A PROCLAMATION

RELATING TO THE IMPORTATION OF CERTAIN ARTICLES INTO THE UNITED KINGDOM.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS by Section forty-three of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, it is provided that the importation of arms, ammunition, gunpowder, or any other goods may be prohibited by Proclamation:

And whereas by certain Proclamations entitled Prohibition of Import Proclamations the importation of certain goods has been prohibited accordingly:

And whereas it is expedient that the importation into the United Kingdom of certain other goods should be prohibited:

Now, therefore, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, in pursuance of the said Act and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby proclaim, direct and ordain as follows:—

As from and after the date hereof, subject as hereinafter provided, the importation into the United Kingdom of the following goods is hereby prohibited, viz.:—

Boots, shoes and slippers of all materials, not already prohibited.

Brislings, herrings, sprats and mousses, tinned, in oil or tomato or other dressing.

Provided always, and it is hereby declared, that this prohibition shall not apply to any such goods which are imported under licence given by or on behalf of the Board of Trade, and subject to the provisions and conditions of such licence.

This Proclamation may be cited as the Pro-

hibition of Import (No. 24) Proclamation, 1918.

And whereas the said Act has been amended by the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) Act, 1915, the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) (No. 2) Act, 1915, and the Munitions of War Act, 1915, and other enactments:

And whereas the said regulations have been amended by various subsequent Orders in Council:

And whereas it is expedient further to amend the said regulations in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following amendment be made in the said regulations:—

After Regulation 9GG the following regulation shall be inserted:—

"9GGG.—(1) Where the Board of Trade are of opinion that for the purpose of increasing the supply of coal or coal of any class, it is expedient to work any seam of coal which is in, near, or adjacent to, any open mine and is for the time being unworked, the Board may authorise any person to take possession of the seam and get the coal therefrom, and subject as hereinafter provided, for the purpose aforesaid to enter on and take possession of any land and execute such works and do such other things as they or he reasonably consider necessary:

Provided that nothing in this regulation shall authorise the opening of any new surface works.

(2) The Board of Trade before authorising any person to take possession of any seam of coal in pursuance of this regulation shall give public notice of their intention in such manner as appears to the Board best calculated to bring their intention to the knowledge of the owners of the land in which the seam is situate.

(3) The Board of Trade shall keep or cause to be kept accurate plans of the site and extent of any seam of coal of which possession is taken under this regulation, and also, unless for any reason it appears to the Board

unnecessary so to do, accounts of the tonnage of the coal gotten from the seam.

(4) In determining the amount of compensation to be paid for any coal gotten under this regulation regard should be had to the royalties current in the same mining district for the same class of coal whether upon an acreage or a tonnage basis."

And whereas His Majesty in Council in pursuance of the said first-mentioned Act has issued the Defence of the Realm (Liquor Control) Regulations, 1915, under the said last-mentioned Act:

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the 27th day of January, 1916, His Majesty was pleased, in pursuance of the said first-mentioned Act, to apply the said Regulations and any Regulations amending the same to an area known as the Humber Area and more particularly described in the Schedule to the said Order:

And whereas it appears to His Majesty to be expedient that the said Area should be extended, and that the Petty Sessional Division of Epworth, in the administrative County of the Parts of Lindsey, in the County of Lincoln, should be included therein:

And whereas it appears to His Majesty that it is expedient for the purpose of the successful prosecution of the present war that the sale and supply of intoxicating liquor in the area thereby constituted and defined and specified in the Schedule hereto should be controlled by the State on the grounds that war material is being made, loaded, unloaded and dealt with in transit therein:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

The Defence of the Realm (Liquor Control) Regulations, 1915, and any Regulations amending the same, shall be, and are hereby, applied to the area defined and specified in the Schedule hereto:

The Humber Area, being the area comprising the City of Kingston-upon-Hull, the County Borough of Grimsby, the Borough of Beverley and the Petty Sessional Divisions of North Holderness, Middle Holderness, South Holder-

ness, North Hunsley Beacon, South Hunsley Beacon, Howdenshire, and Ouse and Derwent, in the East Riding of the County of York, and the Petty Sessional Divisions of Grimsby, Caistor, Brigg, Barton-upon-Humber, Scunthorpe and Epworth, in the administrative County of the Parts of Lindsey, in the County of Lincoln.

