent, recommend, and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending, or proposing, any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore-mentioned Acts, or of any of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"All which we humbly represent, recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council. "THE SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be annexed to the New Parish of Saint Mary, Calton, in the County of Stafford, and in the Diocese of Lichfield, being:—

"All that portion of the Parish of Ilam, in the said County and Diocese, which is bounded upon all sides as follows, that is to say, upon the south partly by the detached portion of the Parish of Croxden which is known as Musden Grange, in the said County and Diocese, and partly by the said New Parish of Saint

Mary, Calton, upon the west partly by the Parish of Waterfall and partly by the Parish of Grindon, both in the said County and Diocese, upon the north-west by the last-named Parish, upon the north-east and upon part of the east by the Parish of Wetton, in the said County and Diocese, and upon the remaining part of the east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said Parish of Wetton from the said Parish of Ilam, at the centre of the weir which crosses the River Manifold at a distance of 44 chains or thereabouts measured in a straight line north-west from the centre of Rushley Bridge, and extending from the centre of the said weir in a straight line due south (thereby crossing Rushley Wood) for a distance of 45 chains or thereabouts to the fence which divides Rushley Wood from Musden Wood, upon the boundary which divides the said Parish of Ilam from the said detached portion of the Parish of Croxden which is known as Musden Grange."

Chapter 55, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Representation as to the assignment of a District Chapelry to the Consecrated Church of St. Mark, Jersey, situated in the Parish of Saint Helier, in the Island of Jersey, and in the Diocese of Winchester:

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a District Chapelry should be assigned to the said Church of Saint Mark, Jersey, situate as aforesaid:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Stuart, Bishop of Winchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this Representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said Parish of Saint Helier, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the *Map or Plan* hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a District Chapelry to the said Church of Saint Mark, Jersey, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Mark, Jersey.'

"And with the like consent of the said Edward Stuart, Bishop of Winchester (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said Church of Saint Mark, Jersey, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices, should be paid and belong to the Minister of the same Church for the time being: Provided always, that so long as the Very Reverend Samuel Falle, Clerk in Holy Orders, Dean of Jersey, and the present Rector or Incumbent of the Rectory of the said Parish of Saint Helier, shall continue to be such Rector or Incumbent, all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication, solemnization, or performance at the said Church of Saint Mark, Jersey, situate as aforesaid, shall be paid over by the Minister thereof to the said Samuel Falle; and Provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism, or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal Consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal Wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Mark, Jersey, being:—

"All that part of the Parish of Saint Helier, in the Island of Jersey, and in the Diocese of Winchester, which is bounded upon all sides as follows, that is to say:—upon the south by the New Parish of Saint James, Jersey, upon the east partly by the last-named New Parish and partly by the Parish of Saint Saviour, upon the north by the Parish of the Trinity, upon the west by the New Parish of Saint Andrew, Jersey, and upon the south-west partly by the New Parish of All Saints, Jersey, partly by

the New Parish of Saint Simon, Jersey, all in the said Island and Diocese, and partly by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Simon, Jersey, from the said Parish of Saint Helier, at the junction of the road called Val Plaisant with Victoria Street, and extending thence eastward along the middle of Victoria Street for a distance of 7 chains or thereabouts to its junction with David Place, and extending thence southward along the middle of David Place for a distance of 8 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Gas Place and Bath Street, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Bath Street for a distance of 2½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Gas Lane, upon the boundary which divides the said Parish of Saint Helier from the said New Parish of Saint James, Jersey."

THE GOVERNING BODY OF CHARTERHOUSE SCHOOL having, on the 23rd day of February, 1917, in virtue of the powers conferred upon them by "The Public Schools Act, 1868," made a Statute ("Statute relating to War Scholars") to be additional to the existing Statutes of the School:

The said Statute has this day been laid before His Majesty in Council, and is hereby published in the London Gazette in accordance with the provisions in that behalf contained in the said Act.

And Notice is hereby given, that any person, body of persons, or body corporate, authorized in that behalf by the said Act, may, within two months after the publication of this notification, petition His Majesty in Council to withhold His approval from the whole or any part of the said Statute.

STATUTE made by the Governing Body of Charterhouse School, under the provisions of the Public Schools Act, 1868, and submitted by the said Governing Body for the approval of His Majesty in Council.

STATUTE RELATING TO WAR SCHOLARS.

