DECLARING THAT THE NAME OF WINDSOR IS TO BE BORNE BY HIS ROYAL HOUSE AND FAMILY AND RELINQUISHING THE USE OF ALL GERMAN TITLES AND DIGNITIES.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS We, having taken into consideration the Name and Title of Our Royal House and Family, have determined that henceforth Our House and Family shall be styled and known as the House and Family of Windsor:

And whereas We have further determined for Ourselves and for and on behalf of Our descendants and all other the descendants of Our Grandmother Queen Victoria of blessed and glorious memory to relinquish and discontinue the use of all German Titles and Dignities:

And whereas We have declared these Our determinations in Our Privy Council:

Now, therefore, We, out of Our Royal Will and Authority, do hereby declare and announce that as from the date of this Our Royal Pro-

clamation Our House and Family shall be styled and known as the House and Family of Windsor, and that all the descendants in the male line of Our said Grandmother Queen Victoria who are subjects of these Realms, other than female descendants who may marry or may have married, shall bear the said Name of Windsor:

And do hereby further declare and announce that We for Ourselves and for and on behalf of Our descendants and all other the descendants of Our said Grandmother Queen Victoria who are subjects of these Realms, relinquish and enjoin the discontinuance of the use of the Degrees, Styles, Dignities, Titles and Honours of Dukes and Duchesses of Saxony and Princes and Princesses of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, and all other German Degrees, Styles, Dignities, Titles, Honours and Appellations to Us or to them heretofore belonging or appertaining.

A PROCLAMATION

FOR CONTINUING IN ACTUAL SERVICE MEN OF THE ROYAL NAVAL RESERVE AND ROYAL FLEET RESERVE, AND OFFICERS AND MEN OF THE ROYAL NAVAL VOLUNTEER RESERVE.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS by the fifth section of the Royal Naval Reserve (Volunteer) Act, 1859, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for Us in case We see fit on any emergency by Proclamation to declare that such volunteers under that Act as may at the date of such Proclamation be in actual service shall continue in such actual service for the period of five years from the date of their respectively coming into actual service, if their services be so long required:

And whereas by the Naval Reserve Act, 1900, the Admiralty are authorised to raise and keep up a new division, commonly known as the Royal Fleet Reserve, of the force raised under the said first recited Act in addition to the men raised under that Act, and it is provided that certain provisions of the said Act of 1859 including the fifth section of that Act, shall apply to the force so raised:

And whereas by the Naval Forces Act, 1903, the Admiralty are authorised to raise and maintain a force to be called the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve:

And whereas by the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve Act, 1917, it is provided that the power under section five of the Royal Naval Reserve (Volunteer) Act, 1859, for His Majesty on any emergency by Proclamation to declare that such volunteers as may at the date of such Proclamation be in actual service shall continue in such actual service for a period of five years from the date of their respectively coming into actual service if their services be so long required, shall, during the continuance of the present war, notwithstanding anything in section one of the Naval Forces Act, 1903, extend to the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve as it extends to the Royal Naval Volunteers:

We do, by this Our Proclamation, order and direct that in the present emergency such volunteers under the said Acts as are in actual service shall continue in actual service in accordance with the provisions of the Royal Naval Reserve (Volunteer) Act, 1859.

A PROCLAMATION

PROHIBITING THE EXPORTATION FROM THE UNITED KINGDOM OF DESIGNS FOR AIRCRAFT.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS by Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, it is enacted that the exportation of arms, ammunition, and gunpowder, military and naval stores, and any articles which We shall judge capable of being converted into or made useful

in increasing the quantity of military or naval stores, provisions, or any sort of victual which may be used as food for man may be prohibited by Proclamation:

And whereas by Section one of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, it is enacted that the said section 8 shall have effect whilst a state of war in which We are engaged exists as if in addition to the articles therein mentioned there were included all other articles of every description:

And whereas We deem it expedient to prohibit the exportation of the articles hereinafter specified:

Now, therefore, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, in pursuance of the said Acts and all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby proclaim, direct, and ordain as follows:—

As from and after the date of this Proclamation the exportation from the United Kingdom of the following articles, that is to say, drawings, designs, specifications, and other descriptions in writing of any kind of aeroplanes or other aircraft, or of engines, or other accessories of aircraft, shall be prohibited:

Provided that nothing herein contained shall apply to any such articles exported under and in pursuance of any licence in that behalf granted by the Air Board.

