**W**HEREAS by section eight of the Air Force (Constitution) Act, 1917, it is enacted that—

(1) For the purpose of the administration of matters relating to the Air Force and to the defence of the realm by air there shall be established an Air Council consisting of one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of

State who shall be President of the Air Council and of other members who shall be appointed in such manner and subject to such provisions as His Majesty may by Order in Council direct:

(2) His Majesty may by Order in Council fix the date as on which the Air Council is to be established and make provision with respect to the proceedings of the Air Council and the manner in which the business of the Council is to be distributed among the members thereof:

And whereas His Majesty by Order in Council dated the twenty-first day of December, nineteen hundred and seventeen, made provision with respect to the constitution of the Air Council and the manner of the appointment of the members thereof:

And whereas it is expedient to make provision with respect to the date as on which the Air Council is to be established, and also to amend the said Order in Council in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The date as on which the Air Council is

to be established shall be the third day of January, nineteen hundred and eighteen.

2. The President of the Air Council may appoint one of the two additional members of the Air Council to be appointed under paragraph 1 of the said Order in Council of the twenty-first day of December, nineteen hundred and seventeen, to be Vice-President of the Air Council.

3. Paragraph 2 of the said Order in Council shall have effect as if for the words "the Controller-General of Equipment and the Inspector-General of the Air Force" there were substituted the words "and the Controller-General of Equipment."

WHEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-eighth day of November, nineteen hundred and fourteen, His Majesty was pleased to make regulations (called the "Defence of the Realm Regulations") under the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914, for securing the public safety and the defence of the realm:

And whereas the said Act has been amended by the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) Act, 1915, the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) (No. 2) Act, 1915, and the Munitions of War Act, 1915, and other enactments:

And whereas the said regulations have been amended by various subsequent Orders in Council:

And whereas it is expedient further to amend the said regulations in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following amendments be made in the said regulations:—

1. In sub-section (3) of Regulation 2M after the words "contravention of this regulation" there shall be inserted the words "or negligently or wilfully fails to comply with the requirements of any order made under this regulation, or with any condition subject to which a licence under any such order has been granted."

2. Regulation 8G and Regulation 8GG shall cease to have effect as from such date as may be fixed by order made by the Board of Trade.

By the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty has been pleased, in exercise of the power in that behalf conferred on Him by Section one, sub-section one, of the Trading with the Enemy (Extension of Powers) Act, 1915, by divers Proclamations, and in particular by a Proclamation dated the 23rd day of May, 1916, entitled "The Trading with the Enemy (Statutory

List) Proclamation, 1916, No. 3," to prohibit all persons or bodies of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, resident, carrying on business, or being in the United Kingdom from trading with any of the persons or bodies of persons mentioned in the List contained in the last mentioned Proclamation, such List being therein referred to as the Statutory List:

And whereas by Section one, sub-section two, of the said Act, it is provided that any List of persons and bodies of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, with whom such trading is prohibited by a Proclamation under the said Act may be varied or added to by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of a Secretary of State:

And whereas the Statutory List contained in the last mentioned Proclamation has been varied and added to by subsequent Orders of Council:

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs to the following effect:—

That the Statutory List should be further varied and added to as set forth in the Schedule hereto.

Now, therefore, Their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into consideration, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Statutory List be varied and added to as set forth in the Schedule hereto.

Whereof the Right Honourable Arthur James Balfour, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Controller of the Foreign Trade Department, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

NOTE (1).—All persons or firms resident, carrying on business or being in the United Kingdom are prohibited from having, with any person or firm mentioned in this List, or in any List issued under the Trading with the Enemy (Statutory List) Proclamation, 1916, No. 3, any dealings other than such as are expressly authorised by paragraph 5 of the Proclamation. A List (The Consolidating List, No. 41a) consolidating all previous Lists, was published on the 7th December, 1917, which, together with List No. 42 of the 21st December, 1917, and the List herewith annexed, contains all the names which up to this date are included in the Statutory List.

Additions to and variations in these Lists will be published at intervals approximately of two weeks.

The Lists are published in the London Gazette and reproduced in the Board of Trade

Journal, and separate copies of all Lists may be obtained at a small cost from the Superintendent of Publications, His Majesty's Stationery Office, Imperial House, Kingsway, W.C.

†NOTE (2).—Where a person or firm mentioned in the List has more than one address in the country or group of countries under which the name of the person or firm appears, all dealing in that country, or in any country in the group, with such persons or firm are prohibited, even in cases where one only of the addresses or one only of the countries is specifically mentioned.

NOTE (3).—Trading is prohibited under the Trading with the Enemy Proclamations of 25th June, and 10th November, 1915, with any person or firm of enemy nationality resident or carrying on business in China, Siam, Persia, Morocco, Liberia or Portuguese East Africa. Persons or firms in the United Kingdom are therefore prohibited from trading with any person or firm of enemy nationality in any of those countries, even though such person or firm is not mentioned by name in the Statutory List.

NOTE (4).—In order to minimise as far as possible any inconvenience which may be caused to British traders by the dislocation of export trade owing to the inclusion in the Statutory List of a former connection, the Foreign Trade Department is collecting and classifying the names of non-enemy firms who may be able to act as substitutes for firms mentioned in the Statutory List. A considerable amount of information is already available at the Foreign Trade Department, and it is in many cases possible to suggest the names of satisfactory substitutes without the necessity of referring the matter abroad. The Department is, however, prepared on application to enquire of His Majesty's Representatives abroad for the names of suitable substitutes. When the applicant wishes this done by telegraph he is required to undertake to pay the cost of telegraphic correspondence. It would greatly facilitate the work of the Foreign Trade Department if applicants in making enquiries would specify the particular trade or trades for which substitutes are required.

