**His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the award of the Victoria Cross to the undermentioned Officers and Men:—**

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Percy Herbert Cherry, M.C., late Aus. Imp. Force.

For most conspicuous bravery, determination and leadership when in command of a company detailed to storm and clear a village.

After all the officers of his company had become casualties he carried on with care and determination, in the face of fierce opposition, and cleared the village of the enemy.

He sent frequent reports of progress made, and when held up for some time by an enemy strong point he organised machine gun and bomb parties and captured the position. His leadership, coolness and bravery set a wonderful example to his men.

Having cleared the village, he took charge of the situation and beat off the most resolute and heavy counter-attacks made by the enemy.

Wounded about 6.30 a.m., he refused to leave his post, and there remained, encourag-

ing all to hold out at all costs, until, about 4.30 p.m., this very gallant officer was killed by an enemy shell.

2nd Lt. George Edward Cates, late Rif. Brig.

For most conspicuous bravery and self-sacrifice.

When engaged with some other men in deepening a captured trench this officer struck with his spade a buried bomb, which immediately started to burn.

2nd Lt. Cates, in order to save the lives of his comrades, placed his foot on the bomb, which immediately exploded.

He showed the most conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in performing the act which cost him his life, but saved the lives of others.

No. 13909 Pte. Christopher Cox, Bedf. R.

For most conspicuous bravery and continuous devotion to duty when acting as a stretcher-bearer.

During the attack of his battalion the front wave was checked by the severity of the enemy artillery and machine gun fire, and the whole line had to take cover in shell holes to avoid annihilation.

Pte. Cox, utterly regardless of personal

safety, went out over fire-swept ground, and single-handed rescued four men.

Having collected the wounded of his own battalion, he then assisted to bring in the wounded of an adjoining battalion. On the two subsequent days he carried out similar rescue work with the same disregard of his own safety.

He has on all occasions displayed the same high example of unselfishness and valour.

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**His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to award a 2nd Bar to the Distinguished Service Order to:—**

Major Frederick William Lumsden, D.S.O., R.M.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in charge of a strong reconnaissance party. He carried out the task allotted to him with conspicuous success, and skilfully withdrew his party at a critical time. His conduct, rapid decision and good judgment saved many casualties.

(Distinguished Service Order gazetted 1st January, 1917. First Bar awarded in this Gazette.)

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**His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to award a Bar to the Distinguished Service Order to:—**

Major Frederick William Lumsden, D.S.O., R.M.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He made a reconnaissance of the enemy's position, moving over open ground under very heavy fire and bringing back most valuable information. He rendered invaluable services throughout the operations.

(Distinguished Service Order gazetted 1st January, 1917.)

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Major James Ross Conrad Meiklejohn, D.S.O., Bord R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when he kept well in touch with battalions, moving about regardless of fire until severely wounded. After having his skull fractured by a shell splinter he continued at work until he had rendered a clear report on the situation.

(Distinguished Service Order gazetted 1st January, 1917.)

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**His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the appointments of the undermentioned Officers to be Companions of the Distinguished Service Order in recognition of their gallantry and devotion to duty in the Field:—**

Capt. (actg. Lt.-Col.) Christopher Galbraith Buckle, M.C., North'n R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of his battalion. He visited the captured trenches during the action and gave orders regarding dispositions and consolidation. The dash of his battalion in the attack and their tenacity in holding the position won, were to a considerable extent due to his influence.

Temp. Capt. Charles Frederick Duguid, M.C., Manch. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. With 20 men of his company he fought his way through uncut enemy wire and established a strong point in a small length of hostile trench. He maintained his position there for 36 hours in spite of several strong enemy counter-attacks.

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Maj. (temp. Lt.-Col.) George William St. George Grogan, C.M.G., Worc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of his battalion. He visited the captured trenches during the action and gave instructions regarding dispositions and consolidation. He kept the brigade informed of the situation, and his reports were of great value. The spirit of his battalion owes much to his personal courage and cheerfulness.

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\*Lt.-Col. and Bt. Col. Orlando George Gunning, C.M.G., Ind. Army.

For conspicuous coolness and gallant leadership. He led his battalion through heavy enfilade rifle and machine gun fire, and continued to command although twice wounded. By his example he retained the cohesion of his regiment and kept up their fighting spirit under very adverse circumstances.

