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R. I. A. A Poem

Madrid, February 3.

New Levies are making in all the Provinces of this Kingdom for reinforcing the Spanish Army in Catalonia; and a Supply of Money has been late-ly sent to the Viceroy of that Country. The Advices from Cadiz of the 18th of the last month say, That the Beneged had made a great Saile upon the Moors, and beat them from several of their Works, which they afterwards demol-ished. We have an account from Cadiz, that several English Men of War are sailed from thence up the streights under the Command of Captain Killigrew, to cruize about

Malta. On the 14th Instant came in here a Venetian Ship called the *Judith* from England; The Mas-ter whereof gives an account, that touching at *Ascani* the 25th of January, he heard that Admiral *Russell* had upon Advise that 4 French Men of War were gone from *Malta* to cruise about *Malta*, sent out several English Fri-gates to look after them, who sailed accordingly from *Ca-diz* the 17th or 18th of the same month; That passing the 5th Instant through the *Strait of Messina*, he saw there 5 big Ships, 4 of which, as he was informed, were En-glish Men of War, and the other a French Ship of 64 Guns which they had brought in with them; The man-ner of he being taken, together with another French Fri-gate in her Company, was thus: Capt. *Killigrew* having with him 4 English Frigates, on the 27th past in the morning sent away 3 of them to cruise, and being himself in His Majesty's Ship the *Medway*, came up about two hours after with two French Men of War, one of 64 and the other of 52 Guns, and engaged them for some hours off of *Pan-talaris*; Upon the noise of the Guns the other three returned to his Assistance, but before they came in, Capt. *Killigrew* was killed, with divers of his men, and the Lieutenant maintained the Fight; And soon after, both the French Ships yielded; They had together above 700 men, many of which were killed, with the Commander of one of them. On the 2d of February, the English Frigates arrived at *Messina* with the biggest of their Pri-zes, the other sinking at Sea; but the men were all sav-ed. The *Medway*, and another English Frigate, had re-ceived some damage in their Masts and Rigging, which, having repaired, they would all four sail very speedily from *Messina*. The Commander of the *Judith* says also, That he saw two Ships off *Palermo* who chased him, and he believes they were the other two French Men of War that came from *Toulon* with those that were taken; and that notice was given thereof to the English Frigates at *Messina*. The last Advices the Senate have received from the *Levant* give an Account, That the Captain Ge-neral *Zeno* Fortifies *Sicily*, and causes his Ships and Gallies to cruise in the *Archipelago*, so that 'tis very difficult for any Vessels to come from, or go to *Constantinople*; And that they had taken several French Ships that were going with Arms and Ammunition to the Turks, and sunk some others. The Senate have ordered their Ambassador at the French Court, to complain of their feeding the Turks with Supplies.

Turn, Febr. 16. The Preparations are continued in *Piedmont* and the *Milanese* for the Siege of *Casal*; and in the mean time the Place is very closely blockt up. The Margrave of *Brandenburg* is returned hither from *Milan*. The Duke of *Savoy* has named the Marquis de *Butehere* to go and make his Compliment of Condolence to His Majesty of Great-Britain upon the Death of the Queen for which this Court is gone into Cierfe Mourning.

Vienna, Febr. 16. Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* is shortly ex-pected here from his Houe in *Bohemia*; and upon his ar-rival a great Council of War will be held at this Court. The Duke of *Croy* is coming hither from *Germany*. Great preparations are made for the Campaign in *Hungary*, and they talk here of opening it with the Siege of *Temeswar*. General *Veterani* is come back from *Inspucke*, and will re-tire to *Transilvania* towards the end of this month.

Frankfort, Febr. 26. All things are preparing in these parts for an early Campaign; The Imperial Commissaries

are providing Magazines at *Hailbron*, and other Places near the *Rhine*, having now the convenience of the Rivers which the late Thaw has opened again. The French are doing the like in *Alsace*.

Cologne, Febr. 28. The Brandenburg Troops that have Wintered in this Diocess, are now quartered about *Brussel* and *Ordningen*; from whence they will remove nearer to the *Muse*. This week a great many Recruits pulled through here, being raised for the Service of the Imperial Troops on the *Upper-Rhine*.

Hamburg, Febr. 28. The Letters from *Poland* of the 15th Instant tell us, that the Count de *Teschin* was arrived there with the Character of Ambassador Extraordinary from the Emperor. That there continued such Heats and Disputes among the Deputies of the *Dyer*; that they had very little hopes of the good conclusion of it. And that the Tartars and Moldavians were pre-paring a great Convoy for the relief of *Cannice*.

