His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to award a Bar to the Distinguished Service Order to:—

Lt. (temp. Capt.) Allan Machin Wilkinson, D.S.O., Hamp. R., and R.F.C.

For great skill and gallantry. He came down to a low altitude and destroyed a hostile scout which was attacking one of our machines, the pilot of which had been wounded, thereby saving it. In one day he shot down and destroyed six hostile machines. He has destroyed eight hostile machines during the past ten days and has displayed exceptional skill and gallantry in leading offensive patrols.

\*Capt. (temp. Maj.) Henry St. George Stewart Scott, D.S.O., Ind. Army.

For conspicuous gallantry and determination when with 250 men he captured 373 of the enemy. He was twice held up by strong entrenched picquets, who were covering parties attempting to cross the river in pontoons, but he pushed on under heavy fire, inflicting great loss on those crossing and prevented any further attempt at escape.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the appointments of the undermentioned Officers to be Companions of the Distinguished Service Order in recognition of their gallantry and devotion to duty in the Field:—

Temp. 2nd Lt. Clive Oliver Bertram Beale, Gen. List and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He made two most gallant attempts to carry out a special mission, which involved a night flight of about fifty miles, in very adverse weather. Although unsuccessful, he showed throughout the greatest courage and determination to achieve his mission.

Temp. 2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Augustus Wieland Bird, Gen. List and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty on many occasions. When on artillery patrol he succeeded in reporting 13 active batteries, observing fire on and silencing several of them. On another occasion he attacked and scattered with machine gun fire two parties of the enemy which were seen forming up. This operation was carried out for a period of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  hours in very adverse weather conditions.

2nd Lt. William Horace Curry, S. Staffs. R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He collected men from three different companies and led them forward as far as it was possible to advance. Later, although nearly surrounded by the enemy, he succeeded in consolidating and maintaining his position. On another occasion he took command of two companies and handled them in a most able manner.

Maj. (temp. Lt.-Col.) Harold James Norman Davis, Conn. Rang., attd. High. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of his battalion. He took charge of a critical situation in the most able manner, and under very heavy fire personally directed the movements of his battalion. He successfully occupied and consolidated his objective.

\*Capt. (temp. Maj.) Hereward de Havilland, R.F.C., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and skill. He attacked and drove down a hostile machine. This is the second enemy machine he has destroyed. • He has rendered invaluable service throughout the operations, and has at all times set a magnificent example.

\*Temp. Capt. Claude Dawson Hempson, Suff. R., attd. R. Lan. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although his right flank was exposed, he held and consolidated the captured trenches for 16 hours against determined enemy bombing attacks. It was mainly owing to his untiring energy and organising powers that the position was maintained and the enemy finally driven back.

Temp. Capt. (actg. Maj.) Walter Mowbray Percival Johnston, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of his battery. He established himself, before dawn, on the remains of a tree, a short distance from our front trenches, and, in full view of the enemy, remained there for several hours directing the fire of his battery by telephone until the whole of the enemy's wire had been effectively destroyed.

\*Temp. 2nd Lt. (actg. Capt.) Cornelius Bernard O'Connor, N. Lanc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. His company was exposed to heavy rifle and enfilade machine-gun fire. By his skilful handling he managed to consolidate the position, despite heavy casualties and several determined efforts on the part of the enemy to drive him out. He eventually captured 90 prisoners.

#### AUSTRALIAN IMPERIAL FORCE.

Maj. James Alexander Robinson, Aust. Infy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He supervised the assembly of the battalion previous to the attack. After the attack had been launched he went forward and sent back most valuable reports on the situation. He showed great bravery and coolness throughout, and his presence

in the front line had a most cheering and marked effect on all present.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to award a Bar to the Military Cross to the undermentioned Officers:—

Temp. Capt. Reginald Peter Nutcombe Buckland Bluett, M.C., R.A.M.C., attd. High. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great judgment and endurance in organising the stretcherbearers in the attack. He worked continuously throughout the day, exposed for many hours to very heavy hostile fire.

(M.C. gazetted March 30, 1916.)

Temp. 2nd Lt. John Brown, M.C., R. Ir. Rif.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went forward with a machine-gun team and some men of his platoon, and engaged two enemy machine-guns, one of which was captured. He set a fine example of courage and initiative.

(M.C. gazetted September 22, 1916.)

\*Lt. Norman Kenneth Cowey, M.C., R.F.A.
For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to
duty when acting as Forward Observing
Officer. He advanced with the attacking
troops, and established an observation post
under heavy fire in an exposed position, from
where he was able to send back early and
valuable information. Later, he carried out
a valuable reconnaissance.

