At the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 1st day of May, 1917.

By the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

HEREAS it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation or Order in Council made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, as amended by the Act now in recital, may, whilst a state of war exists, be varied or added to by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade:

And whereas it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation made under Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, may, whether the Proclamation was made before or after the passing of the Act now in recital, be varied or added to, whilst a state of war exists, by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade:

And whereas by a Proclamation, dated the 10th day of May, 1916, and made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, and Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, and Section 1 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, the ex-

portation from the United Kingdom of certain articles to certain or all destinations was prohibited:

And whereas by subsequent Orders of Council the said Proclamation was amended and added to in certain particulars:

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Board of Trade to the following effect:—

That the Proclamation, dated the 10th day of May, 1916, as amended and added to by subsequent Orders of Council, should be further amended by making the following amendments in and additions to the Schedule to the same:—

- (1) That the following headings should be deleted:—
 - (c) Animal hoofs and other glue stock (including untanned pelts and hides not otherwise specifically prohibited), fish bladders and fish skins;
 - (c) Barrels and casks, empty, and their distinctive component parts, other than such barrels and casks as have been previously imported full, and are being returned empty, whether whole or in parts;

(c) Camphor;
(a) Candles manufactured wholly o partly of paraffin wax or tallow;

(c) Fibres, vegetable, not otherwise specifically prohibited, and cordage, twine and yarns made therefrom;

Whereas by an Order made on the 24th June, 1916, and published in the London Gazette on the 27th June, 1916, the Minister of Munitions, in pursuance of the powers con-ferred upon him by Regulation 30a of the Defence of the Realm Regulations, ordered that the war material to which the Regulation applies should include Whale Oil other than Sperm Oil; and whereas the Minister of Munitions deems it desirable that certain limited sales and purchases of such Whale Oil should be permitted.

Now, therefore, the Minister of Munitions gives notice that he hereby, until further notice, authorises and permits the sale and purchase and negotiations for the sale and purchase of Whale Oil (other than Sperm Oil) situate in the United Kingdom, subject to the

following conditions:

1. No person shall, either by himself or his agent, in any consecutive period of three calendar months sell or purchase or negotiate for the sale or purchase of more than a total quantity of 25 tons.

2. No sale, purchase or negotiation shall be otherwise than for delivery within the United

Kingdom.

SEEDS, OILS AND FATS.

The Minister of Munitions in exercise of the powers conferred upon him by the Defence of

the Realm Regulations, and of all other powers enabling him, hereby Orders as follows:

 As from the date hereof until further notice no person shall purchase, sell or, except for the purpose of carrying out a contract in writing existing prior to such date for the sale or purchase of any of the Articles specified in the first schedule hereto, deal in any of the said Articles whether situated within or without the United Kingdom except under and in accordance with the terms of a licence issued by or under the authority of the Minister of Munitions provided that

(a) No licence shall be required

(i) By a seller for the sale of any of the said articles situated within the United Kingdom in quantities not exceeding one ton provided that the total quantity of all the said articles sold by him or on his behalf to or on behalf of any one purchaser during any one calendar month does not exceed five

(ii) By a purchaser for the purchase of any of the said articles situated within the United Kingdom in quantities not exceeding one ton provided that the total quantity of all the said articles purchased by him or on his behalf in any one calendar month does not exceed five tons.

- 2. As from the date hereof until further notice no person shall purchase, sell or deal in or offer to purchase, sell or deal in any of the articles specified in the second schedule hereto at a price exceeding the price set opposite to the same in the second schedule. Provided that this restriction on price shall not apply to any sale or purchase of any of the said articles which under clause 1 of this Order is authorised to be effected without any licence issued by or under the authority of the Minister of Munitions.
- 4. All parties to any of the transactions herein specified shall require or disclose (as the case may be) all such information as may be necessary for or required by such parties as aforesaid or by or under the authority of the Minister for the purpose of satisfying them or him that the provisions of this Order have not been contravened.
- 3. All persons affected by this Order shall make all such returns as to stocks, purchases, sales, payments, prices and dealings in any of the articles specified in the first schedule hereto as shall from time to time be required by or under the authority of the Minister of Munitions.

ARMY COUNCIL ORDER.

QUININE, PHENACETIN AND FORMALDEHYDE.

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by the Defence of the Realm Regulations, notice is hereby given that it is the intention of the Army Council to take possession of stores of the following classes and descriptions, that is to say:—

All stocks of Quinine Sulphate excepting stocks of less than 100 ounces.

All stocks of Quinine Bisulphate excepting stocks of less than 25 ounces.

