In pursuance of the powers conferred upon Them by Section 2-of the Proclamation relating to Trading with the Enemy dated the 7th day of January, 1915, the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury hereby permit persons, firms, or companies resident, carrying on business, or being in the United Kingdom, notwithstanding anything contained in Section 1 of the said Proclamation, to enter into transactions in respect of banking business with the Salonika Branch of the Banque de Salonique.

This permission may be modified or revoked at any time by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury.

GERMAN CONTRABAND LIST.

The following is a translation of an Ordinance of the German Government revising this list:—

In further retaliation for the regulations adopted by England and her Allies, deviating

from the Declaration of London concerning the Laws of Maritime Warfare, I approve, for the present war, of the following alterations in the Prize Ordinance of September 30th, 1909, and in its supplements dated October 18th, November 23rd, and December 14th, 1914, April 18th, 1915, June 3rd and July 22nd, 1916, and January 9th, 1917.

Articles 21, 23 and 27 shall read as follows:—

- 21. The following articles and materials shall be considered contraband of war, with the designation absolute contraband:—
- (1) Arms of all kinds, including arms for sporting purposes, their component parts, as well as semi-manufactured articles which can be used in their manufacture.
- (2) Projectiles, cartouches and cartridges of all kinds, their component parts, as well as semi-manufactured articles which can be used for their manufacture.
- (3) Gunpowder and explosives of all kinds, smoke-producing and illuminating substances, incendiary matter, implements and substances for fighting with gas, and materials which can be used for their manufacture, including:—Nitric acid and nitrates of all kinds; ammonia,

ammonia liquor, ammonium chloride, ammonium salts; sulphur, sulphur dioxide, sulphite and thiosulphite, sulphuric acid, fuming sulphuric acid (oleum), carbon bisulphide; acetic acid, acetates, for example, acetate of calcium; acetic ether, formic acid and formic acid salts, formic ether, sulphuric ether; acetone; ethyl and methyl alcohol, spirit, sulphite spirit, crude wood spirit, alcohol of all sorts and its derivatives, as well as the products thereof; urea; resin, resinous products, camphor and turpentine (oil and spirit); carbide of calcium; cyanamide and its compounds; phosphorus and its compounds; chlorates and perchlorates of sodium, barium and calcium; chlorine, chlorhydrin; bromine; phosgene (carbonyl-chloride); stannic chloride; mercury; asphalt; mineral pitch; pitch; tar, including wood tar, wood-tar oil; benzol, toluol, xylol, solvent naphtha, phenol (carbolic acid), cresol, napthalene and their mixtures and derivatives; aniline and its derivatives; glycerine; dioxide of manganese; oxalic acid and oxalic acid salts.

- (4) Cannon barrels, gun mountings, limbers, munition wagons, field kitchens and bakeries, supply wagons, field forges, searchlights, searchlight accessories and their component
- (5) Range-finders and their component parts.
- (6) Binoculars, telescopes, chronometers, nautical and artillery intruments of all kinds.
- (7) Clothing and equipments of a recognisably military character.
- (8) Saddle, draught and pack animals, suitable at present or in the future for use in
- 9) All kinds of harness of a distinctively military character.
- (10) Articles of camp equipment and their component parts.

(11) Armour plates.

(12) Steel and iron wire; barbed wire, as well as implements for fixing and cutting the same.

(13) Sheets, tinned or galvanised.

- (14) Warships and other vessels of war, as well as component parts of such a nature that they can be used only on a vessel of war; ship plates and ship construction steel.
- (15) Submarine sound-signalling apparatus. (16) Airships and aeroplanes of all kinds and their component parts, together with accessories, articles and materials for use in connection with aerial navigation; goldbeaters' skin.

- (17) Photographic articles. (18) Tools and appliances designed exclusively for the manufacture and repair of arms and war material.
- (19) Lathes, machinery and tools used in the manufacture of munitions of war.
- (20) Electrical articles designed for use in
- war, and their constituent parts. (21) Mining timber, including undressed and partly dressed timber for mining purposes,

rattan, bamboo, cork, including cork flour.
(22) Coal and coke, including pitch coke

and petrol coke.

