In pursuance of an Act for better preserving the navigation of the River Mersey (5 and 6 Vic., cap. 110), we, the United Alkali Co., Ltd.; Cunard Building, Liverpool, hereby give you notice that we propose to alter and extend the works referred to in our notice of 11th day of December, 1917, to which sanction has now been given in accordance with Plans and Sections deposited at the Office of the Mersey Conservancy.

(a) To construct intakes for circulating pumps required in connection with New Power Station required for work in hand for the Trench Warfare Supply Department of the Ministry of Munitions. These intakes will be formed in concrete and will be in the bed of the river at a point approximately 100 feet south east of the south west pierhead of the New Lock entrance to Widnes West Bank Dock. They

will project no further from the shore than a line parallel to and 50 feet out from the outer coping line of the old river wall of the Widnes West Bank Dock, and their upper surface will be not above 4 ft. 6 in. above the level of Liverpool Old Dock Sill, to which level the river bed rises on this outer boundary line at a point approximately 100 feet south east of these intakes. Their position will be safeguarded and marked by projective piles with lights.

The intakes will be in duplicate each of a total length not exceeding 30 feet and a total of about one million gallons of water per hour will be taken in from the river at this point and returned to the river through an opening in the existing river wall at a point about 220 yards south east of the point of intake.

(b) To construct temporary timber or steel piled dams to enclose the site of these intakes during construction, such dams to project into the river not further than a line parallel to and 60 feet out from the line of the outer coping of the old river wall of Widnes West Bank Dock and not further to the north west than the pierhead of the New Lock entrance of the Widnes West Bank Dock, and to remove such dams on the completion of the work of constructing the intakes. It is proposed to commence these works immediately and to complete them within six months of commencement of work.

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**AN ORDER TO AUTHORIZE GENERAL AND FIELD OFFICERS OF THE ROYAL AIR FORCE TO ISSUE BILLETING REQUISITIONS IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 108A OF THE AIR FORCE ACT.**

Whereas by Section 108A of the Air Force Act it is, amongst other things, enacted that where directions have been given for embodying all or any part of the Territorial Force it shall be lawful for His Majesty by Order distinctly stating that a case of emergency exists and signified by a Secretary of State to authorise any General or Field Officer Commanding any part of His Majesty's Air Force in any Air-force area or place in the United Kingdom to issue a billeting requisition under his hand requiring chief officers of police to provide billets in such places and for such number of officers and airmen and their horses and for such period as may be specified in the requisition in accordance with the provisions of the said Section.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in pursuance of the said Act, is pleased to order and authorise any General or Field Officer Commanding any part of His Majesty's Air Force in any Air-

## ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 5TH APRIL 1918.)

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

### *Application of the Sheep (Double Dipping) Order of 1914.*

1.—(1) The provisions of the Sheep (Double Dipping) Order of 1914 (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order") are hereby applied to the Area described in the Schedule hereto.

(2) In its application to such Area the principal Order shall be read and have effect as if paragraph (3) of article 2 of that Order were omitted.

(3) While this Order remains in operation sheep in the area described in the Schedule hereto shall be exempt from the provisions of Article 3 of the Sheep Dipping (Scotland and North of England) Order of 1915 so far as they relate to dippings within the prescribed dipping periods.


### *Period Prescribed as Double Dipping Period.*

2. The dates between which all sheep in the Area described in the Schedule hereto are to be dipped within the Area by the owner or person in charge of the sheep under and in accordance with Part II. of the principal Order, are hereby fixed to be the fourteenth day of August and the first day of October.

### *Commencement.*

3. This Order shall come into operation on the twelfth day of April, nineteen hundred and eighteen.

Commencing in the main road, Kettlewell, at Townfoot Bridge, and proceeding in a northerly direction along the road to Bainbridge via Starbotton, Buckden and Capfley Green to the guide-post in the main road from Bainbridge to West Witton; thence in easterly, southerly, and easterly directions along that road via Worton, Cubeck, Thornton Rust, and Aysgarth to the guide-post at the junction of the road leading to West Burton; thence in a south-easterly direction along that road via Eshington Bridge to Burton Bridge; thence in north-easterly and easterly directions along the road via Howrane to its junction with the road to Melmerby at Steeps Head; thence in south-easterly and westerly directions via Middleham Common and Melmerby to the northern boundary of the Parish of Carlton Town; thence in easterly and southerly directions following the northern and eastern boundaries of the Parishes of Carlton Town and West Scafton to the County boundary; thence in a south-westerly direction along the county boundary to the point where it is crossed by the road from Kettlewell to Carlton; thence in southerly and westerly directions along that road via West Scale Park and Kettlewell to the point of commencement.