All stocks of Quinine Hydrochloride excepting stocks of less than 25 ounces.

All stocks of Quinine Bi-hydrochloride excepting stocks of less than 25 ounces.

All stocks of Phenacetin excepting stocks of less than 7 lbs.

All stocks of Formaldehyde Solution 40 per cent., excepting stocks of less than 10 gallons.

If after this notice any person, without the consent of the Army Council, sells, removes or secretes any of the said stores, or deals with it, in any way contrary to any conditions imposed in any licence, permit or order which may have been granted in respect thereof, he shall be guilty of an offence against the said Regulations.

(DATED 30TH APRIL 1917.)

MIDDLESBROUGH AND DISTRICT (SWINE-FEVER) ORDER OF 1917.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Prohibition of Movement of Swine out of Certain Area.

1. No swine, fat or store, shall be moved out of the Area described in the Schedule hereto, except as expressly authorised by this Order: Provided that nothing in this Article shall be deemed to apply to the movement of swine where they are moved through such Area by railway from a place outside such Area to another place outside such Area without unnecessary delay and without the swine being untrucked within such Area.

Movement out of Area for Slaughter.

2.—(1.) Swine (not being in a Swine-Fever Infected Place) may be moved out of the Area described in the Schedule hereto to a bacon factory or slaughterhouse, or to any lairs, market or saleyard specially authorised by the Local Authority under the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908 (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order"), or the Swine-Fever (Movement from Ireland) Order of 1904, if accompanied by a licence (Form D) granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the premises from which the swine are to be moved are situate and subject to the following conditions (namely):—

(i.) The swine shall be marked by and at the expense of the owner by the painting with an indelible composition of red colour of a broad line down the back and another broad line across the loins of each of the swine, thus +, each line being not less than nine inches long.

(ii.) The swine shall be moved, by railway so far as is practicable, to the bacon factory, slaughterhouse, lairs, market, or saleyard specified in the Licence, and during such movement shall not be permitted to come in contact with swine not marked under this

Article

- (2.) Swine may also be moved out of the Area described in the Schedule hereto to any market, fairground, or saleyard, if accompanied by a licence (Form A) authorising such movement, granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the market, fairground, or saleyard is situate. Before a licence is granted by an Inspector under this provision, the owner of the swine, or his agent authorised in writing for this purpose, shall sign, and deliver or send by post to the Inspector, a declaration (Form B), which shall not be effective until it is countersigned by a police officer of the district where the swine are, who, before countersigning the declara-tion, shall, so far as is practicable, satisfy himself as to the correctness of the statements contained therein. The declaration shall be retained by the Inspector granting the licence
- (3.) Swine moved to any market, fair-ground, or saleyard with a licence under the preceding paragraph (2) of this Article, shall be moved from such premises only if accompanied by a licence (Form C) authorising such movement granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the market, fairground, or saleyard is situate and only to a bacon-factory or slaughterhouse specified in the licence, or to the premises from which the swine were moved to the market, fairground or saleyard.

(4.) Swine moved under this Article shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay, and where they are moved to a bacon-factory or slaughter-house they shall be there detained until they

are slaughtered.

(5.) Licences granted under this Article shall be in force for not more than eight days

inclusive of the day of issue.

(6.) No licence under the principal Order shall be required for the movement into a Scheduled Area for the purposes of that Order of swine which are being moved under and in accordance with a licence granted under this Order.

Copies of Movement Licences to be sent to Local Authority of Place of Destination.

3. A copy of a licence which authorises movement of swine to premises in a District other than the District for which the person granting the licence acts as Inspector shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Local Authority of the District in which the place of destination specified in the licence is situate.

Forms.

4. The Forms referred to in this Order are the Forms set forth in the First Schedule to the principal Order.

Licences after Completion of Movement. 5.—(1.) Where swine are moved with a licence under this Order to any lairs, market, fairground, or saleyard, the licence shall be delivered up in exchange for the licence for movement of the swine from such premises.

(2) Where swine are moved with a licence under this Order to any premises other than to any lairs, market, fairground, or saleyard, the licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District by the person in charge of the swine at the time of completing the said movement.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

6.—(1.) Any person in charge of a pig being moved, where under this Order a licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the licence, if any, authorising the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or

other officer.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

7. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Granting of Movement Licences.

8.—(1.) A movement licence granted under this Order shall not be available if granted by the owner of the swine to be moved, or by his agent, or by the consignee of the swine, or by the occupier of the farm or premises or slaughter-house from or to which the swine are to be moved, or by any individual member of an Executive Committee or Sub-Committee of a Local Authority.