NOTE (5).—The Statutory List for each country is telegraphed, on the day of issue, to His Majesty's Representative in that country, who is instructed to notify accordingly British Consular Officers, to whom persons abroad should apply for information as to names on the List. Persons and firms in the United Kingdom with agencies or branches abroad would, however, be well advised to furnish such agencies or branches with issues of the List as they appear. The Lists for all countries in Central or South America are also telegraphed to His Majesty's Ambassador at Washington, who transmits them to H.M. Consul-General at New York and to other centres in the United States likely to be interested.

\*NOTE (6).—It is not unusual for firms in Holland and the Netherland East Indies to be registered under names commencing with descriptive terms such as "Handel Maatschappij" (Trading Company) or "Naamlooze Venootschap" (Limited Liability Company). In such cases it has been found more convenient to publish the firm under its proper name followed by the general descriptive term "Handel Maatschappij" or "Naamlooze Venootschap" (N.V.), as in the case of an English company.

For instance Handel Maatschappij van den Berg & Company, and Naamlooze Venootschap de Komeet v/h Dumonceau Frères will be found under "Berg" and "Komeet" respectively, and not under "Handel" or "Naamlooze."

The KING has been pleased, by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date the 3rd instant, to present the Reverend Henry Gee, D.D., Chaplain in Ordinary to His Majesty, Chaplain to the Bishop of Durham, Master of University College, Durham, to the Deanery of the Cathedral Church of Gloucester, void by the death of the Very Reverend Henry Donald Maurice Spence-Jones, D.D.

The KING has been graciously pleased to award the Decoration of the Albert Medal in recognition of the gallant action of Sergeant Michael Healy, Royal Munster Fusiliers, in saving life in France, in March last, at the cost of his own life. The circumstances are as follows:—

*Sergeant Michael Healy*, Royal Munster Fusiliers.

In France, on the 1st March, 1917, during bombing practice, a live bomb failed to clear the parapet, and rolled back into the trench,

which was occupied by the thrower, an officer, and Sergeant Healy. All three ran for shelter, but Sergeant Healy, fearing that the others would not reach shelter in time, ran back and picked up the bomb, which exploded, and mortally wounded him.

Sergeant Healy had previously performed other acts of distinguished gallantry, for which he had been awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal, the Military Medal, and a bar to the Military Medal.

*Whitehall, January 1, 1918.*

The KING has been graciously pleased to award the Decoration of the Albert Medal to the undermentioned Officers and Non-Commissioned Officers of His Majesty's Forces serving in France or elsewhere in recognition of their gallantry in saving life:—

*Lieutenant Charles Herbert Wade*, 88th Labour Company, formerly Durham Light Infantry.

On the 16th June, 1917, a party of men were loading trucks alongside an ammunition dump. The ammunition ignited and began to explode in all directions. The men rushed for shelter, but one of them was caught in the trucks. Lieutenant Wade at once ran forward into the blazing ammunition and released the man, and then called for volunteers to save the trucks which, with their assistance, he succeeded in doing.

*Lieutenant Albert Nevitt*, M.C., Royal Welsh Fusiliers.

On the 4th September, 1916, bombing instruction was taking place in a trench occupied by Lieutenant (then Second Lieutenant) Nevitt, another officer, and two men. One of the men threw a bomb which hit the parapet, and fell back into the trench, where it was deeply embedded in mud and water. Lieutenant Nevitt at once groped for the bomb. He failed to find it at the first attempt, but made a second and successful attempt, seized the bomb, and threw it over the parapet, where it at once exploded.

On the 24th September, 1916, bombing instruction was taking place under the command of Lieutenant Nevitt. Another officer and three men were present in the trench. A bomb fell back from the parapet into the trench, whereupon the men rushed for the entrance, nearly knocking Lieutenant Nevitt down. In the confusion Lieutenant Nevitt lost sight of the bomb, but he searched for it, and, having found it, threw it clear, when it at once exploded. Only one of the men had succeeded in escaping from the trench when the bomb exploded.

On both occasions Lieutenant Nevitt's courage and presence of mind undoubtedly saved the lives of others.

*Lieutenant Thomas Johnstone Dickson*, Yorkshire Regiment.

On the 26th June, 1917, Lieutenant (then Second Lieutenant) Dickson was instructing a man in throwing live bombs. One of the bombs failed to clear the parapet and fell back into the breastwork. Lieutenant Dickson told the man to run to safety, and himself did so. On reaching shelter he found that the man had not followed. He at once ran back into the breastwork, and saw the man crouching in a corner on the far side of the bomb. He ran past the bomb, seized the man, and dragged him back past the bomb into safety just before

the bomb exploded. Had not Lieutenant Dickson deliberately returned into the danger zone, the man would almost certainly have been killed.

*Lieutenant Herbert William Sewell*, Staff for Royal Engineer Services.

In France, on the 6th June, 1917, during a fire at Calais, Lieutenant Sewell broke through the roof of an engine-house which was in flames, and removed the weights of the safety valves. But for the officer's gallant action a serious explosion would have occurred, and he ran grave risk of being fatally scalded by the steam released by the removal of the weights.

*Second Lieutenant Richard Leslie Brown*, Royal Lancaster Regiment.

In France, on the 27th March, 1917, Lieutenant Brown was instructing a class in firing rifle grenades. Owing to a defective cartridge one of the grenades was lifted only about two inches, and then fell back into the cup. The safety catch had been released and the grenade was fusing. Lieutenant Brown at once ordered the men to clear and, running forward, picked up the rifle, seized it between his legs, grasped the grenade in his hands, and endeavoured to throw it away. While he was doing so it exploded, blowing off his right hand and inflicting other wounds. Had not Lieutenant Brown seized the grenade in his hand, thus sheltering the men, there can be little doubt that several of them would have been killed or severely injured.

*Acting Company Sergeant-Major William Shooter*, The Cheshire Regiment.

