His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the appointment of the undermentioned Officers to be Companions of the Distinguished Service Order in recognition of their gallantry and devotion to duty in the Field:—

Temp. 2nd Lt. William Algie, North'd Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He led the assaulting party with great dash and inflicted many casualties on the enemy. He himself shot eight of the enemy with his revolver. Later, he skilfully withdrew his party under very heavy fire and assisted to bring in the wounded.

Capt. (temp. Maj.) Maxwell Hunter Forsyth, M.C., Gord. Highrs., attd. Sco. Rif.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a strong raiding party. He trained the party, and carried out the raid successfully, personally controlling it from the enemy's front line. The party entered the enemy's third line, captured forty-three prisoners, two machine guns, and a trench mortar.

Capt. James Andrew Harcourt Gammell, M.C., R.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when employed as Staff Officer to the Armoured Car Patrol. He displayed great coolness under heavy fire, and his energy and perseverance greatly assisted in the success of the operations.

Temp. Surg. Harold Boultbee Padwick, R.N.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He remained in the open, and continued to tend the wounded under very heavy fire. Later, he proceeded to Head-quarters, and at great personal risk brought in many wounded men. He displayed great courage and determination throughout the operations.

Maj. Llewellyn Partridge, Yeo., attd. Welsh R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great judgment and skill in the leadership of his three light patrols, and showed inexhaustible resource in overcoming the most serious physical obstacles. Later, in action he proved himself a dashing and competent leader.

Capt. (temp. Maj.) Arthur Beresford Phile-

mon Pereira, A.S.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He was untiring in his work, and kept the force supplied in its important requirements of petrol and water for the cars, as well as rations and water for personnel with conspicuous success. He displayed great coolness and resource in action.

Temp. Lt.-Col. Cecil Porch Porch, North'd Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and able leading while in command of a raiding party. The success of the raid was largely due to his most careful work in preparing the details of the scheme and his own determined leading. Later, although wounded, he continued to direct operations, and personally superintended the removal of the wounded under heavy fire.

#### SOUTH AFRICAN FORCE.

2nd Lt. John Currie, S. African Arty.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He, with another officer, organised and led forward a party of infantry at a critical time, thereby enabling an enemy strong point to be carried and over 100 prisoners taken. Later, he again took charge of parties of four different regiments and succeeded in repelling an enemy, counter-attack. He set a splendid example of courage and determination throughout.

Distinguished Service Order Award.

The particulars of the act of gallantry in this case will be published next month in The London Gazette. This award was omitted from the Gazette dated 17th March, 1917, pending verification.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to award a Bar to the Military Cross to the undermentioned Officers:—

Temp. Capt. Archibald Stirling Kennedy Anderson, M.B., M.C., R.A.M.C., attd. R.N. Fld. Amb.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rendered most valuable services while in command of a bearer sub-division, in assisting to collect wounded from a forward area under very heavy fire.

Temp. Lt. (temp. Capt.) Reginald Walter Barnett, M.C., Gen. List.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out a dangerous recon-

naissance and furnished a most valuable report on the situation. He has on many previous occasions carried out valuable reconnaissance work.

Lt. Norman Beresford Lovett, M.C., Aus.

Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He carried a very important message through the most intense hostile barrage, thereby saving the situation at a critical time.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to confer the Military Cross on the undermentioned Officers and Warrant Officers, in recognition of their gallantry and devotion to duty in the Field:—

Temp. Sub-Lt. David Ablett, R.N.V.R.,

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He skillfully established his trench mortar positions and assisted in capturing 31 prisoners. Later, he rallied some infantry, put a trench in a state of defence, and drove off an enemy attack.

Temp. 2nd Lt. John William Aldred, R. Lanc. R. and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry during an aerial combat with two hostile scouts. He drove one of the hostile machines down and succeeded in driving the other hostile machine back over the enemy's lines. He displayed great courage and determination throughout.

Temp. Lt. (actg. Capt.) George Johnston Apperson, R. Ir. Rif.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He, single-handed, attacked a party of five of the enemy and shot two of them with his revolver. He has at all times set a splendid example of courage and determination.

Temp. Sub-Lt. Reginald Francis Edsall Blackmore, R.N.V.R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led a very gallant attack against an enemy strong point. Later, although wounded, he maintained his position and rendered a clear report of the situation.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Douglas Alexander Brett, R.W. Kent R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He led one of the raiding parties with great gallantry and inflicted many casualties on the enemy. He set a splendid example to his men

2nd Lt. James Rodger Brown, High. L.I. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to

duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He showed great courage and initiative throughout the whole operation, and was personally responsible for the capture of one prisoner.