And whereas His Majesty in Council, in pursuance of the said first-mentioned Act, has issued the Defence of the Realm (Liquor Control) Regulations, 1915, under the said last-mentioned Act:

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the 18th day of August, 1916, His Majesty was pleased, in pursuance of the said first-mentioned Act, to apply the said Regulations, and any Regulations amending the same, to an area known as the Eastern Area, and more particularly described in the Schedule to the said Order:

And whereas it appears to His Majesty to be expedient that the said Area should be extended, and that the Parishes of Shillington, Upper Standon, Meppershall, Campton, Shefford, Shefford Hardwick, Clifton, Henlow,

Langford, Arlsey, Astwick, and Stotfold, in the County of Bedford, and so much of the Parish of Southill in the said County as lies within the circumference of a circle having a radius of five hundred yards measured from the Railway Station at Shefford should be included therein:

And whereas it appears to His Majesty that it is expedient for the purpose of the successful prosecution of the present war that the sale and supply of intoxicating liquor in the area thereby constituted and defined and specified in the Schedule hereto should be controlled by the State on the grounds that war material is being made, loaded, unloaded, and dealt with in transit therein, and that men belonging to His Majesty's Naval and Military Forces are assembled therein:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

The Defence of the Realm (Liquor Control) Regulations, 1915, and any Regulations amending the same, shall be, and are hereby, applied to the area defined and specified in the Schedule hereto.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers by the above-recited Acts in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Section 1 of the Marriage of British Subjects (Facilities) Act, 1915, shall apply to the British Protectorate hereunder mentioned:—

WHEREAS by the Isle of Man (War Legislation) Act, 1914, His Majesty has power to extend to the Isle of Man any Act which, in the opinion of His Majesty, was passed for the purpose of meeting any emergency created by the present War, subject to adaptations for the purpose of making the Act applicable to the Isle of Man:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Coroners (Emergency Provisions) Act, 1917, shall extend to the Isle of Man, subject to the following adaptations:—

1. For Section 1 the following provision shall be substituted:—

1. “7” shall be substituted for “11” in Section 5 of an Act of Tynwald promulgated on the 5th day of July, 1852, intituled “An Act to transfer the Power of taking Inquests of Death, and to vest the same in a Coroner for the Island,” as the minimum number of jurors who are to be summoned by a Coroner of a Sheading, and as the number of jurors to be sworn to inquire into the cause of the death of the deceased person.

2. In Section 2 (1) after the words “(Emer-

gency Provisions)” there shall be read the words “ (*Isle of Man*).”

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the 3rd, Chapter 134, of the Act of the 2nd and 3rd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 49, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Representation, bearing date the 28th day of June, in the year 1917, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, Chapter 134, of the Act of the 2nd and 3rd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 49, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Representation as to the assignment of a District Chapelry to the Consecrated Church of Saint John the Baptist, Knighton, situate in the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint Mary Magdalen, Knighton, in the County of Leicester, and in the Diocese of Peterborough:

“ Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a District Chapelry should be assigned to the said Church of Saint John the Baptist, Knighton, situate as aforesaid:

“ Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Frank Theodore, Bishop of Peterborough, (testified by his having signed and sealed this Representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all that part of the said New Parish of Saint Mary Magdalen, Knighton, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the *Map* or *Plan* hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a District Chapelry to the said Church of Saint John the Baptist, Knighton, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named ‘The District Chapelry of Saint John the Baptist, Knighton.’

“ And with the like consent of the said Frank Theodore, Bishop of Peterborough, (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said Church of Saint John the Baptist, Knighton, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices, should be paid and belong to the Minister of the same Church for the time being: Provided always that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the

performance of the said office of baptism, or for the registration thereof.

“ We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal Consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal Wisdom, shall seem meet.

“ THE SCHEDULE TO WHICH THE FOREGOING REPRESENTATION HAS REFERENCE.

“ The District Chapelry of Saint John the Baptist, Knighton, being:—

On the 20th January, 1917, at about 10 a.m., while operations were being conducted for the widening of a shaft at the Cowdenbeath Colliery, Fife, a portion of the side of the shaft collapsed, throwing a workman named Newton down the mine to a scaffold about 90 feet below.

