And whereas it is provided by section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation made under section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, may, whether the Proclamation was made before or after the passing of the Act now in recital, be varied or added to, whilst a state of war exists, by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade:

And whereas, by a Proclamation dated the 10th day of May, 1917, and made under section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act,

1879, and section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, and section 1 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, the exportation from the United Kingdom of certain articles to certain or all destinations was prohibited:

And whereas by an Order of Council dated the 22nd day of June, 1917, the said Proclamation was amended and added to in certain particulars:

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Board of Trade to the following effect:—

That the Proclamation dated the 10th day of May, 1917, as amended and added to by the Order of Council dated the 22nd day of June, 1917, should be further amended by making the following amendments in and additions to the Schedule to the same:—

(1) That the following headings should be deleted:—

(B) Boots and shoes, materials and tools used in the manufacture of, the following:—

Boot and shoe grindery, including clog nails but not including hobnails;

Cutters;

Drivers;

Eyelets;
Groovers;
Hooks;
Shoemakers' tools, hand and machine;
(A) Hobnails;
(B) Steel rivets, bifurcated;
(C) Tobacco;
(C) Wax, carnauba.

(2) That the following headings should be added:—

(A) Bolts, iron or steel;
Boots and shoes, materials and tools used in the manufacture of, the following:—

(A) Boot and shoe grindery, including clog nails;
(B) Cutters;
(B) Drivers;
(B) Eyelets;
(B) Groovers;
(B) Hooks;
(A) Parts of shoemakers' machine tools;

(B) Shoemakers' tools, hand and machine;

Chemicals, etc., the following:—

(A) Potassium bicarbonate and mixtures containing potassium bicarbonate;
(C) Sera, except anti-tetanus serum;
(C) Sodium sesquicarbonate;

(A) Nuts, iron or steel;
Oils, vegetable, the following, and articles and mixtures containing such oils:—

(A) Castor;
(A) Rivets, iron or steel;
(A) Shovels;
(C) Straw plait;
(A) Tobacco, unmanufactured;
(C) Tobacco, manufactured;
(C) Typewriters;
(A) Wax, carnauba.

Now, therefore, their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into consideration, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the same be approved.

Whereof the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs and Excise, the Director of the War Trade Department, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

THE TOBACCO RESTRICTION ORDER (No. 2),
1917, DATED 11TH JULY, 1917, MADE BY THE
BOARD OF TRADE UNDER REGULATIONS 2F AND
2J OF THE DEFENCE OF THE REALM REGULATIONS.

(Consolidating and amending the Order and instructions previously in force.)

WHEREAS by Regulation 2J of the Defence of the Realm Regulations the Board of Trade have the like powers as are given to the Food Controller under Regulations 2F to 2J inclusive as respects any articles of commerce to which the powers of the Food Controller under those Regulations do not extend, where it appears to the Board necessary or expedient to exercise any of those powers for the purpose of encouraging or maintaining the supply of any such article which is required by the public or by any section of the public.

AND WHEREAS by virtue of Regulation 2F these powers include powers to make orders regulating or giving directions with respect to the production, manufacture, treatment, use, consumption, transport, storage, distribution, supply, sale, or purchase of or other dealing in or measures to be taken in relation to any article (including as to maximum and minimum price), and also include power by order to require all or any persons owning or having power to sell or dispose of any article or any stocks thereof, to place at the disposal of the Board of Trade the article or the whole or any part of the stocks thereof as may be directed by the Board on such terms as the Board may direct, and to deliver to the Board, or to any person or persons named by them, the article or any stocks thereof in such quantities and at such times as the Board may require:

AND WHEREAS it appears to the Board of Trade expedient to exercise those powers as

respects tobacco in manner provided by this Order:

Now THEREFORE the Board of Trade, in pursuance of their powers under the said Regulation and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, hereby order as follows:—

1. All persons owning or having power to sell or dispose of any tobacco manufactured or unmanufactured which is on or after the date of this Order at ship's side or in any bonded warehouse shall place that tobacco at the disposal of the Board of Trade, and shall if required deliver the tobacco to the Board, or to any person named by them, in such quantities and at such times as the Board may direct.

2. No tobacco shall be delivered from a ship's side except into a bonded warehouse, and no person shall deliver or take delivery of any tobacco from any bonded warehouse without the consent of the Board of Trade, who may determine the quantity which may be delivered to such person at any one time.

3. No person shall buy, sell or do any act to cause a change of ownership in any unmanufactured tobacco lying in any bonded warehouse or at the ship's side without the consent of the Board of Trade, and any purported purchase, sale, or other dealing contrary to this prohibition shall be void.

4. From and after the date of this Order no person being a manufacturer of tobacco in a bonded warehouse or warehouses shall without a permit issued by the Board of Trade receive into that warehouse or those warehouses in any calendar month any greater amount of tobacco than one-twelfth part of the total amount received into that warehouse or those warehouses during the year ended 31st December, 1916, except that if the amount received into any such warehouse or warehouses in any one month is less than the amount hereinbefore authorised so to be received, the amount which may be received into that warehouse or those warehouses in the next succeeding month may be increased by the amount of the deficiency.

5. When the Board of Trade gives consent to any person taking delivery of any unmanufactured tobacco, such person shall forthwith deliver to the Board of Trade a notice in the prescribed form containing particulars of the nature and quantity of tobacco so to be removed, the bonded warehouse from which it is to be removed, and the licensed manufactory or bonded warehouse to which it is to be removed, and any other information which the Board may require and the person taking delivery of the tobacco from warehouse or ship's side shall cause it to be removed direct to the licensed manufactory or bonded warehouse specified in the notice, and shall not allow it to pass into the possession of any manufacturer of tobacco other than the owner of the specified licensed manufactory or bonded warehouse.

6. Where any person applies to the Board of Trade for their consent to any of the transactions referred to in paragraph 3 hereof such person shall furnish to the Board such information as the Board may require and in particular shall state the name of the other party to the transaction, the amount and description of the tobacco affected thereby, the price or consideration and the place from and to which delivery is to be made.

7. From and after the date of this Order and until further notice a person shall not, without

the consent of the Board of Trade, sell or offer for sale, whether wholesale or by retail, any tobacco manufactured or unmanufactured at a price exceeding by more than such amount as the Board of Trade may from time to time allow, the price at which tobacco of the same description and in similar quantities and under like conditions affecting the sale or offer was sold or offered for sale by that person on the first day of May, 1917.