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\*Capt. William Ralph Elliot Harrison, R.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He moved his observation ladder to within 700 yards of the enemy's trenches and remained up it throughout the day under very heavy fire. His accurate information was of the greatest value, and his initiative and utter disregard of personal safety beyond all praise.

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Temp. Lt. Charles Ernest Storey, M.G. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and initiative when in command of a Tank. He took his car up and down the enemy trenches, working until all his petrol was exhausted and only two of the crew were unwounded. He is reported as having been responsible for the taking of between 200 and 300 prisoners.

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Maj. (temp. Lt.-Col.) John Vander Byl, Hrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of an advanced squadron. Under very heavy fire he effected an entrance to the village, and shortly after assumed command of another squadron. He cleared the village of the enemy and seized the tactical points in advance. He held all the positions gained until relieved by the Infantry.

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#### AUSTRALIAN IMPERIAL FORCE.

Maj. (temp. Lt.-Col.) John Vander Byl, Pye, Aust. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and initiative when in charge of the whole of the front line held by his battalion. He organised a successful attack and exhibited great energy and determination when meeting a counter-attack made by the enemy. He set a splendid example to those under him.

## CANADIAN CONTINGENT.

Maj. John Hector Innes Brown, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He took charge of the assembly of the left assaulting wave and of three large offensive patrols. He carried out these duties with marked skill, and throughout set a magnificent example to his men. Later, he re-organised the dispositions of the companies in the front line and personally supervised the collection of a number of the wounded.

Maj. (actg. Lt.-Col.) Herbert Victor Rorke, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. By his untiring energy and carefully thought out preparations, he contributed in a very large degree to the splendid success of the operation. He personally superintended the assembly of all parties before the attack, and his arrangements were perfect and worked without a hitch.

Maj. Alexander Douglas Wilson, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of his battalion. Owing to his fearless leading and sound preliminary training his battalion carried out the task allotted to it with conspicuous success.

The names marked with an asterisk appeared in the London Gazette dated 17th March, 1917, without deeds.

**His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to award a Bar to the Military Cross to the undermentioned Officers:—**

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Edward Mowbray Alfrey, M.C., K.R.R.C., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded, he led his company in a most gallant manner. He sent forward posts, which he visited in person, and it was mainly owing to him that such an advance line was reached.

(Military Cross gazetted 20th October, 1916.)

Lt. Thomas Brown Barrie, M.C., Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He led an offensive patrol which penetrated 600 yards into the enemy's line, and inflicted many casualties on the enemy. His personal example and coolness were a great inspiration, not only to his own patrol, but also to all those who observed his magnificent work.

(Military Cross gazetted 17th April, 1917.)

Capt. (temp. Maj.) William Edmonstone Duncan, M.C., R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. After the objective had been taken, he reconnoitred our new front line under very heavy fire, and obtained most valuable information. On several occasions he passed through a hostile barrage in order to report the result of his reconnaissances.

(Military Cross gazetted 10th January, 1917.)

Lt. (temp. Capt.) Horace James Gee, M.C., R.G.A., attd. A.O.D.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to

duty. He rendered invaluable services in endeavouring to extinguish a fire at an ammunition dump. On one occasion he was knocked down by a lump of shell, but continued the work till the dump was saved.

(Military Cross gazetted 1st January, 1917.)

Temp. 2nd Lt. John Burleigh Oldfield, M.C., North'n R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took command of his company and gained his final objective, and maintained his position against successive enemy counter-attacks. The ground he won and held was of decisive value to the operations.

(Military Cross gazetted 1st January, 1917.)

**His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to confer the Military Cross on the undermentioned Officers and Warrant Officers in recognition of their gallantry and devotion to duty in the Field:—**

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Harold Pearman Allaway, North Staffs. R., attd. R. Berks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his company in a most able manner, and effected a skilful withdrawal at a critical time. Later, he took command of the assaulting troops, and, in spite of the most trying conditions, succeeded in keeping them well in hand.

Temp. 2nd Lt. William Baillie, Gen. List and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although very severely wounded during a combat with hostile aircraft, he succeeded in bringing his own machine back and effecting a safe landing.

