BY THE KING. A PROCLAMATION

IN ORDER TO THE ELECTING THREE PEERS OF SCOTLAND.

GEORGE R.I.

7 HEREAS the Right Honourable George, Earl of Haddington, Knight of Our Ancient and Most Noble Order Most Ancient of the Thistle, the Right Honourable John David, Earl of Leven and Melville, and the Right Honourable James Walter, Baron Torphichen, were duly elected and returned to be three of the Sixteen Peers of Scotland to sit in the House of Peers in the present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and are since deceased: In order to the Electing three Peers of Scotland to sit in their room, We do, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holyrood House, at Edinburgh, on Wednesday, the Tenth day of October, One thousand nine hundred and seventeen, between the hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to nominate and choose three Peers of Scotland to sit and vote in the House of Peers in this present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, in the room of the said George, Earl of Haddington, the said John David, Earl of Leven and Melville, and the said James Walter, Baron Torphichen, deceased, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and of the Proxies of such as shall be absent (such Proxies being Peers and producing a Mandate in Writing duly signed before Wit-nesses, and both the Constituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law); and the Lord Clerk Register and the Principal Clerk of the Session appointed by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to take the Votes of the said Peers, and immediately after such Election made and duly examined to certify the Names of the Peers so elected. and to sign and attest the same in the presence of the said Peers the Electors, and return such Certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain: And We strictly charge and command that this Our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns of Scotland, Ten Days at least before the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the said Peers to proceed on such Election.

Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace, this Twenty-fourth day of September, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and seventeen, and in the Eighth year of Our Reign.

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

The Defence of the Realm (Liquor Control) Regulations, 1915, and any Regulations amending the same shall be, and are, hereby applied to the area defined and specified in the Schedule hereto.

- "And whereas it is further provided by the said Act that Your Majesty may, by Order in Council, make such adaptations in the enactments relating to such powers and duties as aforesaid as may be necessary to make exercisable by the said Minister and his Officers the powers and duties of the said Authorities and their Officers, and may fix the time or times as from which the several powers and duties are to be transferred to the said Minister:
- "And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council bearing date the 6th day of February, 1917, to order that the date as from which the said powers and duties were to be transferred to the said Minister should be the 15th day of February, 1917:

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, inter alia, that all pay, wages, pensions, bounty money, grants, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Forces to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine, or to the Widow or any relative of a deceased Officer, Seaman, or Marine, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas His late Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Order in Council bearing date the 26th day of September, 1901, to sanction the grant, out of moneys provided by Parliament, of pensions and allowances to the Widows and Children of Seamen and Marines whose deaths are attributable to war-like operations:

"And whereas His late Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Order in Council bearing date the 20th day of March, 1905, to sanction the supplementing, out of Naval Funds, of the sum of £500 per annum provided out of the funds of Greenwich Hospital for allowances to the dependent Relatives, other than Widows and Children, of Seamen and Marines whose deaths are attributable to duty in the service of the Crown:

"And whereas we are of opinion that the pensions, allowances, and grants sanctioned in the said Orders are inadequate for cases arising out of the present War, that the whole cost of all pensions, allowances, and grants awarded by the Admiralty in such cases should be defrayed out of moneys provided by Parliament, and that it is desirable to extend the scope of the Regulations so as to provide benefits for certain dependants of deceased Seamen and Marines who, under previous Regulations, were not eligible for any pension, allowance, or grant:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, in cases arising out of the present War, to sanction, with effect from the 3rd August, 1914, except where a contrary intention is clearly expressed, the award of pensions, allowances, and grants, to the persons, on the scales, and subject to the conditions

specified in the annexed Schedule, without prejudice however to the validity of anything that may have been done prior to the date of the Order hereon under either of the aforesaid Orders, and provided further that any person who is eligible for, and has received, a pension, allowance, or other grant under the Order hereon shall not be eligible to receive concurrently, and in respect of the death of the same Seaman or Marine, a pension, grant, or allowance under either of the aforesaid Orders, except in so far as it may be otherwise provided in the annexed Schedule.

