

Temp. Lt. Walter Nicholas Cowie, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went forward under very heavy fire to ascertain the situation, and sent back most valuable information. He was largely responsible for the success of the operation.

Lt. (actg. Capt.) Cecil Herbert Vaughan Cox, Leic. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He led his men in the most gallant manner, and was largely responsible for the success of the raid.

2nd Lt. George Cyril Addison Cox, Bord. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon against an enemy strong point in a most gallant manner. He himself, though severely wounded, succeeded in reaching a point close to the objective. He thoroughly reconnoitred the position under heavy machine gun fire, and brought back most valuable information.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) John Henry Crosskey, R. War. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He was acting as second in command of the Battalion. By his skill and gallantry in directing the companies in the assault, and afterwards in consolidating the position gained, he made the attack a complete success.

Temp. Lt. (actg. Capt.) Percy Crow, R.F.A. (Lt., Unattached List).

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He observed fire throughout the day in the most exposed position under heavy fire, and by his gallantry and resolution furnished most valuable reports.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Philip Basil Cuddon, Hamp. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great ability in placing a part of the village in a good state of defence at a most critical stage. On a later date he led his company into action, captured a trench containing a large number of the enemy, and defended the right flank of the Division when the advance was held up.

2nd Lt. James Joseph Ignatius Cunningham, Lond. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. His company being held up by thick wire and fired on by an enemy machine gun, he led his platoon and broke through the wire into the enemy trench, where he attacked and dispersed the machine gun team. His prompt action saved many casualties.

\*Temp. Lt. A. Yeshwant Dabholkar, I.M.S.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although himself wounded, he displayed great courage and determination in tending wounded men under heavy fire. He set a splendid example to those around him.

\*Temp. Lt. Erach Ruttonji Daboo, I.M.S.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went forward at great personal

risk and dressed many wounded men under very heavy fire. He was himself wounded.

2nd Lt. Lance Ernest Cecil Dale-Lace, Dns.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When in command of a patrol sent to get in touch with the infantry in the front line he came under heavy shell and machine-gun fire, but succeeded in sending back most valuable information to the artillery.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Harold Eborall Davis, Gen. List and R.F.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out a valuable reconnaissance of the enemy lines, flying for half an hour at a height of 500 feet. Although attacked by five hostile machines he succeeded in completing his task, effecting a safe landing. He was himself badly burnt, but rendered a valuable report.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Stephen Edwin Davis, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He carried out a personal reconnaissance by daylight under considerable shell fire, and during the night succeeded in completing a strong point, all the time exposed to active sniping and machine gun fire.

Temp. Capt. Oswald John Day, M.B., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He worked continuously under very heavy fire, and was responsible for the evacuation of a large number of wounded.

2nd Lt. James Hamilton Dick, R. Scots Fus., attd. R. War. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He took forward two platoons and dug four posts close to the enemy line under heavy fire. Later he attacked, and, capturing the position, proceeded to consolidate it. He effected a withdrawal under heavy machine gun and rifle fire with great ability and courage.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Henry Dinsmore, K.R.R.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He assumed command of his company at a critical time, and by his fine personal example enabled the objective to be captured.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt. and actg. Capt.) John William Nash Dorrington, K.R.R.C., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company with great coolness and courage, and succeeded in establishing himself in the most important points of the village. Although twice wounded he remained at his post until the company was relieved.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Roger Downes, Lan. Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his platoon with great courage and coolness to the front line, under extremely heavy shell and machine gun fire. It was entirely due to his fine example that the operation was successfully carried through.