(Any roads forming parts of such boundaries to be excluded from the area.)

No. 454 of the year 1918.

**SCOTLAND NORTH-EAST COAST, WITH ORKNEY AND SHETLAND ISLES.**

*Former Notices.*—Nos. 762, 888, 1024, 1129 and 1248 of 1917; Nos. 9, 153 and 319 of 1918.

Notice is hereby given that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and are now in force:—

**(1) Pentland and Moray Firths—Restriction of Traffic; Pilotage Regulations.**

The following regulations have been made with a view to safeguarding the interests of shipping in the Pentland and Moray firths:—

**I.—RESTRICTION OF TRAFFIC.**

1. No vessel, either British, Allied or Neutral, is to be in the shaded area on the accompanying portion of Admiralty Chart No. 2, from half an hour after sunset to half an hour before sunrise, unless at anchor. No vessel, however, is to anchor:—

(a) Anywhere along the coast between Tarbet Ness and North Sutor, except within one mile radius of Balintore;

(b) Anywhere off the south shore of the Moray firth between the meridians of Port Gordon and Burghead except within three-quarters of a mile of the low-water mark;

(c) Outside a distance of one mile of the coast in any other portion of the shaded area.

2. Vessels proceeding to ports in the Moray firth should therefore endeavour to enter the firth in time to reach their destinations not later than half-an-hour after sunset. Should they not reach their destinations by that time they are to anchor, weather permitting, subject to the restrictions given in clause 1.

3. Any vessel contravening the foregoing regulations will run the gravest risk of being sunk.

*Caution.*—Neutral or Allied vessels are particularly warned that the passage through the Pentland firth presents very grave risks to a Westbound vessel and are strongly advised not to take it.

## II.—PILOTAGE REGULATIONS.

1. Pilotage is compulsory at the ports of Cromarty and Inverness for all vessels (including fishing vessels) which have a draught of over eight feet, and it is highly dangerous for any vessel to enter or leave without a pilot. Fishing and other small vessels having a draught of over eight feet are to assemble at the Pilotage stations, and will be conducted into and out of port in groups.

Vessels bound for Cromarty and Inverness will be led through the defences from a position


ness to Findhorn, and a line drawn from Fort George to Chanonry point.

## (2) Orkney Isles—Traffic Regulations.

## I.—SCAPA FLOW AND APPROACHES.

1. All entrances are dangerous, and entry is absolutely prohibited by any of them except as provided in succeeding paragraphs.

2. Examination services have been established in the entrances to Hoxa and Hoy sounds; vessels directed to enter must communicate with the Examination vessel and follow



off Tarbet ness by a pilot boat. They should follow directly astern of her.

Local arrangements for leading vessels through the defences will be made for vessels leaving Cromarty or Inverness.

2. It is dangerous for any vessel to be under way to the south-westward of a line joining Tarbet ness and Findhorn without a pilot.

3. No vessels of any description other than H.M. Ships and Auxiliaries are to be under way between sunset and sunrise in the waters contained between a line drawn from Tarbet

the instructions received from her very carefully.

3. No vessel is permitted to approach the entrance to Hoxa sound within a radius of 5 miles under any circumstances whatever, except when actually ordered to Scapa Flow.

4. The only vessels permitted to enter Hoy sound from the westward are those ordered to Stromness.

5. Vessels are not permitted to enter Hoxa or Hoy sounds by night or in thick weather.

6. Passage through Cantick sound is entirely prohibited.

## II.—PORT OF KIRK WALL AND APPROACHES.

1. The port of Kirkwall shall comprise all enclosed waters of the Wide Firth and Kirkwall bay to westward of Thieves holm.

2. Merchant vessels shall obey all orders given them by the Admiralty Port Officer as regards anchoring or shifting position.

3. No vessel other than H.M. Ships shall enter or leave the Port of Kirkwall during hours of darkness, *i.e.*, between half an hour after sunset and half an hour before sunrise, except in special circumstances with special permission from the Admiralty Port Officer.

4. During foggy and thick weather, traffic in and out of the port is stopped, and no vessel shall approach the boom from either direction.