On the 8th April, 1916, while bombing instruction was being given in a trench occupied by two officers, Sergeant-Major Shooter, and a private, the private, who was about to throw a bomb from which he had withdrawn the safety pin, dropped it. Without giving any warning of what had occurred, he ran away. After about two seconds had elapsed, Sergeant-Major Shooter saw the bomb. He could easily have escaped round the traverse, but, in order to save the others, he seized the bomb and threw it away. It exploded in the air before Sergeant-Major Shooter could take cover, wounding him. By risking his life he undoubtedly saved the two officers who were with him in the trench from serious or fatal injury.

*Sergeant Albert Hutchinson*, Highland Light Infantry.

At the Curragh Camp, Ireland, on the 2nd April, 1917, during bombing practice, a live grenade hit the parapet of the trench and fell back at the feet of the man who had thrown it. The man was too terrified to move, and obstructed the efforts of Sergeant Hutchinson to pick up the bomb. After the fuse had been burning for three seconds, Sergeant Hutchinson managed to push the man away, pick up the bomb, and throw it over the parapet, where it immediately exploded. But for the Sergeant's coolness and gallantry the man would undoubtedly have been killed or severely injured.

*Corporal Percy Fairborn Annis*, Canadian Infantry.

On the 23rd December, 1915, Annis was instructing a class in the use of the trench

catapult, when a lighted bomb fell from the catapult into the trench. Annis at once picked up the bomb and threw it away.

On the 11th February, 1916, on a similar occasion, the catapult failed to act properly, with the result that the bomb was thrown only a short distance, and fell close to another party under instruction. Annis at once ran out to pick up the bomb. The bomb exploded just as he reached it and wounded him.

#### The MATCHES ORDER (No 2), 1917.

The MATCHES ORDER No. 2, 1917, dated 31st day of December, 1917. Made by the Board of Trade under Regulation 2 F and 2 JJ. of the Defence of the Realm Regulations.

The Board of Trade deeming it expedient to make further exercise of their powers under the Defence of the Realm Regulations as respects matches, hereby order as follows:—

(1) From and after 31st December, 1917, no person being a manufacturer of or wholesale dealer in matches shall, without the consent in writing of the Tobacco and Matches Control Board, sell or offer for sale any brand, size, style or description of matches other than those named or described in any Notice issued by the said Control Board, and in force for the time being, whereby the maximum price fixed at which matches may be sold by manufacturers and wholesale dealers.

(2) From and after 31st December, 1917, no person shall, without the consent in writing of the Tobacco and Matches Control Board, sell or offer for sale, by retail, any brand, size, style or description of matches other than those named or described in any Notice issued by the said Control Board and in force for the time being, whereby the maximum price is fixed at which matches may be sold by retail.

(3) Where before the date of this Order the Tobacco and Matches Control Board have given a consent in writing to any person to sell or offer for sale any matches, such person may notwithstanding anything in this Order, continue to sell or offer for sale the matches, in respect of which such consent was given, for such time and at such price and subject to such conditions, if any, as were prescribed therein.

(4) Any person who sells matches by retail shall exhibit and keep exhibited in a conspicuous position in the shop, stall, or place at which he sells matches, a Notice stating the maximum price of those brands or descriptions of matches which he keeps on sale, provided that this paragraph shall not apply to a hawker, pedlar, or street seller who does not sell from a stall.

(5) Paragraph 5 of the Matches Order, 1917, shall extend and apply to any intended or proposed sale of matches, though no sale in fact takes place.

(6) All manufacturers of, wholesale dealers in, and retailers of matches, shall obey the In-

structions of the Tobacco and Matches Control Board as to the manufacture, use, transport, storage, distribution, supply, sale or purchase of matches.

(7) This Order may be cited as the Matches Order (No. 2), 1917.

4. Special Permits to purchase steel scrap sold with guaranteed analysis may be granted on application, but in no case will Permits be granted for any such purchase at prices exceeding the following:—

DEFENCE OF THE REALM.  
LIGHTS.

ECONOMY OF SHOP LIGHTING (DERBY AREA) ORDER, DATED 4TH JANUARY, 1918, MADE BY THE MINISTER OF MUNITIONS UNDER REGULATION 11A OF THE DEFENCE OF THE REALM REGULATIONS.

Whereas it has become necessary for the maintenance of the supply of power for the production, repair and transport of war material and for other work necessary for the successful prosecution of the war, to restrict the use of lights for certain purposes in the undermentioned area, the Minister of Munitions, in pursuance of the powers conferred on him by Regulation 11A of the Defence of the Realm Regulations, hereby orders as follows:—

1. This Order shall apply in the area of the County Borough of Derby.

2. No light shall be used in any shop front on any week day, other than Saturday, after 3.30 p.m. or during any period of abnormal darkness occurring at an earlier hour.

Provided that this Order shall not be deemed to prohibit the use of:—

(a) Any light approved by the Chief Officer of Police as necessary for the serving of customers inside a shop.

(b) Any light used solely for illuminating a small sign in a shop front to indicate to persons outside that the shop is open for the serving of customers.

3. The lights used in any part of a shop shall not exceed what is reasonably necessary for the carrying on of business and the display of goods to customers inside the shop.

4. The expression "shop" in this Order shall have the same meaning as in the Shops Act, 1912.

The expression "shop front" shall include any portion of a shop, or any show case or other similar device which is used, or is ordinarily used, wholly or mainly for the display of goods to persons outside the shop. In the event of doubt arising as to whether a particular light is or is not within a shop front, the decision of the Chief Officer or any Superintendent of Police shall be final.

5. This Order shall take effect on and after the 14th January, 1918, and shall be in force up to and including the 31st March, 1918, unless sooner revoked.

6. This Order may be cited as the Economy of Shop Lighting (Derby Area) Order.

NOTE.—Regulation 11A provides that if any person having control of any light, or occupying or having control of, or managing, or being in charge of premises containing any light, or in connection with which any light is used, acts in contravention of this Order, he shall be guilty of a summary offence against the Defence of the Realm Regulations.