WHEREAS by Section 80 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, power is given to His Majesty, by Order in Council, to make Regulations as to the manner in which Government Ships may be registered as British Ships under the Merchant Shipping Acts:

And whereas by the said Section it is provided that those Acts shall, subject to any exceptions or modifications which may be made by Order in Council, either generally or as respects any special class of such Ships, apply to such Ships when registered in accordance with such Regulations:

And whereas on account of urgency the Regulations hereinafter contained should come into immediate operation:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act, or otherwise, in Him vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following Regulations shall come into operation forthwith as *Provisional Rules* in accordance with the provisions of Section 2 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, and shall have effect as regards any Government Ships in the service of the War Department.

1. An application for registry of a Government Ship in the service of the War Department shall be made in writing under the hand of the Secretary of the War Office. Such application shall contain the following particulars:—

(1) A statement of the name and description of the Ship.

(2) A statement of the time when, and place where, the Ship was built; or, if the Ship was foreign built, and the time and place of building are unknown, a statement to that effect, and of her foreign name.

(3) A statement of the nature of the title to the said Ship, whether by original construction by or for the War Department, or by purchase, capture, condemnation, or otherwise, and a list of the documents of title, if any, in case she was not originally constructed by or for the War Department.

(4) A statement of the name of the Master.

2. The Registrar, on receiving such application in respect of a Government Ship in the service of the War Department, shall:—

(1) Enter the Ship in the Register Book as belonging to "His Majesty, represented by

the War Department," and shall also enter therein:—

(2) the name of the port to which she belongs.

(3) the particulars stated in the application for registration.

(4) the details comprised in the Surveyor's Certificate.

3. On the registry of a Government Ship in the service of the War Department, the Registrar shall retain in his possession the Surveyor's Certificate and the application for registry, and any documents of title mentioned in such application.

4. Upon the transfer of a registered Government Ship in the service of the War Department by Bill of Sale the War Department shall be the transferor, and the Bill of Sale shall be in Form A. in the proper form prescribed under the Principal Act, omitting the covenant therein contained. Any such Bill of Sale shall be signed by the Secretary of the War Office on behalf of the War Department.

5. The application for a Certificate of Sale referred to in Section 39 to 42 and Sections 44 to 46 of the Principal Act, may be made in respect of a Government Ship in the service of the War Department by the Secretary of the War Office on behalf of that Department.

6. The person to whom the management of any Government Ship in the service of the War Department is entrusted by the War Department shall be registered as provided by Section 59 (2) of the Principal Act.

7. Government Ships in the service of the War Department registered in pursuance of the provisions of this Order in Council are hereby excluded from the category of Ships belonging to His Majesty within the meaning of Sections 557 to 564 of the Principal Act.

8. Where any Section of the Merchant Shipping Acts which, by virtue of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, and this Order in Council, is applicable to Government Ships in the service of the War Department imposes any duty or liability or confers any right or power upon or contemplates any act being performed by the owner of a Ship such duty, liability, right or power shall, subject always to the other provisions of this Order in Council, be carried out, borne, or exercised by the War Department on behalf of His Majesty.

9. In this Order in Council the term Merchant Shipping Acts shall mean and include any of the Merchant Shipping Acts, any provision of which is by virtue of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1906, and this Order, applicable to Government Ships.