(23) Flax, hemp, jute, ramie, esparto grass, cocoa-nut fibre, kapok, vegetable fibres and yarns and rope-strands made therefrom.

(24) Wool and animal hair of all sorts; the same in its various stages of manufacture up to and including yarn, and the waste products of manufacture.

(25) Raw cotton, linters, cotton waste cotton yarns, cotton goods, rags, waste and artificial cotton.

(26) Barrels and tanks of all kinds and their

component parts

(27) Gold, silver, paper money, securities, negotiable trade papers, every kind of cheque, draft, order of payment, dividend coupons, interest and annuity certificates, letters of credit, of transfer and of advice, notifications of credit and debit or other documents which, whether in themselves or on completion or by virtue of any operation on the part of the recipient, empower, confirm or effect the transfer of sums of money, credits or securities.

28) Rubber tyres for motor vehicles, as well as all articles and materials used specially in manufacturing or repairing rubber tyres.

- (29) Rubber (including crude rubber, waste rubber, reclaimed rubber, rubber solution, rubber cement, or any other preparation containing rubber), balata and guttapercha, as well as the following kinds of rubber—viz., Borneo, Guayule, Jelutong, Palembang, and all other materials containing rubber; besides articles which are made in whole or in part of
- (30) Mineral oils (including shale oils, petroleum, benzine, naphtha, gasoline).

(31) Lubricants.

(32) Tanning material of all kinds, including quebracho wood and the extracts used

in tanning

(33) Hides of cattle, buffaloes and horses; hides of calves, pigs, goats and wild animals; and leather, dressed or undressed, if suitable for use in saddlery, harness, military boots and military clothing; beltings, hydraulic leather and pump leather.

(34) The following ores—Tungsten ores, molybdenite, manganese ore, nickel ore, chrome ore, zinc ore, lead ore, hæmatite iron ore, pyrites (crude and calcined), copper ores, cadmium ore, vanadium ore and cobalt ore.

(35) Aluminium, its alloys and compounds, argillaceous earth, bauxite.

(36) Arsenic and antimony, and their conpounds.

(37) Felspar, borax, boracic acid and other boric compounds, borax-bearing earths and

minerals (borax-lime and boraxite).

(38) The following metals: - Tungsten, molybdenum, vanadium, nickel, selenium, cobalt, hæmatite pig iron, manganese and its alloys, copper and its alloys, tin, lead, zinc; cadmium and its alloys; zirconium, cerium, thorium and their alloys and compounds; oxide zirconium, monazite sand; platinum, osmium, ruthenium, rhodium, palladium, iridium and their alloys and compounds

(39) Alloys of iron (ferro compounds), including tungsten, manganese, vanadium and

chrome iron.

- (40) Insulating material, raw and manufactured.
- (41) Silk of all kinds and silk stuffs; silk cocoons; artificial silk and goods made therefrom.
  - (42) All kinds of wax; sebacic acid.

(43) Quillaya bark.

(44) Talc, emery, corundum, carborundum and all other polishing materials, natural and artificial, and articles prepared therefrom. Diamonds for industrial purposes.

(45) Albumen.

(46) Glass and glass articles of every kind. All kinds of bottles.

- (47) Lime, chalk, chloride of lime, lead powder, soda and caustic soda.
  - (48) Strontium and barium salts.(49) Bone charcoal.
- (50) Graphite of all sorts whether in lumps or ground; graphite crucibles and the shards thereof, Atcheson's graphite, electrodes and fragments thereof.
- 23. The following articles and materials suitable for warlike as well as for peaceful purposes shall be considered as contraband of war under · the designation conditional contraband:-
- Foodstuffs.
   Forage and all kinds of feeding stuffs for animals; oil seeds, nuts and kernels; animal, fish and vegetable oils and fats, excluding those suitable as lubricants, and not including volatile oils; yeast.

