Lt. John Mulgrave Martin, Wilts. R., and M.G. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He rendered most valuable service when commanding a Tank. He gained all his objectives and cleared up several enemy strong points, which were holding up the infantry advance.

Temp. Lt. Charles Henry May, M.G. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. As section commander he accompanied one Tank into action and then transferred to another, till it reached its objective. On his Tank becoming unfit to proceed further he took charge of a party of infantry and directed consolidation of the position under heavy fire, thereby setting a fine example of gallantry and devotion to duty.

Lt. (actg. Capt.) William McCall, Gord. Highrs., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. Although wounded he gallantly led his company forward in the face of very heavy fire. He displayed great courage and initiative throughout the day.

Temp. Capt. John William McKill, R. Welsh Fus.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He led his men in the most gallant manner and showed marked ability and coolness throughout, not only during the raid but in subsequent operations.

2nd Lt. (temp. Capt.) Norman George McNaughton, Gen. List and R.F.C., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when acting as patrol leader in numerous combats. On one occasion he led his formation against an enemy patrol, and himself drove down two hostile machines. He has set a fine example of courage and skilful leadership.

2nd Lt. David William Leslie Melville, Lrs., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty while in charge of a patrol. He carried out a daily reconnaissance under heavy fire, and was the means of obtaining most valuable information.

2nd Lt. Hamilton MacCabe Merewether, R.F.A., Spec. Res.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when acting as Forward Observing Officer. He went forward under very heavy fire and sent back most valuable information. He worked continuously for thirty-six hours.

2nd Lt. (temp. Lt.) Horace Merrick, Glouc. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed great coolness and bravery

when in command of his company, and displayed great energy in organising the whole position captured, having had to assume command of the other company meanwhile.

Temp. 2nd Lt. Charles Herbert Miller, Suff. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. He led his men with great pluck and determination, and although wounded completed his task.

Temp. 2nd Lt. George Stanley Mitchell, R.E.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in charge of a party who were erecting artillery bridges close behind the front line. His conspicuous coolness and determination rendered the completion of the work possible, and it was due to him that the routes were ready for use by the date required.

Temp. Lt. Albert Moore, M.G. Corps.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He has rendered consistent good work in keeping his Tanks in fighting condition, working in darkness and under heavy fire, thereby greatly contributing to the success of the operations in which they were engaged.

Capt. Gilbert Moore, M.B., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He was in command of the evacuation of the wounded for several weeks on an advanced front. He displayed skill in working his dispositions, and personally superintended the evacuation under heavy shell fire.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) Ronald Wilkinson Moorhouse, York. L.I.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. In spite of heavy hostile fire and the most difficult conditions, he succeeded in gaining his objective and successfully carrying out his task.

\*2nd Lt. John Moriarty, I.A.R.O.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty when in command of a raiding party. It was due to his example and able leading in face of heavy rifle and machine gun fire that the raid was successfully carried out at small cost. He was twice wounded.

Capt. William Fraser Munro, M.B., R.A.M.C.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He worked continuously for forty-eight hours under very heavy fire, and was responsible for the evacuation of a large number of wounded. He set a splendid example to all ranks.

Lt. (temp. Capt.) James Martin Gerald Murland, Yeo.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When his squadron retired to a fresh position he remained behind under heavy shell fire to attend two wounded men. He