(M.C. gazetted December 22, 1916.)

Temp. Lt. Percy Charles Crowder, M.C., R. F.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He accompanied the attack to reconnoitre for sites for strong points, sited the line to be consolidated, and returned to construct the strong points, which were completed in spite of heavy fire. Later, he went forward to a hostile battery which had been abandoned and removed the sights from the guns.

(M.C. gazetted September 26, 1916.)

Temp. Capt. Samuel Hugh Duff, M.C., Devon. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company in the most gallant manner, and, in spite of very difficult conditions, succeeded in gaining his objective. He set a splendid example of courage and initiative.

(M.C. gazetted July 27, 1916.)

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Cecil Frederick Holland, M.C., Glouc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised a party and succeeded in capturing an enemy machine-gun, clearing the enemy out of their position, thereby enabling his company to advance. He was severely wounded.

(M.C. gazetted September 22, 1916.)

Capt. Robert Oxspring, M.C., York. L.I., Spec. Res., and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty on several occasions. He has brought down three hostile machines, and in addition has forced several others to land. He has at all times set a splendid example of courage and initiative.

(M.C. gazetted January 14, 1916.)

Lt. Edmund Rait-Kerr, M.C., R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and initiative in getting his party in a trench at a critical time, thereby undoubtedly saving many casualties. He was severely wounded.

(M.C. gazetted June 3, 1916.)

2nd Lt. (actg. Capt.) Geoffrey Robert Wallace, M.C., Worc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company in a most gallant manner and succeeded in reaching his final objective. Later, he took over the whole battalion line and reorganised the defence of the captured position.

(M.C. gazetted January 26, 1917.)

Capt. Christopher Probart Whitaker, M.C.,

Dor. R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He gallantly led his company forward under the most intense hostile fire, and succeeded in capturing an important enemy strong point.

(M.C. gazetted June 3, 1916.)

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to confer the Military Cross on the undermentioned Officers and Warrant Officers in recognition of their gallantry and devotion to duty in the Field:—

Temp. Lt. Wilfred C. Adams, R. Berks. R. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches He handled his men in a most gallant manner, and was largely responsible for the success of the raid. Later, he assisted in rescuing a wounded officer.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Frank Hand Adshead, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out a valuable reconnaissance under heavy fire, and was subsequently wounded. He has previously done fine work.

Qrmr. and Hon. Lt. William Alderman, Dor. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He personally led the ration parties to the advanced line under heavy fire. He set a fine example of courage and determination.

2nd Lt. Archibald Allan, Sco. R., attd. Ox. & Bucks. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon with great courage and initiative. On one occasion his coolness in dealing with an enemy strong point was largely responsible for the success of the operation.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Laurence Wilfred Allen, R. War. R., attd. R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when acting as an observer. On many occasions he has helped to shoot down and destroy hostile machines. He has shown the greatest coolness and skill on all occasions, frequently clearing difficult jams in the middle of a fight.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Charles Henry Asbury, S. Staff. R., Spec. Res., attd. M.G. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his machine guns with great skill, silencing a hostile machine gun and inflicting heavy casualties on the enemy. He set a splendid example to his men.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) Harold Harington Balfour, K.R.R.C., Spec. Res. and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty on many occasions. He has carried out many valuable reconnaissances under very adverse conditions. He has shot down two hostile machines.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Edward Leslie Barrington, Devon. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He succeeded in establishing telephonic communication with the front line almost immediately the objective was reached. He set a splendid example of courage and determination.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Amos Barroll, L'pool R. and M.G. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a machine gun section. He handled his section with great skill and was responsible for inflicting many casualties on the enemy. On one occasion he engaged an enemy field artillery battery at close range and prevented the enemy from manning their guns for over two hours.

2nd Lt. (actg. Capt.) Oliver Bryden Bell, York & Lanc. R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company in the most gallant manner and succeeded in repelling a strong enemy counter-attack. He has previously done fine work.

\*Capt. Ronald Playfair St. Vincent Bernard, Gurkha Rif.

For conspicuous gallantry and resource. When all the officers of the attacking parties had become casualties he organised a strong point in the enemy's line under heavy shell and bomb fire. He set a splendid example to his men.

Temp. Lt. (temp. Capt.) Alan Binnie, Gen. List and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He came down to 50 feet and attacked a hostile kite balloon on the ground. He has on previous occasions shot down and destroyed three hostile machines.