Temp. Sub-Lt. John Frederick Bunce, R.N.V.R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out a dangerous recon-

naissance and obtained most valuable information. He has on many occasions carried out valuable reconnaissance work.

Lt. Douglas Hugh Moffatt Carbery, R.F.A. and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty while engaged on artillery observation. He was attacked by four hostile machines, which he succeeded in driving off and continued to carry out his observations. Later, he was again attacked by several hostile machines and succeeded in bringing one of them down. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. Sub-Lt. Joseph Clark, R.N.V.R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He held a portion of a trench with only fourteen men for two nights and a day. He repelled a strong enemy counter-attack and captured a strong point with several prisoners.

Lt. (actg. Capt.) William Ralph Cobb, R.W. Kent R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his company in a raid against the enemy's trenches with marked ability, and the success of the raid was largely

due to his leadership. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Temp. 2nd Lt. John Edward Common, North'd Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a raiding party with great dash, entered the hostile trenches and himself shot two of the enemy. He was severely wounded. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

2nd Lt. Walter McFarlane Coulter, High. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He led his men with great dash and the success of the raid was largely due to his personal coolness and initiative. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Temp. Lt. Herbert John Davidson, M.B., R.A.M.C., attd. R.N. Fld. Amb.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He tended the wounded in a forward area under very heavy fire. He set a splendid example to all ranks.

2nd Lt. Roy Austin Davidson, Yco., attd. R. Welsh Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed great coolness and resource in getting his patrol forward over almost impassable ground. Although accompanied by only twelve men, he inflicted considerably casualties on the retreating enemy.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) Francis Ivan Leslie Ditmas, R. of O., Durh. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He, accompanied by two other officers, at great personal risk extinguished a fire which had broken out in an ammunition dump. His gallant act undoubtedly saved many lives.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Lionel Frederick Etheridge, E. Lan. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rendered most valuable assistance in digging out several buried men during an intense enemy bombardment. Later, although wounded, he remained at his post and continued to direct operations. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. Sub.-Lt. William Alexander Fernie, R.N.V.R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised carrying parties, led them up to the dumps under heavy fire, thereby ensuring the supply of ammunition and bombs to the front line at a critical time.

Temp. 2nd Lt. George Frederick Filor, Wilts. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a daylight raid on the enemy's trenches. He displayed great coolness throughout the operation, and by his personal example was largely instrumental in the capture of all the objectives.

2nd Lt. Percy Frederick Finch, H.A.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his men in the attack with great dash and succeeded in capturing his objective. He set a fine example of courage and determination throughout.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) John Archibald Fletcher, Glouc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He handled his company with marked ability, and succeeded in repulsing a strong enemy raiding party. He set a fine example to his men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Robert Slade French, R.W. Kent R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. Although wounded, he continued to lead his men and himself accounted for three of the enemy. He set a fine example of courage and determination.

Lt. Dennis Walter Furlong, R. Berks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He made a dangerous reconnaissance under very heavy fire, and sent in an invaluable report. Later, he moved up some men to fill a gap and placed several machine guns in a favourable position.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Tom Goodland, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went forward under very heavy fire to establish an intermediate S.O.S. station. He kept a continual lookout throughout the night, although temporarily knocked out by the explosion of a shell.

Temp. Sub.-Lt. Hugh Merton Graham, R.N.V.R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out a daring reconnaissance of the enemy's front line, and obtained most valuable information.

Temp. 2nd Lt. John Gray, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He led his men with great dash, and assisted in capturing nine prisoners. He set a splendid example of courage and determination.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Philip Guy Grinling, A.S.C.

For conspicuous devotion to duty when in command of a Car Supply Column. He kept his cars in running order under the most trying conditions, and displayed the greatest endurance throughout.

Temp. 2nd. Lt. John Francis Hagarty, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised a party, and at great personal risk succeeded in extinguishing a fire which had broken out in an ammunition dump.

2nd Lt. John Harrison, R. War. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. In spite of heavy casualties, he continued to lead a bombing party against the enemy with great gallantry. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Temp. Lt. Thomas Emmanuel Heron, North'd Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. Although wounded, he continued to command his men for thirty-five minutes in the enemy's trenches, until the signal was given to withdraw. He displayed great courage and determination throughout.

