For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He assisted an officer to extinguish a burning lorry, and organised a party to rescue the battery stores, which were also on fire. This work was carried out under heavy hostile fire.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He led his men in the most gallant manner, and was largely responsible for the capture of an enemy strong point.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to aty. He has displayed the utmost galduty. lantry and skill as an observer in aerial combats, continually bringing down his opponents with great skill and daring.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He showed great courage and determination when commanding a wire-cutting party. He finally withdrew his party, covering their retirement himself, and got several of the wounded under cover.

240647 Pte. (L./Cpl.) P. Fearies, Leic. R. For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He displayed great courage and ability when commanding a patrol under heavy fire. He has at all times set a fine example.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He handled his machine gun team with the greatest skill, and was largely responsible for the success of the operations.

2729 Pte. W. Flaherty, Manch. R.

For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to He displayed great promptness and initiative in the newly captured position. He caused a block to be made and brought a machine gun into action against enfilade fire, inflicting a large number of casualties. He set a splendid example throughout.