10. Section 1 and Sections 8 to 12 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, shall not apply to Government Ships in the service of the War Department registered in pursuance of the provisions of this Order in Council. Provided always that no provision of the Merchant Shipping Acts which, according to a reasonable construction, would not apply in the case of Government Ships in the service of the War Department shall be deemed to apply to such Ships by reason only that its application is not hereby expressly excluded.

"And whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council bearing date the 6th day of July, 1915, to approve of an Allowance being granted to Officers employed on Coding Duties in Ships allowed a Captain in command, or the alternative Ranks of Captain or Commander in command:

"And whereas we consider that the payment of Coding Allowance should depend upon the number of signal books carried in the Ship instead of on the Rank of the Commanding Officer:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to approve of Coding Allowance being payable in all Ships which carry a Light Cruiser's allowance of signal books, or above; this change to take effect as from the 21st day of January, 1918.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

After 4 years' Sea Service ...	£400

"And whereas we consider that all Service on full pay, whether at sea or on shore, should be allowed to count as qualifying Service for these gratuities:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to approve of the above-quoted Regulations being modified by the substitution of the words "Service on full pay as Temporary Naval Instructor" for the words "Sea Service"; time as Acting Temporary Naval Instructor while undergoing the preliminary course of instruction not to count for this purpose.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by Section 18 of "The Extradition Act, 1870," it is (amongst other things) enacted that if, by any Law made after the passing of the said Act by the Legislature of any British Possession, provision is made for carrying into effect within that Possession the surrender of fugitive criminals who are, or are suspected of being, therein, His Majesty may, by the Order in Council applying the said Act in the case of any Foreign State, or by any subsequent Order, either:—

Suspend the operation within any such British Possession of the said Act, or of any part thereof, so far as it relates to that Foreign State, and so long as that Law continues in force there, and no longer;

Or direct that the Law, or any part thereof, shall have effect in such British Possession, with or without modifications and alterations, as if it were part of the said Act:

And whereas by an Ordinance, numbered 69 of 1917, enacted by the Legislature of the Colony of Nigeria, the short title of which is "The Extradition Ordinance, 1917," it is provided that "all powers vested in and acts authorized or required to be done by a Police Magistrate or any Justice of the Peace in relation to the surrender of fugitive criminals in the United Kingdom under The Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, are hereby vested in, and may in the Colony be exercised and done by, any Commissioner of the Supreme Court, in relation to the surrender of fugitive criminals under the said Acts":

And whereas it is further provided by the said Ordinance that the said Ordinance shall not come into operation until His Majesty shall, by Order in Council, direct that the said Ordinance shall have effect within the Colony as if it were part of the "Extradition Act, 1870," but that the said Ordinance shall thereafter come into operation as soon as such Order in Council shall have been published in the Nigeria Government Gazette:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in pursuance of "The Extradition Act, 1870," and in exercise of the power in that behalf in the said Act contained, doth, by this present Order, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, direct that the said Ordinance shall have effect in the Colony of Nigeria without modification or alteration, as if it were part of "The Extradition Act, 1870."

And the Right Honourable Walter Hume Long, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

Powers) Act, 1917, shall extend to the Isle of Man, subject to the following adaptations:—

In Section 1 (1) (i), (2), and (4), for the words "twenty-fifth day of November, nineteen hundred and fifteen" there shall be substituted the words "first day of February, nineteen hundred and eighteen."

In Section 2 (1) (e) for the words "a land charge under the Land Transfer Acts, 1875 and 1897," there shall be substituted the words "a deed of Bond and Security or Debenture."

In Section 2 (2) omit (a), (b), and (c) down to and including the words "situate elsewhere."

In Section 3 for the words "Lord Chancellor" there shall be substituted the words "Lieutenant Governor."

Omit Section 4.

In Section 5, for the words "Act, 1915," there shall be substituted the words "(Isle of Man) Act, 1918."

