Monday Jan. 19. The Letters from *Cadix* of the
obstant inform us, that they continue to Green
the Men of War in that Port; That several clean
Ships were going out to Cruise; That the *Deptford*,
Capt. *Edwards* Commander, had taken and brought to
the French Ship of 18 Guns called the *St. He-*
lène, laden with Oyl, Almonds, Soap,
bound for *St. Malo*; and that the *Resolution*
Frigate, Mr. *Thrington* Commander, was arrived
there in 9 days from the *Isle of Wight*. They
write from *Malaga* of the 4th, that His Majesty's
Ship the *Brida* was come in with 4 Tenders, to
take on Board Wine and Fruit for the service of
the Fleet: And from *Alicant* of the same date we
are told, that the *Comte d'Aguilar* was arrived there
in a Genouefe Ship in 13 days from *Genoa*, but
that they met with very bad Weather in the Gulf
of *Lyma*, which obliged them to throw part of
their Goods over-board. On the 9th Instant
the *Almirante of Castile* was declared Master of
the Horse to the King of *Spain*; and on the 13th
Don *Alonso Carrero*, Secretary of the Universal
Dispatch, was removed from that Office, and
Don *Juan de Lavea* at present supplies his place.
The Moors still continue the Siege of *Centa*, but
have hitherto advanced very little.

Curra, Feb. 5. We have an account from *Bil-*
bo of the 17th past, that the *Newfoundland* Ships that
lately sailed from thence under Convoy of the *Arch-*
Angel, were safely arrived in that Port: And from
Oporto of the 29th past they advise, that on the
28th appeared before that place a Fleet of about
50 Sail of Ships, supposed to be the Convoy from
England, bound thither and to *Lisbon*. They write
from *Madrid*, that the *Deptford* had taken another
French Prize of 18 Guns; and that the English
Frigates cruise so diligently, that none of the En-
emies Ships can pass the *Strait of Gibraltar*.

Leghorn, Jan. 31. By Letters from *Messina* of
the 12th Instant we understand, that 3 Zealand
Privateers had brought in there 3 rich French
Prizes; one bound from *Marseilles* to *Santhia*; an-
other from *Constantinople* to *Marseilles*; and the third
laden with Corn from *Cyprus* to *Marseilles*.

Zante, Febr. 4. We are still expecting an Ac-
count from the *Lieutnant* of what has passed in those
parts since the 15th of *December* (which is the date
of our last Advices from thence) in relation to
the Enemies intended Expedition for the recover-
ing of *Sala*. Prince *Charles of Brandenburg*, who
came hither to partake of the Diversions of the
Carnival, is returned to *Plamou*, very well sa-
tisfied with his Reception here.

Frankfort, Febr. 13. Prince *Lewis of Baden* be-
gan his Journey the 11th Instant from *Grutshurg*
towards *Vienna*; and during his absence the Mar-
grave of *Bareith* commands the Confederate Forces
on the *Rhine*; who for that reason has at present
his Residence at *Hallbrun*. The Recruits for the
Troops of the Allies are continued with great dili-
gence in all these parts.

Paris, Febr. 15. The Carnival passes here without those
Publick Diversions that have been a way of late, in this time,
to which the People have now little inclination by reason of
the many and heavy Taxes that lie upon them, and the
general Poverty of the Kingdom. The still they suffer
makes many take a great liberty in their Discourse against
the Government; and the last week two Con-
fessors of the Parliament of *Reims* were committed to Prison for
speaking against the *Poli Tax*. The Duke de *Noulles* is
to command again the next Summer in *Germany*. The
Maréchal de *Cornet* in *Provence*; and the Maréchal de
Loze and *Châtelain* in *Germany*; but is not yet declared
who is to have the chief Command of the Army in *Flan-*
ders. The Advices from *Italy* continue to speak of the
Enemies design to besiege *Cisal*.

Brussels, Febr. 16. The Elector of *Bavaria* has given
the Command of a Company to the Person that lately
brought the Magazine at *Namur*, with a Reward of Money be-
lieves to him and the rest that assisted in that design. The
Preparations are hastned for sending 3000 men from hence
to serve in *Catalonia*. The Letters from the Frontiers say,
that the Maréchal de *Boufflers* was sent for to the French
Court to be present at a great Council of War.

