**P**URSUANT to Order, 24th November, 1913, of the High Court of Justice, Chancery Division, made in re ELIZABETH TREGO BIRT, deceased, West v. Birt (1913, B. No. 3766), the following enquiry was directed:—"An enquiry who were the persons entitled, by virtue of or according to the Statute of Distribution or otherwise, to the estate of the above named Elizabeth Trego Birt, intestate, living at the time of her death, and whether any of them are since dead, and if so, who are their respective legal personal representatives." Now, all persons claiming to be interested under the said enquiry are, personally or by their Solicitors, on or before 28th June, 1918, to come in and prove their claims at the Chambers of Eve and Peterson, J.J., Royal Courts of Justice, Strand, London, England, or in default thereof they will be peremptorily excluded from the benefit of the said order. Friday, the 5th July, 1918, at 12 noon, at the said Chambers (Room 696), is appointed for hearing and adjudicating upon the claims.

**NOTE.**—Elizabeth Trego Birt died 6th September, 1904. She was a granddaughter of Isaiah Birt, a Baptist Minister, and his Wife Elizabeth, formerly Jones. They had, amongst others, the following children:—(a) John, who had, amongst other children, (1) Savery Birt, born about 1814, and (2) James Satterly, born about 1818, and both alleged to have died in infancy. (b) Jabez Sheen, born 1790, who is alleged to have been a Member of the Royal College of Surgeons, London, and to have died at Haiti, aged about 35. (c) William, died 17th September, 1873. (d) Caleb Evans, married 1817, and died 13th December, 1854, who is alleged to have had 9 children only, of whom (1) Sarah Ann is alleged to have died a Spinster, and (2) William and (3) Helen. (e) Eliza, who married John Howard Hinton in 1818, and died 1st May, 1874. It is alleged she had 10 children only, of whom (1) Sarah is alleged to have married secondly John Lawson, and to have died 4th December, 1886, and (2) Lydia Jemima is alleged to have married Elvery Dothie, and to have died 1st January, 1887. (f) Samuel, alleged to have died abroad, a Bachelor. (g) Isaiah, alleged to have been born in 1788. His second Wife was Elizabeth, formerly Trego. It is alleged their only children were (1) the said Elizabeth Trego Birt, born 1833; (2) Mary, born 1835; and (3) Isaiah, born 1838. The parents of Elizabeth Birt (Mother of Elizabeth Trego Birt) were Edward Trego and his Wife Mary, formerly Symons. It is alleged that they had amongst other children (1) Jane Louisa, baptized 15th October, 1801; (2) Jane Louisa, baptized 27th January, 1803; (3) Edward Isaiah, born 24th April, 1810; and (4) John Ajax, baptized 25th February, 1816. The persons claiming the estate of Elizabeth Trego Birt are her First Cousins living at her death and the representatives of those who have since died.—Dated this 6th day of February, 1918.