(2.) A movement licence shall not be granted by an Inspector if, in his opinion, it is unde-

sirable to grant it.

Offences.

9.—(1.) If a pig is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the pig, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the pig is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Animals Act, 1894.

(2.) If a person in charge of a pig being moved, where under this Order a licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of

Animals Act, 1894.

(3.) If any person fails to deliver up or send a licence, as required by this Order, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases

of Animals Act, 1894.

(4.) If any person, with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted on any pig for the purposes of this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults,

be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Revocation.

10. The Middlesbrough and District (Swine Fever) Order of 1915 is hereby revoked.

Commencement.

11. This Order shall come into operation on the fourth day of May, nineteen hundred and seventeen.

LONDON COUNTY COUNCIL.

By-laws as to Seamen's Lodging-houses. By-laws made by the London County Council in pursuance of section 214 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, relating to seamen's lodging-houses in the administrative County of London.

Interpretation of Terms.

1.-In the construction of the following bylaws, unless the context otherwise requires, the following expressions have the meanings hereby assigned to them, that is to say-"The Council" means

means the London

County Council.
"The County" means the administrative county of London.

"The district" means the district of the

sanitary authority.

"Seaman" means any male person other than the holder of a certificate of competency or service as master, mate, or engineer, in the merchant service who is ordinarily employed in any capacity whatsoever on board ship.

"Licence" means a licence granted, or which may be granted, by the Council in pursuance of these by-laws to a person authorising him to keep the house specified therein

as a seamen's lodging-house.
"Keeper" means a person to whom a licence has been granted in pursuance of these by-laws.

"House" means a seamen's lodginghouse.

Application for Licence.

-A person who shall apply to the Council for a licence shall furnish, on the application form to be supplied by the Council, a true statement of the particulars therein required to be specified.

Penalty for False Statement.

3.—A person who, not being duly licensed, shall himself or by means of any agent or servant hold himself out as keeping or purporting to keep a licensed house, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds, and to a further penalty of ten pounds for every day during which he shall continue to do so after conviction for so doing.

Grant of Licence.

4.—A licence shall continue in force (subject to suspension or revocation as in these by-laws provided) for such period as the Council may determine, and shall be subject to such conditions specified therein or endorsed thereon, and not being inconsistent with the laws, by-laws, or regulations for the time being in force in the county, as the Council sees fit, and a keeper, or any person employed in a licensed house, shall not commit a breach of, or fail to observe, such conditions.

Public-houses or Beer-houses Not to be Licensed .

-A house or part of a house which is in connection with any public-house or beer-house shall not be licensed as a seamen's lodginghouse.

Certain Persons Not to be Licensed.

6.—A licence shall not be granted to a person who holds a licence for the sale of intoxicating liquor, nor shall a licence be granted in respect of any house or part of a house where intoxicating liquor is sold, nor shall any keeper sell or be engaged or interested in the sale of intoxicating liquor. Provided that nothing in this by-law shall prohibit the Council from granting a licence in respect of a bona fide sailors' home carried on under the superintendence of an unpaid board directors or committee of management at which intoxicating liquor is sold; any profits of such home being wholly applied or expended in the upkeep, maintenance, endowment, or improvement of such home or for the benefit of the seamen lodging or boarding therein.

Notice to be affixed to Licensed House.

7.—A keeper shall affix and keep undefaced and legible a notice with the words "Licensed Seamen's Lodging-house " in the most conspicuous place on the outside of the main entrance from any street to the licensed house, and also the full name and address of the keeper.

Access to Seamen's Lodging-house and to Register of Lodgers.

A keeper and any person employed in a house shall at all times, by day or night, when required by an officer appointed by the Council for the inspection of seamen's lodginghouses, or by an officer of the Board of Trade, or of the police, give him or them, or any of them free access to all parts of such house and to the register of seamen lodgers hereinafter referred to.

Number of Lodgers.

9.—A keeper shall not at any one time receive, cause, or suffer to be received into a house

or into any room therein, a greater number of lodgers than shall be from time to time allowed by the certificate of the clerk of the Council. Such certificates shall be supplied by the Council to the keeper, and he shall produce such certificate whenever required by any officer appointed by the Council for the inspection of seamen's lodging-houses.

10.-A keeper shall fix and keep fixed in a conspicuous place in each room appointed for use as a sleeping apartment in a house, a ticket signed by the clerk of the Council, stating the number of lodgers allowed to be received into such room, and a keeper and any person employed in a house shall not at any time conceal, deface, alter, or obliterate, or permit or suffer to be concealed, defaced, altered, or obliterated,

any letters or figures on such ticket.