Paris, Febr. 28. The Poll Tax is now raising here and in the Provinces, but is like to fail much short of what was at first proposed, by the wrong computation that has been made of the number of the People, which at *Rouen* and many other Places is found to be hardly one half of what it was reckoned to be, the Inhabitants being much diminished by the Distemper that have for some time reigned in this Kingdom, occasioned chiefly by the want and misery there is among the meaner sort. 'Tis not yet declared who shall command the French Army in *Flanders*; some speak of the Prince of *Conde*, others of the Prince of *Conti*, and others again of the Mareschal de *Villeroy*; and this Competition creates Factions at Court. An Order was lately put out, by which the Officers of the Army were to have their Companies com-plete by the end of this month, but this is now prolonged till the end of the next by reason of the great difficulty there is to get Men. The Ma-rechal de *Choiseul* is to command this Summer a-gain in *Normandy*, and the Mareschal d'*Estree* in *Poitou*; The Sieur de *Polastron* Mareschal de Camp, is ordered to *St. Malo*, and all possible Care is taken to secure our Coasts against any new Insults of the Enemy. The Mareschal de *Tourville* will shortly return to *Toulon*, where the Men of War are fitting out, and they talk of having a Squa-dron of 15 or 18 Ships ready in *April* to carry Provisions and Ammunition to their Troops in *Catalonia*. They write from *Marseilles*, that the Inhabitants of that City were much troubled at the news they had received, that the Enemy have lately taken 3 of their Ships richly laden.

Brussels, March 2. The States of *Flanders*, be-sides their Ordinary Subsidies, have given 180000 Florins to be applied to the payment of those Troops only that are now actually in the Service of these Countreys. The Duke of *Wirtemberg* has taken a Review of the Infantry in this Garison, and is going from hence to do the like in all the Garisons of *Brabant*. The Letters from *Namur* say, that the French were preparing a Train of Artillery, which they intended to Ship on the Vessels they had provided for that purpose on the *Muse*, and that 15 Battalions are shortly expected there. The Elektor of *Cologne* continues still here.

Hague, March 4 N.S. The States of *Holland* meet again on the 9th Instant. The States General have deputed *Moniteurs Hop, Beckar, and Domberg*, to the States of *Friesland*, who are to assemble at *Lemmerden* on the 12th Instant. *Don Bernardo de Siquera*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Crown of *Spain*, has hired divers Vessels at *Amsterdam* to transport 4000 Soldiers from *Flanders* to *Catalonia*. The Letters from *Venice* advise, that some English Frigates cruising in the Channel of *Malta*, had taken a French Man of War of 64 Guns, and brought her to *Messina*. and had sunk another of 52 Guns.

Falmouth, Febr. 23. On the 20th put into this Port the *Revenge* Galley, *Daniel Clark* Master, from *St. Sebastian*, who failed again yesterday for *London*.

Hull, Febr. 23. On Thursday last sailed out of *Humber* a Fleet of about 85 Sail of Merchant Ships bound to *Rotterdam*, under Convoy of two Dutch Men of War of 50 and 40 Guns each.

Yarmouth, Febr. 25. His Majesty's Ship the *Solebay* came in here this day, and brought in with her a French Privateer of 4 Guns belonging to *Dunkirke*. This Afternoon were landed here two Mails from *Holland*.

From on Board His Majesty's Ship the Centurion, Capt. Price Commander in Margate-Road, Febr. 24. Yesterday between 8 and 9 in the morning, about 5 or 6 Leagues E. N. E. from the *North Foreland*, we fell in with 4 *Dunkirke* Privateers, and coming near, one of them put out Dutch Colours, and we put out our Colours, whereupon they began to bear away from us; We fired at the Ship that was next us, and then gave Chace to the biggest of the four, they all standing different ways; after some time we came up with her, and poured two Broad-sides into her, which killed 12 of her Men, and wounded 17, and on our side there was only one Man wounded in the Arm with a Musket Shot; This so disheartened the Enemy that they presently yielded: The Prize carried 12 Guns, 18 Patereroes, and 160 Men, and was reckoned the best Sailer of *Dunkirke*. The Prisoners say, that these 4 Privateers had together about 600 Men, and that they agreed when they first saw us to lay us on Board, but it seems they quickly changed their minds. They came out of *Dunkirke* in Company of 6 other Privateers to cruise on these Coasts, and 4 more were ready, who were designed to the Northward.

Dover, Febr. 24. Yesterday three French Privateers forced ashore the *Goodwin-Prize*, of 6 Guns, about two miles from hence, but the Men are saved.