Scott, McCafferty and Baird at once descended in a large bucket or kettle to attempt a rescue. The whole of the shaft below the point at which the fall had occurred was in a highly dangerous condition: stones and rubbish were continually falling, and there was constant danger of a further collapse. Newton was found, alive and conscious, buried beneath about 12 feet of debris and pinned by some fallen timber. The men worked continuously

from 10.45 a.m. until 7 p.m. They were joined at 11 a.m. by Christie, and at 1.30 p.m. by Baird, both of whom remained at work with the others until 7 p.m. During the whole of this period all five men were in serious danger.

At 12.45 Boyle descended in the kettle with two other men. While the kettle was descending a fall occurred, killing one of his companions and injuring another. Boyle drew the kettle to the side of the shaft until the fall was over, and then took the kettle again to the surface. He subsequently remained in charge of the kettle, exposed to constant danger, until 7 p.m.

At 7 p.m., after 9 hours' continuous and highly dangerous labour, the rescue party was relieved by other men. Unfortunately, Newton died at 8.30 p.m. Attempts to recover his body were then postponed until the shaft could be worked with greater safety.

WOOL.

Whereas by the Wool (Restriction of Consumption) Order, 1917, the Army Council regulated the hours of work in certain factories:

And whereas the said Order was amended by Orders of the Army Council dated the 5th June, 1917, and 9th June, 1917:

And whereas it is expedient to amend the said Order in the manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, the Army Council, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by the Defence of the Realm Regulations, hereby Order that the following amendments be made in the said Order:—

1. In clause 5, there shall be inserted after the words "amounted to 55½ hours" the words "or more."

2. After clause 7, the following new clauses shall be inserted:—

"8. In any textile factory, the business carried on in which consists wholly or partly in the combing of Merino wool, the weekly hours of work on combing such Merino wool shall not, except under permit issued by or on behalf of the Director of Army Contracts, include, after the fourteenth day of July, 1917, any hours of work on any Monday or Monday night, provided that nothing herein contained shall apply to re-combing.

"9. In any textile factory, the business carried on in which does not consist wholly or partly, at the date hereof, in the combing of Merino wool, no Merino wool shall be combed.

"10. In any textile factory, the business carried on in which consists wholly or partly in the combing of Merino wool, those combs engaged at the date hereof on Merino wool shall not manipulate any wool other than Merino."

And whereas by virtue of Section 20 of the Northampton Corporation Water Act, 1913 (herein-after referred to as "the Act of 1913"), and of the Order aforesaid the time limited for the exercise of the powers of the Corporation for the compulsory purchase of lands under that Act expired on the 4th day of July, 1917;

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by Section 1 of the Act of 1915, and of any other powers in that behalf, We by this Our Order—

(a) extend until the 18th day of August, 1918, the time limited as aforesaid for the exercise of the powers of the Corporation for the compulsory purchase of lands required for the purposes of the Act of 1911; and

(b) extend until the 4th day of July, 1918, the time limited as aforesaid for the compulsory purchase of lands under the Act of 1913.

By His Excellency the Right Honourable The Lord Raglan, Lieutenant-Governor of the said Isle, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS it is deemed advisable to make new Orders for regulating the importation of animals into this Island.

Now I, the said Lieutenant-Governor, by and with the advice and consent of two members of the Council, and under and by virtue of the powers conferred upon me by the Cattle Diseases Prevention Acts, do hereby order as follows:—

Landing Regulations.

1. No animal shall be landed in this Island unless accompanied by a Permit issued by the Government Secretary, which Permit may contain such conditions as to quarantine and veterinary inspection as may at the time of

issue be considered desirable. An animal shall only be landed in this Island at the Port named in the Permit.

2. Animals landed under this Order and removed into the Government Lairs shall, while detained in such Lairs, be supplied with a proper and sufficient supply of food and water by the owners or consignees thereof.

3. The Superintendent of the Government Lairs shall have power to forbid persons entering the same without permission from himself.

4. The Superintendent of the Government Lairs shall keep in a book, to be provided for the purpose, a record of all animals moved into or out of the Lairs.

Animals Suffering from Tuberculosis.

5. Any animal removed to the Government Lairs, which, on being examined by the Government Veterinary Inspector, is found to be showing symptoms of tuberculosis, shall, at the option of the owner or consignee, either be at once removed from the Lairs to the nearest public abattoir and there slaughtered under inspection or sent back by such owner or consignee at his own expense to the port from which such animal was shipped.

