

Temp. Capt. Louis Hudson Lockett, Midd<sup>x</sup> R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and determination in driving off a strong enemy counter-attack against both his flanks. He set a splendid example to his men.

2nd Lt. Alan Parker Lockwood, Notts. & Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company with great gallantry and coolness. During the bombardment of the captured position he showed a fine example to all ranks of endurance and devotion to duty.

2nd Lt. Frederick Sleigh Roberts Lovett, R.G.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when acting as Forward Observing Officer. He went forward under very heavy fire and succeeded in obtaining most valuable information.

\* Temp. Capt. John Low, M.B., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He brought forward his Bearer Sub-Division and established a dressing station under heavy fire, thereby relieving the regimental aid posts. He worked continuously for thirty-six hours.

Lt. Edward Arthur Maxmilian Lys, Yeo. and M.G. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When commanding a S.A.A. column one of his dumps was blown up by enemy shell fire. Under heavy shell and machine-gun fire he succeeded in getting the other dump forward to its position, making twelve consecutive journeys through the barrage.

\*Capt. Frank Alan Macartney, Ind. Army.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded early in the operations, he continued to lead the second wave of the assaulting troops, and showed great courage and coolness in directing his command until he was again wounded. He has previously done fine work.

Lt. (actg. Capt.) (now actg. Maj.) John Forbes Macdonell, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. After withdrawing his men to a flank he remained behind and extinguished a fire which had broken out in an ammunition dump.

2nd Lt. John McPhail Macdonald, Sco. Rif., attd. K.R.R.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his company with great ability and judgment at a critical period, materially assisting in carrying through to the final objective. Later he assumed command of the two companies, and superintended the consolidation of the position.

\*Capt. Robert Macfarlane, R. Highrs., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded early in the

action, he continued to lead his company with great courage and determination. He was largely responsible for the success of the operations

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) John Chiene MacKay, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. His battery was heavily shelled with gas shell, causing several casualties. He, by his courage and fine example, steadied the battery, keeping the remaining guns in action, although twice knocked over by shell fire and slightly wounded.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Francis Sidney Mackenzie, Lond. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Assuming command of his company, he displayed great energy and initiative, and by his fine example, courage and coolness largely contributed to the success of the operation.

2nd Lt. Gilbert Mackereth, Lan. Fus., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He went 100 yards over the open under heavy fire to the assistance of a patrol which had become isolated. Later he made personal reconnaissances and moved about fearlessly under heavy shell fire.

T/2nd Lieut. Harry Mainwaring, A.S.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He was in command of an ammunition convoy to his battery. The front lorry became ditched, thus blocking the convoy on the sky line. He put the men under cover, and with two volunteers worked for half an hour under hostile shelling and succeeded in extricating the lorry.

2nd Lt. James Malley-Martin, Bord. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He made a daring reconnaissance in daylight under heavy rifle and shell fire. The valuable information obtained by him had much to do with the success of the operation.

Temp. Lt. Frederick Sidney Marr, R.F.A.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He has repeatedly done good and valuable work in going forward in front of the firing line and obtaining most valuable information. On a later occasion he led his battery to its forward position through an intense barrage, and it was largely due to his fine example and cool judgment that the battery reached its position with only a few casualties.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) John Marsden, Notts. & Derby. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He led his men in the most gallant manner and succeeded in capturing nine prisoners. He has at all times set a splendid example of courage and determination.

2nd Lt. Charles Leslie Champion Marshall, R.F.A., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. At great personal risk he extinguished