I. The Governing Body shall have power from time to time as and when they shall think fit to do all or any of the following things:—

(1) To provide Scholarships to be tenable by boys who need such assistance for their education and whose fathers have been killed or disabled in the present war, which Scholarships and the holders of them are to be called War Scholarships and War Scholars:

Provided that

(a) the number of War Scholars shall be such as the Governing Body may from time

to time think fit but shall not at any time exceed ten:

(b) the value of a War Scholarship shall not exceed the value of an ordinary Scholarship:

(c) the number of ordinary scholars shall not exceed sixty unless and until the provision for such War Scholars shall have been satisfied:

(d) if the funds at the disposal of the Governing Body shall be insufficient to provide as well for such War Scholars as for sixty ordinary scholars, the Governing Body may to such extent as may appear to them necessary abridge the number of ordinary scholars:

(e) in no case shall the number of ordinary scholars be reduced under paragraph (d) so as to be less than fifty.

(2) To make Regulations for enabling boys of the aforesaid class to receive education and maintenance at the School as commoners thereof in the Boarding Houses belonging to the School or in such of the Boarding Houses as the Regulations shall indicate upon special terms with respect to all or any of the fees to be paid by such boys: Provided that such Regulations shall be so framed as to limit the number of boys who may enjoy the benefit thereof at any one time in any one Boarding House to a number not exceeding two.

(3) (a) To make grants out of the funds at the disposal of the Governing Body towards meeting any expenses relating to the education at the School of the boys for the time being enjoying the benefit of any Regulations which shall have been made under sub-section (2) of this section, being expenses which the payments made under such Regulations shall not suffice to meet:

(b) To contribute either a principal sum or sums by way of annual grant, to the Trust called the Charterhouse Tercentenary Fund for the purpose of enabling the Trustees of the said Fund to give pecuniary assistance to boys entering the School being the Sons of Carthusians and of the aforesaid class: Provided that such contribution or contributions shall be made only upon the undertaking and agreement of the said Trustees.

(i.) That the monies so contributed and the interest (if any) arising therefrom shall be expended for the said purpose and not for any other purpose or object.

(ii.) That in every case where the said Trustees desire to give such assistance the name of the proposed beneficiary and the circumstances of the case and the amount proposed to be expended shall be submitted to the Governing Body, whose approval shall be a condition precedent to such expenditure.

II. (1) No boy shall receive any of the benefits or assistance authorized or empowered by this Statute, unless the Governing Body shall be satisfied that by reason of his pecuniary circumstances it is proper that he should receive such benefit or assistance.

(2) The decision of the Governing Body upon any question arising under this Statute as to whether a boy belongs to the aforesaid class or as to the pecuniary circumstances of a boy shall for the purposes of this Statute be final and conclusive.

III. The provisions with respect to scholarships and scholars contained in the Statutes shall apply to War Scholarships and War

Scholars in like manner as they apply to other scholarships and scholars in the School, but subject nevertheless to the following provisions:—

(1) The examination relating to War Scholarships may be and the list of successful candidates shall be separate and distinct from the examination and the list relating to ordinary scholarships:

(2) In the arranging of names upon the list relating to War Scholars the Governing Body shall have a discretionary power of departing from the strict order of merit as shown by the examination and of giving preferences to candidates who, because they are sons of Carthusians or for any other reason, in the opinion of the Governing Body, ought to be preferred:

(3) In the filling up of vacancies amongst War Scholars a vacancy shall be ignored if the Governing Body shall have determined that the vacancy shall not be filled up.

The secretary of every club to which this Order applies and every holder of a licence for the sale of intoxicating liquor to be consumed on the premises in the above-mentioned part of the area shall keep permanently affixed in some conspicuous place in the club or in each public room in the licensed premises a copy of this Order.

4. This Order shall come into force on the nineteenth day of March, 1917.

All persons shall, on or before the 24th day of March, 1917, furnish to the said Director a statement in writing giving particulars of all cupro-nickel scrap in their possession or under their control on the appointed day, and of all their existing contracts and orders for the purchase or sale of cupro-nickel scrap.

4. The term cupro-nickel scrap for the purpose of this Order shall include and mean all kinds of cupro-nickel webbing scrap, process scrap, and swarf and scrap of whatsoever kind or nature in the composition of which copper and nickel are included, or any of them.

5. The Minister will subsequently communicate to the owners of cupro-nickel scrap taken over by him the prices which he will be prepared to pay for the same.

6. Any person acting in contravention of or failing to comply with this Order will be guilty of an offence under the Defence of the Realm Regulations and be liable to penalties of fine and imprisonment.