Importation of Animals from Abroad.

6. It shall not be lawful to land in this Island any animal brought from any country or place outside the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and the Channel Islands.

7. It shall not be lawful to land in this Island—

(a) The carcase of an animal which has died or been slaughtered on board a vessel while in a port in any country outside the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and the Channel Islands, or during the passage from any such port to this Island or thereafter while in any port in this Island; or

(b) the dung of any such animal; or,

(c) any fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils used for or about any such animal unless they have been scraped and then thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water, and subsequently disinfected, and unless the permission of the Chief Constable has been obtained.

8. The Principal Officer of Customs and Excise in this Island, or any Officer of Police, may seize and detain any carcase, dung, fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils landed in contravention of this Order, and he shall forthwith report the facts to the Government Office with a view to the destruction or disposal of such carcase, dung, fittings, pens, hurdles, or utensils.

Interpretation.

9. In this Order,

“Government Lairs” means such place or places as the Lieutenant-Governor may from time to time appoint for the detention of animals under this Order.

“Animals” for the purpose of this Order means bulls, cows, oxen, heifers, calves, sheep, lambs, goats, and swine.

“Disease” for the purpose of this Order means cattle plague (that is to say, rinderpest, or the disease commonly called cattle plague), Contagious Pleuro-pneumonia of cattle, Foot-and-Mouth Disease, Sheep-pox, Sheep Scab, Swine Fever (that is to say, the

disease known as Typhoid Fever of Swine, Soldier, Purples, Red Disease, Hog Cholera, or Swine Plague), or Anthrax.

“Carcase” means the carcase of an animal, and part of a carcase, and the meat, flesh, bones, hide, skin, hoofs, horns, offal, or other part of an animal separately or otherwise, or any portion thereof.

Repeal.

10. The Orders in Council of the 29th day of January, 1907, the 16th day of April, 1907, the 4th day of June, 1907, the 4th day of January, 1909, the 18th day of October, 1910, the 1st day of July, 1912, the 12th day of February, 1913, the 20th day of July, 1914, the 6th day of August, 1914, and “The Animals (Importation) Order of 1915,” are hereby repealed.

Commencement.

11. This Order shall come into operation on the 9th day of July, 1917.

Short Title.

12. This Order may be cited as “The Animals (Importation) Order of 1917.”

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

No. 699 of the year 1917.

ENGLAND, EAST COAST.

River Humber and Approaches—Pilotage and Traffic Regulations.

Former Notice.—No. 482 of 1917; hereby cancelled.

Mariners are hereby warned that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and are now in force:—

1. That portion of the Humber which lies between two straight lines, drawn from shore to shore, as follows:—(1) a line drawn 225° (S. 61° W. Mag.) through Spurn lighthouse, (2) drawn 344° (North Mag.) from the east side of Barrow haven, will be referred to as the “port” in these regulations.

2. Shipowners and local agents are warned that their vessels should be directed to conform to the following regulations:—

(I.) Except under exceptional circumstances merchant vessels will be free to enter or leave the port during the hours of Official day.

(II.) Before entering the port merchant vessels must receive permission and the necessary instructions from the Examination steamer, and before leaving they must obtain permission through the Collector of Customs at Hull, Grimsby, or Goole, as the case may be.

(III.) Shipowners and local agents are advised to time the arrival of their vessels at the port for daylight.

(IV.) Vessels desiring to enter the port from seaward are, unless previously met by

the Examination steamer, to proceed to the Southern Examination anchorage (except during strong northerly or easterly winds, when they should proceed to the Northern Examination anchorage) and there anchor.

(V.) The Examination steamer will be met in the Examination area between Bull light-vessel and Chequer Shoal buoy.

The Examination steamer will be distinguished by the following means:—

By Day.—A white ensign, and at the foremast head the special flag mentioned in Part II. of Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 1 of 1917. When the port is closed 3 red balls will be hoisted in addition to the special flag.

By Night.—Three lights vertically, 3 feet apart, conspicuously displayed at the end of a yard so as to show an unbroken light round the horizon. When the port is closed these lights will be red, when it is open they will be white.

NOTE.—These lights are in addition to the ordinary navigation lights.

(VI.) There are two Examination anchorages. The northern is to be used in strong northerly and easterly winds. The southern is to be used under all other conditions.