8. The Tobacco Control Board are hereby authorised to do all such things as may be done by the Board of Trade under this Order and all applications, returns, information and notices required to be made or sent to the Board of Trade shall until further order be made or sent to the Tobacco Control Board on their behalf.

9. No person shall knowingly make any false statement, return or representation to the Board of Trade or to the Tobacco Control Board relating to any information to be supplied under or for the purpose of obtaining any consent required by this Order.

10. In this Order the expression "tobacco" includes cigars, cigarettes and snuff.

11. Infringements of this Order may be dealt with as summary offences under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidated) Regulations.

12. The Tobacco Restriction Order (No. 1), 1917, is hereby revoked as from the date of this Order, provided that such revocation shall not—

(a) affect the previous operation of that Order or anything duly done or suffered by reason thereof; or

(b) affect any right, privilege, obligation or liability acquired, accrued or incurred by reason of that Order;

(c) affect any penalty, privilege, obligation or liability acquired, accrued or incurred by reason of that Order;

(d) affect any proceedings or remedy in respect of any such right, privilege, obligation, liability, penalty, forfeiture or punishment as aforesaid

and any such proceeding or remedy may be instituted, continued or enforced, and any such penalty, forfeiture or punishment may be imposed as if such Order had not been revoked.

13. This Order may be cited as the Tobacco Restriction Order (No. 2), 1917.

THE MOTOR SPIRIT RESTRICTION ORDER, No. 1, 1917, MADE BY THE BOARD OF TRADE, AND DATED THE 12TH DAY OF JULY, 1917.

WHEREAS the Board of Trade have power under the Defence of the Realm Regulations to make orders regulating the use or consumption of any article of commerce where it appears to them to be necessary or expedient so to do for the purpose of maintaining the supply of

any such article which is required by the public or by any section of the public.

AND WHEREAS it appears to the Board of Trade expedient to exercise those powers as respects motor spirit in manner provided by this Order.

NOW THEREFORE the Board of Trade, in exercise of those powers and of all other powers them enabling, hereby order as follows:—

1. No person shall use or consume or cause or permit to be used or consumed any motor spirit for the purpose of proceeding to or from any race meeting, whether for the whole or a part only of the journey.

2. No person shall use or permit the use of any vehicle which is propelled or driven by motor spirit for the purpose of proceeding to or from any race meeting, whether for the whole or a part only of the journey.

3. The distance between a person's place of residence, whether permanent or temporary, and the railway station nearest thereto, from or to which he can conveniently travel to or from a race meeting, shall not be deemed to be a part of the journey.

4. Nothing in this Order shall prevent a person using motor spirit or a vehicle propelled or driven thereby for the purpose of proceeding to or from a race meeting on the reasonable belief of sudden illness, accident or other sudden and urgent necessity, and the proof of such belief shall lie upon the person using the motor spirit or vehicle.

5. Nothing in this Order shall prevent the driving or use of a public omnibus or stage carriage, which is propelled or driven by motor spirit, if such public omnibus or stage carriage is actually plying for hire on its ordinary and accustomed route and at its ordinary and accustomed hours.

6. In this Order the expression "motor spirit" has the same meaning as in Part VI of the Finance (1909-10) Act, 1910; and the expression "vehicle" includes a motor cycle.

7. If any person acts in contravention of the provisions of this Order he is guilty of a summary offence against the Defence of the Realm Regulations.

Proposal to vary Minimum Rates of Wages for Female Workers in certain branches of the Tailoring Trade in Great Britain which are engaged in making garments to be worn by male persons.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the above Act by the Board of Trade and dated the 27th of April, 1910, the Trade Board established under the above Act for certain branches of the Tailoring Trade in

Great Britain which are engaged in making garments to be worn by male persons, as defined in the Regulations made by the Board of Trade and dated the 10th January, 1914,

Hereby give notice as required by Section 4 of the above Act that they propose to vary the following Minimum Time-Rates of Wages at present fixed for female workers and set out in Schedule I of their Notice of the 26th February, 1917, relating to female workers as follows, that is to say:—

I. In respect of the Minimum Rates.

Class A.

For Female Workers (other than those specified in Class B. and C. of Schedule I of the above-mentioned notice of 26th February, 1917) namely:—

(a) For female workers other than homeworkers, from 4d. an hour to 4½d. an hour.

(b) For female homeworkers, from 4d. an hour to 4½d. an hour.

Class B.

For Female Learners (other than female learners specified in Class C. of Schedule I. of the above-mentioned Notice of 26th February, 1917), as defined in Section 2 of Schedule I. of the above-mentioned Notice dated the 26th February, 1917.

In respect of Section (3) of Schedule I. of the above-mentioned Notice of the 26th February, 1917, the Trade Board propose to vary such section by the omission of sub-section A, which reads as follows:—

A. In respect to the above-mentioned branches of the Retail Bespoke Tailoring Trade.

I. Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained the minimum rates set out in this Schedule shall not apply in the case of the employment of three persons in the making of one garment in a workshop where the general system prevailing therein is to make the various garments (*i.e.*, Coats, Vests and Trousers) throughout by one person, and where such three persons are (a) a Tailor, (b) an Apprentice Tailor, and (c) a second Apprentice Tailor or a General Machinist.

For the purpose of this section:—

1. A Tailor means a person who has been taught to make the various garments throughout, and who is actually engaged in making the whole of a garment, and with whom either two Apprentice Tailors or an Apprentice Tailor and a General Machinist and no other person (other than a Cutter or Trimmer) may be working.

2. An Apprentice Tailor is a person who is under contract to learn, and whose employer

is under contract to teach him the making of the various garments throughout.

3. A General Machinist is a person who machines the minor parts of garments already prepared in the workshop, and who does no other machining.

4. A workshop means a room or place in which no mechanical power is used for the purposes of the trade as covered by this section.

II. Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained the minimum rates set out in this Schedule shall not apply in the case of the employment of two female persons in the making of one garment in a workshop where the general system prevailing therein is to make the various garments (*i.e.*, Coats, Vests and Trousers) throughout by one person, and where such two female persons are:

1. (a) A Tailoress, and
(b) A Female General Machinist; or
2. (a) A Tailoress, and
(b) An Apprentice Tailoress.