Hague, Febr. 18. N. S. The Deputies of the Admi-
ralties have frequent Conferences with the Deputies of the
States about our Sea Preparations. The next week divers
new Mortars are to be tried which have been cast for the
next Summers service.

Dublin, Feb. 7. The Letters from *Kinsale* of the 5th
instant give an account, that His Majesty's Ship the *Pearle*,
Captain *Holmes* Commander, came into that Port the day
before, and brought in with him a French Privateer of 10
Guns and 6 Pattereroes, called the *Squadron of Brest*, which
Capt. *Holmes* took on the 4th Instant off of *Wexford*.

Pembroke, Feb. 8. Yesterday came into our Harbour the
Jezebel of London, John *Hyslop* Commander from *Barbadoes*.
Falmouth, Feb. 9. The 6th came in here the *Spanish*
Expedition from the *Groyne*. And on the 7th arrived in
this Port the *Rebecca* of London in 11 weeks from *Jamaica*;
From whence she came with some other Merchant Ships
under Convoy of the *Atreus* Frigate.

Plymouth, Feb. 10. On the 8th arrived here His Ma-
jesty's Ship the *Atreus* from *Jamaica*, and under her Con-
voy the *Gilbert* and *Aime* bound for London. Yesterday
came in His Majesty's Ship the *Forefight*, with the *Sea*
Power of London from *Virginia*, which was taken by a
French Privateer of 52 Guns, called the *Fortune of Dun-*
kerke, and retaken on the 6th Instant by the *Forefight*, who
gave Chase for several hours to the said Privateer. This
day arrived here the *Mary Rose* of London from *Barbadoes*;
And the *Amelia*, and the *Richard* and *Sarah*, the two last
belonging to London, and both bound home from *Jamaica*.

Kennington, Febr. 13. A Letter to His Majesty from the Lords, Justices and Council of Ireland, in which they humbly Express their great Grief and Concern for the Queens Death; Bless God for His Goodness in preserving His Majesty to be the great Defender of our Religion and Liberties against the open and secret Enemies of both; Pray for His Majestys long and prosperous Reign; And Assure His Majesty of their faithful Services, though to the hazard of their Lives and all that is dear to them, and that His Majesty has entirely the Hearts and Affections of all His Protestant Subjects in that Kingdom, who have behaved themselves with all imaginable Duty on this Sad Occasion; was yesterday presented to His Majesty, together with an humble and very Loyal Address of the Nobility and Gentry about Dublin to the same effect, by Mr. Keightley, one of the Privy Council of Ireland, who was sent over by the Board for this purpose.

The Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons and Citizens of the City of Dublin, have likewise made an Humble and Loyal Address to His Majesty, in which they Condole the Queens Death; acknowledge the great Advantages they receive under His Majesty's Government; pray for the long continuance of it; and Assure His Majesty, that they will stand by Him with their Lives and Fortunes against all His Enemies; Which was delivered by Sir Michael Mitchel an Alderman of that City.

The Governor of the City and Garison of Carlisle in the County of Cumberland, and the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Bayliffs, and Citizens of the same City, have made a Loyal Address to His Majesty, declaring their deep Sorrow for the Queens Death, praying for His Majesty's long and happy Reign, and Assuring His Majesty, that they will by all the Services in their power endeavour to defend and maintain His Majesty's Government against all Opposers; which was delivered by His Grace the Duke of Bolton.

The Justices of the Peace for the County of Westmorland, do in like manner Condole the Queens Death, and crave Leave to Assure His Majesty, that they will upon all Occasions, to the utmost of their Power, most faithfully and loyally serve and defend His Majesty and His Government against all His Enemies both at Home and Abroad.

The Bayliffs, Burgesses, and Commonalty of the Burrough of Tamworth in the Counties of Warwick and Stafford, do also in their Address to His Majesty Condole the Queens Death, and give His Majesty sincere Assurances of serving His Majesty's Person and Government with their Lives and Livelihoods against all His Enemies; which was delivered by Sir Henry Gough one of their Representatives in Parliament.