"And whereas it is provided in the annexed Schedule that the scale of pensions for Widows and Children specified therein shall have effect

from the 1st March, 1915, only:

"And whereas certain pensions in excess of the scale sanctioned by His late Majesty, by His Order in Council of the 26th September, 1901, have been granted to Widows and Children between the outbreak of the War, and the 28th February, 1915:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend also that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the grant of such pensions within the scale and subject to the conditions specified in the annexed Schedule.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals.

. Schedule.

REGULATIONS FOR THE AWARD OF PENSIONS, ALLOWANCES, AND GRANTS IN THE NATURE THEREOF, TO WIDOWS, CHILDREN, AND OTHER DEPENDANTS OF DECEASED SEAMEN AND MARINES IN CASES ARISING OUT OF THE PRESENT WAR.

"1. Pensions, Allowances, and Gratuities may be granted by the Admiralty to the Widows, Children and other Dependants of Non-Commissioned Officers and Men of the Royal Navy and Marines, and the Reserve Forces, subject to fulfilment of the following conditions:—

(a.) That the man be killed or drowned

while on duty during the War.

(b.) That the death be due to wounds or injuries sustained on duty, whether it occurs before or after the cessation of duty, provided it occur within 7 years of removal from duty.

(c.) That the death be due to disease medically certified to have been contracted or to have developed on duty, whether it occur before or after the cessation of duty, provided it occur within 7 years of removal from duty.

"2. A Pension, Allowance, or Gratuity will not be granted in any case in which the death of a man was due to his own culpable action or negligence, or in the case of a Widow who was not married to the man before he sustained the injury or before he was discharged from the Service on account of the disease which caused his death.

"3. In any case in which the provision made by way of Separation Allowance and Allotment, or Alloment only, during the life-time of a Seaman or Marine continues to be paid after his death to a person who is eligible for a pension, allowance, or gratuity under these Regulations, such pension, allowance, or gratuity shall not be payable until the cessation of such provision.

"4. Scale of pensions for Widows and Children as from the 1st March, 1915:—

Additions for each Child in excess of two:—2s. a week for all Classes. Addition when the Widow attains the age of 35:—2s. 6d. a week for all Classes. Further addition when the Widow attains the age of 45:—2s. 6d. a week for all Classes. If the Children be Motherless, or if through misconduct their Mother either has not been awarded a pension, or has forfeited her pension after award, and the Children are removed from her control, a pension of 5s. a week may, at the discretion of the Admiralty, be granted in respect of each Child.

- "5. If a Widow remarries, her pension will cease, and she may be granted a gratuity equal to twice the annual value of the pension in course of payment at the time of such remarriage, or if, at the time of remarriage, there shall be no pension in course of payment by reason of the fact that the Widow is still in receipt of a weekly payment equal to the provision made for her by way of Allowance Allotment Separation and during her Husband's life, the gratuity shall be calculated at twice the annual value of the pension appropriate to her age at the date of remarriage, and her Husband's Rank or Rating at the time of his death. Such gratuity may be paid in one sum, or by instalments, in such manner as may, in the discretion of the Admiralty, be considered advisable, and shall be in full discharge of all claims upon the public bounty.
- "6. Children's pensions may be continued unless, in consequence of the Widow's remarriage, they become eligible for Separation Allowance, in which case the pensions will cease to be payable during their eligibility for such Allowance.
- "7. Widows shall be required to make a declaration quarterly, or whenever it may be considered necessary, before a duly authorized person, as to their continued Widowhood, and as to any particulars required in reference to their Families.
- "8. If the claim of a Widow to a pension be not established before her death, the amount of the pension to which she would have been entitled, if living, will not be allowed to her Representatives.
- "9. The term 'Children' for the purpose of these Regulations may include Stepchildren, ex-nuptial Children, adopted Chil-

dren, and foster Children, and shall denote Children of either sex under the age of 16 years.