For the purpose of this section:—

1. A Tailoress means a female worker who has been taught to make the various garments throughout, and who is actually engaged in making the whole of a garment, and with whom an Apprentice Tailoress or a General Machinist and no other person (other than a Cutter or Trimmer) may be working.

2. An Apprentice Tailoress is a person who is under contract to learn, and whose employer is under contract to teach her the making of the various garments throughout.

3. A General Machinist is a person who machines the minor parts of garments

already prepared in the workshop, and who does no other machining.

4. A workshop means a room or place in which no mechanical power is used for the purposes of the trade as covered by this section.

No variation is proposed in respect of the other provisions of Schedule I of the above-mentioned Notice dated the 26th February, 1917.

The Trade Board will consider any objections to the above Proposals to Vary which may be lodged with them within three months from 9th July, 1917. Such objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address) and should be sent to the Secretary of the Tailoring Trade Board (Great Britain), 5, Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2.

It is desirable that the objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

Proposal to vary Minimum Rates of Wages for Male Workers in certain branches of the Tailoring Trade in Great Britain which are engaged in making garments to be worn by male persons.

In accordance with Regulations made under Section 18 of the above Act by the Board of Trade, and dated the 27th April, 1910, the Trade Board established under the above Act for certain branches of the Tailoring Trade in Great Britain which are engaged in making garments to be worn by male persons, as defined in the Regulations made by the Board of Trade, and dated the 10th January, 1914,

Hereby give notice as required by Section 4 of the above Act, that they propose to vary the following Minimum Time Rates of Wages for male workers at present fixed and set out in Schedule I of their Notice of 26th February, 1917, relating to male workers, as follows, that is to say:—

I. In respect of the Minimum Rates:

A.

(a) For male workers other than homeworkers, from 7d. an hour to 8d. an hour.

(b) For male homeworkers, from 7d. an hour to 8d. an hour.

B. *Learners.*

When employed under 15 years of age, from 4s. 2d. to 4s. 9d. a week.

When employed at 15 and under 16 years of age, from 6s. 3d. to 7s. 2d. a week.

When employed at 16 and under 17 years of age, from 8s. 4d. to 9s. 6d. a week.

When employed at 17 and under 18 years of age, from 11s. 6d. to 13s. 2d. a week.

When employed at 18 and under 19 years of age, from 14s. 7d. to 16s. 8d. a week.

When employed at 19 and under 20 years of age, from 18s. 9d. to 21s. 5d. a week.

When employed at 20 and under 21 years of age, from 20s. 10d. to 23s. 10d. a week.

When employed at 21 and under 22 years of age, from 24s. 6d. to 28s. a week.

For Learners commencing employment in the tailoring trade at and over the age of 19 years—during their 1st six months of employment from 15s. 8d. to 18s. per week; during their second six months of employment from 19s. 10d. to 22s. 6d. per week.

The above proposals in respect of Learners are on the basis of a week of 50 hours, the rates being subject to a proportionate deduction or increase according as the number of hours actually spent by the worker in the factory or workshop in any week is less or more than 50.

II. In respect of the Application of the Minimum Rates:

In respect of Section C of Schedule I of the above-mentioned Notice of the 26th February, 1917, the Trade Board propose to omit the clause in the Notice which reads as follows:—

Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained the above-mentioned minimum rates shall not apply in the case of the employment of three persons in the making of one garment in a workshop where the general system prevailing therein is to make the various garments (*i.e.*, Coats, Vests and Trousers) throughout by one person and where such three persons are (a) a Tailor, (b) an Apprentice Tailor, and (c) a second Apprentice Tailor or a General Machinist.

For the purpose of this Section:—

1. A Tailor means a person who has been taught to make the various garments throughout and who is actually engaged in making the whole of a garment and with whom either two Apprentice Tailors or an Apprentice Tailor and a General Machinist and no other person (other than a Cutter or Trimmer) may be working.

2. An Apprentice Tailor is a person who is under contract to learn, and whose employer is under contract to teach him the making of the various garments throughout.

3. A General Machinist is a person who machines the minor parts of garments already prepared in the workshop and who does no other machining.

4. A workshop means a room or place in which no mechanical power is used for the purposes of the trade as covered by this section.

And in its place to substitute the following clause:—

Notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained the above-mentioned minimum rates shall not apply to male apprentices in the Retail Bespoke branches of the trade who are learning to make the various garments throughout under a contract in writing and are registered with the Trade Board in accordance with rules from time to time laid down by the Trade Board.

No variation is proposed in respect of the other provisions of Schedule I of the above-mentioned Notice dated the 26th February, 1917.

The Trade Board will consider any objections to the above Proposals to Vary which may be

lodged with them within three months from 9th July, 1917. Such objections should be in writing and signed by the person making the same (adding his or her full name and address) and should be sent to the Secretary of the Tailoring Trade Board (Great Britain), 5, Chancery Lane, London, W.C. 2.

It is desirable that the objections should state precisely, and so far as possible with reasons, what is objected to.

ORDER.

CREOSOTE AND OTHER OILS PRODUCED FROM THE DISTILLATION OF COAL TAR.

The Minister of Munitions in exercise of the powers conferred upon him by the Defence of the Realm Regulations and all other powers thereunto enabling him hereby orders as follows:—

(1) For the purposes of this Order the expression "creosote" shall mean creosote, green oil, sharp oil, and any oil produced from or containing an admixture of oil produced from the distillation of coal tar, or any of them.

(2) No person shall as from the date hereof until further notice, except under and in accordance with the terms of a licence issued under the authority of the Minister of Munitions, use any creosote (whether as a solvent or otherwise) for or in connection with—

(i) The water-proofing preservation, or treatment of timber or wood of any kind or description.

(ii) The manufacture, repair, preservation or treatment of any road or path in the United Kingdom, or any part of such road or path.

(3) No person shall as from the date hereof until further notice offer to sell, sell or, except for the purpose of carrying out a contract in writing existing prior to such date for the sale of creosote, enter into any transaction or negotiation in relation to the sale of creosote, except under and in accordance with the terms of a licence issued under the authority of the Minister of Munitions.