5. No vessel other than H.M. Ships or boat shall move in the harbour during hours of darkness as aforesaid. And no boat other than those belonging to H.M. Ships shall approach the shore or go alongside any pier in the Port of Kirkwall.

6. All vessels other than H.M. Ships entering or leaving the Port of Kirkwall shall be piloted in and out by a Pilot drifter, and are prohibited from entering or leaving harbour unless so piloted, save and except only (1) in the case of such British vessels as have a written exemption therefrom, issued by the Admiralty Port Officer, (2) when a liner is entering the harbour, the Pilot may at his discretion, when circumstances of tide and sea render it advisable, direct such liner to enter the harbour without being piloted, provided always that the gate is open for incoming traffic.

7. Vessels, when cleared, shall wait for the Pilot vessel to conduct them out of port, or proceed as directed by the Naval Authorities.

8. Drifters engaged on pilot duty will fly the pilot flag (white and red, horizontal).

9. Incoming and outgoing traffic will be regulated by signals hoisted at the yardarm of the Boom trawler and repeated at the Hellier holm lighthouse.

10. Traffic signals are to be strictly obeyed, and no vessel shall approach the entrance against the signal.

11. The following Traffic signals will be displayed at the Boom and at Hellier holm:—

Gate "Open for Incoming Traffic":

By day—Two balls, vertical.

By night—A red light.

Gate "Open for Outgoing Traffic":

By day—A cone, point upwards.

By night—A green light.

Gate Closed: By day—Three balls at Hellier holm.

By night—Three red lights at Hellier holm.

12. Vessels entering will, as a rule, be given priority over those leaving.

13. All outgoing vessels shall pass round the Turning buoy (red and white striped, spherical) moored approximately  $285^{\circ}$  (*N.  $56^{\circ}$  W. Mag.*), one mile from the entrance.

14. Incoming vessels will not pass round the Turning buoy, but will shape course as requisite for the anchorage on entering.

15. No outgoing vessel shall pass the Turning buoy, unless the signal for outgoing traffic is up. If the signal is against it, such vessel shall stop and wait in the neighbourhood of the Turning buoy.

16. No incoming vessel shall pass Hellier holm, unless the signal for incoming traffic is

up at Hellier holm. If the signal is against it, such vessel shall wait in Shapinsay sound.

17. Incoming and outgoing vessels shall not pass through the gate simultaneously. If, through any misunderstanding, an outgoing and an incoming ship are approaching the gate simultaneously, then the outgoing ship shall give way, and shall turn round, and return to the Turning buoy and there wait till such time as the entrance is clear.

18. As a rule only one ship will be conducted out at a time, but under exceptional circumstances, in the event of two ships being conducted out, then the pilot will give instructions as to which ship is to go first and the rear ship shall then keep a full half mile directly astern, and is on no account to close or overhaul or attempt to pass the ship ahead.

19. *Caution.*—Caution is necessary when approaching the boom, as the tidal stream does not set fairly through the opening and attains considerable velocity especially on the ebb or west-going stream, which sets in a north-westerly direction.

*Variation.*— $19^{\circ}$  W.

(3) *Shetland Isles—Traffic of Neutral Vessels Prohibited.*

No vessels other than those of British Nationality or those of the Allied Nations, except vessels calling for the purpose of Examination, shall enter any ports or harbours in, or anchor off any part of, the coasts of the Shetland Isles until further notice.

*Note.*—Special traffic regulations for the Port of Lerwick and approaches will be found in Admiralty Notice to Mariners No. 767 of 1917.

Notice is hereby given that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty and are now in force:—

(1) *Beachy Head to St. Albans Head—Traffic Regulations.*

#### I. REGULATIONS REGARDING TRADING, FISHING AND PLEASURE CRAFT.

1. The areas on the South Coast of England to which the following orders apply are:—

Area A.—Enclosed by a line from Beachy head to Owers light-vessel to Boulder bank buoy, thence in a  $315^\circ$  (*N.  $30^\circ$  W. Mag.*) direction to the Portsmouth Defence area.

Area B.—Enclosed by a line from Culver cliff to a point 3 miles,  $90^\circ$  (*S.  $75^\circ$  E. Mag.*), from Culver cliff, thence within the 3-mile limit to a point 3 miles,  $180^\circ$  (*S.  $15^\circ$  W. Mag.*), from Freshwater Gate, thence to Freshwater Gate.