"10. When, owing to death of a child, or owing to its attaining the age limit, it is necessary to reduce the amount of the pension in course of payment for the benefit of a Family which includes more than one Child, the reduction shall be at the lowest rate, so that at least 5s. a week shall be paid as long as there is a Child eligible for a pension, and at least 8s. 6d. a week while there are two Children eligible for pensions.

"11. Payment of pensions awarded in respect of Children may, at the discretion of the Admiralty, be continued after they have attained the age of 16 years until they attain the age of 21 years on the recommendation of the Local Education Authority, in the cases of Apprentices receiving not more than nominal wages or of Children being educated at Secondary Schools, Technical Schools, or Universities. Such payments may also be continued until the Children attain the age of 21 years should they be unable, by reason of bodily or mental infirmity, to contribute to their own support.

"12. A pension may also be awarded, at the discretion of the Admiralty, on the same grounds in respect of a Child over the age of 16, but under the age of 21, if at the time of the Father's death a Separation Allowance was being paid, and had not been discontinued before the date on which the pension became

due.

"13. If parish relief is afforded in respect of a Widow or Child the pension or allowance may, under such conditions as shall from time to time be laid down, be applied in whole or in part towards satisfying the claims of the Parish Authorities.

OTHER DEPENDANTS.

Gratuities and Allowances.

"14. For the purposes of this part of this Schedule:—

- (a) A "Dependant" of a deceased Seaman or Marine means any Person, whether a Member of his Family, or Household, or otherwise related to him or not, whom he supported, or to whose support he contributed for a reasonable period before mobilization if he was then in the Service, or before his entry into the Service, if later in date, and also (in either case) subsequently to mobilization or entry until the date of his death
- (b) "Dependent" bears a meaning corresponding with the meaning of "Dependent."
- (c) "Pre-war dependency" means the ascertained weekly amount or value of the contribution made by a deceased Seaman or Marine towards a Dependant's support during the period before mobilization if the Seaman or Marine was then in the Service, or before his entry into the Service, if later in date.
- (d) "Means of support" or "Means" include earning power, contributions from Members of the Family or Household, or from other Relatives, Old Age Pensions, and all other income except casual and precarious charitable gifts; but in estimating the earning power of a Woman regard shall be had to the due performance of her domestic duties, if any.
- (e) "Incapable of self-support" means incapable of self-support by reason of age or bodily infirmity, or (in the case of a Woman having Children or aged or infirm Persons in her care) by reason of domestic duties.
- (f) "Child" and "Children" bear the same meanings as in the earlier part of this Schedule.
- (g) "Wholly Dependent" includes "Substantially Dependent" in cases where the Dependant's other means of support were of a triffing amount or exceptionally precarious.
- "15. The Admiralty may, at their discretion, grant to any Dependent of a deceased Seaman or Marine, either an allowance or a gratuity within the limits of amount, and on the conditions expressed, in this Schedule, but
 - (a) No allowance or gratuity is to be paid to any Dependant of a deceased Seaman or Marine if any pension is granted under these Regulations to his Widow or any Child of his, except that an allowance may be awarded to a Woman who was wholly dependent upon the deceased, although pensions are also awarded in respect of his Children
 - (b) Except as otherwise expressly specified in the order hereon, no allowance shall in any case be granted to any Dependant of a deceased Seaman or Marine if a gratuity is granted under these Regulations on his account to any of his Dependants, and
 - (c) If allowances or gratuities are granted to two or more Dependants of a deceased Seaman or Marine on his account, the aggregate weekly amount, for the time being, of the allowances so granted, or the aggregate total amount of the gratuities so granted, as

the case may be, shall not exceed the maximum amount that might have been granted by way of weekly allowance, or by way of gratuity, as the case may be, if a grant had been made to one only of his Dependants.

(d) An allowance or gratuity shall not, unless exceptionally, be awarded to a Dependent who was not in receipt of a Separation Allowance during the life of the Seaman or Marine, and no award shall have effect from a date earlier than 1st October, 1914.