The Northern Examination anchorage comprises those portions of Hawke road and Middle shoal included between the intersection of the following lines of bearing:—

(1) Skeffling church bearing 18° (N. 34° E. Mag.).

(2) Skeffling church bearing 4° (N. 20° E. Mag.).

(3) Spurn lighthouse bearing 120° (S. 44° E. Mag.).

(4) Extreme of Spurn point bearing 115° (S. 49° E. Mag.).

The Southern Examination Anchorage comprises the area bounded as follows:—

(1) On the north by the Bull sand.

(2) On the south by the three fathom contour line northward of Tetney haven.

(3) On the east by the line joining the Bull light-vessel and entrance to Tetney haven.

(4) On the west by a line parallel to and 7 cables from the eastern limit (3).

NOTE.—When the Southern Examination anchorage is full of shipping further arrivals should anchor eastward of and as near to it as possible.

The Examination area is that portion of the river enclosed by an irregular line drawn from the Bull light-vessel to the extreme of Spurn point, thence to the Chequer Shoal buoy, thence to a point 210° (S. 46° W. Mag.) of and distant 7 cables from Bull light-vessel and thence to Bull light-vessel.

3. All pilotage certificates granted to masters and mates for the whole or any part of the Humber Pilotage district are suspended and further all vessels (irrespective of draught, size, or nationality, but with the exception of those provided for in paragraph 4) bound to or from any place on the Humber must be conducted by licensed pilots over the whole or any part of the waters between Hull and the Outer Pilotage station of the Humber Pilotage district, which station, until further notice, will be situated in the neighbourhood of the Bull light-vessel.

4. In the case of lighter inter-dock traffic and of small British vessels engaged in local

traffic above Immingham, pilotage by licensed pilots is not compulsory.

5. During the hours of official night, and during fog with visibility of less than half-a-mile, no traffic is permitted to move on the Humber below Paull point _____

6. Every vessel shall endeavour to approach the Humber in sufficient time to enable such vessel to obtain a pilot and arrive at her destination, or at a position in which she is permitted to anchor, before the commencement of official night, but, should occasions arise when a vessel is delayed through unforeseen or unpreventable circumstances from arriving in time, she may approach the Examination steamer, from whom she will receive directions as to anchoring until the end of official night. The Examination steamer will be found in the neighbourhood of the "Bull" light-vessel after the commencement of official night. In the event of an incoming vessel being unable immediately to find the Examination steamer in these circumstances, she is to remain in the vicinity of the "Bull" light-vessel, but shall not cross the line drawn 225° (S. 61° W. Mag.) through Spurn lighthouse without permission. Outward bound vessels shall not pass Hawkins point later than 45 minutes before the commencement of official night.

7. Vessels when leaving the Humber must proceed direct to sea. Should it be necessary to wait for the weather to moderate or clear, they must remain inside the river at an authorised anchorage.

The pilot lobbies will be notified when the existence of fog outside the river is known.

8. All vessels proceeding into or out of the Humber must be navigated by way of Hawke and Sunk roads passing to the northward of the Bull light-vessel, except those outward-bound from Grimsby, which may cross the Middle shoal passing at once into the channel north of the Middle.

NOTE.—The five-fathom channel through the Sunk and Hawke roads is very narrow at the western entrance and also at a point north of the Middle light-vessel; deep-draught vessels steaming against the tide when approaching the buoys marking these portions of the channel should endeavour to avoid passing other vessels between them by easing engines to allow ships with the tide under them to get through first. Smaller vessels outward-bound should pass close to the southward of the buoys marking the south side, and those inward-bound close to the northward of the buoys marking the north side, of the narrow portions of the channel, provided always that their draught of water and the state of the tide will admit.

9. Sailing vessels of 50 tons register and upwards when entering or leaving the Humber must be towed through the Boom Defence gateways. Should tugs not be available, inward-bound vessels may anchor north-westward of the No. 2 Lower Middle light-float at a distance of not more than $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from it, but they must not bring the before-mentioned light-float to bear to the southward of 128° (S. 36° E. Mag.).

10. All vessels entering or leaving Grimsby docks must pass to the southward of the No. 4 Lower Burcom buoy except those making use of the channel southward of the Burcom shoal (hereinafter called the Burcom channel), which are exempted from this condition, but no vessel may cross the Burcom shoal between the

No. 5 Middle Burcom and No. 4 Lower Burcom buoys. Vessels using the Burcom channel must pass into and out of its western end to the eastward of No. 6 Upper Burcom buoy, and through a gateway at its eastern end 220 feet wide each side of which is marked by a dolphin surmounted by a black triangle supported on a white pole. No vessel is permitted to tow more than two craft at one time through this gateway.