11.—Notwithstanding that the maximum number of lodgers to be received into a house or into any room therein may not have been fixed by the Council as hereinbefore provided, a keeper shall not cause or suffer a greater number of persons than will admit of the provision of 400 cubic feet of free air space for each person to occupy at one time as a sleeping apartment a room which is used for that pur-

12.—Whenever the Council shall consider it necessary to reduce the number of lodgers to be received into any room in a house, the keeper shall, upon receiving notice in writing to that effect under the hand of the clerk of the Council, cease to permit such room to be occupied by any greater number of lodgers than that specified in such notice.

Sleeping Apartments.

13.—A keeper shall not at any time cause or suffer any room which may be appointed for use as a kitchen, scullery, or sitting room, or any underground room which does not comply with the provisions of sub-section 1 of section 96 of the Public Health (London) Act, 1891, to be used as a sleeping apartment.

Ventilation.

14.--A keeper shall cause all such means of ventilation as may be provided in or in connection with any room, passage or staircase in a house, and in, or in connection with, any water-closet or urinal belonging to a house to be maintained at all times in good order.

15.—A keeper shall cause the windows of every room and of every passage, staircase and water-closet in a house to be kept fully open for such time on each day as may be necessary for the purposes of ventilation, and shall cause the windows of every room which may be appointed for use and occupation as a sleeping apartment to be kept fully open from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. each day during months of October, November, December, January, February, March, and April, and from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. each day during the months of May, June, July, August, and September.

Provided that such keeper shall not be required in pursuance of this by-law to cause any window in any room to be opened or to be kept open at any time when the state of the weather is such as to render it necessary that the window shall be closed, or when any bed in such room may be occupied by any lodger in consequence of sickness or other sufficient

cause.

Cleansing.

16.—A keeper shall, in the first week in the

month of April, and, if required in writing by the Council, in the first week in the month of October, in every year, cause every part of a house to be cleansed, and shall, at the same time, except as in such cases as are hereinafter specified, cause every area, the interior surface of every ceiling and wall of every water-closet belonging to the premises, and the interior surface of every ceiling and wall of every room, staircase and passage in the house, to be thoroughly stopped, cleansed, and limecleansed, and lime-Provided that if any thoroughly stopped, washed or distempered. such interior surface is painted or covered with material which is such as to render the limewashing thereof unsuitable or inexpedient, this by-law shall be deemed to be satisfied, so long as such surface is thoroughly cleansed and the paint or other covering thereon is renewed, if such cleansing or renewal be necessary for the purpose of keeping the house in a cleanly and wholesome condition.

17.—A keeper shall, as often as may be necessary to keep the same in a clean and wholesome state, cause all the rooms, passages, stairs, floors, windows, doors, and walls of a house to be thoroughly cleansed and freed from vermin, and shall also cause the floors of every room to be thoroughly swept daily before the hour of ten in the forenoon, and to be well and sufficiently washed on Friday in each week before the hour of twelve noon.

18.—A keeper shall cause all bed clothes and bedding and every bedstead used in a house to be thoroughly cleansed as often as shall be required for the purpose of keeping such bed clothes, bedding and bedsteads in a clean and wholesome condition and free from vermin.

Chamber Utensils and Washing Basins.

19.—A keeper shall, for the use of the lodgers received into a house, cause to be provided a sufficient number of chamber utensils and a sufficient number of washing basins or other proper receptacles for water, of adequate capacity and suitably placed, and a sufficient supply of water, and a sufficient number of towels for use in connection with such washing basins and other receptacles and shall cause such basins or receptacles to be kept clean and in good order, and the supply of towels to be renewed as often as may be requisite.

Beds and Bedding.

20.—A keeper shall cause every room which may be appointed for use and occupation as a sleeping apartment in a house to be furnished with such number of beds and bedsteads and with such a supply of bed-clothes as may be sufficient for the requirements of the number of lodgers authorised to be received into such room, and he shall cause every sleeping apartment to be furnished with bedsteads and bedding of a size adapted for one person only.

Removal of Refuse.

21.—A keeper shall cause all solid or liquid filth or refuse to be removed once at least in every day before the hour of ten in the forenoon from every room in the house, and shall once at least in every day cause every vessel, utensil, or other receptacle for such filth or refuse to be thoroughly cleansed.

Infectious Disease.