#### THE WOOLLEN AND WORSTED (CONSOLIDATION) ORDER, 1917.

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by the Defence of the Realm Regulations the Army Council hereby order as follows:—

##### PART I.—GENERAL.

1. All persons, the business carried on by whom consists wholly or partly in the production of goods of which wool or any derivative thereof, or mohair, alpaca, cashmere or camel hair, is a constituent part, or of any articles or material required for, or in connection with, the production thereof, are hereby required to furnish such particulars as to their business as may be required by or on behalf of the Director of Wool Textile Production.

2. All persons, the business carried on by whom consists wholly or partly in the production of goods of which wool or any derivative thereof, or mohair, alpaca, cashmere or camel hair, is a constituent part, or of any articles or material required for, or in connection with, the production thereof, are hereby required to cause work to be done in their

factories or workshops in accordance with any directions given by the Director of Wool Textile Production, with the object of making such factory or workshop, or the plant or labour therein, as useful as possible for the production of war material.

#### PART 2.—RATIONING.

3. In all factories or workshops, or other premises, the business carried on in which consists wholly or partly in the production or manufacture of goods of which wool or any derivative thereof, or mohair, alpaca, cashmere or camel hair is a constituent part, the owners or occupiers, their officers or servants, shall give priority over all other work to the production of material required as a component part of any work to be carried out, or goods to be supplied under any contract or order placed or made by the Admiralty, Army Council or Minister of Munitions, or any contract for Naval or Military equipment placed by an Allied Government by or with the consent in writing of the Admiralty, Army Council or Minister of Munitions.

Any direction that may be given by, or on behalf of, the Director of Wool Textile Production for the purpose hereof shall be strictly complied with by such owners or occupiers, their officers or servants.

4. All persons, the business carried on by whom consists wholly or partly in the production or sale of goods of which wool or any derivative thereof, or mohair, alpaca, cashmere or camel hair is a constituent part, or of any article or material required for, or in connection with, the production thereof, are hereby required to comply strictly with the provisions relating to the rationing of wool, tops and yarns for civil orders, contained in Schedule A hereto annexed, and it shall be the duty of all such persons as aforesaid to furnish and to obtain the various particulars therein referred to in such manner as may be required by, or on behalf of, the Director of Wool Textile Production.

5. No person, the business carried on by whom consists wholly or partly in the production of goods of which wool or any derivative thereof, or mohair, alpaca, cashmere or camel hair is a constituent part, shall, without a permit issued by or on behalf of the Director of Wool Textile Production, take delivery in any rationing period of a quantity of yarn in excess of the quantity allocated to him for such period.

For the purposes of this Order, the expression "Allocation period" shall mean any period determined by, or on behalf of, the Director of Wool Textile Production to be a period for the allocation of yarn.

#### PART 3.—RESTRICTION OF CONSUMPTION.

6. No person shall put into manufacture in any textile factory any wool, grown or to be grown on sheep in the United Kingdom, or any wool imported or to be imported into the United Kingdom, or any East Indian hair, or any tops produced or to be produced therefrom, otherwise than for any purpose referred to in Clause 3 hereof, or in accordance with the terms of any permit or certificate that may be issued by or on behalf of the Director of Wool Textile Production; provided that nothing herein contained shall be deemed to refer to any hair other than East Indian hair.

7. For the purposes of this Order, the Director of Wool Textile Production may authorise any District Rationing Committee to require any particulars as to the business of any person engaged in the sale or manufacture of goods of which wool or any derivative thereof, or mohair, alpaca, cashmere or camel hair is a constituent part, and to issue certificates and permits on his behalf.

8. In any textile factory in Great Britain, the business carried on in which consists wholly or partly in the drawing, spinning, reeling, or winding of worsted yarns of which wool or any derivative thereof, or mohair, alpaca, cashmere or camel hair is a constituent part, the weekly hours of work on drawing, spinning, reeling or winding shall, except under permit issued by or on behalf of the Director of Wool Textile Production, be not more than 50 hours.

9. In any textile factory in Great Britain, the business carried on in which consists wholly or partly in the carding or spinning on the woollen principle of any yarn other than that referred to in the preceding clause whereof wool or any derivative thereof, or mohair, alpaca, cashmere, or camel hair is a constituent part, the weekly hours of work on carding and spinning shall, except under permit issued by or on behalf of the Director of Wool Textile Production, be reduced to a figure  $7\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. less than the average weekly hours of work on carding or spinning in such factory during the month of March, 1917.

For the purpose of this Order, the expression "spinning on the woollen principle" shall mean spinning in such manner as may be determined by or on behalf of the Director of Wool Textile Production to be spinning on the woollen principle.

10. In any textile factory in Great Britain, the business carried on in which consists partly in carding, drawing or spinning, and partly in the weaving of any woollen or worsted yarn of which wool or any derivative thereof, or mohair, alpaca, cashmere, or camel hair is a constituent part, the weekly hours of work on weaving shall, except under permit issued by or on behalf of the Director of Wool Textile Production, be not more than 50 hours.

11. In any textile factory in the West Riding of Yorkshire, except the area indicated in the Schedule hereto annexed, the county of Cumberland, and Scotland, except the counties of Ayrshire and Fifeshire, the weekly hours of work on weaving shall, except under permit issued by or on behalf of the Director of Wool Textile Production, be not more than 50 hours, provided that the provisions of this Order may be applied by or on behalf of the Director of Wool Textile Production to any other textile factory in Great Britain.

12. In any textile factory in Great Britain, the business carried on in which consists wholly or partly in the weaving of carpets, the weekly hours of work on weaving carpets shall, except under permit issued by or on behalf of the Director of Wool Textile Production, be not more than 50 hours.

13. In any textile factory in Great Britain, the business carried on in which consists wholly or partly in the production or manufacture of hosiery, no person shall, except under permit issued by or on behalf of the Director of Wool Textile Production, put into manufacture for

other than direct Government orders a quantity of yarn whereof wool or any derivative thereof, or mohair, alpaca, cashmere, or camel hair forms a constituent part, exceeding a quantity 15 per cent. less than the average consumed weekly in such factory for other than direct Government orders during the months of January, February and March, 1917, such quantity to be estimated in pounds weight.

