A PROCLAMATION,

For Encouraging Mariners, Seamen and Landmen, to Enter themselves on Board Their Majesties Ships of War.

WILLIAM R.

WE being desirous to give all due Encouragement to all such able Seamen as have not been in Our Service the last Year, or being in the Service have been regularly Discharged therefrom, and also to able bodied Landmen, who shall voluntarily Enter themselves in Our Service, and remain on Board Our Ships of War in Our Royal Navy, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to Publish this Our Royal Proclamation; And We do hereby Promise and Declare, That all Seamen and able-bodied Landmen, who shall on or between the Twentieth Day of this Instant December, and the Twentieth Day of January next, Voluntarily Enter themselves, and remain on Board any of Our Ships of War, or Fire-Ships, or on any Press-Vessels or Tenders belonging to Our Fleet, shall receive as of Our Free Gift and Royal Bounty, the respective Allowances or Rewards following, viz. Each able and ordinary Seaman Three Months Pay, and each able-bodied Landman One Month's Pay, to be Paid to them by or before the Twentieth Day of March next, and if any Ships shall be sent Abroad, the Men so Entered on Board the said Ships shall be Paid before they Sail. And We do hereby Command and Require the said Seamen and Landmen, to repair on Board the respective Ships on which they shall so Enter themselves, and give their constant Attendance, for fitting out to Sea such Ships as each of them do belong unto. And We are also Graciously pleased to Declare, That Conduct-Money, according to the Practice of the Navy, shall likewise be allowed to such Seamen and Landmen as shall Voluntarily Enter themselves, and remain on Board any of Our said Ships, according to the true meaning of this Our Royal Proclamation. And for the prevention of any Deceit and Abuse that may happen by any Person or Persons leaving the Ships to which they belong, and Entering him or themselves on Board any other of Our said Ships, as aforesaid, in order to the obtaining of the Bounty-Money herein before Granted, We do hereby likewise Direct, Declare and Command, that such Seamen and Landmen belonging to any of Our Ships or Vessels whatsoever, as shall leave any of the Ships or Vessels to which they belong, and Enter themselves on Board any other of Our Ships, in order to the obtaining of the said Bounty-Money, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ship which they shall so leave, but also be severely Punished according to their Demerits. And We do hereby further Publish and Declare Our Pleasure, That all Warrants for Pressing of Seamen shall be suspended in their Execution between the Twentieth Day of this Month of December, and the Twentieth Day of January next ensuing; Whereof all Commanders of Our Ships, and other Officers whom it may concern, are to take Notice, and to deliver to Press-Masters accordingly during that time.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall the Thirteenth Day of December, 1694. In the Sixth Year of Our Reign.

Leghorn, November 30. We hear by a Vessel come from the Coast of Barbary, that the Algerines have taken Porto Farina, a Sea Port belonging to the Government of Tunis, as also the Castles of Goulette, and that they had so beleaguered the City of Tunis, that 'twas thought it could not hold out much longer. The Basha

Ramadam, Brother to the Bey of Tunis, who, when that place was first Invested by the Algerines, fled from thence to Scio, and upon the surrender of this Island to the Venetians went over to Smirna, is lately arrived here in a French Merchant Ship, and has sent to our Great Duke to desire his Protection.

Venice, December 3. We have Advice, by the way of Ragusa, that the Turks begin to be already very sensible of the loss of Scio, as well by the interruption of their Commerce with Egypt, (which has very much raised the Price of Provisions at Constantinople) as by the daily complaints that come from the Islands in the Archipelago, and their Sea Coasts on the Asia side, of their being exposed to the continual insults of the Venetians, and to the payment of great Contributions. Several new Men of War and Gallies are Building for the service of this State, which will be ready to go to Sea the next Summer, being designed for the reinforcement of our Fleet. The Senate have under consideration the raising of 4000 Horse to be sent to the Morea; and several Officers are come hither to offer their service in these Levies. They write from Corfu, that several Ships of the last Convoy which went from hence, were arrived there, having been separated from the rest of their company in a Storm; And we have Advice also, that 140 French new raised Soldiers, who were on Board one of the Ships of the said Convoy, had Murined, and after having killed and wounded divers of the Officers and Seamen, they carried the Ship to Manfredonia, and made their escape. Signior Marino Michel, General of the Venetian Forces in the Morea, is recalled from that station, and made Governor of Vicenza.

Vicenza, December 4. The Heer Van Heemskerke, Ambassador Extraordinary from the States-General of the United Provinces in Turkey, who in May last was stopt at Belgrade as he was returning home, being at the Viziers departure from thence for Adrianople, permitted to proceed on his Journey, is now on his way hither; and by our last Letters from Hungary, had passed Peter Waradin. General Caprara, and General Veterani, are not yet arrived here, but daily expected. We hear that Count Teckley is very ill of a Dropsie.

Frankfort, December 12. The Deputies of the Circle of the Upper Rhine will shortly meet here, to regulate matters about the preparations for the next Campagne. 'Tis said that the Circles of Franconia and Suabia will raise several new Regiments against Spring. The Letters from Susslerland tell us, that the Catholick Cantons have consented that the Spaniards may make a new Levy of 4000 men within their Territories, upon condition they serve no where but in Piedmont.