Vessels making use of this gateway are cautioned to keep well in the middle of the opening, and are subject to the following regulations:—

(1) Vessels navigating against the tide must in all cases give way to those navigating with the tide.

(2) No vessel must approach the defences in this part of the river nearer than a quarter of a mile except to pass through the before-mentioned gateway or to enter or leave the docks or old outfall.

(3.) No vessel may tow more vessels at one time than she can safely navigate through the gateway, and under no circumstances is the tow to comprise more than two craft.

(4.) Distant signals will be shown from the flagstaff on the West Pier at the Grimsby Dock entrance as follows:—

(a) Two black balls will denote that the gateway is open.

(b) Three black balls will denote that the gateway is closed.

(c) No signal being hoisted denotes that traffic is suspended.

When signal (b) three black balls is hoisted, no vessel may approach the gateway, and when traffic is suspended no vessels, other than H.M. Ships on special duty, may use the gateway.

11. Prohibited Anchorage areas:—

(I.) Anchorage is prohibited for all vessels between two lines:—

(a) Joining Stone Creek Coast Guard flagstaff and the eastern extremity of the eastern jetty at Immingham.

(b) Joining the riverward beacon of the two centre measured mile beacons on Sunk island and the northernmost of two clumps shown southward of Stallingborough on Admiralty Chart No. 109. The latter line passes through the position of No. 6 Upper Burcom buoy.

(II.) No merchant vessel shall anchor (except when granted special permission) between the before-mentioned prohibited anchorage area (I.) and the line of transit of the eastern measured mile beacons on Sunk island produced to the Lincolnshire shore or (except as provided for in paragraph 9) to the northward of the line of the Killingholme leading lights or within $1\frac{1}{2}$ cables of any of the Admiralty mooring buoys.

(III.) Anchorage is prohibited between the following lines:—

(a) A line joining New Clee railway station and Patrington church.

(b) A line joining Middle light-vessel and No. 4 Lower Burcom buoy, extended to both banks of the Humber.

(IV.) Anchorage is prohibited to merchant vessels to the southward of a line joining No. 4 Lower Burcom buoy and Spurn lighthouse, or to the eastward of a line joining Cleethorpes

pier pavilion and Skeffling church, except so far as the Examination anchorages are concerned.

(V.) No vessel of any description may anchor on the south side of the Bull sand between the western limit of the Southern Examination anchorage described in paragraph 2 of this notice and a line drawn through the Cleethorpes Sewer outfall beacon (on which a red light is exhibited in peace time) in a direction 60° (N. 76° E. Mag.), passing through a point 299° (North-west Mag.) distant 7 cables from Spurn lighthouse; nor on the north side of the Bull sand between the before-mentioned line of bearing passing through the Cleethorpes Sewer outfall and a line joining Spurn lighthouse and the Bull light-vessel produced to the Bull sand; nor within 3 cables of the No. 4 Lower Burcom buoy.

12. No neutral vessel may lay alongside any of the piers or jetties in the Humber at night without special permission.

13. No merchant vessels or boats, etc., will be allowed to approach within a quarter of a mile of any defence work (except to pass through the Boom gateways or to enter or leave the old outfall or docks at Grimsby) or to go alongside any Government ship, vessel, lighter, or any other Government craft, or any Government establishment, without special permission. All vessels proceeding up and down the Humber are to pass at a distance at least three cables from H.M. Ships, if the depth of water and circumstances of navigation permit.

14. All vessels employed in laying moorings, raising wrecks, etc., must be passed at slow speed, propelling engines being eased at least 300 yards before reaching such vessels and so continued for 150 yards after passing them. While the said mooring or wreck raising craft are at work they will each fly a red flag.

15. Anchor lights are to be reduced in power and screened as prescribed in Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 581 of 1917.

Vessels anchored in the Humber westward of a line joining Cleethorpes pier pavilion and Skeffling church are to exhibit anchor lights as mentioned above, except that between Immingham and the before mentioned line they are to be reduced in brilliancy so as to be invisible at any greater distance than half-a-mile. Eastward of the line joining Cleethorpes pier pavilion and Skeffling church no lights whatever are to be exhibited.