Temp. Lt. John Barker, Mach. Gun Co.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination throughout the operations, and assisted in rescuing several men who had been buried. He set a fine example to his men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Albert James Barr, Gen. List, attd. T.M. Bty.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed marked ability in organising bomb and ammunition dumps previous to the attack. On one occasion he went round all the dumps in broad daylight to satisfy himself as to their being correct.

2nd Lt. Ernest Bertram Brown, S. Staff. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led two platoons into the enemy's lines, and maintained his position until ordered to retire. He assisted to bring in several wounded men under heavy fire, and throughout set a splendid example to his men.

Lt. Edward Budd, I. Gds., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out a dangerous reconnaissance under very heavy fire, and brought back most valuable information. He has on many occasions done fine work.

\*2nd Lt. John Leslie Butler, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry when acting as

forward observing officer to his battery. Accompanied by a signaller, he laid a line across 300 yards of open ground under heavy fire. He established communication and maintained it throughout the day.

Temp. Lt. (temp. Capt.) John Archibald Cahill, R. Berks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took command of his company and successfully repelled a strong enemy counter-attack. He set a magnificent example to his men.

2nd Lt. Edmund Barry Cahusac, S. Staff. R., Spec. Res., attd. R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out a successful artillery observation on a hostile battery in very adverse weather. He worked for two and a half hours at a height of 1,500 to 3,000 feet under very heavy fire. On another occasion, whilst engaged on photography, he drove off three hostile scouts and completed his work.

Lt. (actg. Capt.) Edward Conder, Glouc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He, without a guide, led his men to their positions, and carried out a most successful attack on the enemy's trenches. He set a splendid example of courage and initiative.

2nd Lt. Gordon Ernest Cronk, S. Staff. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a night attack on the enemy's trenches. He directed the organisation and despatch of bombing parties in the enemy's trenches, and personally obtained touch with the company on his right. He set a splendid example to his men.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Edwin Darling, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out a dangerous reconnaissance under very difficult conditions, and obtained most valuable information. He set a fine example of courage and determination.

2nd Lt. Robert Lenard Derry, E. Lan. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rendered most valuable assistance to his Company Commander in posting and reorganising the company. He brought in several wounded men under heavy fire, and, although himself wounded, refused to leave his post.

\* 2nd Lt. Eric Raymond Sandars Dods, Ind. Army.

For conspicuous gallantry and ability in leading his company across the open for 350 yards in the face of heavy fire. He showed great coolness and determination in the assault, and subsequently consolidated the position with a small party under difficult conditions.

Temp. Lt. Thomas Hugh Evans, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in charge of a carrying party. As a result of his organisation, ammunition dumps were formed in the enemy lines within one hour after the commencement of the attack.

\* 2nd Lt. Thomas Innes Farrar, Devon. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded in two places, he remained on duty and took his guns up to the captured trench, where he behaved with the utmost gallantry, although he was again wounded in the hand.

Lt. Ralph Eric Friend, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He commanded the advanced section of his battery, which was 450 yards from the enemy front line, and, though exposed to continuous and accurate fire, rendered great assistance to our attack throughout the day.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) John Gibson Gargate, Durh. L.I., attd. Notts. & Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He brought up a gun, and by his fire considerably relieved a critical situation. On another occasion he was largely responsible for repelling a strong enemy bombing attack.

Capt. Douglas Reginald Gawler, R. Scots. and R.F.C.

For consistent good work whilst carrying out artillery observation and for gallantry on many occasions. On one occasion he continued his observation work in spite of being attacked by several hostile machines and in spite of being under very heavy fire.

Temp. Lt. (actg. Capt.) William John Green, R. Berks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company with great dash into the enemy trench, inflicted many casualties on the enemy, and personally supervised the pushing forward of piquets 500 yards ahead. He set a fine example to his men.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) Graham Hamilton Greenwell, Oxf. & Bucks. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He kept his men well in hand when suddenly caught in a hostile barrage, and, later, carried out the original plan with complete success. He set a magnificent example to his men.

2nd Lt. Robert Hamilton, High. Cyclist Bn., attd. R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty as an observer. He carried out a successful artillery observation on a hostile battery in very adverse weather. He worked for two and a half hours at a height of 1,500 to 3,000 feet under very heavy fire. On another occasion, whilst engaged in photography, he drove off three hostile scouts and completed his work.

2nd Lt. Claude Dennis Hampshire, R. Berks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He led his men with great dash, and captured several prisoners. The success of the raid was largely due to his good leading and the fearless example he set to all ranks of his command.