And whereas by the Metropolitan Police Courts Acts, 1839 and 1840, it was, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, with the advice of His Privy Council, to order that a Police Magistrate or Magistrates shall attend regularly at any Police Court or Courts hereafter to be established, either daily or on such days or times as His Majesty, by the advice aforesaid, shall order:

And whereas by divers Orders in Council made under the said Acts such Police Court Divisions as to His Majesty, from time to time, has seemed fit have been constituted within the Metropolitan Police District, and the extent thereof defined respectively, and such Divisions have been assigned to each of the Police Courts continued or established under the said Acts:

And whereas by an Order in Council made on the 12th day of August, 1913, His Majesty was pleased to order that the Divisions for the time being assigned to the Westminster and West London Police Courts should be assigned to the

Juvenile Court established at the Westminster Police Court:

And whereas it would be convenient that a Juvenile Court should be established at the West London Police Court, and that the Division for the time being assigned to the West London Police Court should be assigned to the said Juvenile Court:

His Majesty is pleased, therefore, with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that a Juvenile Court shall be established at the West London Police Court, and that the Division to be assigned to it shall be the Division for the time being assigned to the West London Police Court; and that the said Juvenile Court shall be held on Tuesday and Friday in each week at ten o'clock in the morning, or on such other days and at such other hours as may, from time to time, be approved by a Secretary of State; and that one of the Magistrates appointed for the Metropolitan Police Courts shall attend the said Juvenile Court on the said days at the said hours: provided that a Juvenile Court which would in pursuance of the foregoing provision have been held on Christmas Day, Good Friday, or a day appointed for a public fast or thanksgiving, may be held on the preceding day, or, if the preceding day is a Sunday, on the day following:

And His Majesty is further pleased, with the advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered accordingly, that the said Juvenile Court shall not be held in the Court Room in which the ordinary sittings of the Court are held, but in the second Court Room, or in some other Room suitable for the purpose in the Police Court Building.

The provision in the Order made on the 12th day of August, 1913, assigning the West London Police Court Division to the Juvenile Court established at the Westminster Police Court is hereby revoked.

This Order shall come into operation on the 22nd day of April, 1918.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 37, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 21st day of March, 1918, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 37, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 104, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for constituting a Separate District for spiritual purposes to be taken partly out of the New Parish (sometime District) of Brightside,

and partly out of the New Parish (sometime Consolidated Chapelry) of Saint Thomas, Wincobank, both in the County of York, and in the Diocese of Sheffield:

"Whereas we are satisfied that the said New Parish of Brightside and the said New Parish of Saint Thomas, Wincobank, are Cures wherein, or in parts whereof, the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the Inhabitants thereof, and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said New Parish of Brightside, and of the said New Parish of Saint Thomas, Wincobank, which are hereinafter mentioned and described, should be constituted a Separate District in the manner which is hereinafter set forth:

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed District any Consecrated Church or Chapel in use for the purpose of Divine Worship:

"And whereas in pursuance of the power and authority given by an Order of the High Court of Chancery, dated the 1st day of August, 1854, confirming a Scheme for the future application of the income of the Trust Property of the Twelve Capital Burgesses and Commonalty of the Town and Parish of Sheffield, in the said County of York, and of an Order of the Board of Charity Commissioners for England and Wales, dated the 4th day of March, 1874, in partial variation of the Scheme established by the said first-mentioned Order, the said Burgesses and Commonalty have proposed to appropriate the sum of £200 per annum out of that part of the income of their Trust Property which is applicable to Ecclesiastical Purposes in and towards the Endowment of the District herein proposed to be constituted:

"And whereas we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, have signified by a Writing, bearing date the 21st day of March, 1918, under our Common Seal, our approval of and consent to the proposed Endowment of the said proposed District:

"And whereas the said Endowment of £200 per annum has been so appropriated as aforesaid upon the understanding and condition that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) we should recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council that the whole right of Patronage of the said District or New Parish, and of the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereof, should be assigned to the Twelve Capital Burgesses and Commonalty of Sheffield aforesaid:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Leonard Hedley, Bishop of Sheffield, (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said New Parish of Brightside, and of the said New Parish of Saint Thomas, Wincobank, which are more particularly described in the Schedule hereunder written, and are delineated and set forth on the *Map or Plan* hereunto annexed, shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme become and be constituted a Separate District for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint Margaret, Brightside.'