(4) All applications for licences under this Order shall be made to the Director-General of Munitions Supply, Ministry of Munitions, Whitehall Place, London, S.W. 1, and marked "Creosote Licence."

(1) The source or sources from which their present supply is obtained.

(2) The quantities of such oils used or consumed by them from 1st January, 1917, to 30th June, 1917.

(3) The quantities of such oils which it is anticipated will be used or consumed by them from 1st July, 1917, to 31st December, 1917.

(4) Full details of the purposes for which such oils have been or are intended to be used or employed.

Portland Bill to Bardsey Island—Traffic Regulations.

Former Notice.—No. 644 of 1917; hereby cancelled.

Notice is hereby given that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have

been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty and are now in force:—

I.—REGULATIONS RESPECTING SMALL CRAFT.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

The following Regulations are to be complied with until further notice by all small steam, motor, sailing and pulling boats and vessels, including pleasure craft of all descriptions (but excluding bona-fide fishing craft which are specially provided for under Section II of this

Notice), from Portland Bill on the east to Bardsey Island on the west.

2. Permits.—The owners of all such boats or vessels are to supply lists of all their boats and vessels which they may place afloat, and must obtain for each boat or vessel a permit from the Divisional Coast Watching Officer through the Station Officer of the nearest Coastguard Station. No boat or vessel is permitted to be used without a permit.

Amateur boat owners, or amateurs hiring boats for specified periods, must similarly obtain permits, and will be regarded, for the period of the permit and for the purpose of these Regulations, as the owners.

Permits may be withdrawn at any time at the discretion of the officer by whom they were issued. They must always be carried while under way, and may be regarded as being issued for the boat or vessel and not for the person using the boat or vessel, the owner being held responsible at all times for any infringement of the regulations contained in this Notice. A distinguishing number or letter, corresponding with that on the permit, must be painted on each bow of the boat or vessel.

3. Navigational Directions.—Boats or vessels subject to this Notice are to comply strictly with the following navigational directions:—

(a) They are not to be under way at night, *i.e.*, between half an hour after sunset and half an hour before sunrise, or during fog, but are to remain at their moorings. If caught out by fog, they are to return to the shore at once.

(b) Subject to any special exceptions that have been or may hereafter be made, they are not to proceed to a distance of more than three miles in any direction from the port, creek or river to which they belong.

It must be further understood that no special protection can be afforded them.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS.

4. Small Rowing or Sailing Boats may be let out on hire to parties for whom the owners are prepared to be responsible, and while so hired shall be strictly subject to these Regulations. Great care must therefore be taken that they are only hired out to persons who are thoroughly acquainted with these Regulations, as any infringement of the orders will, among other penalties, lead to the detention of the offending boat.

5. Power-driven Boats not exceeding 24-feet in length or a carrying capacity of 12 passengers may be let out on hire on the same conditions as small rowing and sailing boats, but with the further restriction that, while so hired, they shall in no circumstances be under way outside the port, creek or river to which they belong.

6. Excursion Traffic, defined as advertised trips wholly or chiefly for the pleasure of the passengers, is allowed only within ports, creeks or rivers and by written permission of the Commander-in-Chief, Plymouth, which may be obtained through the District Coast Watching Officer. Such permission will only be given subject to compliance with the regulations in paragraph (3) (a) above, and provided that:—

- (a) The entire trip is within the harbour,
- (b) One person is responsible for the party, and
- (c) The permission is applicable only to the trip specified.

7. Regular Ferry Boats may obtain special permission from the District Coast Watching Officer to run up to a specified hour according to circumstances.

8. Yachts and Pleasure Craft may obtain permission from the Commander-in-Chief, Plymouth, through the District Coast Watching Officer to proceed from their fitting-out port to their summer base port.

9. Special Local Regulations are in force for defended areas and ports, comprising Portland, Plymouth, Falmouth, Milford Haven, Cardiff and Barry, and Swansea.

10. Oil, Motor-Spirit, Petrol, or other goods may not be shipped on board craft of any description, whether coasting or foreign, either as stores for the equipment or navigation of the vessel or as merchandise, except at places which are under the supervision of a Customs Officer. Such goods must be properly pre-entered before shipment, and a clearance must be obtained from the Customs Officials in accordance with the Customs War Powers Act, 1915.

Sailing vessels may not have on board a quantity of petrol, motor-spirit, benzine, paraffin, petroleum or similar substances, exceeding 4 gallons.

II. REGULATIONS WITH REGARD TO FISHERMEN.

The following Regulations are to be complied with by all fishing vessels and boats from Portland Bill on the east to Bardsey Island on the west (hereinafter referred to as the South-Western Area).

2. Fishing vessels authorised by fishing permits signed by the local Fishery Officer, are allowed to be at sea day and night, except as stated below in paragraph 3.

3. (i) *By day and night* trawling or anchoring is forbidden on the south-east coast of Devon westward of the meridian of long. $3^{\circ} 29' W.$ (*i.e.*, Hope's nose just open of Berry head) between the parallels of the Mewstone and Skerries bell-buoy.

(ii) *By night* no fishing vessel is allowed to fish, or to be—

(a) Within the above area;

(b) On the south-east coast of Devon to the westward of a line drawn from the Skerries bell-buoy to a point two miles, 85° (*S. $79^{\circ} E.$ Mag.*), of Start point;

(c) Within ten miles of the entrance to any defended port, except as laid down in the Special Local Regulations which may be in force at each port (see paragraph 4).

Mines.—Fishermen are warned to exercise the greatest caution when operating in Lyme bay. In particular, a sharp look-out for mines should be kept when hauling gear. Extreme care is necessary in cases where torpedoes, mines, shells or bombs are found in trawl or other nets, as they may still be dangerous even after being in the water a long time. (See also general warnings contained in Notices to Fishermen, issued by the Marine Department, Board of Trade.)

4. Special local regulations are in force in certain defended ports and areas, comprising Portland, Plymouth, Falmouth, Milford Haven, Cardiff and Barry, and Swansea.

5. A new issue of fishing permits will be made throughout the South-Western Area, and

fishing skippers will be required to exchange their old permits for permits of the new issue on or before 1st June, 1916.

6. The fishing permit, made out to the skipper actually in charge, and for the boat in question, must at all times be carried by a fishing vessel at sea, and it must be produced on demand to any officer or other authorised person. Failure to comply with this regulation will render the offender liable to prosecution.

