At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 16th day of January, 1918.

#### PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the Parish of St. Mary, Chelmsford, in the County of Essex, 10 days' previous Notice of their intention in that behalf, have, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by the Burial Act, 1900, made a Representation to His Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new Burial Ground in the Civil Parish of Chelmsford, in the County of Essex, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, and that Burials should be discontinued therein, as follows, viz.:—

CHELMSFORD.—Forthwith and entirely in the Churchyard of St. Mary, Chelmsford, otherwise known as Rectory Lane Cemetery, in the County of Essex; Provided that—

(a) In any vault or walled grave now existing in the said Burial Ground burial may be allowed subject to the condition that every coffin buried in such vault or grave be

separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b) In any earthen grave now existing in the said Burial Ground the burial may be allowed of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than 3 feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

(c) In the said Burial Ground, in any grave space in which no interment has here-tofore taken place, the burial may be allowed of the body of any person for whom, or of any member of a family for which, such grave space has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place, with the exclusive right of burial therein, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than 3 feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give Notice of such Representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 27th day of February next.

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct

that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the Churches or Chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the Parish affected by such Representation one month before the said 27th day of February.

And whereas it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation made under Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, may, whether the Proclamation was made before or after the passing of the Act now in recital, be varied or added to, whilst a state of war exists, by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade:

And whereas by a Proclamation, dated the 10th day of May, 1917, and made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, and Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, and Section 1 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, the exportation from the United Kingdom of certain articles to centain or all destinations was prohibited:

whereas by subsequent Orders of Council the said Proclamation was amended and added to in certain particulars:

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Board of Trade to the following effect:

That the Proclamation, dated the 10th day of May, 1917, as amended and added to by subsequent Orders of Council, should be further amended by making the following amendments in and additions to the Schedule to the same:

A) Wine.

Now, therefore, Their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into consideration, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the same be approved.

Whereof the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs and Excise, the Director of the War Trade Department, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

# CARGOES EX GERMAN VESSELS IN BRAZILIAN PORTS.

With reference to the notification which was published in the London Gazette of December 28th last, His Majesty's Minister at Rio de Janeiro now reports by telegraph that the warehouse charges on cargo discharged from these vessels have been finally fixed at 16 per cent. on ordinary cargo and 32 per cent. on cargo classed "Sobre-Agua" in the Brazilian Customs tariff.

His Majesty's Minister adds that these charges will hold good until the end of February, by which time the local representative of the cargo-owners estimates that all cargo for transhipment will have been cleared.

# CARGOES EX ENEMY VESSELS IN PORTUGUESE HARBOURS.

With reference to the notification which was published in the London Gazette of the 14th ult., respecting the release of allied and neutral merchandise found on enemy vessels in Portuguese harbours, His Majesty's Minister at Lisbon reports that the Portuguese Official Gazette of December 29 last publishes a correction of Article I. of the Ministerial Order No. 1155 of November 27 last, which should now be read as follows:

"1. That the Delivery Orders issued by masters and agents of ships shall be considered. as equivalent to those issued by the ship-owners, for the purposes, etc."

# Whitehall, 17th January, 1918.

His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to award the Edward Medal to Wilby Booth, signal man, and William Jeffells, plane-man, under the following circumstances:

On the 2nd of June, 1917, at the North Gawber Colliery, Yorkshire, a train of empty tubs was being hauled towards the face while at the same time a train of 36 tubs, containing the day shift of over 100 men, who were leaving work, was being hauled away from the face. Both trains were being hauled at about six miles an hour. Shortly before the trains met the incoming empty train ran off the rails, knocking down the roof supports and bringing a heavy fall of roof on to the tubs, which were piled in confusion. Both lines were completely blocked, and the signalling apparatus was injured, so that it was impossible to stop the outgoing train. After rapid consultation with Booth, Jeffells jumped on to the hauling rope and, after it had travelled about 25 yards, succeeded in drawing the bolt which secured the pin fastening the rope to the train. Booth, meanwhile, mounted the first tub, and, as soon as Jeffells had drawn the bolt, succeeded, after the rope had travelled a further 70 yards, in drawing out the pin, thus detaching the train from the rope. The train came to a standstill from the rope. within 30 yards of the fall. As soon as the train was detached from the rope, the hauling engine accelerated to such a degree that Booth was jerked from the tub before he could leave hold of the rope, injuring both knees.