Gratuities.

"16.—(a) A gratuity shall not exceed the greater of the two following amounts, viz.:(1) the amount for one year of the Separation Allowance and Allotment (if any) in force at the death of the deceased Seaman or Marine in favour of the Dependant to whom the gratuity is granted, or (2) the pay of the deceased Seaman or Marine for one year at the rate in force at his death.

(b) A gratuity may be granted to any Dependant though he is not necessitous, and may, at the discretion of the Admiralty, be made payable by weekly or other instalments.

ALLOWANCES TO DEPENDANTS.

Generally.

"17. Subject to the provision of Clauses 18 to 23 of these Regulations in cases to which those Clauses apply:—

(a) No allowance shall be granted except to a Dependant whose other means are insufficient, and who is wholly or partially incapable of self-support as defined in Clause 14 (c) of these Regulations

14 (e) of these Regulations.
(b) The maximum rate of allowance shall be 5s. per week or the pre-war dependence of the Dependant, whichever is the lesser rate.

(c) An allowance may be reviewed by the Admiralty and either temporarily or permanently reduced whenever the other means or capacity for self-support of the Dependant improve, and shall be discontinued if the Dependant's other means become sufficient, or if the Dependant ceases for any reason to be incapable of self-support.

SPECIAL ALLOWANCES TO PARENTS.

"18. The maximum allowance that may be granted to a Parent of a deceased Seaman or Marine (whether the deceased was of legitimate or illegitimate birth) shall be 5s. per week, or the lesser of the following amounts if in excess of 5s. per week, namely:—

(a) The lowest rate of Widow's pension appropriate to the deceased Man's Rank after deducting the ascertained weekly value or amount of the Parent's other means of support, and

(b) The pre-war dependency of the Parent after making the like deduction:

Provided that in estimating the other means of support of a Parent who was wholly dependent upon the deceased, and who is not in fact earning any income, the Admiralty may disregard the possible earning power of the Parent, and, except in the case of a wholly dependent Parent, an allowance exceeding 5s. per week shall not take effect from a time earlier than the 18th August, 1916.

"19. An allowance granted to a dependent Parent may be reviewed, and either temporarily or permanently reduced, by the Admiralty whenever his or her other means of support improve, and shall be discontinued if his or her other means become adequate.

SPECIAL PROVISIONS FOR WHOLLY DEPENDENT Women and Children.

"20. The maximum rate of allowance that may be granted to a Woman who was wholly dependent upon the deceased (not being a Woman to whom Clause 21 applies) shall be 5s. a week, or (if her other means of support are less than 5s. per week) such weekly amount as will make up the other means of support to 10s. per week, but otherwise Sub-Clauses (a) and (c) of Clause 17 of these Regulations shall

apply to any such Woman.
"21. A Woman who was wholly dependent upon the deceased Seaman or Marine and has in her care any Child or Children may, if and so long as her other means are insufficient for her support, be granted an allowance at a rate not exceeding 10s. per week for as long as any such Child or Children remain in her care. Thereafter she may be granted an allowance under Clause 20 of these Regulations if quali-

fied under that Clause.

"22. An allowance or gratuity awarded to a Woman under the preceding Clause may, at the discretion of the Admiralty, and whether or not any pension is granted in respect of any other Child or Children of the deceased, be supplemented in respect of any Child or Children in her care to the same extent as the pension of a Widow in respect of a Child or Children under Clause 4 of these Regulations, but so that the total amount paid by way of pension or allowance on account of any deceased Seaman or Marine in respect of Children shall not exceed the amount which would have been permissible if all the Children had formed a single Family, and such Child or Children, in the event of the death of the Woman either before or after the decease of the Seaman or Marine, or in the event of their removal from the Woman's care for any cause, may be treated in all respects as though they were Children within the meaning of the said Clause.

Separated Wives.