Temp. Lt. James Curzon Hilton, R.N.V.R. For conspicuous gallantry in action. He handled his company in the attack with marked ability, and maintained his position against several enemy counter-attacks. He set a splendid example of courage and determination throughout.

2nd Lt. John Ferrar Holms, High. L.I. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion

for conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised a bombing attack, and succeeded in repulsing an enemy raiding party at a critical time. He set a splendid example of courage and determination.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Edwin Ibbotson, N. Lan. R. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a successful raiding party against the enemy and inflicted many casualties. Later, he assisted to rescue several wounded men under very heavy fire.

Capt. Henry Basil Inman, R.M.L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He handled his company with marked ability and maintained his position under the most

trying conditions. He set a splendid example to his men.

2nd Lt. Basil Charles Barwell Jagger, R.W.

Kent R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He led the left raiding party with great dash, and inflicted many casualties on the enemy. He has at all times set a splendid example.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) Hubert William Godfrey Jones, Welsh. R. and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. With a patrol of three scouts he attacked a hostile formation of ten enemy machines. Although wounded, he continued the combat and drove down an enemy machine. Later, although again wounded, he remained with his patrol until the enemy retired.

7449 C/S/M. Harold Keetley, York. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He displayed great courage and initiative during the attack, and himself accounted for several of the enemy. Later, he materially assisted in repelling an enemy counterattack.

2nd Lt. John Noble Kennedy, R.G.A.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He, with three men, established an observation post in "No Man's Land," and under very heavy hostile fire directed the fire of his Battery most successfully. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Capt. Robert Andrew Kerr, M.B., R.A.M.C., attd. R. War. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He succeeded in rescuing his three bearers, who were entombed when the aid post was blown in. He constantly visited the most dangerous parts of the line in order to tend the wounded.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Sydney Charles Kerridge, North'd Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry during a raid in the enemy trenches. He systematically cleared the whole of the trench allotted to him, bombing the dugouts and killing the occupants. He set a splendid example to his men throughout the operation.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Andrew Ronald Legat, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He established and maintained communication under very heavy fire. He got valuable information through by going forward to advanced Battalion Headquarters under a heavy enemy barrage.

Temp. Sub.-Lt. Walter Paterson Lyall, R.N.V.R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. During an enemy counter-attack he continually visited his men under very heavy fire. His men were hard pressed, and his gallant action undoubtedly saved the posts from being rushed.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Eric Gordon Henderson

Lyon, Sco. Rif.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He was severely wounded in the earlier stages of the raid, but continued to lead his men till the objective was reached.

2nd Lt. Stewart Milley, North'd Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. bombed two dug-outs, killing three of the enemy, and rescued a wounded officer from the enemy front line. Later, he, singlehanded, drove back a party of the enemy and rescued several wounded men under very heavy fire.

Lt. (acting Capt.) John Graham Mowat, W. Rid. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He led his men with great gallantry, and inflicted many casualties on the enemy. On one occasion he personally helped to clear a gap in the enemy's wire.

2nd Lt. John Richard Neave, Linc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when leading a patrol. He encountered two enemy patrols of superior strength to his own, and at once attacked them and drove them off in disorder. displayed great courage and initiative.

2nd Lt. William Herbert Odbert, Conn.

Rang., attd. R. Ir. Rif.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. During an intense hostile bombardment of the front line, he went backwards and forwards between various posts to see that his men were ready to meet an attack.

2nd Lt. Alfred Oliver Pollard, H.A.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a patrol and carried out a dangerous reconnaissance. Later, he assumed command of a company and repulsed two strong enemy counter-attacks.

Temp. Sub.-Lt. Harold Alfred Pound, R.N.V.R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He assumed command of a company, and, under the most difficult conditions, succeeded in closing a gap in the front line. He set a fine example of courage and determination.

Temp. Sub.-Lt. Basil Bedsmore Rackham, R.N.V.R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He showed marked ability in preparing gun positions, and continually moved from position to position under very heavy fire. On another occasion, he displayed great bravery in going round the whole line during an enemy counter-attack.

Temp. Lt. Allan George Reid, R.A.M.C., attd. R.N. Fld. Amb.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He tended the wounded under very heavy fire, and worked continuously for 36 hours in command of a bearer sub-division which was operating in a forward area.

