

to time think fit but shall not at any time exceed ten:

(b) the value of a War Scholarship shall not exceed the value of an ordinary Scholarship:

(c) the number of ordinary scholars shall not exceed sixty unless and until the provision for such War Scholars shall have been satisfied:

(d) if the funds at the disposal of the Governing Body shall be insufficient to provide as well for such War Scholars as for sixty ordinary scholars, the Governing Body may to such extent as may appear to them necessary abridge the number of ordinary scholars:

(e) in no case shall the number of ordinary scholars be reduced under paragraph (d) so as to be less than fifty.

(2) To make Regulations for enabling boys of the aforesaid class to receive education and maintenance at the School as commoners thereof in the Boarding Houses belonging to the School or in such of the Boarding Houses as the Regulations shall indicate upon special terms with respect to all or any of the fees to be paid by such boys: Provided that such Regulations shall be so framed as to limit the number of boys who may enjoy the benefit thereof at any one time in any one Boarding House to a number not exceeding two.

(3) (a) To make grants out of the funds at the disposal of the Governing Body towards meeting any expenses relating to the education at the School of the boys for the time being enjoying the benefit of any Regulations which shall have been made under sub-section (2) of this section, being expenses which the payments made under such Regulations shall not suffice to meet:

(b) To contribute either a principal sum or sums by way of annual grant, to the Trust called the Charterhouse Tercentenary Fund for the purpose of enabling the Trustees of the said Fund to give pecuniary assistance to boys entering the School being the Sons of Carthusians and of the aforesaid class: Provided that such contribution or contributions shall be made only upon the undertaking and agreement of the said Trustees.

(i.) That the monies so contributed and the interest (if any) arising therefrom shall be expended for the said purpose and not for any other purpose or object.

(ii.) That in every case where the said Trustees desire to give such assistance the name of the proposed beneficiary and the circumstances of the case and the amount proposed to be expended shall be submitted to the Governing Body, whose approval shall be a condition precedent to such expenditure.

II. (1) No boy shall receive any of the benefits or assistance authorized or empowered by this Statute, unless the Governing Body shall be satisfied that by reason of his pecuniary circumstances it is proper that he should receive such benefit or assistance.

(2) The decision of the Governing Body upon any question arising under this Statute as to whether a boy belongs to the aforesaid class or as to the pecuniary circumstances of a boy shall for the purposes of this Statute be final and conclusive.

III. The provisions with respect to scholarships and scholars contained in the Statutes shall apply to War Scholarships and War

Scholars in like manner as they apply to other scholarships and scholars in the School, but subject nevertheless to the following provisions:—

(1) The examination relating to War Scholarships may be and the list of successful candidates shall be separate and distinct from the examination and the list relating to ordinary scholarships:

(2) In the arranging of names upon the list relating to War Scholars the Governing Body shall have a discretionary power of departing from the strict order of merit as shown by the examination and of giving preferences to candidates who, because they are sons of Carthusians or for any other reason, in the opinion of the Governing Body, ought to be preferred:

(3) In the filling up of vacancies amongst War Scholars a vacancy shall be ignored if the Governing Body shall have determined that the vacancy shall not be filled up.