22.—In the event of any inmate of a house, whether a lodger or otherwise, being ill of any infectious disease, the keeper shall forthwith give intimation in writing of the same to the medical officer of health of the county, and of the district, and shall adopt all such precautions as may be necessary to prevent the spread of such infectious disease. Such keeper shall not, at any time while such inmate is suffering from such infectious disease, cause or allow any other person, except a person voluntarily in attendance on such inmate, to use or occupy the same room as such inmate.

Where in pursuance of the statutory provision in that behalf, the sanitary authority may order the removal of such inmate to a hospital or other place for the reception of the sick, such keeper, on being informed of such order, shall forthwith take all such steps as may be requisite on his part to secure the safe and prompt removal of such inmate in compliance with the order of the sanitary authority, and shall, in and about such removal, adopt all such precautions as, in accordance with any instructions which he may receive from the medical officer of health of the county or of the district, may be most suitable for the circumstances of the case.

Where, in consequence of the illness of such inmate, there may be reasonable grounds for apprehending the spread of infection through the admission of a lodger to any room or rooms in a house or through the admission to such room or rooms of the maximum number of lodgers authorised to be received therein, such keeper, after being furnished with the necessary instructions from the medical officer of health of the county or of the district, and until the grounds for apprehending the spread of infection shall have been removed, shall cease to receive any lodger into such room or rooms or shall receive therein such number of lodgers, being less than the maximum number, as the exigencies of the case may require.

Water-closets.

23.—A keeper shall provide sufficient and proper water-closet accommodation in a seamen's lodging house in the proportion of one such closet to every 12 or fractional part of 12 persons in a house authorised to receive not more than 24 persons; one to every 15 or fractional part of 15 persons in a house authorised to receive more than 24 and not more than 60 persons; one to every 20 or fractional part of 20 persons in a house authorised to receive more than 60 and not more than 100 persons; and one to every 25 or fractional part of 25 persons in a house authorised to receive more than 100 persons. He shall cause all waterclosets in a house and every part of the apparatus of such water-closets to be kept clean, and shall cause the same and every drain or means of drainage with which they or either of them may communicate, to be maintained in good order and efficient condition.

Maintenance of Premises.

24.—A keeper shall cause every part of the structure of a house to be maintained at all

times in good order and repair.

25.—A keeper shall cause the yard, area, forecourt, or other open space within the curtilage of a house to be maintained at all times in good order and thoroughly clean and free from any accumulation of filth or other refuse.

No Female Lodgers.

26.—A keeper and every person employed in a house shall not receive any female lodger into such house.

Exclusion of Persons of Improper Character. 27.—A keeper and every person employed in

a house shall not knowingly lodge, or knowingly harbour, any thief or reputed thief, any prostitute or reputed prostitute, or any other person of improper character.

Register of Lodgers, &c.

28.—A keeper shall keep a register and shall enter therein the name, age, and nationality of every seaman lodger received into a house, the name of the last vessel from which such seaman lodger was discharged, and the port of discharge, with the name and port of registry of any vessel he may join while resident in such house, and his declared destination on leaving.

Scale of Charges.

29.—A keeper shall put up or affix and keep up or affixed a copy of these by-laws in a suitable and conspicuous position in the common sitting-room of a house, in such a manner that the contents of such copy may be clearly and distinctly visible and legible, and shall enter upon the space left for the purpose at the foot of that copy, a scale of the charge per day for board, lodging, and necessaries, made in such house, and shall not make a higher charge than is provided by the scale on any pretence whatever.

Licence may be Suspended or Revoked.

30.—Upon the Council being satisfied that any keeper has been guilty of a breach of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, or the Acts amending the same, or that such keeper has kept, or is keeping or is allowing to be kept, a house in which drunkenness, gambling, opium smoking, or immoral or fraudulent practices prevail, or is or has been a party to such proceedings, or neglects to remove from such house any person of improper or immoral character who may have entered therein, or has failed, or is failing to comply with these by-laws or any of them, the Council may suspend or revoke all licences granted to such keeper.

Officers not to be Obstructed.

31.—No person shall obstruct any officer or person engaged in securing the execution of these by-laws.

Penalty.

32.—Every person offending against any of the foregoing by-laws, except where otherwise expressly provided, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds for every such offence, and in the case of a continuing offence to a penalty of five pounds, for every day during which the offence may be continued after conviction for the first offence.

Date when By-laws come into Force.

33.—These by-laws shall come into force on the 1st day of April, 1917, from which date the by-laws made by the Council on the 6th day of July, 1909, and the 14th day of December, 1909, relating to seamen's lodging-houses in the county shall be repealed.