2nd Lt. Cecil Oliver Rich, Wilts. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He continually carried out daring patrols of the enemy's wire, and the success of a raiding party was largely due to his information.

Temp. Lt. William Lister Robotti, R.M.L.I:

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He conducted two echelons of a pack-animal train to within 300 yards of the front line, under very heavy fire. He displayed great courage throughout, and set a fine example to his men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Harvey Wilfred Warwick

Rowe, Ches. R.

For conspicuous gallantry during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He was the first to enter the trench, and himself accounted for five of the enemy. He then organised the clearing of the trench with marked coolness and ability, with the result that heavy casualties were inflicted on the enemy.

2nd Lt. Wilfrid Rippon Snow, R.F.C., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He successfully bombed a hostile aerodrome from a height of 1,000 ft. Later, in another machine, he again bombed the hostile aerodrome from a low altitude. On another occasion he made two very daring trench reconnaissances.

2nd Lt. George Stephens, Glouc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He handled his platoon with great gallantry, and materially assisted in repelling a strong enemy raiding party.

Temp. Sub.-Lt. John Cecil Sterndale-Bennett, R.N.V.R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He rushed up and endeavoured to save a post which was being strongly attacked by the In doing this he was severely wounded, but refused to leave his post until another officer could be found to replace him.

Lt. Geoffrey Killigrew Wait, Wilts. R.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. led a raiding party with great gallantry, and organized the different attacking parties with great skill. He set a splendid example throughout.

2nd Lt. John Watson, North'd Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. Although wounded in two places, he continued to lead and encourage his men until he fainted from loss of blood close to the enemy's wire.

2nd Lt. Frank Bernard Williams, R. War.  $\mathbf{R}$ .

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He voluntarily carried an important message under very heavy fire. He has at all times set a fine example of courage and determination.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Robert Williams, R. Welsh

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches.

He led his men forward in a gallant and determined manner in spite of very heavy Later, although wounded, he re-He was again wounded. mained at duty.

Capt. Frederick Vavasour Broome Witts, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and coolness. Under heavy rifle and machine gun fire he made a personal reconnaissance of the river bank, and subsequently led a party of his men carrying a pontoon across the open and down the bank. Although wounded himself, and in spite of casualties among his party, which made the task increasingly difficult, he succeeded, in full view of the enemy, in launching the pontoon.

#### AUSTRALIAN IMPERIAL FORCE.

Lt. William Stanley Bone, Aust. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his company in the attack with great courage and initiative. Later, he personally supervised the consolidation of the position, and was indefatigable in his efforts through-

Lt. Ambrose Campbell Carmichael, Aust.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He tained his position during the most intense enemy bombardment. He set a splendid example of courage and determination throughout. He was wounded.

2nd Lt. John Patrick Courtney, Aust. Infy. For conspicuous gallantry in action. During an intense hostile bombardment he moved from post to post encouraging his men. Later, he personally supervised and assisted in the carrying of the wounded some 150 yards across the open to the dressing station.

2nd Lt. Richard Henry Hooper, Aust. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. During the height of the attack and under an intense hostile artillery fire he coolly directed the work of his men, carried out hourly reliefs, and although twice wounded continued to encourage and help.

Lt. George Stanley McDowell, Aust. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry in action.

He led his men in the attack with great gallantry and established a bombing post in the enemy's trench, thereby securing the left flank at a critical time. He has at all times set a splendid example.

Lt. Werner Henry McPherson, Aust. Fld. Arty., attd. Medium Trench Mortar By.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He kept his trench mortar battery in action under very heavy hostile shell fire and succeeded in carrying out his task of wirecutting. He set a splendid example throughout.

Capt. Norman Craig Shierlaw, Aust. A.M.C., R.M.O., Aust. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He continually attended to the wounded for two days and nights under heavy fire. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Capt. Walter Wells, Aust. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He organised the men of his platoon and maintained his position during the most in-tense enemy bombardment. He set a splendid example of courage and determination throughout.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He handled his men with marked ability, and inflicted many casualties on the enemy He was the last to leave the enemy's line, and brought back most valuable information.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a raiding party with great courage and initiative, bombed many dugouts, and inflicted severe casualties on the He was wounded. He has preenemy. viously done fine work.

Lt. Norman Howard Pawley, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He led his party with great dash, and personally captured an enemy machine gun. Later, he captured and brought in a prisoner.