Area C.—Enclosed by a line joining Chewton Bunny to Christchurch ledge buoy, thence to a point 3 miles,  $180^\circ$  (*S.  $15^\circ$  W. Mag.*), from Anvil point, thence to a point 3 miles,  $180^\circ$  (*S.  $15^\circ$  W. Mag.*), from St. Albans head, thence to St. Albans head.

2. The term craft as used herein includes ships, barges, boats and vessels of all descriptions, and the orders apply to all fishing and pleasure craft.

3. No craft are to go out in the specified areas between sunset and sunrise.

4. All craft from places within these areas are to be on shore or back in their harbour half an hour after sunset.

5. No craft are to put to sea during fog or

thick weather, and any caught at sea by fog, &c., are to return to shore or harbour at once, if possible.

6. Craft unable to return to harbour owing to failing wind or fog, &c., are to anchor and show the regulation anchor lights at night. No bright lights are permitted. Fishing craft anchoring off Brighton or Hove are to anchor between the piers.

7. Craft found after dark in the areas detailed in paragraph 1 are liable to be fired upon.

8. Fishing is permitted during daylight hours in areas A, B and C except within the limits stated in paragraph 9, by all *bona fide* fishermen, provided they are in possession of a permit which can be obtained from the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, through their District Fishery Officers or the Coastguard. When applying for these permits, fishermen are to state the port from which they intend to work, and this will be entered on the permit. Permits for areas A, B and C are only issued to craft registered locally. Under no circumstances are fishermen allowed to carry passengers in their boats.

Permits will not be issued for vessels transferred from ports of registry outside areas A, B and C to ports of registry inside those areas.

9. No small craft may anchor or be under way in the area bounded as follows:—

(a) *On the North.*—By the coastline between Seaford head and Crowlink Coastguard Station.

(b) *On the West.*—By a line drawn from Seaford head in a  $158^\circ$  (*S.  $7^\circ$  E. Mag.*) direction for a distance of  $1\frac{3}{10}$  miles.

(c) *On the East.*—By a line drawn from Crowlink Coastguard Station in a  $197^\circ$  (*S.  $32^\circ$  W. Mag.*) direction for a distance of  $1\frac{3}{10}$  miles.

(d) *On the South.*—By a line joining the southern extremities of limits (b) and (c).

10. All unregistered fishing craft must carry their permit number painted on each bow in figures not less than 12 inches in height. Vessels registered as British sea fishing boats are to comply with the statutory rules as regards lettering and numbering.

11. Night fishing is permitted by special permit in a portion of area A by craft for which a Board of Agriculture and Fisheries permit has been issued. Applications for these special permits to be made to Captain A. B. Purvis, D.C.W.O., Worthing, through Mr. Edward Page, Chief Fishery Officer, 61, Tamworth Road, Hove.

12. Fishing is absolutely prohibited for all steam, oil, or petrol-driven fishing vessels of over 50-ft. keel length.

13. The following orders regarding oil of all kinds and petrol are to be complied with:—

(a) Oil, motor spirit, petrol, or other goods may not be shipped on board craft of any description, whether coasting or foreign, either as stores for the equipment or navigation of the vessel or as merchandise, except at places which are under the supervision of a Customs Officer. Such goods must be properly pre-entered before shipment, and a clearance must be obtained from the Customs Officials in accordance with the Customs War Powers Act, 1915, pars. 1 to 3.

(b) In places where there are no Customs Officials, oil or petrol-driven craft cruising in pleasure areas, and oil or petrol-driven fishing craft of 50-ft. keel length and under,

may obtain their stores locally provided the Coast-Watching Officer as representing the Customs Officials is previously notified and a Stock Book giving particulars of quantities received and used is kept on board and open for inspection.

(c) Sailing vessels may not have on board a quantity of petrol, motor spirit, benzine, paraffin, petroleum or similar substances exceeding four gallons.

14. Owners of motor craft, pleasure craft, and small craft of all descriptions are to supply to the Coastguard Officer of the district lists of all their boats and vessels which they may place afloat, and they are to obtain from him permits for them. Without such permits these craft are not to be used. The number of the permit is to be painted on each bow in figures not less than 12 inches in height.

15. Motor craft, pleasure craft, and small craft of all descriptions are not to proceed outside of their ports, creeks or rivers, during the hours of official day, unless in possession of a permit which may be obtained from a Customs Official on personal application, or (in places where there is no Customs Official) from the Coastguard Officer of that district.

16. The areas within which pleasure craft with permits may move during daylight are as follows, and, except as provided for in paragraph 17, they are forbidden to move in any other areas:—

Newhaven: Within one mile radius from the end of the western breakwater.