In the case of a new skipper taking charge of a boat, or of a skipper taking charge of a boat not specified on his permit, a new permit must be obtained, or the necessary alterations made on the old permit. No alterations to permits will be recognised unless signed and dated by the Permit Issuer.

7. Oil, motor-spirit, petrol, or other goods may not be shipped on board fishing craft of any description, either as stores for the equipment or navigation of the vessel or as merchandise, except at places which are under the supervision of a Customs Officer. Such goods must be properly pre-entered before shipment, and a clearance must be obtained from the Customs Officials in accordance with the Customs War Powers Act, 1915.

Sailing vessels may not have on board a quantity of petrol, motor-spirit, benzine, paraffin, petroleum or similar substances, exceeding four gallons.

Notes.

1. Fishing vessels are only to include bona-fide professional fishing craft, manned by bona-fide fishermen. Doubtful cases for fishing permits are to be referred to the nearest Divisional Coast Watching Officer.

2. Amateurs and pleasure craft out fishing are to be regarded as coming under section I. of this notice, and must comply with the Regulations contained therein.

3. Fishing vessels, having a fishing permit and desiring to carry passengers, *i.e.*, persons other than their bona-fide crew, must obtain separate permits in accordance with section I. of this notice, and when such passengers are on board, the vessels will become strictly subject to the regulations therein laid down. In the event of non-compliance, both permits may be withdrawn by the Divisional Coast Watching Officer or Fishery Officer concerned.

4. Fishery Officer means an officer of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, or of the Local Sea Fisheries Committee within whose district the fishing port in question lies, or other person duly appointed to issue fishing permits.

5. Permits may be withdrawn, suspended or endorsed at the discretion of the Divisional Coast Watching Officer or of a Fishery Officer.

6. Availability of permits.—South-Western Area fishing permits are available over the whole area, when and where fishing is permitted by these regulations, but boats moving from port to port within the area should, in order to avoid delay, notify their arrival and departure to the Local Fishery Officer or Permit Issuer.

7. Visiting boats from ports outside the South-Western Area must, before fishing in this area, obtain from the local Permit Issuer a South-Western Area fishing permit, either—

(a) In exchange for their former permit (re-exchanging on departure), or,

(b) By previous application through the Local Fishery Officer;

otherwise they will be detained in port until their credentials have been verified. In all cases visiting boats must give up their South-Western Area fishing permits on leaving the South-Western Area.

8. Charts of the restricted areas off the Devon coast can be seen by Fishermen at the Harbour Master's office, Brixham, the Fish Inspector's office, Plymouth Barbican, and the Fishery Collector's office, Newlyn Harbour.

9. Complaints on the part of the fishing community, and questions of doubt, should be referred in the first instance to the Local Fishery Officer, or to the Inspector of Fisheries attached to the area.

III.—PLYMOUTH.

No vessels other than those of British Nationality or those of the Allied Nations are permitted to enter the Port of Plymouth until further notice.

PART I.—ENTRANCE TO THE PORT.

Notification of Time of Arrival.

1. Shipowners and shipping agents will facilitate the entry of their vessels by giving previous notice of the probable time of arrival to the King's Harbour Master for Plymouth, Longroom, Stonehouse (Telegraphic address: Tidal, Plymouth), with particulars of appearance, &c., so that they may be readily identified.

Instructions for Ships Approaching the Port.

2. All ships may be brought in at night as well as by day. This does not apply to fishing vessels and small craft, as they cannot be allowed to enter at night.

Endeavour will be made to bring vessels in from sea during a fog even though movements inside the port are prohibited (*vide* paragraph 11). If, however, the fog is so dense as to make this dangerous, the vessel must wait in the outer examination anchorage (Cawsand bay) or at sea until it lifts sufficiently.

When once ships are anchored they are not to move under any circumstances without previously obtaining permission from the King's Harbour Master for Plymouth.

Vessels of every description, including fishing vessels and small craft, are forbidden to enter or leave the port by the eastern entrance. They may only do so by the western entrance.

The Devil's bridge is entirely closed.

All orders and instructions given by the Examining Officers are to be implicitly obeyed, otherwise ships will be liable to be fired upon.

Distinguishing Signals of Examination Steamers.

3. The Examination Steamer will be found in the neighbourhood of Penlee point, and will *by day* be distinguished by the Examination Flag (white and red horizontal surrounded by blue border), and will fly the Blue Ensign.

By night the Examination Steamer will be distinguished by three white lights.

Signals Indicating Port Closed.

4. The following signals will be employed to indicate that the Port is closed:—

By Day.—Three red balls hoisted vertically

by the Examination Steamer and at the flag-staff on Breakwater fort.

By Night.—Three red lights, six feet apart, hoisted vertically by the Examination Steamers, and at the flagstaff on Breakwater fort.

In this case the Examination Vessel will not lead ships in further than Cawsand bay, where they must anchor or remain at sea.

Vessels must on no account proceed further in than Cawsand bay unless met by the Examination Steamer and led in or given the special signal to proceed into the sound.

Ships Anchored in Cawsand Bay.

5. Vessels are not to attempt to leave the anchorage under any circumstances, or to communicate with other vessels, or with the shore, without previously obtaining permission from the Chief Examining Officer.

Fishing Vessels and Small Craft.

6. Fishing vessels, barges, boats, yachts, and small private vessels of any kind are only to enter the port by day and should approach the western entrance only, where the patrol boats will give them instructions as to proceeding into harbour.

If obliged to shelter at night from stress of weather or other cause, Shipowners, Masters, and Local Agents are advised to direct their vessels to proceed to a sheltered anchorage in the vicinity, such as Salcombe, The Yealm, Looe or Fowey, until daylight.

Lights of Ships.

7. The normal condition in regard to lights of ships at anchor in the sound, Cawsand bay, Cattewater, or Hamoaze at night is that no lights whatever are to show from the outside. When, however, during dark hours, a vessel is under way, anchor lights are to be exposed until the vessel is anchored; or, in the case of ships leaving, until they are clear of the breakwater, when lights are again to be obscured. It is expected that masters of vessels and others concerned will see that this order, which is given for their own protection, is carried out; any infringement of it will entail more stringent measures being taken.