"And we further recommend and propose

that the whole right of Patronage of the said District so recommended to be constituted, and, when such District shall have become a New Parish as aforesaid, then of the said New Parish, and of the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereof, shall, without any assurance in the law other than this Scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to and be vested in and shall be exercised by the said Twelve Capital Burgesses and Commonalty of the Town and Parish of Sheffield, and their Successors.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"All which we humbly recommend and propose to Your Majesty in Council.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint Margaret, Brightside, comprising:—

"All those contiguous portions of the New Parish (sometime District) of Brightside, and of the New Parish (sometime Consolidated Chapelry) of Saint Thomas, Wincobank, both in the County of York, and in the Diocese of Sheffield, which are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the centre of Brightside Bridge which carries Weedon Street across the River Don, and extending thence westward along the middle of Weedon Street for a distance of 3 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Brightside Lane and Meadowhall Road, and extending thence northward along the middle of Meadowhall Road for a distance of 16 yards or thereabouts to its junction with Colliery Road, and extending thence, first westward, then south-westward, and then north-westward, along the middle of Colliery Road for a distance of 15 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Burslem Street, and extending thence north-westward in a straight line for a distance of 32 chains or thereabouts to the trigonometrical point at or near the centre of the ancient Camp in Wincobank Wood, and continuing thence north-westward in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a distance of 5½ chains or thereabouts to the fence forming the northern boundary of Wincobank Wood, upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Brightside from the said New Parish of Saint Thomas, Wincobank, and also upon the parliamentary boundary of the City of Sheffield, and extending thence, first north-eastward, and then in various directions; along the said parliamentary boundary of the City of Sheffield (thereby following in one part the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Brightside from the said New Parish of Saint Thomas, Wincobank, and in another part the boundary which divides the Chapelry of Tinsley, in the said County and Diocese, from the said New Parish of Saint Thomas, Wincobank), for a distance of 2 miles or thereabouts to the point in the middle of the old course of the River Don where the boundaries of the said Chapelry of Tinsley, the said New Parish of

Saint Thomas, Wincobank, and the said New Parish of Brightside all meet, and extending thence, first south-westward along the middle of the old course of the River Don, and then first south-westward, and then southward, along the middle of the River Don (thereby following in part the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Thomas, Wincobank, from the said New Parish of Brightside) for a distance in all of 41 chains or thereabouts to the centre of Brightside Bridge which carries Weedon Street across the River Don at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas Drafts of the said Scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the firstly herein-before mentioned Act, been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbents of the Cures out of which it is intended that the District recommended in such Scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such Patrons and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent to such Scheme:

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Sheffield.

No person shall as from the date hereof until further notice purchase or take delivery of any Mica as hereinafter defined situated in the United Kingdom except under and in accordance with the terms of a licence issued under the authority of the Minister of Munitions, or sell or deliver any such Mica to any person other than the holder of such a licence and in accordance with the terms thereof.

2. No person shall as from the date hereof until further notice use any Mica for the purpose of any manufacture or work except under and in accordance with the terms of a licence issued under the authority of the Minister of Munitions.

3. All persons shall send to the Controller of Non-Ferrous Materials (MS/R), Ministry of Munitions, 8, Northumberland Avenue, W.C. 2, such returns with regard to their stocks, purchases, sales and deliveries of Mica and any contracts or orders made or given to or by them requiring for their execution the use of Mica as shall from time to time be required by the said Controller of Non-Ferrous Materials.

4. All applications for licences under this Order shall be made to the said Controller of Non-Ferrous Materials and marked "Mica Licence."