2nd Lt. Cuthbert Edwin Birkett, Mon. R.

and M.G. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devoticn to duty. Although wounded, he commanded his tank with the greatest gallantry and skill. He was subsequently wounded a second time.

2nd Lt. John Henry Bowler, Rif. Brig.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. In spite of intense hostile fire he gallantly urged his men on and led them to their objective. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

2nd Lt. Edward Henry Briggs, Manch. R. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his company with great skill, and was largely responsible for the success of the operations. He set a fine example to his men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. James Lothian Brodie, High. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon in the most gallant manner, and succeeded in carrying out the task allotted to him with conspicuous success.

2nd Lt. William Buckingham, R.F.C., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and initiative in carrying out a patrol in heavy rain, with clouds at 500 feet, during an enemy attack. He obtained valuable information and undoubtedly contributed largely to the successful repulse of the enemy.

Temp. Capt. Henry Aylmer Burdett, Essex R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led the first wave with great gallantry and succeeded in gaining his objective. He was largely responsible for the success of the operations. He was wounded.

2nd Lt. Robert George Matheson Calderwood, H.L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and initiative in the handling of his party when under very heavy hostile fire at close range.

Temp. Lt. Arthur William Cantwell, Lan.  ${f F}$ us.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took command of a Company and led it forward in the most gallant manner. He contributed largely to the success of the operations.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) Oscar Bernard Challenor, R. Berks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company most gallantly in the face of heavy fire and succeeded in gaining his objective. He set a magnificent example to his men.

2nd Lt. Alec Hayward Bradshaw Clark, Worc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon in a most gallant manner and showed great initiative in seizing and consolidating a strong tactical point.

Temp. Capt. Edward W. Clayton, Midd'n R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took entire charge of the operations which led to the capture of the village, two machine guns and some prisoners. He has previously done fine work. Capt. Sam Hattersley Clough, W. Rid. R. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He forced his way through the enemy's wire and succeeded in reaching his objective. He was wounded. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

2nd Lt. Leonard George Colbeck, R.F.A., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of his battery. He handled his battery with great skill under the most trying conditions, and carried out the task allotted to him with conspicuous success.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Frank Stuart Cornelius, Devon R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his platoon in the most able manner and succeeded i destroying two enemy machine guns, together with their crews.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Wilfred Reseigh Cox, D. of C. L.I., attd. R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and initiative in carrying out a patrol in heavy rain, with clouds at 500ft., during an enemy attack. He obtained valuable information, and undoubtedly contributed to the successful repulse of the enemy.

2nd Lt. Sidney Charles Dawe, Lin. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon in the most gallant manner, and inflicted heavy casualties on the enemy. Later, although wounded, he remained at his post until the position was consolidated.

2nd Lt. John William Denison, W. Rid. R. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. In spite of heavy hostile fire, he succeeded in exploding a torpedo under the enemy wire. He was severely wounded.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Augustus Andrew Denyer, York & Lan. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. In spite of being subjected to the most intense hostile bombardment, he maintained his position, and throughout set a splendid example to his men.

2nd Lt. William Donald, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. At great personal risk he extinguished a fire which broke out in an ammunition dump, thereby undoubtedly preventing a serious explosion. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Temp. Capt. Thomas Dowzer, F.R.C.S.I., R.A.M.C., attd. Manch. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed great personal bravery in moving about in the open under heavy fire, organising his bearers, and assisting in the search for the wounded.

Temp. 2nd Lt. William Durling, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and skill in supervising the burying of cables. He was out for nine nights in succession, and, in

spite of heavy shelling every night, he managed to get 30 pairs of armoured cables laid.

Rev. Nathaniel Walter Allen Edwards, Chapn. to the Forces, A. Chapln. Dept., attd.

Divl. Arty.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He, with great gallantry and regardless of his personal safety, accompanied by three men, went forward under heavy fire and succeeded in rescuing three severely wounded men. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

2nd Lt. (actg. Capt.) Henry Coppock Ellis, Manch. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led a portion of his company against an enemy machine gun, killing the team, and capturing the gun. He was severely wounded.

Capt. Francis Robert Farquhar, Ind. Army. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his squadron with great dash, and obtained valuable information. He was subsequently wounded, but continued to direct the operations in hand.

2nd Lt. Lionel John Gàrdner, R. West Surr.