Anchor lights, bow and masthead steaming lights, and other lights, are to be as prescribed in Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 581 of 1917.

Pilotage.

8. Pilotage is compulsory for all vessels in the whole of the waters comprising Plymouth Sound, Hamoaze, Cattewater and Sutton pool, inside a line joining Penlee point on the west through the Shagstone to the coast on the East, as far as Laira bridge to the eastward and Saltash bridge to the westward, with the following exceptions:—

- (a) Ships belonging to His Majesty;
- (b) Pleasure yachts and sailing boats under 30 feet in length on the water line and under 10 feet draught;
- (c) Fishing vessels;
- (d) Sailing vessels trading coastwise of less than 75 tons net register;
- (e) Ships of less than 50 tons gross tonnage not carrying passengers;
- (f) Motor barges and boats habitually used exclusively within the limits of the Port of Plymouth;

(g) Steam tug boats registered at the Port of Plymouth.

NOTE.—This order does not apply to ships changing moorings unless the shift entails going through or into the channel.

If necessary, the Examining Officer will place a licensed local Pilot on board all incoming merchant vessels, or they will be led in by one of the Examination Vessels which have licensed Pilots on board.

All vessels proceeding from the Cattewater or Sutton pool to Plymouth sound and *vice versa* are to pass between the Mallard shoal and Mount Batten breakwater.

PART II.—MOVEMENTS WITHIN THE PORT.

9. The movements of all merchant ships, fishing vessels, or boats of any kind, are subject to the direction of the King's Harbour Master, Plymouth, for the Sound, and the King's Harbour Master, Devonport, for the Hamoaze, whose orders are to be immediately obeyed.

Disobedience of such orders will render vessels liable to be fired upon.

Pilotage.

10. Pilotage is compulsory under the same conditions as stated in paragraph 8 above.

Night and During Fog.

11. During the hours of official night, or during fog, no merchant vessels (including fishing craft, barges, boats, yachts, or private vessels of any kind) will be allowed to be under way in the sound and adjacent waters, except with special permission, which should be obtained from the King's Harbour Master for Plymouth, at Longroom, Stonehouse.

During the hours of official night no vessel, barge, or boat of any kind, will be allowed to be under way in the Hamoaze or creeks and coves adjoining, including the Lynher river and the Tamar river above Saltash as far as a line joining Skinham and Warren points, except with special permission, which should be obtained from the King's Harbour Master, for Devonport, at His Majesty's Dockyard, Devonport.

All traffic within the port is absolutely prohibited during a state of fog.

Approach to Government Vessels and Establishments.

12. No merchant vessels (including fishing craft, barges, boats, yachts, or private vessels of any kind) will be allowed to approach any Government ship, vessel, lighter, or other Government craft, or any Government Dockyard or Establishment, without special permission.

Subject to the above, merchant shipping may move as usual within the Ports of Plymouth and Devonport, taking care to keep clear of any of His Majesty's ships which are being navigated in the Ports. (See paragraphs 22 and 23.)

Patrol of Internal Waterways and Approaches of the Port.

13. The internal waterways of the port, as well as the approaches thereto, will be patrolled by Naval patrol boats, or other Government vessels. Captains and Masters of merchant ships, and persons in charge of fish-

ing vessels or boats of any kind, are hereby warned to observe any orders which may be given by the Naval patrols. Merchant ships, fishing vessels, and boats will be subject to inspection and search, and will be liable to be fired upon in the event of disobedience to the orders given them by the patrols.

Regulation Lights to be shown at Night.

14. All vessels, barges, or boats, that have received permission to be under way, must display the regulation lights at night. (*See also paragraph 7.*)

Caution as to Anchoring.

15. When anchoring, care must be taken to be well clear of the fairway.

Prohibited Areas.

16. No vessel, boat, or craft of any kind is at any time allowed within the following areas:—

The Eastern Channel.—The area defined as follows:—On the north by the line of Torpedo range targets; on the west by the line joining Breakwater fort with Shagstone beacon; and on the south by a line joining Shagstone beacon with Reny rocks.

The Bridge.—The area defined as follows:—On the north by a line joining Ravenness point to Drake's island north-west buoy; on the east by a line joining Drake's island north-west buoy to Melampus light-buoy; and on the south by a line joining Melampus light-buoy to Fort Picklecombe pier.

No fishing boat or sailing vessel engaged in coast trade shall be admitted into Cawsand bay during the night, or be allowed to lie at anchor there during the night. No fishing boat or sailing vessel engaged in coast trade shall approach Cawsand bay so late in the evening as to make it impossible for them to enter the Cattewater before dark.

Fishing is now permitted by night in Whitsand bay, subject to the following regulations:—

(a) No fishing at night is to take place east of a line drawn in a 231° (S. 67° W. Mag.) direction from Rame head, and no boat is to cross this line at a distance of less than ten miles from the Breakwater light during the hours of official night.

(b) Except on Sundays, no night fishing is to take place within three miles of the Coast between Tregantle and Portwrinkle up to the hour of 12 midnight, or such later hour as may be ordered.

The above regulations are to be strictly complied with and any infringement of them will entail severe penalties.

Paragraph 3, clause (ii) (c) of section II. of this Notice is modified to the extent stated above as regards the defended Port of Plymouth.

No yacht, &c., or pleasure boat may proceed to the westward of a line joining the east end of Drake's island and the west side of the entrance to Millbay docks, nor may they proceed more than two miles outside the breakwater.

With the above exceptions, yachts, &c., and pleasure boats, may cruise in the waters of the sound as laid down in the Public Traffic Regulations. All persons going afloat in charge of yachts or boats are to make themselves thoroughly acquainted with these orders, the

Public Traffic Regulations, and the notices that have been published from time to time in the public press defining prohibited areas.

Special notice is drawn to the following points in the regulations:—

No yacht or boat may be under way after dark; there can, therefore, be no traffic after dark between yachts at their moorings and the shore.

Although it is only laid down that no craft may leave or enter by the East channel, no craft is to approach anywhere near the East channel buoys, as such action would be likely to draw the fire of the forts.

All Excursion Steamer Traffic is Prohibited in the Sound.

Note.—Yachts that are only fitting out at Plymouth, and that may wish to proceed to their Summer base harbour, must obtain permission to leave for that purpose.