Rottingdean: Within one mile radius of the slipway.

Brighton: Within one mile radius from eastern pier.

Hove: Within one mile radius from Coastguard station.

Shoreham: Within one mile radius from the end of western pier.

Worthing: Within one mile radius from the end of town pier.

East Preston: Within one mile radius of Coastguard boathouse.

Littlehampton: Within one mile radius from the end of western pier.

Bognor: Within one mile radius of green fishing light.

Pagham: Within one mile radius from the coast watching hut.

Selsea: Within one mile radius from Coastguard station.

Sandown Bay: Inside the line joining Culver cliff and Dunnose head.

Ventnor: Within one mile of Ventnor pier.

Christchurch: Inside line joining Chewton Bunny to Christchurch ledge buoy, and thence to Christchurch head.

Christchurch head to Sandbanks: Within 500 yards of low water mark.

*Note.*—Boating off Bournemouth is permitted inside a line joining the Martello tower near Sugar Loaf chine and Southborne provided the boats are supervised and inspected by the Piermaster and Beach Inspectors in conjunction with the Coast-Watching Officer.

Poole harbour: Within line joining North and South havens.

Studland Bay: From opposite Studland village to the old breakwater within 400 yards of low water mark.

Swanage bay: To the west of line joining Ballard and Peverill points.

17. At certain ports and places where pleasure cruising is permitted in areas A and C

a strictly limited number of permits will be issued to amateur fishermen, who are residents and British born, to fish during daylight only in an extension of the pleasure cruising area. The conditions and regulations under which these permits are issued are printed on the permits and are to be strictly complied with. This relaxation of the rules has been made with the sole purpose of increasing the food supply.

Applications for these permits should be made:—

By residents of Newhaven to the Senior Naval Officer, Newhaven.

By residents of other places and ports in area A to Captain A. B. Purvis, R.N., Divisional Coast-Watching Officer, Lorne House, Broadwater Road, Worthing.

By residents of ports and places in area C to Captain A. L. K. Knapton, R.N., Divisional Coast-Watching Officer, Rope Hill, Lymington.

18. Pleasure permits will be issued at the discretion of the Customs Official and Coastguard Officer subject to the following conditions:—

(a) No person shall receive a pleasure permit in respect of any craft for which he has been granted a Board of Agriculture and Fisheries fishing permit.

(b) Subject to par. (a), pleasure permits may be granted to private owners and to owners of craft for hire, on the strict understanding that no professional fisherman or boatman between the ages of 18 and 60 be employed either on shore or at sea in connection with such craft. Any infringement of this rule will lead to the immediate withdrawal of the permit.

(c) All persons who receive pleasure permits will be expected to do their utmost to increase the food supply by catching fish; but this does not give them authority to go outside the limits of the pleasure area.

(d) The pleasure permit is always to be carried by the person in charge of the craft when the craft is in use, and the owner of the craft is responsible that those using the craft understand the orders relating to pleasure cruising.

19. *Shipping of Amateurs as Crew on Commercial Fishing Vessels.*—Where it is proved that there is a shortage of *bonâ fide* fishermen to form the crews of fishing craft provided with Board of Agriculture and Fisheries fishing permits, permission may be granted to a limited number of approved amateur fishermen or yachtmen enabling them to ship as crew on such craft. In cases where this is required application is to be made to the District Inspector of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries (Mr. E. S. Russell, Warblington Cottage, Havant).

20. No excursion traffic is allowed except with the written permission of the Commander-in-Chief, to be obtained for the season in regard to standing excursions, and on each occasion of special excursions.

21. Nothing in these orders shall affect the standing orders relating to the Defence Areas at Portsmouth, Newhaven, and Poole.

## II. NEWHAVEN—CAUTION WITH REGARD TO EXTINCTION OF LIGHTS; TRAFFIC REGULATIONS.

### CAUTION WITH REGARD TO EXTINCTION OF LIGHTS.

Notice is hereby given that the following

lights within the port are liable to be extinguished without further notice being issued:—

1. Light at South end of West pier.
2. Light at North end of West pier.
3. Light at end of Sea wall.
4. Red Leading Light on Packet wharf.

#### REGULATIONS FOR THE INTERNAL TRAFFIC OF THE PORT OF NEWHAVEN.

The port is now closed. Entry into the Port of Newhaven is prohibited to all merchant ships other than those on Government Service, and those which may have previously obtained special permission to enter from the Senior Naval Officer at Newhaven.