"23. Where a deceased Seaman or Marine leaves a wife living apart from him who was either dependent upon him, or entitled to the benefit of a magistrate's or other competent maintenance order against him, whether obeyed by him in his lifetime or not, the Admiralty may, if no pension is awarded to her under these Regulations, award her, while she remains his widow, and without regard to her other means, an allowance of less amount not exceeding, as the case may be, the amount of her pre-war dependency, or the amount payable under the order, and such an allowance may be awarded whether or not she has any Child or Children in respect of whom a pension or allowance iş awarded.

GENERAL.

"24. In the event of an allowance awarded to a Dependant . nder any of these Regulations except Clause 22 ceasing or being discontinued for any cause other than the death or misconduct of the Dependant, the Admiralty may, at its discretion, award to such De-pendant a terminal gratuity equivalent to the payment of 26 additional weekly instalments of the allowance in course of payment, or alternately, if more advantageous to the Dependant, a gratuity of such amount as, when added to the total sum paid by way of allowance, will be equal to the total amount which might have been paid to the Dependant by way of gratuity on the death of the deceased if no

allowance had been granted.
"25. Any person in receipt of a pension or allowance may be required to make a declaration quarterly, or whenever it may be considered necessary, regarding his or her own circumstances or any particulars required in reference to his or her Family, and the pension or allowance may be temporarily or permanently reduced or discontinued accordingly.

"26. A Dependant to whom a gratuity may have been awarded under Clause 13 of the Regulations sanctioned under Order in Council dated the 9th October, 1903, shall not thereby be excluded from any benefit under these Regulations, but in determining the amount of the allowance, if any, payable under these Regulations, and the date from which it should have effect, the amount of the gratuity will be

taken into consideration.

"27. All pensions, allowances, and gratuities are tenable subject to good behaviour, and are granted at the discretion of the Admiralty. They cannot be claimed as a right. assignment, sale, or contract relating to a pension, allowance, or gratuity, is void. If the grantes of a gratuity dies before all the instalments fall due the Admiralty may pay the outstanding instalments to such person or persons as they may think proper, and may, at their discretion, cancel such instalments.

"28. The Admiralty may, at their discretion, award, in lieu of a pension or allowance under the foregoing Regulations, a lump sum not exceeding the amount of one year's pay of a deceased Man to any Widow or other Dependant who is not of British origin."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to Majesty, having approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Parliament and Local Elections Act, 1917, shall extend to the Isle of Man adapted as set out

below:

 For the purpose of postponing Local Elections the Local Elections (Isle of Man) Act, 1916, and the enactments referred to therein. and Section 1 of the Elections and Registration (Isle of Man) Act, 1915, as amended in the consolidated form in the Schedule to this Act,

shall be deemed to be incorporated in this Act.

2. This Act may be cited as "The Local Elections (Isle of Man) Act, 1917."

Schedule.

THE LOCAL ELECTIONS (ISLE OF MAN) ACT, 1916, AND THE ENACTMENTS REFERRED TO THEREIN, AND SECTION 1 OF THE ELECTIONS AND REGISTRATION (ISLE OF MAN) ACT, 1915, IN A CONSOLIDATED FORM.

(1) The next statutory elections of Members shall, subject to the limitation hereinafter contained, be postponed, or, in the case of elections already postponed under the Elections and Registration (Isle of Man) Act, 1915, or the Local Elections (Isle of Man) Act, 1916, further postponed for a year; and the term of office of the existing Members shall accordingly be extended, or further extended, by one year.

This provision shall apply only where the next statutory election (whether a postponed election or not) would take place before the

1st day of November, 1918.

(2) The provisions of this Schedule may be applied, if necessary, to the election, appointment, or co-optation of the Chairman. Vicechairman, elective Auditors, or Members of any kind of Local or other Body or Committee thereof, by order of the Lieutenant-Governor.

(3) Any provisions of any Act or Order or Regulations relating to any such Member shall be construed as if they were modified in such a manner as to give effect to the provisions of this Schedule, and the Lieutenant-Governor, if any question arises, may by order specify the actual modification which is to be made in pursuance of this Schedule.

