

2nd Lt. Charles William Jones, York. R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went out in broad daylight and carried out a lengthy reconnaissance, furnishing a valuable report. He has on many previous occasions done fine work.

2nd Lt. Harold Jones, Ox. & Bucks. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great coolness and judgment when commanding the flank guard of the company, which was raiding the enemy lines. His platoon were unable to return to their lines in the day-time, and he remained with them all day in the open. At night-fall he succeeded in bringing his men in, together with all the wounded.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Llewellyn Rodwell Jones, W. York. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. With both flanks in the air, he maintained his position all day against several enemy counter-attacks. He showed great bravery under very trying circumstances.

Temp. Capt. Daniel Kennedy, R.A.M.C., attd. Lrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He tended the wounded under very heavy machine gun shell fire, to which he was continuously exposed. It was owing to his bravery and untiring devotion that many lives were saved.

2nd Lt. Lionel Braund Kent, York & Lanc. R., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He led his men in the most gallant manner, and carried out the task allotted to him with conspicuous success.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Charles Martel Knight, M.G. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. After he and several of his crew had been wounded, he returned to the starting-point and took a fresh crew on board. He remained in action until unable to carry on owing to casualties, and brought his Tank back and all his crew.

Temp. Lt. (actg. Capt.) Cecil Knight-Coutts, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. While commanding his battery, he displayed the utmost gallantry and coolness in removing shells from a dump which had caught fire. He organised and superintended the rescue of buried men, and by his courage and determination under heavy shell fire greatly diminished the loss in personnel and material.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Frederick George Lancaster, W. Yorks. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He was in command of a patrol which the enemy threatened to completely surround. He, although wounded, so engaged the enemy as to inflict severe casualties, covering the withdrawal of his party with a machine gun in the face of heavy odds.

Capt. Valentine Henry Elwes Langford, Notts. & Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. His energy and utter disregard of personal safety were a splendid example to all ranks. He was largely responsible for the success of the operations.

2nd Lt. Frank Stanley Layard, Bord. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He commanded a patrol of bombers on reconnaissance which came under heavy fire. In spite of several casualties, he completed his task, and brought back most valuable information. The success of the enterprise was entirely due to his own personal courage and determination.

2nd Lt. John Harold Ernest Joseph Leahy, R.F.A., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. In spite of very heavy hostile fire and the most difficult conditions, he succeeded in establishing and maintaining communication throughout the operations.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Charles Milward Le Clair, E. Surr. R., attd. M.G. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although his Tank was subjected to very heavy shell fire and most of his crew wounded, he continued to fight his Tank and assisted to clear the village until his Tank was disabled.

Temp. 2nd Lt. John Wannan Tait Leith, Gord. Highrs.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company in the most gallant manner, and was largely responsible for the success of the operations. He set a splendid example to his men.

Temp. 2nd Lt. James Albert Lewis, Gen. List. attd R. Ir. Regt.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during a raid on the enemy's lines. He walked up and down the enemy trench under heavy fire encouraging his men, and arranged the successful evacuation of the wounded.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Harold Anyon Linfoot, Ches. R., attd. R. War. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination when leading a night attack on the enemy lines. Under heavy shell fire he rushed an enemy machine-gun, which was captured mainly as a result of his own personal efforts. He then organised the consolidation of the position with the utmost energy and initiative.

* 2nd Lt. Robert Stuart Lloyd, Norf. R., Spec. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Under heavy fire he organised, controlled and generally superintended every boat load leaving the right bank of the river. Later he stormed and captured a fort under very heavy fire.
