Leghorne, January 24.

THE *William and Thomas*, Captain Orchard Commander, is arrived here from *New-England*, but last from *Port Longone*; as is also a Dutch Merchant Ship in 40 days from *Amsterdam*. We hear from *Toulon*, that 4 or 5 French Frigates are gone from thence to cruise.

Venice, Jan. 28. The Senate has not received this Week any Advices from the *Levant*, which we expect with some impatience, by reason of the great concern we are under to know the success of the Enemies design against *Scio*. Two new Men of War and 6 Gallies have been lately Launched, and will sail with the next Convoy, to join our Fleet in the *Archipelago*, and with the same opportunity, 2000 men will be sent thither to reinforce the *Venerian Army*.

Turin, January 28. The Duke of *Savoy* went from hence last Saturday to *Milan*, to pass a few days there; The chief design of this Journey is thought to be to concert Matters with the *Marquis de Leganes*, and the principal Commanders of the German and Spanish Forces, about the Siege of *Casal*; which 'tis generally believed, will be undertaken so soon as the Weather is proper for it. His Royal Highness has ordered a new Regiment of Dragoons to be raised. The *Vaudois* took the last Week 12 Mules that were going with Provisions to *Pignarol*.

Vienna, February 2. The Officers of the Imperial Forces are making their Recruits, as well for the Horse as the Foot, which they are to have compleat by the beginning of *April* at farthest. The Gallies, and other Vessels, that served the last Year on the *Danube*, are not only sitting out again, but others are provided to augment their number, because of the great usefulness they were found to be of in the former Campaignes. The Letters from *Gyula*, dated the 21th of the last month, tell us, that the Turkish Garrison continued still in the Lower Town or *Palank*; but that they would march away the 23d, consisting in about 1200 Soldiers, and 3 or 400 Inhabitants, who design to go with them to *Temeswar*; The Imperialists found in the place 40 Pieces of Cannon, with a considerable quantity of Ammunition. Our Troops on the Frontiers of *Transylvania* have lately defeated two of the Enemies Parties, and in both Rencontres cut off above 200 of them.

Frankfort, February 9. Prince *Lewis of Baden* is at last gone to *Vienna*, where he intends to make but a short stay. The preparations for the next Campaign are continued in these parts with great diligence.

Hamburg, February 11. The Letters from *Warsaw* of the 11th past give an account, that there continued to be such great heats and disputes among the Deputies which compose the Diet of that Kingdom, that they had not yet been

able to agree about the choice of their *Mareschal* or *Speaker*. The King of *Poland*, who had been indisposed, was perfectly recovered.

Paris, February 11. The Weather is excessive cold here, and several persons have of late been found dead on the Roads; 'Tis thought these severe Frosts will do much harm to the Vines, and to the Corn in the Ground. Great Complaints are still made concerning the Liking of men by force, but without any redress; and several disorders have happened on this account. The Poll-Tax, and that upon Fountains and Water-Pipes, go on, and tho' they will be Levied with great severity, yet 'tis generally believed, the first will fall much short of the Sums they propose to raise by it, because of the great diminution of the people in this Kingdom, as well by Mortality as the War, which has wholly dispeopled many Bourgs and Villages. 'Tis said that Orders are sent to *Toulon*, for refitting the Men of War in that Port; and that divers Frigates are made ready at *Rochefort*, to serve as Convoys for the French Merchant Ships designed to the *West-Indies* and other parts. The 6 Ships bound to the *East-Indies*, will sail about the middle of the next month. The French King has made Prince *Alexander* and Prince *Constantine*, Sons of the King of *Poland*, Knights of the Order of the Holy Ghost. The *Marquis d'Arenches* is arrived here Inognito in his Journey to *Vienna*; with the Character of Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of *Portugal* to the Emperor. We have an account from *Marseilles*, that two *Zevaland* Privateers had taken a French Merchant Ship belonging to that place, which was laden with Merchandises and Silver, to the value of 3 or 400000 Livres. They are here in much pain for *Casal*, which all the Letters from *Piedmont* say, the Allies design to besiege in the Spring.