#### PART 4.—LAPS AND WASTE.

14. No person shall sell to any spinner or manufacturer any laps or waste, or any blends or material wholly or partly composed thereof, without a permit issued by or on behalf of the Director of Wool Textile Production, or at prices exceeding those set out in Schedule "C" hereto annexed, or at such other prices as, in any particular case, may be allowed by or on behalf of the Director of Wool Textile Production.

15. No person shall without a permit issued by or on behalf of the Director of Wool Textile Production sell for export any laps or waste.

16. The remuneration of dealers in laps or waste shall be determined at the rates, and for the services set out, in Schedule "D" hereto annexed, and no dealer shall make any sale of laps or waste at a price exceeding the purchase price thereof by more than the amount to which he may be entitled under such scale of charges, having regard to the services performed by him.

17. All persons having in their custody or control any laps or waste shall furnish such particulars as to their business as may be required by or on behalf of the Director of Wool Textile Production.

18. No person shall, without a permit issued by or on behalf of the Director of Wool Textile Production, deliver any laps or waste in pursuance of any contract entered into prior to the 25th day of June, 1917, provided that where such contract shall have been entered into at any time prior to the 1st day of April, 1917, no such permit shall be necessary, and the contracting parties may be and are hereby authorised to complete such contract by delivery before the 31st day of December, 1917.

19. No dealer in laps or waste shall, without a permit issued by or on behalf of the Director of Wool Textile Production, convert or cause to be converted any laps into tops.

20. For the purpose of this Order, the expression "laps or waste" shall mean laps, waste and other bye-products indicated in Schedule "C" hereto annexed, produced in the spinning or manufacture of worsted or hosiery material.

#### PART 5.—REPEAL AND SHORT TITLE.

21. The Orders indicated in Schedule "E" hereto annexed are hereby repealed.

22. This Order may be cited as the Woollen and Worsted Consolidation Order, 1917.

#### SCHEDULE A.

##### PART I.—MANUFACTURERS AND SPINNERS.

1. Supplies of wool, tops, yarn, etc., available for civil consumption shall be handed over by the Board of Control to the existing distribution committees to be distributed between

individual firms in a fair and equitable manner. Such committees shall be known in future as Rationing Committees, and shall have power to add to their number.

The existing Spinners' Section Committee shall act for and be responsible to the Board of Control for the rationing of wools and tops to worsted spinners.

2. (a) A Joint Rationing Committee, composed of representatives of the District Rationing Committees, shall be set up in order to deal with general questions affecting all the Rationing Committees, and the meetings of such Joint Committees shall be held in Bradford.

(b) The Joint Rationing Committee shall be constituted as follows, and the representatives shall be nominated by the District Rationing Committees concerned:—

7 members representing West Riding Rationing Committees, of which 3 shall be worsted spinners.

1 member representing West of England Rationing Committee.

2 members representing Scottish Rationing Committee.

1 member representing Welsh Rationing Committee.

1 member representing Irish Rationing Committee.

2 members representing Midlands Rationing Committee.

1 member representing Carpet and Felt Trades' Rationing Committee.

7 members representing Labour Interest.

1 member representing Yarn Merchants' Committees.

Representatives elected by the District Rationing Committees should, as far as possible, be members of the Board of Control.

3. The basis of distribution as between district and district shall be determined by the Joint Rationing Committee, and should any District Rationing Committee be dissatisfied with the allocation made to it by the Joint Rationing Committee the matter shall be referred to the Board of Control for determination.

4. In accordance with the system which has hitherto obtained in making distribution, priority in supplies shall not be given for any particular class of civil trade, and the present system of cloth merchants' certificates shall be abolished.

5. In order to ensure that each individual manufacturer who buys all or part of his yarns obtains his fair share of the yarn made from the wool or tops allocated to spinners, the following system of Manufacturers' Certificates shall be arranged:—

Within the first fourteen days of each month every manufacturer shall be required to supply to each spinner from whom he has received yarn during the preceding month a certificate showing the aggregate net weight of such yarn.

A statement of such returns shall be furnished not later than the 21st of the month, by each spinner to the Secretary of the Manufacturers' Committee, War Department, Cloth Office, Bradford.

In the event of the Manufacturers' Committee finding the necessity of revising any individual manufacturers' allocation, due notice of such intention shall be furnished to the Spinners' Committee, who shall in turn convey the decisions to the spinners concerned.

Any revision which necessitates a reduction of a spinner's deliveries shall not come into operation in the case of white yarns for one month after the date of such notice, and in the case of coloured or mixture yarns for three months after the date of such notice.

The operation of this scheme will automatically cancel all sub-certificates then existing.

Every spinner shall account, by means of monthly returns, for the whole of the yarn delivered by him during that month.

6. The basis of distribution as between individual spinners shall be the consumption in 1916 and the average number of spindles effecting such consumption. Regard shall be had to Army Contracts and the fortnightly returns of consumption.

7. The basis of distribution as between individual manufacturers of cloth shall be the consumption for civil purposes in 1916 and the average number of looms effecting such consumption.

8. The basis of distribution between individual manufacturers of hosiery shall be the consumption of yarn for all purposes in 1916, from which shall be deducted the requirements of such machinery as is engaged on Government work in each period.

9. Manufacturers who run worsted spinning machinery in addition to looms or knitting frames shall apply on spinners' forms for wool and tops, and on manufacturers' forms for yarn (including that which will be produced by their own spindles).

All wools or tops for the worsted spinning plant of such firms shall be dealt with by the Spinners' Sectional Committee. It will be necessary for such manufacturers to issue certificates for yarn from their weaving department to their spinning department.

10. The District Rationing Committees shall themselves, or by means of sub-committees, deal with cases of genuine hardship or other special cases, and shall hear the appeal of any applicant who may think that his application has not been dealt with fairly.