Cologne, December 14. The Officers of the Imperial and Confederate Troops are very busie in making their Recruits; And a Regiment of Germans is likewise raising for the service of the Venetians. Strict Orders are given to secure all the Passes between Germany and the French Territories, to hinder the Enemies being supplied with Horses or Corn from these parts; and such persons as are taken offending herein, are to be exemplarily punished. The Elector of Cologne continues at Liege, but we understand by the last Letters from thence, that his Electoral Highness designed to go to Brussels, and to be there against the arrival of the Electors of Bavaria.

Hague, December 17. N. S. There are Letters come

come from the Dutch Ambassador Monsieur Heemskerke, giving an account of his having taken his leave of the Grand Vizier at Belgrade, and of his arrival within the Emperors Territories. All is quiet on the Frontiers of Flanders.

Corunna, December 12. N. S. The Spanish Expedition Packet-Boat, Capt. Francis Clyes Commander, came from Falmouth on the 4th, and arrived here the 7th Instant, having taken a French Ship laden with Fish from Newfoundland, and brought her into this Port. The Soldiers that are to be sent from hence by Sea to Biscay, will Embark in few days. The Letters from Cadiz of the 21th of the last month tell us, that the Fleet commanded by Admiral Russell continued in that Port; That they had had for several days very stormy weather, with abundance of Rain, but that our Ships had not received any damage; That some of our Cruisers were come in; And that they had taken 7 French Prizes, two bound from *Marseilles* to *Lisbon*, one from *Lisbon* with Sugar for *Venice*, two with Fish from Newfoundland, and two Satees from *Salley* to *Marseilles*. The Success, Capt. Rogers; The *Naxerano*, Capt. Tito; And the *John and Thomas*, *William Brook* Commander, are arrived at Cadiz from Newfoundland. The Letters from Madrid of the first Instant tell us, that by their last Advices from *Barbary*, *Casas* was still Besieged by the Moors, but 'twas believed the violent Rains had obliged them to retire.

Dublin, December 5. On the 30th past, a Dutch Merchant Ship of about 100 Tuns, laden with Wine and Sugar from *Portugal* bound to *Rosterdam*, being forced into our Channel by the late high South-East Winds, ran ashore among the Rocks near *Hoath*, where she received some damage, but 'tis hoped she will get off again. On the 2d Instant came into *Kinsale* the *Adventure* of *Leith* in *Scotland*, of 70 Tuns, bound to the *Canaries*, who in her Voyage thither was taken by two French Men of War of 40 Guns each, and five days after was retaken by the *Mountague*. By a Person come from the West we are told, that the *Thomas and James*, *Arthur Muncriffe*, and the *Rose* of *Plymouth*, *Charles Seager* Commanders, both from *Barbadoes*, (who were separated from the rest of the Fleet in a great Storm) are put into *Castlehaven*; as also the *William and Mary*, *Robert Aldred* Master, from *New-England*. And just now we have Advice by an Express, that the *James and Elizabeth* of *Weymouth* arrived at *Castlehaven* on Friday last from *Barbadoes*, having been 13 Weeks in her passage from thence; she has sustained much damage in her Hull, Masts and Rigging, by bad weather. The *Arabella* of *Cork* is arrived in that Port from *Antegoa*.

Dublin, December 7. On Monday last, the Right Honorable Sir *Joseph Williamson* was sworn of Their Majesties Privy-Council here, and accordingly took his place at the Board. We have an account from *Kinsale*, that on the 4th Instant there came into that Harbor Their Majesties Hired Ship the *England-Frigate* of 42 Guns, Capt. *Cooper* Commander, who met on the 29th of the last month, about 30 Leagues to the Westward of *Kinsale*, a French Man of War called the *Temeraire* of 54 Guns, and engaged her from 9 in the morning till night, when the French Ship had one of her Masts shot by the Board; The *England-Frigate* lay by her all Night, and early the next morning renewed the fight; at which time the *Mountague*, Capt. *Bridges* Commander, came in, and soon after the Frenchman yielded, but was so disabled, that our men were forced to set her on fire; This Ship was Admiral of the French Squadron, in their late Enterprise against *Tamaraica*, and carried 260 men; of whom 26 were killed and wounded in this fight; and Capt. *Cooper* had 6 men wounded, but none killed: He has brought in 80 of the French Prisoners, the rest being on Board the *Mountague*. They write also from *Kinsale*, that the *Elizabeth* and *Mary* of *London*, *John Pierce* Master, laden with Sugar and Tobacco from *Antegoa*, is come in there, being very much disabled in her Masts and Rigging; as also the *Rose* of *Plymouth*, *Charles Seager* Master, from *Barbadoes*, but lost from *Glandore*.

Pembroke, Dec. 9. Yesterday arrived in this Harbour the *Hopewell* of *London* from *Virginia*; She parted on the Coast of *Ireland* with another Ship bound to *London* from the *West-Indies*, *Robert Burnham* Commander, who steered for *Kinsale*.

Southampton, Dec. 8. This day was Launched here a New Ship of the Third Rate for Their Majesties Service, Named the *Dorchester*, of 80 Guns.