A limited number of moorings for yachts may be laid in the following places and nowhere else:—

On West Hoe—on application to King's Harbour Master, Plymouth; in the Cattewater above Turnchapel—on application to the Harbour Master of Cattewater.

Hamoaze.—Within the limits in the Harbour of Devonport mentioned in paragraph (4) below, all small craft, motor boats, steam boats, pulling boats, punts, &c., are to be moored in one of the following areas, *viz.*:—Saltash, Pottery quay, North corner, Mutton cove, Cremyll hard, Torpoint, Stonehouse creek (or be hauled up and secured above highwater mark in an approved position), where they will remain under Police supervision, and only be allowed out on the production of a permit. [*See paragraph (4) below.*]

(2) With the exception of steam or motor ferry boats which have obtained special permits, no craft of any description is to be under way during the hours of Official Night, *i.e.*, between the sunset gun and daylight gun fired from the Boom Defence Vessel "Mariner." Any craft under way between these times may be fired on by the Naval patrol boats or H.M. ships in harbour without notice.

(3) During fog or thick weather no craft of any description is to be under way, with the exception of the Chain Ferry bridges at Torpoint and Saltash.

(4) All traffic is prohibited in the waters of the Harbour of Devonport within the following limits, *viz.*:—Between lines joining Skinham and Warren points in the Tamar river, and the Boom at Devil's point, including the Lynher river as far as St. Germans, Millbrook lake, and all the creeks and coves adjoining, subject to the following provisions:—

During daylight, i.e., outside the hours of official night, all craft of any description engaged by their owners in the prosecution of their business, or used by them as a means of obtaining their livelihood, may be permitted to be under way within the above limits on obtaining a permit for the purpose. These permits to be obtained for steam, motor, or other self-propelled craft, from the King's Harbour Master, Devonport, and for sailing or pulling craft from the Superintendent of Dockyard Police, such permits to be produced when called for by the person in charge of any

patrol boat, police boat, or boat of H.M. ships.

Persons owning craft of any description which they may wish to use for pleasure purposes will be allowed to remove the same to approved places outside the above limits.

No permits will be Granted for Use of Pleasure Craft within the Limits defined.

(5) With the undermentioned exception at** the following areas are prohibited to all craft of every description:—

Coombe bay, Kiln bay, Wilcove lake, Thanckes lake, south of Gravesend point to Pound at Torpoint, St. John's lake, Millbrook lake (inside a line from Palmer point to Little Southdown).

** With regard to Millbrook lake inside the line specified, special permits will be given to steam or motor ferry craft, for public traffic only, and for sailing and pulling craft conveying market produce or provisions and coal, at the discretion of the King's Harbour Master, Devonport.

(6) No craft of any description is to approach or is to communicate with any of H.M. establishments or ships without having permission and calling the attention of the guard before they close. Craft disobeying this order may be fired on without notice.

(7) The foregoing provisions do not apply to any of H.M. craft or boats, or to vessels in Government employ.

(8) No excursion steamers will be permitted in the Hamoaze between the boom at Devil's point and Saltash pier. Subject to special arrangements, facilities will be granted during the summer months only for excursions in the rivers Tamar and Tavy above Saltash, permits for which must be obtained by the owners of Excursion Steamers from the King's Harbour Master, Devonport.

Special Warning to Boatmen and those who Hire Out Yachts or Boats.

Great care must be taken that yachts and boats are only hired out to persons who are thoroughly acquainted with these Regulations, as any infringement of the orders will, amongst other things, lead to the detention of the offending yacht or boat.

PART III.—VESSELS LEAVING THE PORT.

Prohibition.

17. No fishing vessels, barges, boats, yachts, or private vessels of any kind, are permitted to leave the Dockyard Port of Plymouth during the hours of official night or during fog.

18. Merchant vessels (including those engaged in the coastal trade) must on no account leave the Dockyard ports of Devonport and Plymouth without permission.

Vessels in the Hamoaze must obtain such permission from the King's Harbour Master, Devonport, at his office in the Dockyard; those at berths in the waters of the sound, Cawsand bay, Cattewater, Sutton pool, or Millbay docks, must obtain permission from the King's Harbour Master, Plymouth, at Longroom, Stonehouse.

It is also necessary for ships to obtain permission from the Collector of Customs, at the Barbican, Plymouth.

Fishing Vessels and Small Craft.

19. Fishing vessels, boats, and small craft generally may leave the Port during daylight without any formalities, but such craft are liable to inspection and search by the Naval patrol boats.

Pilotage.

20. Pilotage is compulsory under the same conditions as stated in paragraph 8 of Part 1 above.

PART IV.—BOOM DEFENCE.

21. A boom defence is in position across the entrance to the Hamoaze and should be approached with caution.

The gate of the boom will always be closed during the hours of official night and during fog, and may be closed during the day.

The following signals will be displayed:—

BY DAY.

When the Gate is open.—On each side of the gateway on the hulk to which the end of the gate is secured, the signals displayed by wreck-marking vessels, viz.:—Two black balls vertical on one yard-arm and one black ball on the opposite yard-arm. Vessels to pass on the side showing two balls.

When the Gate is closed.—On each side of the gateway of the boom a blue burgee.

This signal is also shown from Mount Wise signal station; Harbour Master's flagstaff, Longroom, Stonehouse; and South dockyard flagstaff.

BY NIGHT.

The Gate is closed and no signals will be shown.

22. For the guidance of vessels entering or leaving the Hamoaze while the boom is open, the following signals will be hoisted on the gate of the boom to indicate when vessels are entering or leaving the Hamoaze:—

(1) Pilot Jack.—Large man-of-war entering or leaving the harbour.

(2) Cone, point down.—A vessel or vessels leaving the harbour.

(3) Cone, point up.—A vessel or vessels entering the harbour.

These signals will not be used for barges, steamboats, or small passenger steamers.

23. Vessels are warned to pay strict attention to Clause 9, Second Schedule of Order in Council, 14th October, 1915, Regulations for the Dockyard Ports of Plymouth and Devonport, and no merchant vessel, whether navigating with or against the tide, is to attempt to pass a man-of-war in the "Narrows" when she is flying the "O" Flag at the fore truck.

Vessels are required not to pass other vessels in the gateway of the boom, and a vessel navigating against the tide should ease her engines and wait until any other vessel going with the tide has passed clear.