Brussels, February 13. The Elector of *Cologne* came hither on the 11th Instant accompanied by Count *Serclaes of Tilly*, and other Persons of Quality, from *Liege*. An Officer in the Spanish Service, having laid a design to burn the Stores of Hay and Straw which the French had provided at *Namur*, he went thither the 3d of this month with 9 or 10 Volunteers more; The 4th in the Evening they got near the Town, and the Night following two of them passed the *Sambre*, and the Ditch, which were both frozen, and fixed their Fireworks in a great Magazine of Hay near the Wall of the place, which was all burnt, and they returned hither to give an account of their Exploit; for which they have been very well rewarded by the Elector. 'Tis said that they burnt, by this contrivance, about 1000 Load of Hay and Straw. The Prince of *Saxe-Gotha* is come hither, designing to pass some short time at this Court.

Hague, February 15. N. S. Yesterday came in 6 Posts together from *England*, which had been stopp'd by the strong Easterly Winds. All is quiet on the Frontiers of *Flanders*. The *Marquis de la Palette*, one of the French General Officers, and who was in great esteem among them, died at *Courtray* on the 9th of this month.

Falmouth, February 4. Yesterday arrived here a Vessel belonging to *Stetin*, laden with Salt from *Lubon*, who about 50 Leagues from the *Lizard*, met a French Prize laden with Salt taken by a Dutch Privateer, which being ready to Founder, was deserted by a Dutch and 4 French-men; and the said Vessel took them on Board, and brought them hither.

Plimouth, February 5. Yesterday came in the *St. Johns Adventure*, of, and from *Boston*, *Thomas Parker* Master, laden with Sugars and Molasses for *London*.

Bristol, February 5. This day was Launched here.

here a new Fourth Rate Ship for His Majesty's Service, carrying 60 Guns, called the *Glooucester*, built by Mr. *Thomas Clements*. A small Vessel is arrived here from *Cadix*, which lay a long time Wind-bound at *Combe*; as also several Vessels from *Ireland*.

Shorcham, February 5. A new Fifth Rate Frigate of 32 Guns called the *Hastings*, was Launched here this day, being built by Mr. *Ellis*.

Cowes, February 6. Yesterday passed by this Island to the Westward, a Fleet of Homeward-bound Merchant Ships, most of them English, under Convoy of the *Weymouth* and *Smirna-Factor*.

Poole, February 7. Yesterday was Launched at this Dock, a new Ship for His Majesty's Service, of 80 Guns, called the *Shrewsbury*, built by Mr. *Stigant*. His Majesty's Ship the *Weymouth* is come to *Spithead* from the Westward, with some Vessels under her Convoy.

Deale, February 8. Yesterday came into the Downs the *Smirna-Factor* from the Westward, with about 50 sail of Merchant Ships under her Convoy; among which is the *Samuel*, from *India*, some from the *Streights*, and others from the *West-Indies*.

Kensington, February 7. This day an Humble Address to His Majesty from the Clergy of *Ireland*, in which they condole the Queens Death, and earnestly pray that God would prolong His Majesty's Life, and continue his Government a great and lasting Blessing to all the Protestant Churches, and give success to all his Undertakings, for the restoring and preserving the Liberties of *Europe*, was, in their Names, presented to His Majesty by his Grace the Lord Archbishop of *Canterbury*.

The Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Gentlemen, and Grand Juris of the County of *Norfolke*, have, in an Humble Address to His Majesty, condole the Queens Death, and assured His Majesty, that they will be ready, upon all occasions, to assist His Majesty in their Persons, and to the utmost of their power, against all the Enemies of His Majesty's Government; which was delivered by His Grace the Duke of *Norfolke*, their Representatives in Parliament, and other Gentlemen of that County.

The Justices of the Peace for the *North-Riding* of the County of *York*, have made a very Loyal Address to His Majesty on the occasion of the Queens Death, which they condole, and assure His Majesty that they are unanimously resolved to use their utmost endeavours in their respective Stations, to disappoint the designs of all His Majesty's Enemies.