(3). The following articles, if suitable for use war: articles of clothing, fabrics for clothing, footgear, skins and furs which can be used for clothing, boots and shoes.

(4) Vehicles of all kinds and their component parts, as well as accessories (especially all motor vehicles), suitable for use in war.

(5) Railway materials, both fixed and rolling stock, and materials for telegraphs, wireless telegraphs and telephones.

(6) Fuel, exclusive of coals, coke and mineral oils.

(7) Horseshoes and shoeing materials.

- (8) Harness and saddlery.
  (9) Ships, boats and floating craft of all kinds, floating docks and appliances for dry docks, as well as their component parts.
  (10) Cement.
- (11) All kinds of timber, rough or worked (especially hewn, sawn, planed, grooved), excepting mining timber, etc. [See article 21, cepting mining timber, etc. under (21).
- (12) Sponges, raw or prepared. (13) Glue, gelatine and materials used in their manufacture.
  - (14) Soap
  - (15) Paint for ships' hulls.
  - (16) Lac.
  - (17) Copper vitriol.
- (18) Lathes and such machines and tools as are used principally for the manufacture and repair of arms and war material.
  - 27. The following articles cannot be declared contraband of war:-
  - (1) Hops.
  - (2) Horns, bones and ivory.
- (3) Natural and artificial fertilisers in so far as specified substances have not already been expressly declared contraband.

(4) Earths, stone's including marble, bricks,

slates and roofing tiles.

- (5) Paper and the materials prepared for its manufacture, in so far as specified substances have not already been expressly declared contraband
- (6) Colours, including the materials exclusively used for their manufacture, with the exception of paint for ships' hulls; varnish.

(7) Sulphate of soda in cakes.

(8) Machinery specially adapted for agri-

culture and for printing.

- (9) Precious stones, excepting diamonds used for industrial purposes [see Article 21, under (44)]; semi-precious stones, pearls, mother of pearl and corals.
- (10) Steeple and wall clocks, timepieces and watches, excepting chronometers.

(11) Fashion and fancy goods.

(12) Feathers of all kinds.

(13) Articles of domestic furniture and decorative articles for domestic purposes; office furniture and appliances.

This Ordinance shall take effect from the day of its promulgation.

# Whitehall, August 4, 1917.

The KING was pleased, on Friday the 3rd instant, at Buckingham Palace, to present to Captain (then Second Lieutenant) William Leslie Coutts Rathbone, 15th Battalion, London Regiment, the Albert Medal of the Second Class, which had been conferred upon him by His Majesty for gallantry in saving life, as detailed below:

On the night of the 6th May, 1916, as a working party under Lieutenant Rathbone was proceeding down a communication trench, they were fired upon from close quarters. On enquiry Lieutenant Rathbone ascertained that the shots came from a soldier who had run amok, and had posted himself with loaded rifle and fixed bayonet further down the trench. tenant Rathbone borrowed a rifle and accompanied by Corporal Feldwick, advanced along the trench until in view of the mentally deranged man. They then advanced with rifles at the ready; the officer calling upon the man to surrender. Receiving no reply they then dropped their rifles and rushed him, and after disarming him took him to the nearest dressing

Corporal Feldwick, who is a prisoner of war, has also been awarded the Albert Medal of the Second Class.

(MISCEL-POLICE, FACTORIES, &c. LANEOUS PROVISIONS) ACT, 1916.

#### ORDER.

#### BLAST-FURNACE DUST.

The Minister of Munitions, in exercise of the powers conferred upon him by the Defence of the Realm Regulations, the Munitions of War Acts, 1915 and 1916, and all other powers thereunto enabling him, hereby orders as follows:—

- 1. No person shall buy, sell, deal in or dispose of any blast-furnace dust except under and in accordance with the terms of a License issued on behalf of the Minister of Munitions by the Controller of Potash Production.
- 2. No person shall treat any such dust so as to extract any component part thereof except under and in accordance with the terms of a License issued as aforesaid.
- 3. All persons producing or in possession of blast-furnace dust shall make returns in regard to rate of production, stocks, purchases, sales, dealings or other matters relating to blastfurnace dust in such form and at such times as may be required by the said Controller.
- 4. Samples of any blast-furnace dust produced by or in the possession of any person shall be furnished to the said Controller by such person in such form and quantity, and at such times as the said Controller may prescribe. Such samples shall be taken in such manner as

the said Controller or his authorised representative may prescribe.