Captain Arthur Alan Hanbury Hanbury Sparrow, D.S.O., R. Berks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to

duty. Although wounded, he led his men in a most gallant manner, and consolidated the position won with great skill. He was again wounded. He has at all times set a splendid example of courage and determination.

Capt. Stanley Sextus Barrymore Harrison, R.A.M.C., attd. S. Staff. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He worked continuously for ten hours under very heavy fire, and was responsible for saving many lives. He displayed great courage and determination throughout. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Temp. Capt. Reginald Davies Hickson, Essex R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. With great coolness and a total disregard for danger he went forward under very heavy fire and personally superintended the withdrawal of his advanced parties at a most critical time.

Lt. Maurice Lake Hilder, R. Fus., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company in a most gallant manner and succeeded in capturing a strong enemy position. He set a fine example of courage and good leadership.

\*Lt. (actg. Capt.) Francis Lord Charlton Hodson, Glouc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company most gallantly against a strong enemy redoubt, being twice wounded, and refused to be brought in till the wounded round him had been evacuated.

Temp. 2nd Lt. John Henry Hughes, E. Kent R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised bombing parties to repel enemy raiding parties whilst under very heavy fire. Later, although severely wounded, he continued to direct and encourage his men.

Lt. John Eustace Jarvis, North'n R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He led his platoon in a most gallant manner, killing 28 of the enemy and capturing 21 prisoners. He has at all times set a splendid example.

Temp. 2nd Lt. (actg. Capt.) Robert Wilkie Jones, L'pool R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He led his men with great gallantry and inflicted many casualties on the enemy. He trained the party for the raid and its success was due to his skilful handling and daring leadership.

2nd Lt. Russell Medley Leake, N. Lan. R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He made three most gallant attempts to rescue a wounded officer and eventually succeeded in getting him to a place of safety. He set a splendid example of courage and determination.

Temp. 2nd Lt. William Drummond Matheson, Genl. List and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in leading a formation of eight machines against 16 of the enemy. He drove down one hostile machine and eventually succeeded in landing his machine safely in spite of being attacked by several enemy machines. On other occasions he has brought down four hostile machines.

2nd Lt. Hugh McLean Millar, High. L.I., attd. Glouc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Accompanied by two men he carried out a daring reconnaissance under very heavy fire and brought back most valuable information. He set a splendid example throughout the operation.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Reginald Ernest Minnis, Leic. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his party in a most gallant manner and was the first to enter the enemy trenches. He carried out the task allotted to him with conspicuous success and captured five prisoners.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Gordon Reid Morton, Cam'n Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He led his men in a most gallant manner and destroyed a hostile machine gun. Later, he carried a wounded man back to our lines.

Capt. Edward Frank Nichol, N. Lan. R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. Although severely wounded he gave the withdrawal signal at a critical time, thereby undoubtedly saving many casualties.

Temp. Lt. Robert Anthony O'Donovan, Worc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He performed consistent good work throughout the day and was largely responsible for the success of the operations. He set a splendid example of courage and determination.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Edward George Passingham, North'd Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a raiding party with great courage and determination through uncut wire and succeeded in entering the enemy's front line trenches, where he personally shot three of the enemy.

Lt. (actg. Capt.) John Eric Macdonald Pierson, North'n R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He, accompanied by another officer, with great personal courage reorganised the raiding party under very heavy fire. Later, he effected a successful withdrawal under the most trying conditions.

Temp. 2nd Lt. James Alexander Prevel, North'n R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took command of his company

and successfully repelled several enemy bombing attacks. Later, although forced to give ground owing to a shortage of bombs, he organised an attack and re-captured the lost ground.

Temp. Lt. Mervyn Phippen Pugh, R. Berks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rapidly organised and led bombing parties against the enemy, and it was greatly owing to his initiative that all objectives were seized and consolidated. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Temp. Capt. Lancelot Lytton Richardson, Gen. List and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He attacked a formation of five hostile scouts, and brought two of them down. On another occasion, although himself wounded, he destroyed two hostile machines, and drove down, damaged, at least two others.

2nd Lt. John Bickerton Robertson, Arg. & Suth'd. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He showed great gallantry and coolness in the leading of his men throughout the raid. He himself killed two of the enemy who were attempting to get out of a dug-out to attack his party.