The resource and courage of both men undoubtedly avoided a serious accident, in which many lives must have been lost. Both men risked their lives, as had Jeffells slipped from the rope, as he might easily have done, he would certainly have been crushed by the train, while had Booth failed in the very difficult task of drawing the pin while the train was in motion he would have been the first to have been killed when the train crashed into the

Also to Arthur Morris, a timberman at the Llanhilleth Colliery, Monmouth, under the following circumstances:

On the morning of the 30th March, 1917, a timberman named William Henry Dixon was drawing out timber in a part of the mine which it had been decided to abandon, and Morris was assisting him in this work. They had been at work for an hour when, owing to the collapse

of a pair of timbers, a fall of roof and sides occurred. Dixon was caught by the fall and fell in a sitting position, being buried up to the neck with rubbish and timber, about eight tons of which had fallen.

Morris was eight yards away when the fall occurred, and at once responded to Dixon's call for help, and, although heavy stones were still falling from the roof, and Morris was urged by Dixon to stand back, he persisted in his efforts to release his fellow-workman.

A large stone was then seen to be in imminent danger of falling on their heads, and with commendable presence of mind Morris ran back 20 yards for a piece of timber, which he fixed in a slanting position over Dixon to support the stone temporarily. Morris then restarted uncovering Dixon, and succeeded in releasing him in about twenty-five minutes after the accident occurred.

Dixon was badly bruised and cut all over his body, and while his injuries were being attended to by Morris, who himself suffered from cuts, the stone, which had been supported temporarily and which weighed about two tons, fell to the ground on the place where the men had been, and would undoubtedly have killed them both had the rescue been effected less expeditiously.

Morris displayed coolness, intelligence and initiative. He was 600 yards from the nearest man working in the mine, and if, as is the usual custom, he had gone for help, Dixon would have been buried by the falling debris

and have lost his life.

Also to Lieutenant John Morley Stebbings, Corporal Charles Ashley, Bombardier Bert Dugdale, Acting Serjeant Charles Thomas Harris, and Acting Bombardier Arthur Frederick Edwards on account of their gallant conduct in assisting in the rescue work on the occasion of the explosion which courred at Faversham on the 2nd April, 1916.

Also the Edward Medal in silver to George Henry Taylor and Thomas Stokes, and the Edward Medal to Thomas James White and Eli Purser, under the following circumstances:—

On the 31st May, 1917, an accident occurred at the Askern Main Colliery, Yorkshire.

Two men were trapped by a fall of roof weighing about thirty tons, and extending over an area of about 160 square feet—one of them completely buried near the edge of the fall, and the other was partially buried and severely injured. Eight of their fellow-workmen were soon on the spot, and after working bravely for two hours succeeded in releasing both men All the four men recommended for medals ran considerable risk, for a space of two hours, of being buried by further falls, and, had it not been for the presence of mind and self-sacrifice, their two comrades would certainly have lost their lives. Taylor and Stokes were exposed to the greatest danger, and displayed special initiative.

The KING has been graciously pleased to confer the Decoration of the Albert Medal in Gold upon Mr. Alfred William Furneaux, a chief steward in the Mercantile Marine.

The following is an account of the services in respect of which the Decoration has been conferred:—

In April, 1917, the steamship in which Mr. Furneaux was serving was torpedoed by the enemy, and a Lascar, who was on the spot where certain deck plates had buckled and broken, had his legs so firmly caught between the plates that he would have gone down with the ship. Mr. Furneaux, however, went to the man's assistance and managed to get one leg out, but the other was nearly severed through above the knee. Finding it impossible to pull this leg out, Mr. Furneaux amputated it with an ordinary clasp knife and then carried the man to a boat. When in the boat he dressed the wound as well as possible, and gave the life belt he was wearing to the wounded man. Mr. Furneaux also rendered first aid in the boat to another Lascar who was badly scalded.