- 5. For the purpose of this Order blastfurnace dust shall mean dust deposited or otherwise derived from the gases of any furnace used for treating ores for the production of iron or any of its alloys.
- 6. All applications in reference to the above Order should be made to the Controller of Potash Production, Ministry of Munitions, 117, Piccadilly, W.1.

# Ministry of Munitions, August 7th, 1917.

Order of the Minister of Munitions, revoking the Orders of the 9th day of May, 1917, and the 14th day of June, 1917, as to roadstone quarries.

Whereas, by an Order, dated the 9th day of May, 1917, the Minister of Munitions ordered that, from and after the date thereof until further notice, Regulation 9gg of the Defence of the Realm Regulations should be applied to all roadstone quarries throughout the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and whereas, by an Order, dated the 14th day of June, 1917, the Minister of Munitions ordered that, notwithstanding the said Order of the 9th day of May, 1917, Regulation 9cc should not be applied to any roadstone quarry outside England and Wales, or to any roadstone quarry, wherever situated, producing only gravel and flint used as road stone, and further ordered that the application of Regulation 9gg should be postponed until the 15th day of July, 1917, and whereas the Minister of Munitions is desirous of revoking the said Orders of the 9th day of May, 1917, and the 14th day of June, 1917, with a view to an Order being made by the Army Council in place thereof, now the Minister of Munitions, in exercise of the powers conferred upon him by Regulation 9cc and every other power enabling him in that behalf, hereby, as from the date hereof, revokes the said Orders of the 9th day of May, 1917, and the 14th day of June, 1917, and hereby gives notice that the same are so revoked.

#### ARMY COUNCIL ORDER.

Whereas under Regulation 9gg of the Defence of the Realm Regulations, which is set out at the foot of this Order, the Army Council has power to apply that Regulation to any road stone quarries, including slag dumps and slag works producing road materials.

Now, therefore, the Army Council, being of opinion that, for securing the public safety and the defence of the Realm, it is expedient that the said regulation should be applied to all road stone quarries, including such slag dumps and slag works as aforesaid, in England and Wales except as hereinafter mentioned, in the exercise of their powers under the said regulation do hereby order that from and after the date of this Order and until further notice Regulation 9gg of the Defence of the Realm Regulations shall be applied to all road stone quarries, including such slag dumps and slag works as aforesaid, in England and Wales, but excluding all quarries producing only gravel and flint used as road stone.

# Regulation 9gg.

- (1) Where the Minister of Munitions is of opinion that for securing the public safety and the defence of the Realm it is expedient that this regulation should be applied to any metalliferous mines, or to any mines of stratified iron stone, shale, or fire clay, not being coal mines, or to any quarries, he may by order apply this regulation, subject to any exceptions for which provision may be made in the order, to all or any of such mines or quarries, either generally or in any special area, or to any special mine or quarry.
- (2) Any mine or quarry to which this regulation is so applied shall by virtue of the order pass into the possession of the Minister of Munitions as from the date of the order, or from any later date mentioned in the order; and the owner, agent and manager of every such mine or quarry and every officer thereof, and where the owner of the mine is a company every director of the company shall comply with the directions of the Minister of Munitions as to the management and user of the mine or quarry, and if he |

fails to do so he shall be guilty of a summary offence against these regulations.

