Maeffricht and *Liege*. They write from the Upper Rhine,
 That Prince *Lewis* of *Baden*, who is gone to *Vienna* to
 assist at a great Council of War there, had before he be-
 gun his Journey, acquainted the Deputies of *Franconia* and
Saxonia, with his intentions to be back at *Guntzburg* by
 the middle of the next month; and that the Margrave of
Bavaria was to Command the Confederate Forces during
 his absence.

Dublin, Feb. 15. His Majesty's Ship the *Pearle*, Capt.
Holmes Commander, is come into this Bay from *Kinsale*.
 The two last Posts from the Sea Ports of this Kingdom
 brought no manner of News.

Falmouth, Feb. 16. The 11th instant put into this Port
 the *Nuestra Señora de Capua*, of and from *Lasbon*, bound
 with Wines and Fruit for *London*; She came from thence
 about 3 weeks ago in Company of the *Joseph*, Captain
Brookes Commander, from whom she was parted on the
 9th instant. On the 12th came into this Port two flush-
 ing Privateers, called the *Galley of Fishing*, *John Wiffard*
 Commander, and the *Roman of Zealand*, *Jacob Steer*
 Commander, from Cruising; The last of these is one of
 the Privateers that retook the *Falkeland*, and saw her safe
 into Port *St. Antonio*.

Pembroke, Feb. 15. The 12th instant put into this Har-
 bour the *Supply of London*, *John Boston* Commander, from
Barbadoes, laden with Sugar and Cotton; She came from
 thence in November last. The *Abraham* and *Isaac* of
Bristol, who was in her Company, foundered at Sea, but the
 Men and Passengers were all saved by this Ship.

London, Feb. 20. Yesterday was Launched at His Ma-
 jesty's Yard at *Woolwich* a new Fourth Rate Ship, called the
Livestock, carrying 50 Guns and 226 Men, built by Mr.
Joseph Lawrence.