This order will not absolve the Masters of craft at anchor from keeping a sharp look-out and giving warning on the approach of any craft under way.

Anchor lights authorised by these orders are never on any account to be extinguished; the order "Out Lights" will not apply to them.

Bow and masthead steaming lights are to be as prescribed in Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 581 of 1917.

Other lights are to be as prescribed in Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 581 of 1917, and this order also applies to vessels in dock or alongside quays and jetties. Notwithstanding anything in these orders, dredgers may be permitted to work at Hull and Immingham at night provided all their lights are extinguished within half-an-hour of issue of the general order "Out Lights."

The above orders apply to vessels of every description, other than H.M. ships. The latter

should, however, comply so far as the visibility of anchor lights eastward of Immingham is concerned.

16. No vessel is permitted to tow more than three craft at one time through a gateway of the Boom defence or more than two through the gateway in the Burcom channel described in paragraph 10. Owners of tugs may apply to the Humber Conservancy Board for pilot licences for the masters of their vessels which will enable them to pilot their own vessels and river craft comprising their tow (in certain parts of the river). The number of craft towed will be restricted according to the power of the tug.

17. Humber Rule No. 18 is to be strictly enforced. No sound signals other than navigation signals authorised by the Regulations for preventing Collisions at Sea, and by Humber Rules Nos. 14 to 16 (inclusive) at all times of the day or night, and No. 17 during the day only, are on any account to be used by vessels in any part of the Humber, the Old Harbour at Hull, or within any of the docks at Hull, Immingham and Grimsby.

18. Owners of small vessels plying in the vicinity of the Humber are instructed not to paint their craft light *grey*, and are hereby directed to have any vessels so coloured repainted. They are warned that small vessels painted *grey* run a great risk of being fired upon in mistake for submarines. Vessels painted *black* run the least risk.

19. Fishing in the Humber.—No vessel is allowed to fish in the Humber below Hull without a permit from the Admiralty port officer; all fishing, shrimping, trawling, or whelking in this portion of the river in areas other than those for which permits are granted is prohibited.

Pleasure boats will be granted fishing permits on application to the Admiralty Port Officer. The holding of these permits will remove the restriction as to the limits within which pleasure boats may ply for hire contained in the first portion of paragraph 20 below, provided they do so with the object of catching fish.

No registered fishing boat or mechanically propelled craft will be granted a pleasure permit except for the purpose of fishing.

No able-bodied professional fishermen or boatmen between the ages of 18 and 60 may be employed on land or sea in connection with any boat for which a pleasure permit has been issued.

Nothing in this notice will exempt vessels from any obligation to register or procure licences as now required by local authorities.

20. Regulations affecting small craft in the vicinity of Cleethorpes.—Pleasure boats may ply for hire at Cleethorpes only between the Eastern and Western Sewer Outfall beacons, and must keep within a distance of one mile from the shore, except under the conditions stated in paragraph 19.

Notwithstanding anything in these orders, rowing boats may pass along the shore at Cleethorpes, but they must keep within 400 yards of the high-water mark of spring tides.

21. Excursions by Water.—Excursions by water are limited to the River Humber above Hull, and Rivers Ouse and Trent. Excursion steamers will not be allowed to ply without a permit from the Admiralty port officer, Dock Offices, Immingham, and in no case are they to pass to the eastward of an imaginary line join-

ing Victoria Dock entrance, Hull, and the east beacon on Skitter Ness.

22. Patrol of Internal Waterways.—The internal waterways of the port will be policed by Naval patrol vessels and by the Humber Conservancy Board under the direction of the Naval authorities.

Captains and Masters of Merchant Vessels and persons in charge of barges or boats of any kind are hereby warned to observe any orders which may be given to them by Naval Patrol vessels or the duly authorised officers of the Humber Conservancy Board.

23. All instructions given by Officers in command of H.M. ships, Patrol vessels or Examination steamers, or the duly authorised officers of the Humber Conservancy Board, are to be implicitly and promptly obeyed even should they conflict with these orders.

24. Warning.—Warning is hereby given that vessels disobeying the above regulations will be liable to be fired on.

Variation.—16° W.

Note.—This Admiralty Notice to Mariners is a revision of the former Notice quoted above.

Caution.