11. The District Rationing Committees shall be instructed to report to the Board of Control cases of wilful infringement of the Defence of the Realm Regulations, and the Board of Control shall then take such action as they may think desirable.

## PART II.—YARN MERCHANTS, ETC.

### A.—For Export of Yarn.

12. A notice shall be published through the District Rationing Committees, the Press, certain Chambers of Commerce and Associations, etc., stating that the Board of Control are now prepared to receive applications from (a) spinners desirous of exporting yarn direct, and (b) merchants desirous of obtaining yarn for export in yarn.

13. The Export Yarn Rationing Committee shall be informed by the Joint Rationing Committee of the total quantities of yarn permitted for each of the Allies, the Colonies, and other countries. The Export Yarn Rationing Committee shall submit their recommendations from time to time to the Joint Rationing Committee, who may authorise the issue of

Rationing Certificates to spinners and export yarn merchants as follows:—

(a) The Secretary of the Joint Rationing Committee shall open an account for each country, showing the bulk ration allotted to it for a certain period.

(b) Before any yarn can be put into work the export merchant must present a rationing certificate to the Secretary of the Joint Rationing Committee, War Office, Bradford, who will certify that the quantity of yarn specified comes within the total of the bulk ration allotted to the country to which it has been sold.

(c) An exporting spinner must present a rationing certificate to the Secretary of the Joint Rationing Committee, who will certify that the quantity of yarn specified comes within the total of the bulk ration allotted to the country to which it has been sold.

(d) When the total quantity of the bulk ration for each country is reached, no more rationing certificates will be certified by the Secretary of the Joint Rationing Committee until the Joint Rationing Committee give a further bulk ration for the same country.

14. Export yarn merchants will be required, in addition, to give the monthly delivery certificate to the spinner, as resolved in Clause 5 above.

15. The export yarn merchant shall render an account each month to the Secretary of the Joint Rationing Committee of all yarn delivered to him by spinners, showing what weight has been delivered to him, exported by him, and the balance (if any) remaining in stock.

16. The Board of Control shall retain the right of demanding any documentary evidence they may require.

17. The War Trade Department shall be asked to require the quotation of the number of the rationing certificate before issuing any export licence, and to refuse licences if this is not forthcoming.

### B.—Yarn for consumption by Home Manufacturers.

18. Yarn merchants desirous of obtaining yarn for consumption by home manufacturers shall:—

(a) Obtain from the Secretary of the Rationing Committee of their district a book of "Order Certificates" and "Delivery Certificates."

(b) Demand from every manufacturer ordering yarn from them the number of the manufacturer's key-certificate.

(c) Supply to their spinner with every order for yarn an "Order Certificate" on which shall be quoted the number of the key-certificate of the manufacturer who requires the yarn in question.

(d) Supply to each of their spinners by the 14th day of every month a "Delivery Certificate" stating the aggregate net weight of yarn delivered by each spinner to the yarn merchant during the preceding calendar month.

(e) Receive by the 14th day of every month from each manufacturer to whom

yarn has been delivered by the yarn merchant during the preceding calendar month a certificate of the aggregate net weight of yarn so delivered.

(f) Make a return by the 21st day of every month to the Secretary of the Rationing Committee for their district of the yarn delivered to them by spinners during the preceding calendar month, with the names, certificate numbers, etc., of the manufacturers to whom the yarn has been forwarded.

*C.—Hand Knitting and Mending Yarns for the Home Trade.*

19. Permits may be issued to certain spinners to deliver for the home trade in hand knitting and mending yarns, certain aggregate quantities of yarn during the specified periods without obtaining delivery certificates from the firms to whom the yarn is supplied.

PART III.

20.—(1) The term "Yarn" is here interpreted as meaning "all woollen or worsted yarn containing 40 per cent. or more of *new wool*."

(2) The term "delivered" is here interpreted as meaning "dispatched or consigned from the spinner's or yarn merchant's premises."

#### ADMIRALTY NOTICE TO MARINERS.

No. 1 of the year 1918.

CAUTION WHEN APPROACHING  
BRITISH PORTS.

PART I.

CLOSING OF PORTS.

*Former Notice.—No. 1 of 1917; hereby cancelled.*

(1) My Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, having taken into consideration the fact that it may be necessary to forbid all entrance to certain ports of the Empire, this is to give Notice that on approaching the shores of the United Kingdom, or any of the ports or localities of the British Empire, referred to in Part III. of this Notice, a sharp look-out should be kept for the signals described in the following paragraph, and for the vessels mentioned in paragraph (5), Part II., of this Notice, and the distinguishing and other signals made by them. In the event of such signals being displayed, the port or locality should be approached with great caution, as it may be apprehended that obstructions may exist.

(2) If entrance to a port is prohibited, three red vertical lights by night, or three red vertical balls by day, will be exhibited in some conspicuous position, in or near to its approach, which signals will also be shown by the vessels indicated in paragraph (5), Part II., of this Notice.

If these signals are displayed, vessels must approach the port with the greatest caution and implicitly obey all orders or signals given them by the Examination vessel or signal station.

(3) At all the ports or localities at home or abroad referred to in Part III. of this Notice, search-lights are occasionally exhibited for exercise.

Instructions have been given to avoid directing moveable search-lights during practice on to vessels under way, but mariners are warned that great care should be taken to keep a sharp look-out for the signals indicated in paragraph (2) above, when search-lights are observed to be working.

**PART II.**

**EXAMINATION SERVICE.**

(4) In certain circumstances it is also necessary to take special measures to examine vessels desiring to enter the ports or localities at home or abroad, referred to in Part III. of this Notice.

(5) In such case, vessels carrying the distinguishing flags or lights mentioned in paragraph (7) will be charged with the duty of examining ships which desire to enter the ports and of allotting positions in which they shall anchor. If Government vessels, or vessels belonging to the local port authority, are found patrolling in the offing, merchant vessels are advised to communicate with such vessels with a view to obtaining information as to the course on which they should approach the Port. Such communication will not be necessary in cases where the pilot on board has already received this information from the local authorities.