5. For the purposes of this Order the expression "Mica" shall mean block Mica of the following quality and size grades:—

Clear and partly stained "Ruby" of "best" or "Government standard" quality, or suitable for use in the manufacture of magneto condenser plates, in size grades No. 3 to No. 6, inclusive, or their equivalent in rectangular or other trimming, and shall include Mica coming within the above definition when split from block of any quality.

6. This Order may be cited as the Mica Control Order, 1918.

NOTE.—Any person acting in contravention of or failing to comply with the above Order or

making a false return will be guilty of an offence under the Defence of the Realm Regulations, and be liable to penalties of fine and imprisonment.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 10TH APRIL 1918.)

THE WART DISEASE OF POTATOES ORDER OF 1918.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Destructive Insects and Pests Acts, 1877 and 1907, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Commencement.

1. This Order shall come into operation on the first day of June, nineteen hundred and eighteen.

Definition of Infected Area.

2.—(1) For the purposes of this Order the expression "Infected Area" means an area which is for the time being certified by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries (in this Order referred to as "the Board") to be an area infected with Wart Disease for the purposes of this Order.

(2) The area described in the First Schedule to this Order, and also any area which at the commencement of this Order is an Infected Area for the purposes of the Wart Disease of Potatoes (Infected Areas) Order of 1914 shall, unless and until the Board otherwise certify, be an Infected Area for the purposes of this Order.

Restriction on planting potatoes in an Infected Area.

3.—(1) No person shall plant, or cause or permit to be planted, in any land in his occupation or under his charge which is situated in an Infected Area, any potatoes which are not of an approved immune variety, and no person shall permit any potatoes to remain in land in his occupation or under his charge if the potatoes have been planted in contravention of this Article, and the removal of the potatoes is required by notice served on him by an Inspector; Provided that a person shall not be liable to conviction for planting potatoes or causing or permitting potatoes to be planted in contravention of this Article if he proves to the satisfaction of the Court that the potatoes were sold to him as potatoes of an approved immune variety by a person authorised by the Board under this Order to sell for planting potatoes of an approved immune variety, and that he did not know that the potatoes were not of an approved immune variety.

(2) The restrictions imposed by this article shall not apply to any planting which is licensed by an Inspector of the Board for the purpose of enabling a first early variety of potatoes to be grown.

(3) An approved immune variety is a variety approved for the time being by the Board as being immune from Wart Disease.

Restriction on Sale of Approved Immune Varieties.

4. (1) No person shall sell or offer for sale for planting, except to a dealer in seed potatoes, any potatoes of an approved immune variety unless he is authorised to do so by a licence granted by the Board or in contravention of the conditions (if any) imposed by the licence, and no person shall sell as potatoes of an approved immune variety potatoes which are not of an approved immune variety.

(2) Any person who sells or offers for sale for planting (otherwise than to a dealer in seed potatoes) potatoes of an approved immune variety shall if so required by the person to whom the potatoes are sold or offered for sale produce the authority of the Board or a copy thereof for his inspection and permit him to copy the authority or copy.

Restriction on use of Potatoes grown in an Infected Area.

5. No person shall knowingly sell or purchase or use for planting in land which is not in an Infected Area any potatoes which have to his knowledge been grown in an Infected Area.

Application of preceding provisions to land not in an Infected Area.

6.—(1) An Inspector may by notice served on an occupier or other person in charge of land not in an Infected Area on which the Inspector is satisfied that Wart Disease exists, or to which in his opinion the disease is likely to spread, apply the preceding provisions of this Order to such land and such provisions shall while such notice remains in force, apply to such land as if it were an Infected Area.

(2) The preceding provisions of this Order shall, without service of notice under this Article, apply until they are withdrawn by an Inspector, to any lands which at the commencement of this Order are "infected premises"

for the purposes of the Wart Disease of Potatoes Order of 1914.

Notification of Disease.