The following signals are hoisted at Mount Wise, Longroom, and South dockyard signal station:—

Signal and Signification.

Ball over Red Burgee.—Large ships coming from sound to Hamoaze; all traffic outwards between Rubble bank and Melampus buoy is to cease while this signal is flying.

Red Burgee over Ball.—Large ships coming from Hamoaze to sound; all traffic inwards

between Melampus buoy and Rubble bank is to cease while this signal is flying.

Ordinary Port Regulations.

24. The ordinary Regulations of the Port, except as affected by this Notice, are to be strictly adhered to.

IV. BRISTOL CHANNEL.

The passage of vessels through the channel southward of the Breaksea light-vessel is entirely prohibited. Vessels contravening this regulation are liable to be fired upon.

No vessel is allowed to anchor to the westward of a line drawn from Nells point to Breaksea light vessel, except during foggy weather when inward bound.

Only vessels waiting to enter Barry harbour are permitted to anchor in Barry roads; all other shipping should anchor to the eastward of West Cardiff light-buoy.

Variation.—16° W.

Note.—This Notice is a revision of the former Notice quoted above.

Caution.

This Admiralty Notice to Mariners is issued under the provisions of the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, and failure to comply strictly with the directions contained in it will constitute an offence against those Regulations.

Any person found guilty of such an offence is liable to severe penalties both of imprisonment and fine.

Any person aiding or abetting the commission of such an offence is himself guilty of an offence against the Regulations.

Attention is also drawn to the fact that any infringement of the directions contained in this Admiralty Notice to Mariners is liable to result in the detention of the ship or vessel.

(a) Lands for the purposes of a widening of the North-Eastern Railway Company's Darlington and Saltburn Railway, described in and authorised by that Act, and situate in the Urban District of Eston and the Parish of Wilton, in the North Riding of the County of York.

(b) Lands situate in the Parishes of Sherburn and Pittington, in the Urban District of Hetton, in the Parishes of Little Eppleton, East Rainton, West Rainton and Moorsley, in the Parishes of Seaham, Burdon, Seaton with Slingley, and Dalton le Dale, in the Parish of Ryhope, and in the County Borough of Sunderland, forming the site of part of the Durham and Sunderland Railway, and certain lands situate in the Parishes of East Murton and Haswell, forming the site of part of the Sunderland and Hartlepool Railway Haswell Branch, all in the County of Durham.

(c) Lands situate in the Parish of Kirkcleeatham and in the Urban District of Redcar, in the North Riding of the County of York, shall in each case be extended for one year from the 15th day of August, 1917.

By His Excellency the Right Honourable The Lord Raglan, Lieutenant-Governor of the said Isle, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS it is deemed advisable to make new Orders for regulating the importation of animals into this Island.

Now I, the said Lieutenant-Governor, by and with the advice and consent of two members of the Council, and under and by virtue of the powers conferred upon me by the Cattle Diseases Prevention Acts, do hereby order as follows:—

Landing Regulations.

1. No animal shall be landed in this Island unless accompanied by a Permit issued by the Government Secretary, which Permit may contain such conditions as to quarantine and veterinary inspection as may at the time of issue be considered desirable. An animal shall only be landed in this Island at the Port named in the Permit.

2. Animals landed under this Order and removed into the Government Lairs shall, while detained in such Lairs, be supplied with a proper and sufficient supply of food and water by the owners or consignees thereof.

3. The Superintendent of the Government Lairs shall have power to forbid persons entering the same without permission from himself.

4. The Superintendent of the Government Lairs shall keep in a book, to be provided for the purpose, a record of all animals moved into or out of the Lairs.

Animals Suffering from Tuberculosis.

5. Any animal removed to the Government Lairs, which, on being examined by the Government Veterinary Inspector, is found to be showing symptoms of tuberculosis, shall, at the option of the owner or consignee, either be at once removed from the Lairs to the nearest public abattoir and there slaughtered under inspection or sent back by such owner or consignee at his own expense to the port from which such animal was shipped.

Importation of Animals from Abroad.

6. It shall not be lawful to land in this Island any animal brought from any country

or place outside the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and the Channel Islands.

7. It shall not be lawful to land in this Island—

(a) The carcase of an animal which has died or been slaughtered on board a vessel while in a port in any country outside the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and the Channel Islands, or during the passage from any such port to this Island or thereafter while in any port in this Island; or

(b) the dung of any such animal; or,

(c) any fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils used for or about any such animal unless they have been scraped and then thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water, and subsequently disinfected, and unless the permission of the Chief Constable has been obtained.

8. The Principal Officer of Customs and Excise in this Island, or any Officer of Police, may seize and detain any carcase, dung, fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils landed in contravention of this Order, and he shall forthwith report the facts to the Government Office with a view to the destruction or disposal of such carcase, dung, fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils.

Interpretation.

9. In this Order,

“Government Lairs” means such place or places as the Lieutenant-Governor may from time to time appoint for the detention of animals under this Order.

“Animals” for the purpose of this Order means bulls, cows, oxen, heifers, calves, sheep, lambs, goats, and swine.

“Disease” for the purpose of this Order means cattle plague (that is to say, rinderpest, or the disease commonly called cattle plague), Contagious Pleuro-pneumonia of cattle, Foot-and-Mouth Disease, Sheep-pox, Sheep Scab, Swine Fever (that is to say, the disease known as Typhoid Fever of Swine, Soldier, Purples, Red Disease, Hog Cholera, or Swine Plague), or Anthrax.

“Carcase” means the carcase of an animal, and part of a carcase, and the meat, flesh, bones, hide, skin, hoofs, horns, offal, or other part of an animal separately or otherwise, or any portion thereof.

Repeal.

10. The Orders in Council of the 29th day of January, 1907, the 16th day of April, 1907, the 4th day of June, 1907, the 4th day of January, 1909, the 18th day of October, 1910, the 1st day of July, 1912, the 12th day of February, 1913, the 20th day of July, 1914, the 6th day of August, 1914, and “The Animals (Importation) Order of 1915,” are hereby repealed.

Commencement.

11. This Order shall come into operation on the 9th day of July, 1917.

Short Title.

12. This Order may be cited as “The Animals (Importation) Order of 1917.”
