A PROCLAMATION.

For Encouraging Mariners, Seamen and Landmen, to Enter themselves on Board Their Majesties Ships of War.

E being destrous to give all due Encouragement to all such able Seamen as have not been in Our Service the last Year, or being in the Service best but regularly Discharged therefrom. and also to able bodied Landmen, who shall voluntarily Enter themsslues in Our Service, and remain on Board Our Ships of War in Our Royal Navy, have thought sit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to Publish this Our Ryal Proclamation; And We do hereby Promise and Declar, That all Seamen and able-bodied Landmen, who shall not between the Twentieth Day of this Instant December, and the Twentieth Day of this Instant December, and the Twentieth Day of January next, Voluntaily Enter themselves, and remain on Board any of Our Ship if War, or Fire-Ships, or on any Press-Vessels or Tendosblunging to Our Fleet, shall receive as of Our Free Gistand Ryal Bounty, the respective Allowances or Rewards subside Bounty, the respective Allowances or Rewards subside Pay, and each able-bodied Landman One Months Pay, to be Paid to them by or before the Twentieth Day filming, viz. Each able and ordinary Seaman Three Musts Pay, and each able-bodied Landman One Months Pay, to be Paid to them by or before the Twentieth Day of March next, and if any Ships [hall be fent Abroad, the Must feath next, and if any Ships [hall be Paid before the Sail. And We do hereby Command and Require the Jaid Seamen and Landmen, to repair on Board the reJeffive Ships on which they shall seemet themselves, and give their constant Attendance, for fitting out to Sea Juch Ships as each of them do belong unto. And We are also Graciously pleased to Declare, That Conduct Money, activities the Practice of the Navy, shall likewise be alliaved to Juch Seamen and Landmen as shall Voluntarily Enter themselves, and remain on Board any of Our said Ships, according to the true meaning of this Our Royal Prelamation. Lightne, November 30. Ramadam, Brother to the Bey of Tenis, who, whenthat place was first Invested by the Algerines, sted from thence to Scio, and upon the surrender of this issand to the Venetians went over to Smirna, is lately arrived here in a French Merchant Ship, and has sent to our Great Duke to define his Protection.

Venice, December 3. We have Advice, by the way of Ragus, that the Tu ks begin to be already very senible of the loss of Scio, as well by the interruption of their Commerce with Egypt, (which has very much raised the Price of Provisions at Constantinople) as by the daily complaints that come from the Islands in the Archipelago, and their Sea Coasts on the Asia side, of their being exposed to plaints that come from the mains in the Archipetago, and their Sea Coasts on the Asia lide, of their being expected to the continual insults of the Venetians, and to the payment of great Contributions. Several new Men of War and Gallies are Building for the service of this Stare, which will be ready to go to Sea the next Summer, being designed for the reinforcement of our Meer. They write from Corfou, that several Ships of the last Convoy which went from hence, were arrived there, having been separated from the rest of their company in a Storm; And we have Advice also, that 140 French new raised Soldiers, who were on Board one of the Ships of the said Convoy, had Mutined, and after having killed and wounded divers of the Officers and Seamen, they carried the Ship to Monfredonia, and made their cscape. Signior Marino Michel, General of the Venetian Forces in the Morea, is recalled from that station, and made Govern r of Vicenza.

Vienna, December 4. The Hear Van Heemskerke, Ambassador Extraordinary from the States-General of the United Provinces in Turkey, who in May last was stopt at Belgrade as he was returning home, being at the Viziers departure from thence for Adrianople, permitted to proceed on his Journey, is new on his way hither; and by our last Letters from Hungar, had passed Peter Waradin. General Caprara, and General Veterani, are not yet arrived here, but daily expected. We hear that Count Teckeley is very ill of a Dropsie.

Francfort, December 12. The Deputies of the Circle of the Upper Rbine will shortly meet here, to regulate matters about the preparations for the next Campagne. 'Tis faid that the Circies of Francouia and Suabia will raise several new Regiments against Spring. The Letters from Sulffirland tell us, that the Catholick Cantons have consented that the Spaniards may make a new Levy of 4000 men within their Territories, upon

condition they serve no where but in Piedmont.

Corunna, December 12. N. S. The Spanish Expedition Packet-Boat, Capt. Francis Clyes Commander, came from Falmouth on the 4th, and arrived here the 7th Instant, having taken a French Ship laden with Fish from Newfoundland, and brought her into this Port. The Soldiers that are to be fent from hence by Sea to Bifeay, will Embark in few days. The Letters from Cadiz of the 21th of the last month tell us, that the Fleet commanded by Admiral Ruffel continued in that Port; That they had had for several daysvery stormy weather, with abundance of Rain, but that our Ships had not received any damage; That some of our Grudsers were come in; And that they had taken 7 French Prizes, two bound from Marfeillesto Lisbon, one from Lisbon with Sugar for Venice, two with Fish from Newfoundland, and two Satees from Salley to Marseilles. Dublin, December 7. On Monday lake, the Right Honorable Sir Joseph Williamson was sworn of Their Majesties Privy-Cour cil here, and accordingly took his place at the Board.