(4) Any enactment making the payment of a fine a condition of resigning any office shall not have effect so as to require the payment of a fine in the case of a Member who resigns any office after the date on which his term of office would, but for the provisions of this Schedule,

have expired.

(5) Where at the date on which, but for the provisions of this Schedule, the next statutory election would take place of Members there is a vacancy amongst those Members that vacancy may be filled by means of the choice by the Council, Body or Committee of a person to fill the vacancy, and any person chosen to fill the vacancy shall hold office in the same manner in all respects as though his predecessor had remained in office until the date when the vacancy was filled.

(6) The Elections and Registration (Isle of Man) Act, 1915, shall be deemed to have had effect so as to extend by 3 years in all cases the term of office of an Alderman of a Municipal

Borough.

(7) For the purposes of this Schedule the expression "statutory election" means an election to fill the place of Members retiring on the expiration of their term of office, and the expression "Existing Members" means Members who are in office at the time when the next retirement of Members after the passing of this Act would, but for this Act, have taken place.

(8) The register of voters, under the House of Keys Election Acts, the Douglas Municipal Corporation Act, 1895, and the Local Govern-ment (Registration of Voters and Election by Ballot) Act, 1904, in force at the time of the passing of this Act shall remain in force until Parliament provides for special registers being made or otherwise directs, and the Act making such provisions shall have been extended to the

(9) In this Act the expression "Board" shall mean the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the Borough of Douglas, the Commissioners of a Town, the Commissioners of a Village District, the Commissioners of a Parish District, a Higher Education Board, a School Board, the Board of Guardians of the Poor of any District, and any other Board or Body to which this Act may be applied by the Lieutenant-Governor, and the expression "Member " or " Members " shall mean a Member or Members of a "Board."

Omit Paragraphs 1 and 3, and Paragraph 2

except Sub-paragraph (6).

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said New Parish of Saint John, Moordown, and of the New Parish (sometime District) of Saint Stephen, Bournemouth, in the said County and Diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the Schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several Churches of such New Parishes:

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said New Parish of Saint John, Moordown, and of the said New Parish of Saint Stephen, Bournemouth, should be formed into a Consolidated Chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said Church of Saint Luke, Bournemouth, situate as aforesaid:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Stuart, Bishop of Winchester, as such Bishop, and also as the Patron in right of his See of the Vicarage of the said New Parish of St. John, Moordown, and as one of the Patrons of the Vicarage of the said New Parish of Saint Stephen, Bournemouth, and with the consents of the Rev. Walter Lock, Doctor of Divinity, the Warden of Keble College, Oxford, the Right Honourable Hugh Richard Heathcote Cecil, a Member of Your Majesty's Commons House of Parliament, commonly called Lord Hugh Cecil, the Reverend William Charles Edmund Newbolt, a Canon of the Cathedral Church of Saint Paul in London, and Sir John Walter Buchanan Riddell, of Hepple, Rothbury, in the County of Northumberland, Baronet, one of Your Majesty's Justices of the Peace, as the remaining Patrons of the said Vicarage of the New Parish of Saint Stephen, Bournemouth, (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this Representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical

Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said New Parish of Saint John, Moordown, and of the said New Parish of Saint Stephen, Bournemouth, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the Map or Plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one Consolidated Chapelry for the said Church of Saint Luke, Bournemouth, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'the Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Luke, Bournemouth.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal Consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal Wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Luke, Bournemouth, comprising:—