R., Spec. Res.
For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He successfully attacked a party of the enemy on our flank and drove them out of their position. His courage and initiative undoubtedly saved a critical situation.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Roy Gibbons, Devon. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his men with great dash and showed great bravery in capturing an enemy post of two officers and twenty-two men and a machine-gun.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Leslie Herbert Gibson, Notts.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon in the most gal-lant manner, and was largely responsible for repelling a strong enemy counter-attack. He himself killed two of the enemy.

2nd Lt. William George Gibson, R.W. Surr. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He led his platoon forward to a position from where they were able to keep down the enemy's fire, thus enabling the rest of the line to advance on their objective.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) John Gilmour, Argyll

and Suth'd Highrs. and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty in carrying out long-distance bomb raids. On one occasion, although his engine began to fail, he continued to lead his formation, and succeeded in bringing back most valuable information.

2nd Lt. Walter William Glenn, R.F.A. and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He saved one of our machines from being destroyed, and drove down a hostile machine out of control. Later, although severely wounded, he succeeded in bringing down a second hostile machine.

Capt. Gerald Mahon Glover, Manch. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to ity. Although wounded, he gallantly led his company against an enemy battery, which he captured at the point of the bayonet. He set a splendid example to his men.

\*Temp. Lt. Cecil Radcliffe Goldie-Taubman,

For conspicuous gallantry and resource. He organised and led an attack along a shallow nullah under heavy fire, which culminated in the capture and consolidation of a line of trenches of great value to future operations.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Malcolm Graham, Gord.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of his company. By his skilful leading and coolness under fire he largely contributed to the success of the attack.

Capt. Thomas Graham, M.B., R.A.M.C. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He rendered invaluable assistance in evacuating the wounded under very heavy fire. He has at all times set a splendid example of courage and determination.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Frederick Collins Granger,

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of three patrols. He personally reconnoitred the position, and, in spite of very heavy hostile fire, succeeded in leading one patrol through a gap in the enemy's wire. He was severely wounded. He has previously done fine work.

Temp. Lt. Thomas Reginald Graty, R.E. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He worked continuously for twentyfour hours under very heavy fire, establishing and maintaining communication.

Temp. Lt. Ernest George Green, R.E. & R.F.C

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty as an observer He has on several occasions brought down hostile machines, and has carried out many successful photographic reconnaissances. He has at all times set a fine example of courage and initiative.

2nd Lt. Frederick Henry Griffiths, E. Kent

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He did most excellent work in evacuating the wounded and reinforcing at critical points. He was wounded. He had previously done fine work.

2nd Lt. Frank Barnes Gunning, Yeo.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He carried out a dangerous reconnaissance under very heavy fire, and obtained most valuable information. He has at all times set a fine example.

2nd Lt. (actg. Capt.) Howard Kilbourne Harris, Essex R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He assumed command and controlled the operations with great coolness and skill. He was of the greatest assistance both in the preparations for and in the execution of the assault.

\*2nd Alfred Marshall Lt. Langton Harrison, Gurkha Rif.

For conspicuous gallantry and initiative when in command of an advanced party during night operations. He pushed forward with great dash under heavy fire, rushing two piquets with the bayonet and successfully bombing three pontoons full of the enemy.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Colin Heather, Manch. R. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He personally led two patrols to reconnoitre the enemy's position, and succeeded in obtaining most valuable information. He has previously done fine work.

2nd Lt. (actg. Lt.) Frederick Stanley Hill, Glouc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's trenches. He led his men with great dash during the fighting in the enemy tront line, himself kill-• ing one of the enemy and capturing two prisoners. Later, he organised and led a bombing attack. He was wounded.

2nd Lt. Edward Hopkinson, Notts. and

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a reconnoitring patrol. He inflicted many casualties on the enemy and successfully repulsed all attacks made against his position. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

Lt. George Dall Howarth, Intell. Dept. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He assumed command and successfully withdrew an infantry regiment from a very difficult situation.

2nd Lt. Ernest Russell Hicks Hudson,

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He assumed command of his company and led it in the most gallant manner. He contributed very largely to the success of the operations.

Capt. Eric Conway Irwin, D. of Cam. O.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a patrol. He carried out a successful raid on a strong hostile position and accounted for twelve of the enemy.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He handled his battery of trench mortars with marked skill, and successfully cut wire for a special operation under constant heavy enemy retaliation.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his company with marked ability throughout the attack and was largely responsible for the success of the operations.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to While on a photographic patrol he shot down and destroyed a hostile machine. He has done consistently good work in artillery observation and photography throughout the operations.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Norman James Macdonald, R. Scots.