\*Lt. Dudley Clare Robinson, Ind. Army.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He left his company to organise the assaulting line, and then returned and led his own men to the assault. Later, he went to the second line to get touch with the regiment on his right, and again returned to bring his own men on. He set a splendid example throughout the day.

Temp. Lt. (actg. Maj.) Ernest Alfred Robinson, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He personally taped out a line for a front-line trench in close proximity to the enemy, and under very heavy fire. He set a fine example throughout.

2nd Lt. Samuel Rubery, S. Staff. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a night attack on the enemy's trenches. He gallantly led a bombing party into the heart of the enemy defences. He was severely wounded. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) Donald Campbell Rutter, R. Suss. R., Spec. Res., and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He completed a valuable reconnaissance alone, at a very low altitude, and in face of heavy fire, which riddled his machine. On another occasion he, single-handed, succeeded in driving off three hostile machines.

\*Subadar Sarajit Gurung Bahadur, I.O.M., Gurkha Rif.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took command of his company,

and by his fine personal example inspired his men at a critical time. He himself killed two of the enemy. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Robert Woodburn Barnard Semple, Cam'n Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He was the first man to enter the enemy lines, and during the whole operation set a splendid example to the two platoons under his charge. He led a bombing party, and inflicted many casualties on the enemy.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Cecil Shekury, Bedf. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out a difficult reconnaissance under very heavy fire, and brought back most valuable information. He set a fine example of courage and determination.

Temp. 2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Joseph Arthur Smithin, Worc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon in a most gallant manner, and was responsible for destroying many enemy dug-outs. Later, he took command of his company, and throughout handled it with great skill.

2nd Lt. Robert Stancliff, Lond. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon in a most gallant manner, and personally reconnoitred an enemy trench. Later, he, single-handed, attacked and captured two of the enemy. He was subsequently wounded.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Albert Stone, Bedf. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out a difficult reconnaissance under very heavy fire, and brought back most valuable information. He remained out for one and a half hours.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) Noel Herbert Stone, Worc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He gained his objective, and, in spite of heavy fire and strong enemy counter-attacks, succeeded in maintaining his position. He set a splendid example of courage and determination throughout the operations.

2nd Lt. John Swales, N. Staff. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He established a bombing post on our left flank and held it for two hours, although heavily counter-attacked by the enemy. He set a splendid example of courage and determination throughout.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Leonard Tolcher Tracey, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He remained in "No Man's Land," and continued to assist the wounded under very heavy fire. He set a splendid example throughout, and undoubtedly saved many lives.

2nd Lt. Richard Ernest Nowell Twopenny, King Ed. Horse.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in leading an Officers' patrol on two

occasions. He carried out daring reconnaissances under the most difficult conditions, and obtained information of the utmost value. He set a fine example of courage and initiative.

2nd Lt. Herbert Henry Tyler, Notts. & Derby. R., attd. Leic. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in charge of a torpedo party. Although wounded, he remained with his party until the torpedoes were satisfactorily exploded. He carried out splendid reconnaissance work in this area before and for the attack.

2nd Lt. Frederick Kenneth Walbank, R.F.A., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out a dangerous reconnaissance and obtained most valuable information. Later, he controlled the fire of one of the forward guns with marked ability. He set a splendid example throughout.

Temp. 2nd Lt. George Walker.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He worked continuously for six hours under very heavy fire, and succeeded in erecting three trolley bridges across our front line trenches.

2nd Lt. John Steel Watson, Arg. & Suth'd Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded, he went forward with two bombers and commenced bombing the enemy trench, thereby covering the retreat of the remainder of the party.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Richard Henry White, Lond. R., attd. Oxf. & Bucks. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Accompanied by two men, he went out four times to examine the enemy wire, and, in spite of meeting several hostile parties, attained his objective and brought back very valuable information.

Lt. (actg. Capt.) Arthur Cecil Willison, Notts. & Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He, with his platoon, personally led five important and hazardous reconnoitring parties. He seized a partially evacuated enemy trench, and was largely responsible for the success of the operations.

Temp. Lt. Alexander Paterson Young, R. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and ability in establishing dumps of bombs in the front line preparatory to an attack on the enemy's trenches.