"(1) All that portion of the New Parish (sometime District) of Saint John, Moordown, in the County of Southampton, and in the Diocese of Winchester, which is bounded upon the west by the New Parish of Saint Andrew, Kinson, in the County of Dorset, and in the Diocese of Salisbury, upon the south-west partly by the New Parish (sometime District) of Saint Stephen, Bournemouth, and partly by the New Parish of Saint Augustin, Bournemouth, both in the said County of Southampton, and Diocese of Winchester, upon the south-east by the said New Parish of Saint Augustin, Bournemouth, upon the east by the of Saint Consolidated Chapelry Bournemouth, in the said County of Southampton, and Diocese of Winchester, and upon the remaining side, that is to say, upon the north, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Alban, Bournemouth, from the said New Parish of Saint John, Moordown, at the junction of Somerley Road with Green Road, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of Green Road for a distance of 10 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Bemister Road, and extending thence northward along the middle of Bemister Road for a distance of 1½ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Calvin Road, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of Calvin Road for a distance of 17 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Wimborne Road, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Wimborne Road for a distance of 7 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Privet Road, and extending thence first westward, and then north-westward, along the middle of Privet Road for a distance of 13 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Edge Hill Road, opposite to a proposed new road leading north-westward, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the course of such proposed new road for a distance of chains or thereabouts to its northern end, at its junction with another proposed new road leading south-westward and crossing Bengal Road near its northern end, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the course of the last-mentioned proposed new road for a distance of 181 chains or thereabouts to the point where it meets the eastern side of

the road leading from Redhill Common to Wither Moor, upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint John, Moordown, from the said New Parish of Saint Andrew, Kinson, and the said County of Southampton

from the said County of Dorset.

"(2) And also all that contiguous portion of the said New Parish of Saint Stephen, Bournemouth, which is bounded upon all sides as follows: -that is to say, upon the south-east by the said New Parish of Saint Augustin, Bournemouth, upon the north-east and upon the north by the above described portion of the said New Parish of Saint John, Moordown, upon the north-west by the said New Parish of Saint Andrew, Kinson, and upon the south by the middle of the Bournemouth Junction Line of the London and South-Western Railway, thereby for the greater part following the existing boundary which divides the New Parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Bournemouth, situate partly in the said County of Southampton, and partly in the said County of Dorset, and wholly in the said Diocese of Winchester, from the said New Parish of Saint Stephen, Bournemouth."

And whereas the said Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London

Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar

of the said Diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a District Chapelry should be assigned to the said Church of Saint Luke, Worsborough Common, situate as aforesaid:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Leonard Hedley, Bishop of Sheffield, (testified by his having signed and sealed this Representation) we, the said Lcclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said New Parish of Saint Thomas, Worsborough Dale, which is described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the Map or Plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a District Chapelry to the said Church of Saint Luke, Worsborough Common, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Luke, Worsborough Common.

And with the like consent of the said Leonard Hedley, Bishop of Sheffield, (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marbaptisms, churchings, and should be solemnized or performed at the said Church of Saint Luke, Worsborough Com-mon, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the Minister of the same Church for the time being: Provided always that so long as the Reverend William Banham, Clerk in Holy Orders, and an Honorary Canon of the Cathedral Church of Sheffield, the present Vicar or Incumbent of the Vicarage of the said New Parish of Saint Thomas, worsborough Dale, shall continue to be such Vicar or Incumbent, all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication, solemnization, or performance at the said Church of Saint Luke, Worsborough Common, situate as aforesaid, shall be paid over by the Minister thereof to the said William Banham: and Provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism, or for the registration thereof.

TOTICE is hereby given, that the Urban District Council of West Bridgford, on the 14th day of September, 1917, made the following Bye-laws in connection with their Motor Omnibuses, and that application is intended to be made to the Board of Trade for their confirmation:

WEST BRIDGFORD URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Motor Omnibus Undertaking. Bye-Laws and Regulations.

At a meeting of the West Bridgford Urban District Council, duly convened and held at

the Public Offices in the said district on Friday, the 14th day of September, 1917, in pursuance of notice for that purpose duly given, the following Bye-laws and Regulations were made with respect to the Motor Omnibuses of the said Council, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon the said Council by the Tramways Act, 1870, that is to say:-

WEST BRIDGFORD URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Bye-laws and Regulations made by the West Bridgford Urban District Council, with respect to the Motor Omnibuses of the said Council, under powers of the Tramways Act, 1870.