- (3) It is hereby declared that the possession by the Minister of Munitions under this regulation of any mine or quarry shall not affect any liability of the actual owner, agent or manager of the mine or quarry under the Coal Mines Acts, 1887 to 1914, or the Metalliferous Mines Regulation Acts, 1872 and 1875, or the Quarries Act, 1894, or the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, or any Act amending the same.
- (4) Any order of the Minister of Munitions under this regulation may be revoked or varied as occasion requires.
- (5) The Army Council may, as respects any road stone quarries, exercise the like powers as are by this regulation conferred on the Minister of Munitions, and the expression "road stone quarries" includes slag dumps and slag works producing road materials.

SCOTLAND NORTH-EAST COAST, ORKNEY AND SHETLAND ISLES.

Notice is hereby given that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have

been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and are now in force:—

(1) Pentland and Moray Forths—Restriction of Traffic—Pilotage Regulations.

The following regulations have been made with a view to safeguarding the interests of shipping in the Pentland and Moray firths:—

#### I.—RESTRICTION OF TRAFFIC.

- 1. No vessel, either British, Allied or Neutral, is to be in the shaded area indicated on the accompanying portion of Admiralty Chart No. 2, from half an hour after sunset to half an hour before sunrise, unless at anchor. No vessel, however, is to anchor:—
  - (a) Anywhere along the coast between Tarbet ness and North Sutor, except within one mile radius of Balintore;
  - (b) Anywhere off the south shore of the Moray firth between the meridians of Port Gordon and Burghead, except within three quarters of a mile of the low-water mark;

(c) Outside a distance of one mile of the coast in any other portion of the shaded area.

- 2. Vessels proceeding to ports in the Moray Firth should therefore endeavour to enter the firth in time to reach their destinations not later than half an hour after sunset. Should they not reach their destinations by that time, they are to anchor, weather permitting, subject to the restrictions given in clause 1.
- 3. Any vessel contravening the foregoing regulations will run the gravest risk of being sunk.

Caution.—Neutral or Allied vessels are particularly warned that the passage through the Pentland Firth presents very grave risks to a Westbound vessel and are strongly advised not to take it.

#### II.—PILOTAGE REGULATIONS.

1. Pilotage is compulsory at the ports of Cromarty and Inverness for all vessels (including fishing vessels) which have a draught of over eight feet, and it is highly dangerous for any vessel to enter or leave without a pilot. Fishing and other small vessels having a draught of over eight feet are to assemble at the Pilotage stations, and will be conducted into and out of port in groups.

Vessels bound for Cromarty and Inverness will be led through the defences from a position off Tarbet ness by a pilot boat. They should

follow directly astern of her.

Local arrangements for leading vessels through the defences will be made for vessels leaving Cromarty or Inverness.

2. It is dangerous for any vessel to be under way to the south-westward of a line joining Tarbet ness and Findhorn without a pilot.

3. No vessels of any description other than H.M. Ships and Auxiliaries are to be under way between sunset and sunrise in the waters contained between a line drawn from Tarbet ness to Findhorn, and a line drawn from Fort George to Chanonry point.

#### (2) Orkney Isles—Traffic Regulations.

#### I .- SCAPA FLOW AND APPROACHES.

1. All entrances are dangerous, and entry is absolutely prohibited by any of them except as provided in succeeding paragraphs.

2. Examination services have been estab-

lished in the entrances to Hoxa and Hoy sounds; vessels directed to enter must communicate with the Examination vessel and follow the instructions received from her very carefully.


3. No vessel is permitted to approach the entrance to Hoxa sound within a radius of 5 miles under any circumstances whatever, except when actually, ordered to Scapa Flow.

4. The only vessels permitted to enter Hoy sound from the westward are those ordered to Stromness.

enter or leave the Port of Kirkwall during hours of darkness, i.e., between half an hour after sunset and half an hour before sunrise, except in special circumstances with special permission from the Admiralty Port Officer.

4. During foggy and thick weather, traffic in and out of the port is stopped, and no vessel shall approach the boom from either direction.