(6) As the institution of the Examination Service at any port will never be publicly advertised, especial care should be taken in approaching the ports, by day or night, to keep a sharp look-out for any vessel carrying the flags or lights mentioned in paragraph (7), and to be ready to "bring to" at once when hailed by her or warned by the firing of a gun or sound rocket.

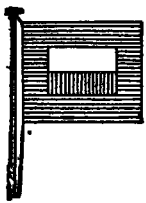
In entering by night any of the ports mentioned in Part III., serious delay and risk will be avoided if four efficient all round lamps, two red and two white, are kept available for use.

(7) By day the distinguishing flags of the Examination Steamer will be a special flag (white and red horizontal surrounded by a blue border) and a blue ensign.

Also, three red vertical balls if the port is closed.

**SPECIAL FLAG**

**THREE RED BALLS**



By night the steamer will carry:—

(a) Three red vertical lights if the port is closed.

(b) Three white vertical lights if the port is open.

The above lights will be carried in addition to the ordinary navigation lights, and will show an unbroken light around the horizon.

(8) Masters are warned that, when approaching a British port where the Examination Service is in force, they must have the distinguishing signal of their vessel ready to hoist immediately the Examination Steamer makes the signal.

(9) Masters are warned that, before attempt-

ing to enter any of these ports when the Examination Service is in force, they must in their own interests strictly obey all instructions given to them by the Examination Steamer.

Whilst at anchor in the Examination Anchorage, Masters are warned that they must not (except to avoid accident) lower any boats, communicate with the shore, work cables, move the ship, or allow anyone to leave the ship, without permission from the Examination Steamer.

(10) In case of fog, Masters are enjoined to use the utmost care, and the Port should be approached with caution.

(11) Merchant vessels when approaching ports are especially cautioned against making use of private signals of any description, either by day or night: the use of them will render a vessel liable to be fired on.

(12) The pilots attached to the ports will be acquainted with the regulations to be followed.

## SWEEPING OPERATIONS.

Notice is hereby given, that under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and are now in force:—

H.M. Vessels are constantly engaged in sweeping operations off the coasts of the United Kingdom.

Whilst so engaged, they work in pairs connected by a wire hawser, and are consequently hampered to a very considerable extent in their manœuvring powers.

With a view to indicating the nature of the work on which these vessels are engaged, they will show the following signals:—

A black ball at the foremast head and a similar ball at the yardarm, or where it can best be seen, on that side on which it is dangerous for vessels to pass.

For the public safety, all other vessels, whether steamers or sailing craft, must keep out of the way of vessels flying this signal, and should especially remember that it is dangerous to *pass between* the vessels of a pair, as the vessels may have mines trailing in their sweeps and also on account of the danger caused to traffic if mine sweepers have to slip their sweeps to get out of the way of vessels.

Part IV. of this Admiralty Notice to Mariners is issued under the provisions of the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, and failure to comply strictly with the directions contained in it will constitute an offence against those Regulations.

Any person found guilty of such an offence is liable to severe penalties both of imprisonment and fine.

Any person aiding or abetting the commission of such an offence is himself guilty of an offence against the Regulations.

Attention is also drawn to the fact that any infringement of the directions contained in Part IV. of this Admiralty Notice to Mariners is liable to result in the detention of the ship or vessel.

## SPECIAL INSTRUCTIONS TO MERCHANT VESSELS.

*Former Notices.*—Nos. 4, 579 and 581 of 1917.

(1) *Information respecting War Instructions for Merchant Vessels.*

Notice is hereby given that, under the Defence of the Realm Regulation (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Order has

been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty and is now in force:—

The Orders contained in Admiralty War Instructions for British Merchant Ships or in any instructions or advice, confidential or otherwise, issued or given to Masters of vessels by British or Allied Naval Officers, or by other duly authorised Officers or Officials, as to routes to be taken and other precautions to be observed to avoid capture or destruction by the enemy, are to be observed even when they are in conflict with the provisions of the Regulations for preventing Collisions at Sea, and every vessel observing such regulations, instructions or advice shall be deemed to be taking measures to meet "special circumstances" within the meaning of Article 27 of the Regulations for preventing Collisions at Sea.

(2) *Caution as to obeying Orders received from H.M. Ships, &c.*

The attention of all Masters or other persons in command or charge of vessels is directed to the duty of obeying promptly and strictly all orders, whether by way of signal or otherwise, given by any Officer in Command of any of His Majesty's Ships or by any Naval or Military Officer engaged in the defence of the coast. Cases have been reported to the Admiralty in which British Merchant vessels have wilfully disregarded the Orders given by Patrol Boats, &c., and it is therefore considered necessary to remind all persons concerned of the penalties provided for such acts of disobedience.

Where vessels neglect to obey Orders so given the person in charge is liable to prosecution under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, and upon conviction to be fined £100 or imprisoned for six months or, where the disobedience was of an aggravated kind, to suffer both penalties.

It should also be noted that failure to obey orders may necessitate the seizure and detention of the vessel, when found in any port of the United Kingdom subsequently to the time at which the act of disobedience was committed.

(3) *Use of Mine Protection Gear by Vessels.*

Notice is given that under the Defence of the Realm Regulations, the following Regulation has been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty with a view to protecting vessels navigating within certain areas from the risk of damage by mine, and is now in force:—

No British vessel equipped as directed by the Admiralty or Shipping Controller with the "Otter" protective gear shall, while navigating within the 60-fathom line off the United Kingdom or in any waters less than 60 fathoms deep where mines have been reported or may with reasonable probability be encountered, or in less than 80 fathoms in the Mediterranean Sea, neglect to have such protective gear properly adjusted and actually running out-board and adequately manned to secure the efficient working of the apparatus; and the Master or other person in command or charge of any British vessel who neglects to see that such apparatus is so adjusted, running, manned and worked shall be guilty of an offence against the Defence of the Realm Regulations.