12/481 S./M. Charles Polden, York. & Lanc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He collected a few men and carried several wounded men to cover under very heavy fire. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

13/297 C.S.M. John Bennet Wilson, E. York. Regt.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. He

with his Company Commander and eight men consolidated two shell holes, and though unsupported held this post against repeated counter-attacks for seven hours. He set a splendid example throughout.

#### AUSTRALIAN IMPERIAL FORCE.

Lt. Samuel William Aldenton, Aust. Fld. Arty.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He laid an armoured cable to the front line, being under very heavy fire for a great part of the time. On another occasion he carried out most valuable reconnaissances and sent in excellent reports. He set a splendid example throughout the operations.

Lt. Leslie St. John Allen, Aust. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company in a most gallant manner, and throughout the operations set a magnificent example to his men. He led out a patrol and obtained valuable information.

2nd Lt. Reginald Francis Baillieu, R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Accompanied by his observer, he descended to the rescue of a pilot who had been forced to land and who had set his machine on fire. He landed safely on difficult ground, and, in spite of the close proximity of the enemy, succeeded in rescuing the pilot and in carrying off his two passengers under a close and heavy rifle fire.

2nd Lt. Eric Sullivan Baldock, Aust. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and ability in establishing and maintaining communication in spite of heavy hostile fire. Later, he supervised the laying of nearly two miles of wire to forward posts within 300 yards of the enemy position.

Lt. Allan Torrance Doig, Aust. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. On several occasions he carried out very valuable reconnaissance work under heavy fire. On another occasion he led out a patrol, and in spite of heavy hostile fire ably fulfilled the duties allotted to him.

Lt. John Lowe Fawcett, Aust. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised the defence of his post with marked skill, and maintained his position in spite of two determined enemy counter-attacks.

2nd Lt. Cyril Denton Fethers, Aust. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a reconnoitring patrol in a most gallant manner, and brought back valuable information. He set a splendid example to his men throughout the operations.

2nd Lt. Henry Alfred Harrison, Aust. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised a small party, and succeeded in clearing the enemy out of a village. On one occasion he attacked and dispersed a party of 100 of the enemy.

Later, although wounded, he remained at duty, and continued to assist his Company Commander.

Capt. Charles Henry Lamb, Aust. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised a rescue party, and proceeded out into "No Man's Land" under very heavy fire, and succeeded in bringing in wounded on three occasions. He set a splendid example throughout the operations.

2nd Lt. Charles Daniel Wimbledon Lintott, Aust. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He made several most gallant attempts to rescue a wounded officer, and eventually succeeded in bringing him safely back to our lines. Later, he personally led rescue parties under heavy fire and brought in a number of wounded.

2nd Lt. Byron Fitzgerald Nicholas, Aust. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a forward post. At great personal risk, he went out and dug in two standing patrols. Later, he rendered valuable assistance in repelling an enemy counter-attack.

Lt. Ross Macpherson Smith, Aust. Light Horse R., attd. Aust. R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when his pilot descended to the rescue of an officer who had been forced to land. On landing he held the enemy at bay with his revolver, thus enabling his pilot to rescue the officer and to safely fly away his machine.

#### CANADIAN FORCE.

Lt. Lester Birely Husband, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He reorganised his men at a critical time, and led them forward in a most gallant manner, clearing the enemy trench and capturing 14 prisoners. He set a fine example of courage and initiative.

Lt. Guy Stuart McLennan, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry during a raid on the enemy's trenches. Although twice wounded, he continued to lead his men forward, and inspired them by his fine personal example. He was largely responsible for the success of the operation.

Lt. Harry Farnham Germaine Letson, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed great courage and determination in leading his men forward in the face of intense hostile fire. He was severely wounded.

Lt. William Edmond Poupore, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded, he continued to direct the operations, and set a splendid example to his men. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Lt. Evan Edward Price, Royal Canadian Dragoons.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. With his troop he attacked a party of the enemy, and, although exposed to heavy fire, succeeded in capturing nine, killing three and dispersing the remainder.

Capt. Brian Simpson, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry during a raid on the enemy's trenches. Although wounded, he continued to lead his men most gallantly, and entered the enemy trenches. His fine personal example was largely responsible for the success of the raid.

Capt. Philip Charles Stanley, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his men in a most gallant manner, and succeeded in entering the enemy trench, in spite of a determined opposition. He was severely wounded.