Until further notice, the following regulations are to be observed by all merchant shipping (including barges, boats and private vessels), moving within the limits of the Commercial Port of Newhaven.

##### Entrance into Port.

1. Shipowners and local agents are warned that their vessels should be directed to arrive at, and leave, the port as a general rule by daylight, and to conform to the following regulations.

2. Shipowners and local agents will facilitate the entry of their vessels by giving previous notice of probable time of arrival to the Senior Naval Officer, Newhaven (Telegraphic address:—Divisional Transports, Newhaven), with particulars of appearance, &c., so that they may be readily identified.

3. A vessel wishing to enter the port is to proceed to the Examination Anchorage marked on Admiralty Charts Nos. 2154 and 1652, and there anchor, unless previously met by the Examination Steamer. Instructions will be given to the Master by the Examining Officer as to entering.

4. The Examination Anchorage is westward of the breakwater. It is a square area, of which the sides are 888 yards long, the northern one being drawn in the direction  $255^\circ$  (*West Mag.*) from a point situated  $255^\circ$  (*West Mag.*) and 800 yards from the Breakwater Lighthouse. (See Admiralty Charts, Nos. 1652 and 2154.)

5. The Examination Steamer will be found at the seaward end of the entrance channel.

6. The Examination Steamer will be distinguished by the following means:—

By day.—A white ensign, and at the foremast head a special pilot flag (white and red, horizontal, surrounded by a blue border). When the port is closed the Examination Steamer will, in addition, hoist three red balls, and three red balls will be similarly hoisted at the flagstaff at the West pier.

By night.—Three lights vertically, six feet apart, conspicuously displayed at the end of the yard, so as to show an unbroken light round the horizon. When the port is closed, these lights will be red; when it is open, they will be white.

NOTE.—These lights are in addition to the ordinary navigation lights, and they will also be hoisted at the flagship at the West pier.

##### Leaving Port.

7. No vessel is to attempt to leave the port without having first received permission from the Senior Naval Officer.

##### Pilots.

8. At the discretion of the Chief Examining Officer, small coasters and fishing vessels, whose masters are British subjects, or those transports

whose masters are in possession of a pilotage certificate for the port, will be allowed to enter or leave the port without a pilot.

9. Subject to the above exemptions, pilotage is compulsory, and all merchant vessels must have a licensed local pilot on board before leaving or attempting to enter.

##### Traffic by Day.

10. The movements of all vessels, barges, or boats of any kind are subject to the direction of the Senior Naval Officer, whose orders are to be obeyed immediately.

11. Subject to the above, merchant shipping may move as usual within the port of Newhaven, taking care to keep clear of any H.M. ships which are being navigated in the port.

##### Traffic by Night.

12. All vessels, barges, and boats must display the regulation lights.

13. When anchoring care must be taken to be well clear of the fairway.

##### Approach to Government Vessels and Establishments.

14. No vessels or boats will be allowed to approach any Government ship, vessel, or lighter, or other Government craft, or any Government establishment, without special permission.

##### Warning.

15. Vessels disobeying these Regulations will be liable to be fired on.

#### III. SPITHEAD APPROACH—RESTRICTION OF TRAFFIC; PROHIBITED ANCHORAGE.

1. Passage of vessels between Noman's fort and the charted position of Warner light-vessel is entirely prohibited.

2. Vessels of all descriptions are prohibited from anchoring in St. Helen's roads to the westward of a line drawn in a  $162^\circ$  (*S. 3° Mag.*) direction from Noman's fort.

#### IV. POOLE BAY AND SOLENT APPROACH—RESTRICTION OF TRAFFIC.

No craft of any description, other than craft employed on Admiralty work, is to be under way to the northward of a line joining St. Catherine's point and Anvil point, between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise, or during fog.

##### (2) Portland Harbour Approach—Restriction of Traffic.

No vessels or boats of any description are to move in the area north of a line joining Portland bill with St. Albans head, by day or night, unless proceeding into Weymouth anchorage.

Variation.— $15^\circ$  W.

##### Note.

This Notice is a revision of the former Notice quoted above.

##### Caution.

This Admiralty Notice to Mariners is issued under the provisions of the Defence of the Realm Regulations, and failure to comply strictly with the directions contained in it will constitute an offence against those Regulations.

Any person found guilty of such an offence is liable to severe penalties both of imprisonment and fine.