(4) *Procedure for Visit and Search of Vessels by H.M. Ships.*

In view of the danger of H.M. Ships closing vessels, apparently Neutral, British or Allied traders, but which are in reality German raid-

ing cruisers, it is necessary to adopt a special Boarding procedure as a measure of precaution.

When it is desired to put into force the special Boarding procedure it will be as follows:—

A red pendant of a specially large size will be hoisted by the man-of-war exercising the right of visit and search. The hoisting of this pendant will be accompanied by the firing of a rocket. This will signify that the merchant ship is to close the boat lowered by the man-of-war, whether the man-of-war remains in the vicinity of the boat or not.

(5) *Regulations with regard to Vessels' Lights.*

Notice is hereby given that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Order has been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty and is now in force:—

1. *Anchor Lights.*—No electrically-lit lanterns are to be employed as anchor lights. The normal brilliancy of all other anchor lanterns is to be reduced by 50 per cent.

All anchor lanterns are to be fitted with overhead screens, so arranged as to cut off the light at an angle of between 20 and 25 degrees above the horizontal.

NOTE.—Specimen screens can be viewed at the Board of Trade Surveyor's Offices at Leith, North Shields, Hull, London, Plymouth, Cardiff, Liverpool, Glasgow and Dublin.

2. *Bow and Masthead Steaming Lights.*—Vessels in estuaries, harbours, anchorages and channels where navigation in the dark hours is permitted are not to employ electrically-lit lanterns as bow or steaming lights, with the exception of those vessels specially mentioned in paragraph 5.

3. *Other Lights.*—No light, either aloft, on deck or below, except those authorised by the Admiralty Confidential Instructions, and such as may be necessary for authorised signalling purposes, are to be permitted to be visible from outboard. This applies to vessels whether under way or at anchor.

4. The above Order applies to vessels of every description, other than H.M. ships and the vessels mentioned in the succeeding paragraph, in the waters of the United Kingdom.

5. Vessels carrying volatile oil or spirits in bulk are, notwithstanding the above orders, to exhibit (in lieu of oil lamps) electrically-lit lanterns not exceeding in brilliancy 50 per cent. of the brilliancy of the normal oil lamps.

Note.—This Notice is a re-publication of the former Notices quoted above.

ENGLAND, SOUTH COAST.

(1) *Falmouth Harbour Approach—Traffic Regulations.*

*Former Notice.*—No. 1324 of 1917.

All vessels bound to or from Falmouth harbour must pass between the two light-buoys situated at a distance of about 3 miles south-westward from St. Anthony point lighthouse, and maintain a course 0° (*N. 17° E. Mag.*) and 180° (*S. 17° W. Mag.*), respectively, for a distance of a quarter of a mile from the light-buoys.

Vessels approaching from the eastward, after passing the meridian of Penare head, must keep to the southward of the parallel of lat. 50° 03' N., before attempting to pass through the gateway.

Any instructions given by the patrol vessels should be strictly observed. Vessels proceeding eastward must obtain instructions as to the route to be followed before attempting to leave the anchorage.

Inward-bound vessels will have priority over outward-bound vessels in respect of passage through the gateway. Vessels entering Falmouth harbour must close the Drifter, stationed about half a mile to the southward of the two light-buoys defining the gateway.

This Drifter regulates inward-bound and outward-bound traffic. When no signals are exhibited by day or night by this Drifter, inward-bound traffic may proceed to pass through the gateway.

To indicate that the gateway is clear for outward-bound vessels, the Drifter will display by day a black shape and by night two horizontal white lights.

During fog three long blasts on the steam whistle, repeated at intervals of five minutes, will indicate that the gateway is clear for outward-bound traffic.

Vessels approaching Falmouth in foggy weather should be careful to sound the regulation fog-signal and to proceed with great caution when within a depth of 30 fathoms at all states of the tide.

When the gateway is clear for inward-bound traffic, no outward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the gateway; and when the signals indicate that outward-bound traffic may pass through the gateway, no inward-bound vessels may approach within half a mile of the gateway.

During the hours of darkness all vessels entering or leaving Falmouth harbour must exhibit their side-lights.

(2) *Penzance Bay—Traffic Regulations.*

All vessels bound to or from Penzance bay must pass between the two light-buoys situated at a distance of about 1½ miles south-eastward

from St. Paul church north-westward of Mousehole, and maintain a course  $0^{\circ}$  (*N. 17^{\circ} E. Mag.*) and  $180^{\circ}$  (*S. 17^{\circ} W. Mag.*), respectively, for a distance of a quarter of a mile from the light-buoys.

Vessels approaching from the eastward must keep to the southward of the parallel of lat.  $50^{\circ} 02' N.$ ; until reaching a position about 3 miles southward of the gateway, which should then be steered for.

Any instructions given by the patrol vessels should be strictly observed.

Inward-bound vessels will have priority over outward-bound vessels in respect of passage through the gateway.

Vessels entering Penzance bay must close the Drifter, stationed about half a mile to the southward of the two light-buoys defining the gateway.

This Drifter regulates inward-bound and outward-bound traffic. When no signals are exhibited by day or night by this Drifter, inward-bound traffic may proceed to pass through the gateway.

To indicate that the gateway is clear for outward-bound vessels, the Drifter will display by day a black shape and by night two horizontal white lights.

During fog three long blasts on the steam whistle, repeated at intervals of five minutes, will indicate that the gateway is clear for outward-bound traffic.

Vessels making Mounts bay in foggy weather should be careful to sound the regulation fog-signal and to proceed with great caution when within a depth of 25 fathoms at all states of the tide.

When the gateway is clear for inward-bound traffic, no outward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the gateway; and when the signals indicate that outward-bound traffic may pass through the gateway, no inward-bound vessel may approach within half a mile of the gateway.

During the hours of darkness, all vessels entering or leaving Penzance bay must exhibit their side-lights.

Before attempting to leave Penzance bay, outward-bound vessels must obtain instructions as to the route to be followed.
