THE King is pleased to Order the Chief Offi-
cers of the Army to meet twice a Week at the
Great Chamber at the Horse-Guards at Whitehall,
to receive and examine all Informations and Com-
plaints that shall be brought before them, against
any Officers or Soldiers of His Majesty's Land
Forces: Which meeting is to be held every Wed-
nesday and Saturday at Ten a Clock, when all Per-
sons whatsoever may make Application to them,
and offer their Complaints, of any Wrong or Injury
in order to their being Redressed.

Milan, January 26. An Officer came
hither two days ago from the Confederate
Forces quartered about Casal, to inform the
Marquis de Leganez, our Governor, that
several Country People have been lately
taken, who were carrying in Provisions for the
use of the Garison, and some others, who were
coming from thence, and that the latter do all
agree in the account they give of the ill condi-
tion that Garison is reduced to through the want
of their Pay, and the scarcity of Victuals and
other Necessaries. The Marquis de Leganez has,
by Order from the Court of Spain, given out
Commissions for raising two Regiments of Ita-
lians, who are designed for the Service of Ca-
telonia, and the Officers are to have them com-
pleat to be transported thither in the Spring.
The Genoueses do raise Men to reinforce their
Frontier Garisons. Preparations are made at
Alexandria, Patia, and other places, for the Siege
of Casal.

Venice, Feb. 5. They are fitting here 12 new
Gallies, and several Men of War, which may
be ready to sail the next month in order to join
our Fleet in the Levant. Several new railed
Companies are come to the Lido, and more are
daily expected, who are to go with the next
Convey to the Levant; from whence we have
no fresh News. The last Letters from Dalma-
tia say, That the loss of Ciclut makes the Turks
in those parts very uneasie, and that they seem
to have thoughts of making another Effort to
recover it, which the Venerians are little con-
cerned at, the Garison being in a very good con-
dition to defend it, and a sufficient Body of
Troops ready at hand to relieve them, in case
there be occasion.

Warsaw, Jan. 29. The Diet of this Kingdom was open-
ed on the 12th instant, but the Deputies that compose it
were no sooner come together but a great dispute arose
among them, by reason, the Sicur Crispin, who was Ma-
rshchal of the last Diet held at Grodno, took upon him, ac-
cording to Custom, to exercise that Function till a new
Marshchal was chosen, which the Deputies of Lithuania
warmly opposed, because he was not deputed by any of the
Palatinates to assist on their part at the present Diet; others
supported him in his Pretention, and the Heats grew so
high, that several Sabres were drawn on both sides, and
the Assembly broke up in much disorder; Since which they
have met again several times, but with no better success,
notwithstanding the Cardinal Radziowski, and some other
Persons of the principal Quality, have laboured very ear-
nestly to adjust this matter; and because this misunder-
standing between the Deputies of the Diet, seems to be
fomented on account of the difference that happened some
time since between the Prince Sapieha, General of Lithua-
nia, and the Bishop of Vilna, the King of Poland does
particularly endeavour to compose the same, and has ef-
fected so much, that the Pope's Nuncio, (who had very ze-
alously taken part with the Bishop of Vilna) and the said
General, were on Thursday last brought together, and
reconciled in his Majesty's presence, which probably
will be followed in few days by an accommodation be-
tween the General and the Bishop. The Tartars make
preparations at Jassi in Moldavia for the Relief of Cami-
niec, and our Troops are very watchful to prevent their
design.

Vienna, Feb. 9. The Radziens, Commanded by Col.
Antonio have had very good success in the Incursions they
have lately made into the Enemies Territories, having de-
feated several of their Parties, and taken good store of
Boory. General Vesperani will return to Transilvania a-
bout the beginning of the next month; and there is a dis-
course as if the Emperor would employ him in the chief
Command of his Army in Hungary the next Campaign.
They write from the Frontiers, That the Bassa of Belgrade
had received positive Orders from the Ottoman Port to
relieve the Garison of Giula, and was preparing to put
the same in execution, when he received the news of the
surrender of that place, which he had given notice of by
an Express to the Grand Visier. We are expecting with
much impatience to know the success of the Enmies
enterprise for the regaining of Scio, which is of great
consequence to them seeing the loss of that Island interrupts
their Navigation with Egypt, from whence they are sup-
plied with Provisions.