Mr. Furneaux was in imminent danger of

losing his life in rendering the service.

TRADE BOARDS ACT, 1909.

HOLLOW-WARE TRADE BOARD (GREAT BRITAIN).

In accordance with the Regulations made under Section 18 of the above Act by the Board of Trade and dated 27th April, 1910, the Trade Board established under the above Act and the Trade Boards Provisional Orders Confirmation Act, 1913, for the Hollow-ware Trade as defined by the Regulations made by the Board of Trade and dated 6th July, 1914, have given notice that they have varied certain minimum rates of wages for female workers as follows:—

For female learners of 15 and under 16 years of age, from 8s. 6d. to 9s. per week.

For female learners of 16 and under 17 years of age, from 10s. 6d. to 12s. per week.

For female learners of 17 and under 18 years of age, from 13s. to 15s. per week.

For female workers (other than learners), from 15s. 9d. to 18s. per week.

The minimum rates are based on a week of 54 hours and are subject to a proportionate deduction or increase according as the number of hours spent by the worker in the factory or workshop under contract of employment in any week is less, or more than 54.

The Notice setting out the variations which have been made is dated 21st January, 1918, from which date such variations take effect as provided by the Trade Boards Act.

#### ORDER.

EXTENDING THE ORDER OF THE MINISTER OF MUNITIONS OF THE 23RD MARCH, 1917, AS TO SPELTER.

Whereas the Minister of Munitions is desirous of extending the Order made by him as to the control of spelter dated the 23rd March, 1917, in manner hereinafter appearing.

Now the Minister of Munitions, in exercise of the powers conferred upon him by the Defence of the Realm Regulations and all other powers thereunto enabling him, hereby orders as follows:—

- (1) As from the date hereof the said Order of the 23rd March, 1917, shall operate and take effect as if the following clause was substituted for clause 5 of the said Order, namely:—
  - "5. For the purpose of this Order the expression "Spelter" shall mean Spelter of all qualities and shall include sheet and rolled zinc, scrap zinc, hard spelter, dross, zinc ashes, flux skimmings, zinc dust, zinc ore,

zinc oxide, zinc sulphide (or lithopone), whether dry, in oil, or prepared for use, and zinc compounds of every kind, or any of them."

.(2) This Order may be cited as "The Spelter Control (Amendment) Order, 1918."

# DEFENCE OF THE REALM REGULATIONS.

# Screening of Lights on Board British Merchant Vessels.

In exercise of the powers conferred upon them by the Defence of the Realm Regulations and all other powers thereunto enabling them, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty hereby make the following Order:—

1. No light of any description shall be exposed in any British Merchant Vessel so as to be visible outboard or as to reflect upwards, and if any Master, Officer, Member of the Crew or Passenger, or any other person on board, so exposes or permits to be exposed any light, he shall be guilty of an offence against these Regulations.

Provided that this Order shall not apply to such Navigation Lights as the Admiralty Instructions may authorise to be shown at any particular time or in any particular place or circumstances, nor to any lights that are necessary for authorised signalling purposes.

- 2. It shall be the duty of the owner of every such vessel to provide adequate means of screening lights on board, and it shall be the duty of the Master or of such other Member of the Crew as he may appoint to take measures to secure that lights on board are screened as this Order requires, and if any of the said persons fail to perform his said duty he shall be guilty of an offence against these Regulations.
- 3. Any Naval Officer whom the Senior Naval Officer of the Port may appoint for the purpose may board any such vessel entering the Port to inspect the means provided for screening lights as this Order requires. The Master of such vessel shall give facilities for such inpection and shall, if the Inspecting Officer so requires, sign a certificate to the effect that adequate means of screening lights are provided on board.

Shipping is hereby warned that the only passage for traffic proceeding between the Downs and Dungeness is between the N.E. and S.E. gate light-buoys and then between North and South Folkestone gate light-vessels shown on the chart, and between N.W. and S.W. gate light-buoys and vice versa, and that Article 25 of the Collision Regulations must be complied with, that is to say, East-bound traffic must keep to the southern side of the passage and West-bound traffic must keep to the Northern side.