Lt. George Melville Taylor, Can. Engrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He prepared and organised his demolition parties with marked ability. Later, although wounded, he continued to direct the work of his men.

Lt. William Wallace, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his party to their objective, which was 400 yards behind the enemy front-line trenches, and succeeded in inflicting heavy casualties on the enemy. He set a fine example of courage and initiative.

Capt. Arthur Vincent Wood, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry when in command of five offensive patrols. He controlled the preliminary movements of his patrols with marked ability, and throughout the operation set a splendid example to his men. Later, he effected a successful withdrawal under the most difficult conditions.

442778 C./S./M. Walter Titus Schmehl, Can. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rendered invaluable assistance to his Company Commander, and set a magnificent example throughout the operations. He was severely wounded.

The names marked with an Asterisk appeared in the London Gazette dated 17th March, 1917, without deeds.

33948 Pte. J. Black, Mach. Gun Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry in action. During the withdrawal of the line his gun emplacement was blown in by a high explosive shell, and he was wounded in the face. In spite of this, he at once got his gun into position on the parapet and continued to fire it until the withdrawal was complete.

10330 C./S./M. W. Brant, R. Berks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He greatly assisted in reorganising his company and consolidating the captured trench under very heavy hostile fire.

10017 Sjt. E. Breakspear, R. Berks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He handled a bombing party with great skill, and was largely responsible for the success of the raid.

S.24513 Staff Serjt. (actg. S.Q.M.S.) E. W. Castle, A.S.C.

For valuable services and devotion to duty under very difficult circumstances. His efficiency and zeal have been most noticeable. (The award of the Meritorious Service Medal, published in the Gazette of 1st February, 1917, is hereby cancelled.)

13791 Pte. B. Caunt, Notts. & Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rushed a traverse which was held by the enemy, and, single-handed, succeeded in capturing seven prisoners. He set a fine example to all ranks.

8796 Pte. (L./Corpl.) H. R. Chapman, R. Berks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He collected six men and charged an enemy bombing party, killing nine of them. He showed great courage and initiative throughout.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He personally organised the bringing up of fresh supplies of bombs and ammunition, thereby materially assisting in the successful consolidation of the position.

when retirement was ordered. Throughout the operation he rendered great assistance to the Brigade staff, which had suffered heavy casualties.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rendered invaluable assistance in organising parties to drive back the enemy, and in going back alone and personally leading up stretcher parties to bring in the wounded.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rendered invaluable assistance by bringing up reinforcements during an enemy attack. He set a fine example of courage and determination.

1384 Pte. W. E. Finch, K. Edward's Horse.

For gallantry and devotion to duty under difficult and trying conditions while working with officers engaged in the destruction of supplies likely to fall into the hands of the enemy. Private Finch played no mean part in doing everything possible to help in the work.

16416 Pte. (actg. L./Corpl.) C. Fisher, R. Berks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed great skill in consolidating and maintaining his position under heavy fire. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

25/955 Actg. C./S./M. R. E. Forster, North'd Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went forward and heard an enemy raiding party assembling, and gave warning, which enabled artillery fire to be brought to bear on the place of assembly. He has previously done fine work.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rendered invaluable service throughout the operations, and assisted in capturing an enemy machine gun. He set a fine example to his men.

16370 Pte. (actg. L./Cpl.) F. H. S. Harley, Worc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He opened fire with his machine gun at a critical time and defeated all enemy attempts to counter attack. Later, he carried two machine guns out of action through a heavy hostile barrage.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He has attacked and driven down six hostile machines. On one occasion, when on patrol, he displayed great courage and skill in driving down two hostile machines, and afterwards continuing the patrol until it was finished.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He, single-handed, attacked a bay which was held by fire of the enemy, and succeeded in killing all of them. He set a splendid example of courage and initiative.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. At great personal risk he extinguished a fire which had broken out in an ammunition dump, thereby undoubtedly saving many lives. Later, he brought in several wounded men under very heavy fire.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took command of a bombing party, and succeeded in clearing the enemy out of the trench. He set a fine example of courage and determination.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took command of a bombing party and repelled repeated enemy counter-attacks. Finally, he held the post single-handed against an attack after all his men had become casualties.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded, he continued working until daylight, when he was again wounded very seriously in the thigh, and then, his post having been organised, he consented to be carried away.