- 1. The Bye-Laws and Regulations hereinafter set forth shall extend and apply to all carriages of the Council, and to all places with respect to which the Council have power to make Bye-laws and Regulations.
- 2. Every passenger shall enter or depart from a carriage by the hindermost or Conductor's platform, and not otherwise.
- 3. No passenger shall smoke inside any carriage, and no person shall spit in, on, from or against any carriage.
- 4. No passenger or other person shall, while travelling in or upon any carriage, play or perform upon any musical instrument.
- 5. A person in a state of intoxication shall not enter or mount upon any carriage, and if found in or upon any carriage, may be immediately removed by, or under the direction of the Conductor.
- 6. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language, whilst in or upon any carriage, or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any carriage, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.
- 7. No person shall wilfully cût, tear, soil, or damage the cushions or the linings, or remove or deface any number-plate, printed or otherwise in or upon the carriage, or break or scratch any window of or otherwise wilfully damage any carriage. Any person acting in contravention of this Regulation shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by these Bye-laws and negulations, in addition to the liability to pay the amount of any damage done.
- 8. A person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the Conductor of a carriage, soil or injure the linings or cushions of any carriage, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, or a person who in the opinion of the Conductor might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not be entitled to enter or remain in or upon any carriage, and may be prevented from entering or mounting any carriage, and shall not enter or mount any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the Conductor, and if found in or upon any carriage, shall, on request of the Conductor, leave the carriage, upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned.

Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the Conductor or other duly authorised officer of the Council, the fare legally demandable for the journey.

10. Each passenger shall show his Ticket (if any) when required so to do, to the Conductor or any duly authorised servant of the Council, and shall also when required so to do, either deliver up his ticket or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled over by such passenger.

11. No person shall evade or attempt to

evade payment of the legal fare.

12. Personal or other luggage (including the tools of artizans, mechanics, \mathbf{and} labourers) shall only be placed on the front of the carriage, or driver's platform, and not in the interior or upon the roof of any carriage. Provided, however, that the driver may refuse to carry anything that in his opinion would interfere with the safe handling of the carriage.

13. No passenger or other person not being a servant of the Council shall travel on the steps or platforms of any carriage, or stand on the upper deck, or sit on the railing, guards, or buffers of any carriage, and any person so travelling, standing or sitting shall cease to do so immediately on request by the Conductor.

14. No person shall hold or hang on by or to any part of any carriage, or travel therein or thereon otherwise than on a seat provided for passengers, except in the interior of the carriage with the consent of the Conductor.

15. When any carriage contains the full number of passengers which it is licensed to contain, no additional person shall enter, mount or remain in or on any such carriage when warned by the Conductor not to do so.

16. No person shall enter, mount or leave

any carriage whilst in motion.

17. No person shall enter or mount, or attempt to enter or mount any carriage, arriving or standing at a terminus or stopping place, until such passengers as may be upon the carriage and desire to dismount, shall have had

reasonable opportunity to dc so.

18. No person shall take a dog or other animal into a carriage. Any dog or other animal found to be inside any carriage shall be removed by the person in charge of such dog or animal from the carriage immediately upon request by the Conductor, and in default of compliance with such request, may be removed by, or under the direction of the Conductor.

19. No person shall travel in or upon any

carriage with loaded firearms

20. No passenger shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the Council in the execution of his or her duty upon or in connection with any carriage of the Council.

21. The Conductor shall enforce these Byelaws and Regulations and prevent the breach

thereof to the best of his or her ability.

22. Any person offending against or committing a breach of any of these Bye-laws or Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceed-

ing forty shillings.
23. The expression "Conductor" shall include any officer or servant in the employment of the Council and having charge of a carriage. The expression "Carriages" means the Omnibuses of the Council used for the conveyance of passengers.

24. There shall be placed and kept placed in a conspicuous position inside of each carriage in use a printed copy of these Bye-laws and Regu-

25. These Bye-laws shall come into force on the 1st day of December, 1917.