This Admiralty Notice to Mariners is issued under the provisions of the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, and failure to comply strictly with the directions contained in it will constitute an offence against those Regulations.

Any person found guilty of such an offence is liable to severe penalties both of imprisonment and fine.

Any person aiding or abetting the commission of such an offence is himself guilty of an offence against the Regulations.

Attention is also drawn to the fact that any infringement of the directions contained in this Admiralty Notice to Mariners is liable to result in the detention of the ship or vessel.

Position.—At a distance of approximately 600 feet, 265° (N. 78° W. *Mag.*), from the eastern light-buoy (a).

Description.—A can light-buoy, painted in red and white chequers, exhibiting an *occulting red light every ten seconds*, thus:—

All vessels bound to or from Falmouth harbour must pass between the above light-buoys and maintain a course 0° (N. 17° E. *Mag.*) and 180° (S. 17° W. *Mag.*), respectively, for a distance of a quarter of a mile from the light-buoys.

Vessels approaching from the eastward, after passing the meridian of Penare head, must keep to the southward of the parallel of lat. 50° 03' N. before attempting to pass through the gateway.

Any instructions given by the Patrol vessels should be strictly observed. Vessels proceeding eastward must obtain instructions as to the route to be followed before attempting to leave the anchorage.

Inward-bound vessels will have priority over outward-bound vessels in respect of passage through the gateway. Vessels entering Falmouth harbour must close the Drifter, stationed about half a mile to the southward of the two light-buoys defining the gateway.

This Drifter regulates inward-bound and outward-bound traffic. When no signals are exhibited by day or night by this Drifter, inward-bound traffic may proceed to pass through the gateway.

To indicate that the gateway is clear for outward-bound vessels, the Drifter will display by day a black shape and by night two horizontal white lights.

During fog three long blasts on the steam whistle, repeated at intervals of five minutes, will indicate that the gateway is clear for outward-bound traffic.

When the gateway is clear for inward-bound traffic, no outward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the gateway; and when the signals indicate that outward-bound traffic may pass through the gateway, no inward-bound vessels may approach within half a mile of the gateway.

During the hours of darkness all vessels entering or leaving Falmouth harbour must exhibit their side-lights.

(2) *Penzance Bay—Light-Buoys established; Traffic Regulations.*

Former Notice.—No. 648 of 1917.

Two light-buoys have been established to mark a gateway in the approach to Penzance bay, as follows:—

(a) Eastern light-buoy:

Position.—At a distance of 14½ cables, 103° (S. 60° E. *Mag.*), from St. Paul church. Lat. 50° 05' N., long. 5° 30½' W.

Description.—A conical light-buoy, painted red, exhibiting a *flashing green light every five seconds*.

(b) Western light-buoy:

Position.—At a distance of approximately

600 feet, 270° (N. 73° W. *Mag.*), from the eastern light-buoy (a).

Description.—A can light-buoy, painted in red and white chequers, exhibiting an *occulting red light every ten seconds*.

All vessels bound to or from Penzance bay must pass between the above light-buoys and maintain a course 0° (N. 17° E. *Mag.*) and 180° (S. 17° W. *Mag.*), respectively, for a distance of a quarter of a mile from the light-buoys.

Vessels approaching from the eastward must keep to the southward of the parallel of lat. 50° 02' N. until reaching a position about 3 miles southward of the gateway, which should then be steered for. Any instructions given by the patrol vessels should be strictly observed.

Inward-bound vessels will have priority over outward-bound vessels in respect of passage through the gateway. Vessels entering Penzance bay must close the Drifter, stationed about half a mile to the southward of the two light-buoys defining the gateway.

This Drifter regulates inward-bound and outward-bound traffic. When no signals are exhibited by day or night by this Drifter, inward-bound traffic may proceed to pass through the gateway.

To indicate that the gateway is clear for outward-bound vessels, the Drifter will display by day a black shape and by night two horizontal white lights.

During fog three long blasts on the steam whistle, repeated at intervals of five minutes, will indicate that the gateway is clear for outward-bound traffic.

When the gateway is clear for inward-bound traffic, no outward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the gateway; and when the signals indicate that outward-bound traffic may pass through the gateway, no inward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the gateway.

During the hours of darkness, all vessels entering or leaving Penzance bay must exhibit their side-lights.

Before attempting to leave Penzance bay, outward-bound vessels must obtain instructions as to the route to be followed.
