For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went forward with a party on to an open beach under heavy fire, and successfully distributed his men to their various boats. He was severely wounded.

2nd Lt. Thomas Telfer Archibald, Arg. &

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He commanded the company after they had reached the final objective, and continued with great coolness and ability to direct the defence. The retention of this captured position, which was under continuous heavy shelling, greatly assisted in the success of the operation.

2nd Lt. Vernon Hay Armitage, Notts. &

Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his platoon with the utmost coolness and courage under heavy fire. Although he was himself wounded he continued to direct operations, particularly in assisting to rescue some of his men who had become buried by hostile shelling. Throughout he set a fine example.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Clifford Elliston Ashby, Lond. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company with the utmost gallantry and skill, and by his personal example of courage and coolness largely contributed to the success of the operation.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He has behaved in a most gallant manner on several occasions in attending to wounded under intense shell fire, showing an utter disregard of personal danger, and setting a splendid example to all.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went forward to the front line under very heavy fire, and sent back most valuable information to his battery.

*2nd Lt. William Sidney Baker, I.A.R.O. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He forced an enemy machine gun to withdraw. He then collected a team to withdraw. Lewis gun team and some bombers, built a block, and drove off two enemy counterattacks. He set a splendid example to his men.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. While moving one of the guns, the carburetter of the lorry caught fire. The lorry was stopped and the fire got under. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed the utmost coolness and bravery in going out under heavy machine-gun fire and assisting to bring in and attend wounded men. Throughout he set a splendid example to all.