The KING has been graciously pleased to confer the Decoration of the Albert Medal of the Second Class on :—

Acting Lieutenant Frederick William Weeks, R.N.R.

The following is the account of the services in respect of which the Decoration has been conferred :—

On the night of Thursday, the 18th January, 1917, a member of the crew of one of his Majesty's Ships, when returning from leave, fell into the sea between the ship and the quay. The matter was at once reported to Acting Lieutenant Frederick William Weeks, R.N.R., to whom it was obvious that any attempt at rescue must be attended by considerable danger. The ship, which was kept clear of the side of the quay by spar fenders of only nine inches in diameter, was working to and fro with the slight swell entering the harbour. Moreover the man was incapable of helping himself; he was of heavy build and was wearing a uniform greatcoat. In view of the risk to the rescuer of being crushed between the ship and the quay, Lieutenant Weeks decided that he could not order a man down. He thereupon took a line and went down himself. By this time the man was almost unconscious. Lieutenant Weeks managed to obtain a hold of his hair and by this means kept him sufficiently above water, whilst wedging himself with his back against the quay with his knees against the ship's side. During this time he was mostly under water, the temperature of which was thirty-nine degrees. He succeeded in securing a line round the man, who was hauled on deck. The man was unconscious and very nearly drowned when brought on deck, and there is no doubt that, but for Lieutenant Weeks' prompt measures, he would have lost his life.

ADMIRALTY NOTICE TO MARINERS.

No. 285 of the year 1917.

ENGLAND, SOUTH COAST.

Former Notice.—No. 866 of 1916; hereby cancelled.

Notice is hereby given that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and are now in force:—

(1) *Beachy Head to St. Albans Head—Traffic Regulations.*

I. REGULATIONS REGARDING TRADING, FISHING AND PLEASURE CRAFT.

1. The areas on the South Coast of England to which the following orders apply are:—

Area A.—Enclosed by a line from Beachy head to Owers light-vessel to Boulder bank buoy, thence in a 315° (*N. 30° W. Mag.*) direction to the Portsmouth Defence area.

Area B.—Enclosed by a line from Culver cliff to a point 3 miles, 90° (*S. 75° E. Mag.*), from Culver cliff, thence within the 3-mile limit to a point 3 miles, 180° (*S. 15° W. Mag.*), from Freshwater Gate, thence to Freshwater Gate.

Area C.—Enclosed by a line joining Chewton Bunny to Christchurch ledge buoy, thence to a point 3 miles, 180° (*S. 15° W. Mag.*), from Anvil point, thence to a point 3 miles, 180° (*S. 15° W. Mag.*), from St. Albans head, thence to St. Albans head.

2. The term craft as used herein includes ships, barges, boats and vessels of all descriptions, and the orders apply to all fishing and pleasure craft.

3. No craft are to go out in the specified areas between sunset and sunrise.

4. All craft from places within these areas are to be on shore or back in their harbour half an hour after sunset.

5. No craft are to put to sea during fog or thick weather, and any caught at sea by fog, &c., are to return to shore or harbour at once, if possible.

6. Craft unable to return to harbour owing to failing wind or fog, &c., are to anchor and show the regulation anchor lights at night. No bright lights are permitted. Fishing craft anchoring off Brighton or Hove are to anchor between the piers.

7. Craft found after dark in the areas detailed in paragraph 1 are liable to be fired upon.

8. Fishing is permitted during daylight hours in areas A, B and C, by all *bonâ fide* fishermen, provided they are in possession of a permit which can be obtained from the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, through their District Fishery Officers. When applying for these permits, fishermen are to state the port from which they intend to work, and this will be entered on the permit. Permits for areas A, B and C are only issued to craft registered locally, and will not be issued for vessels trans-

ferred from ports of registry outside areas A, B and C, to ports of registry inside those areas. Under no circumstances are fishermen allowed to carry passengers in their boats on a fishing permit.

9. All unregistered fishing craft must carry their permit number painted on each bow in figures not less than 12 inches in height. Vessels registered as British sea fishing boats are to comply with the Statutory rules as regards lettering and numbering.

10. Fishing is absolutely prohibited for all steam, oil, or petrol-driven fishing vessels of over 30-ft. keel length.

11. The following orders regarding oil of all kinds and petrol are to be complied with:—

(a) Oil, motor spirit, petrol, or other goods may not be shipped on board craft of any description, whether coasting or foreign, either as stores for the equipment or navigation of the vessel or as merchandise, except at places which are under the supervision of a Customs Officer. Such goods must be properly pre-entered before shipment, and a clearance must be obtained from the Customs Officials in accordance with the Customs War Powers Act, 1915.