5. No vessel (other than H.M. Ships) or boat shall move in the harbour during hours of darkness as aforesaid. And no boat other



5. Vessels are not permitted to enter Hoxa or Hoy sounds by night or in thick weather.

6. Passage through Cantick sound is entirely prohibited.

# II .- PORT OF KIRKWALL AND APPROACHES.

- 1. The Port of Kirkwall shall comprise all enclosed waters of the Wide Firth and Kirkwall bay to westward of Thieves holm.
- 2. Merchant vessels shall obey all orders given them by the Admiralty Port Officer as regards anchoring or shifting position.
  3. No vessel other than H.M. Ships shall

than those belonging to H.M. Ships shall approach the shore or go alongside any pier in the Port of Kirkwall.

6. All vessels other than H.M. Ships entering or leaving the Port of Kirkwall shall be piloted in and out by a Pilot drifter, and are prohibited from entering or leaving harbour unless so piloted, save and except only (1) in the case of such British vessels as have a written exemption therefrom, issued by the Admiralty Port Officer, (2) when a liner is entering the harbour the Pilot may at his discretion, when circumstances of tide and sea render it advisable, direct such liner to enter the harbour without being piloted, provided always that the gate is open for incoming traffic.

7. Vessels, when cleared, shall wait for the Pilot vessel to conduct them out of port, or proceed as directed by the Naval Authorities.

8. Drifters engaged on pilot duty will fly the pilot flag (white and red, horizontal).

9. Incoming and outgoing traffic will be regulated by signals hoisted at the yardarm of the Boom trawler, and repeated at Hellier holm lighthouse.

10. Traffic signals are to be strictly obeyed, and no vessel shall approach the entrance

against the signal.

11. The following Traffic signals will be displayed at the Boom and at Hellier holm:—

Gate "Open for Incoming Traffic":

By day—two balls, vertical.

By night—a red light.

Gate "Open for Outgoing Traffic":

By day—a cone, point upwards.

By night—a green light.

Gate Closed: By day—Three Balls at Hellier holm.

By night — Three red lights at Hellier holm.

12. Vessels entering will, as a rule, be given

priority over those leaving.

13. All outgoing vessels shall pass round the Turning buoy (red and white striped, spherical) moored approximately 285° (N. 56° W. Mag.), one mile from the entrance.

14. Incoming vessels will not pass round the Turning buoy, but will shape course as requisite

for the anchorage on entering.

15. No outgoing vessel shall pass the Turning buoy, unless the signal for outgoing traffic is up. If the signal is against it, such vessel shall stop and wait in the neighbourhood of the Turning buoy.

16. No incoming vessel shall pass Hellier holm, unless the signal for incoming traffic is up at Hellier holm. If the signal is against it, such vessel shall wait in Shapinsay sound.

17. Incoming and outgoing vessels shall not pass through the gate simultaneously. If, through any misunderstanding, an outgoing and an incoming ship are approaching the gate simultaneously, then the outgoing ship shall give way, and shall turn round, and return to the Turning buoy, and there wait till such time as the entrance is clear.

18. As a rule only one ship will be conducted out at a time, but under exceptional circumstances, in the event of two ships being conducted out, then the pilot will give instructions as to which ship is to go first, and the rear ship shall then keep a full half mile directly astern, and is on no account to close or overhaul or attempt to pass the ship ahead.

19. Caution.—Caution is necessary when approaching the boom, as the tidal stream does not set fairly through the opening, and attains considerable velocity, especially on the ebb or west-going stream, which sets in a north-

westerly direction.

Variation.—19° W.

# (3) Shetland Isles—Traffic of Neutral Vessels Prohibited.

No vessels other than those of British Nationality or those of the Allied Nations, except vessels calling for the purpose of Examination, shall enter any ports or harbours in, or anchor off any part of, the coasts of the Shetland Isles until further notice.

This Notice is a revision of the former Notices quoted above.

Special Acts (Extension of Time) Act, 1915: Extending Time for operation of Section 44 of the Keighley Corporation Act, 1912.

# BOROUGH OF KEIGHLEY.

WHEREAS by Section 44 of the Keighley
Corporation Act, 1912 (herein-after
referred to as "the Act of 1912"), it is provided that the powers of the Mayor, Aldermen,
