Capt. Alfred George Timbrell Fisher, M.B., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. The advanced dressing station of which he was in command was destroyed by shell fire, and although himself severely shaken, he succeeded in forming a fresh dressing station.

Temp. Capt. Frederick George Flood, M.B., R.A.M.C., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination in tending the wounded under very heavy fire. His disregard of personal danger inspired all ranks. He has previously done fine work.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Thomas Ronald Fortescue, Oxf. and Bucks. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He re-organised his company under very heavy fire, and, in spite of strong opposition, continued his advance. He set a splendid example of courage and initiative.

Temp. Lt. Edward Roland Foster, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination in superintending the digging of assembly trenches under very heavy fire.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) William Foster, Notts. & Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great coolness and determination when commanding a night patrol. They penetrated some distance into the enemy lines, and, although attacked, succeeded in routing the enemy party and returning to their lines with much valuable information.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Herbert Henry Charles Fowler, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in charge of a working party. In spite of very heavy hostile fire, he kept his men well in hand, and succeeded in completing his task.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Arthur John Field, R. War. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He organised a most successful attack and led his platoon against an enemy strong point, capturing the position. Though wounded in the head, he remained in the field directing operations, thereby setting a fine example of courage and devotion to duty.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Edward William French, A.C.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When in command of the company he was forced to reorganise the whole line owing to a withdrawal on his flank. This he effected with great skill under most trying circumstances, improving his position, and getting in touch with both his flanks.

· 2nd Lt. Edward Henry Garner, Lan. Fus., attd. R. War. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He assumed command of his company, and displayed great bravery in the face of heavy fire, and succeeded in reaching his objective.

2nd Lt. Albert Edward Gearey, Notts. & Derby: R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed great skill and courage when leading his platoon during house-tohouse fighting. He drove the enemy from various positions, and later repelled a counter-attack with complete success.

2nd Lt. Jack Ross Gifford, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when acting as Forward Observing Officer. He went forward under very heavy fire, and sent back most valuable information to his battery.

\*2nd Lt. Stephen Deiniol Gladstone, I.A.R.O.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his men in the most gallant manner, and maintained his position for four hours. He undoubtedly saved a critical situation.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Maurice Gliddon, R.F.A. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. In spite of being subjected to very heavy hostile fire, he continued to fire his gun with the assistance of one gunner. He set a magnificent example to his men.

2nd Lt. Francis Thomas Goble, Sco. Rif., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty while in command of a daylight raid. He led his men with great skill and gallantry, and was able to bring back valuable information.

Capt. Robert Cecil Gordon Canning, Hrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He handled his squadron and put his position in a state of defence under very heavy fire. He also took his squadron to reconnoitre the enemy position with great ability and courage. He set a splendid example to his men.

\*2nd Lt. James Wensley Gray, I.A.R.O.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded in both thighs and the head, he continued to lead his company during the advance along the railway line under an intense and well-directed fire from the enemy's guns.

2nd Lt. Robert William Griffin, R. War. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. During operations his platoon became isolated, and came under heavy fire from a machine gun. He organised a party of bombers, and forced the enemy to withdraw the gun, thus enabling the attack to continue with success.

2nd Lt. Robert Harry Groves, Lond. R. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When digging in, his company came