(b) In places where there are no Customs Officials, oil or petrol-driven craft cruising in pleasure areas, and oil or petrol-driven fishing craft of 30-ft. keel length and under, may obtain their stores locally, provided the Coast-Watching Officer as representing the Customs Officials is previously notified, and a Stock Book giving particulars of quantities received and used is kept on board and open for inspection.

(c) Sailing vessels may not have on board a quantity of petrol, motor-spirit, benzine, paraffin, petroleum, or similar substances exceeding four gallons.

12. Owners of motor craft, pleasure craft, or small craft of all descriptions, are to supply to the Coastguard Officer of the District lists of all their boats and vessels which they may place afloat, and they are to obtain from him permits for them. Without such permits these craft are not to be used. The number of the permit is to be painted on each bow in figures not less than 12 inches in height.

13. Motor craft, pleasure craft, and small craft of all descriptions are not to proceed outside of their ports, creeks or rivers, during the hours of official day, unless in possession of a permit which may be obtained from a Customs Official on personal application, or (in places where there is no Customs Official) from the Coastguard Officer of that district.

14. The areas within which pleasure craft with permits may move during daylight are as follows, and they are forbidden to move in any other areas:—

Newhaven: Within one mile radius from the end of the western breakwater.

Rottingdean. Within one mile radius of the slipway.

Brighton: Within one mile radius from eastern pier.

Hove: Within one mile radius from Coastguard station.

Shoreham: Within one mile radius from the end of western pier.

Worthing: Within one mile radius from the end of town pier.

Littlehampton: Within one mile radius from the end of western pier.

Bognor: Within one mile radius of green fishing light.

Pagham: Within one mile radius from the coast watching hut.

Selsea: Within one mile radius from Coastguard station.

Sandown bay: Inside the line joining Culver cliff and Dunnose head.

Ventnor: Within one mile of Ventnor pier.

Christchurch: Inside the line joining Chewton Bunny to Christchurch ledge buoy, and thence to Christchurch head.

Christchurch head to Sandbanks: Within 500 yards of low water mark.

Note.—Boating off Bournemouth is permitted inside a line joining the Martello tower near Sugar Loaf chine and Southbourne, provided the boats are supervised and inspected by the Piermaster and Beach Inspectors in conjunction with the Coast-Watching Officer.

Poole harbour. Within line joining North and South Havens.

Studland bay: From opposite Studland village to the old breakwater within 400 yards of low water mark.

Swanage bay: To the west of line joining Ballard and Peverill points.

15. No excursion traffic is allowed except with the written permission of the Commander-in-Chief, Portsmouth, to be obtained for the season in regard to standing excursions, and on each occasion of special excursions.

16. Nothing in these orders shall affect the standing orders relating to the Defence Areas at Portsmouth, Newhaven and Poole.

II. NEWHAVEN—CLOSING OF THE PORT.

The Port of Newhaven is closed to all merchant vessels other than those employed on Government Service, and those which have previously obtained special permission to enter from the Divisional Naval Transport Officer, Newhaven.

III. SPITHEAD APPROACH—RESTRICTION OF TRAFFIC; PROHIBITED ANCHORAGE.

1. Passage of vessels between Noman's fort and the charted position of Warner light-vessel is entirely prohibited.

2. Vessels of all descriptions are prohibited from anchoring in St. Helen's roads to the westward of a line drawn in a 162° (*S. 3^{\circ} E.* *Mag.*) direction from Noman's fort.

IV. POOLE BAY AND SOLENT APPROACH—RESTRICTION OF TRAFFIC.

No craft of any description, other than craft employed on Admiralty work, is to be under way to the northward of a line joining St. Catherine's point and Anvil point, between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise, or during fog.

(2) Portland Harbour Approach—Restriction of Traffic.

No vessels or boats of any description are to move in the area north of a line joining Portland bill with St. Albans head, by day or night, unless proceeding into Weymouth anchorage. *Variation.*— 15° W.

Note.

This Notice is a revision of the former Notice quoted above.

CAUTION.

This Admiralty Notice to Mariners is issued under the provisions of the Defence of the Realm Regulations, and failure to comply strictly with the directions contained in it will constitute an offence against those Regulations.

Any person found guilty of such an offence is liable to severe penalties both of imprisonment and fine.