7.—(1) The occupier or other person in charge of any land on which Wart Disease exists or appears to exist and any person having in his possession or under his charge potatoes which are affected with Wart Disease, shall forthwith notify the fact by post or otherwise to the Board or to an Inspector.

(2) If Wart Disease is found to exist in any subsequent year on land in respect of which notification of disease has been given a further notification of disease shall be so given.

Sale of Diseased Tubers prohibited.

8. Tubers visibly affected with Wart Disease shall not be sold or offered for sale for any purpose.

Precautions to be adopted in case of an outbreak of Disease.

9.—(1) An Inspector may at any time and from time to time by notice served on an occupier or other person in charge of land on which the Inspector is satisfied that Wart Disease exists require him to adopt such measures for the prevention of the spread of the disease as are authorised by this Article and specified in the notice.

(2) A notice under this Article may require the occupier or other person in charge of the land to adopt one or more of the following measures, that is to say:—

(a) to destroy any part of the crop of potatoes, except the tubers, by fire or such other suitable method as may be specified in the notice;

(b) to boil thoroughly all diseased tubers;

(c) to take such other steps as the Inspector may consider necessary to prevent the spread of the disease.

(3) Any such notice may appoint the time within which the adoption of any measure thereby prescribed shall be completed.

(4) Nothing in this Article shall prevent the destruction by the owner, by fire or other effective method, of any tubers affected with Wart Disease.

Service of Notices, etc.

10. (1) For the purpose of this Order a notice shall be deemed to be served on any person if it is delivered to him personally or left for him at his last known place of abode or business, or sent through the post in a letter addressed to him there; and a notice purporting to be signed by an Inspector shall be *prima facie* evidence that it was signed by him as an Inspector.

(2) A copy of every notice served under this Order shall be sent to the Board by the Inspector by whom the notice is signed.

(3) A notice served under this Order, which applies the provisions as to Infected Areas to premises which are not in an Infected Area, shall remain in force until its operation is determined in writing by an Inspector of the Board.

Power to Deal with Diseased Potatoes.

11. An Inspector may by a notice served on any person having in his possession or under his charge tubers which are affected with Wart

Disease, or which are in a pit, bag or other receptacle with tubers so affected, or which the Inspector has reason to believe to have been in a pit, bag or other receptacle with tubers so affected or otherwise exposed to infection with Wart Disease, prohibit the removal of the tubers from the premises on which they are when the notice is served, except under such conditions as the Inspector may consider necessary to prevent the spread of Wart Disease and prescribe by the notice.

Information to be given as to Diseased Potatoes.

12. Every person who has or has had in his possession or under his charge any tubers affected with Wart Disease, and every person who as auctioneer, salesman or otherwise has sold or offered for sale any such tubers shall, if so required in writing by the Board or an Inspector, give the Board or the Inspector, as the case may be, all such information as he possesses as to the persons in whose possession or under whose charge they are or have been: Provided that any information given under this Article shall not be available as evidence against the person giving the same in any prosecution under this Order, except in respect of an alleged failure to comply with this Article.

Powers of Entry.

13. An Inspector, upon production if so required of his appointment, may for the purpose of enforcing this Order enter any land and examine any potatoes thereon.

Notification of Order.

14. This Order and any certificate issued by the Board thereunder shall be published by the Local Authority in accordance with any direction given by the Board.

Offences.

15. Every person shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds, who does any act in contravention of this Order, or fails to do any act which, by this Order or any notice served on him under this Order, he is required to do.

Definitions.

16. In this Order:—

“Inspector” means, where the context permits, an Inspector of the Board or of the Local Authority;

“The Local Authority” means as regards any District the Local Authority for the District under the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894;

“Wart Disease” means the disease affecting potatoes which is known as *Synchytrium endobioticum*, or Wart Disease of Potatoes, or Black Scab or Cauliflower disease.

Revocation of Order.

17.—(1) The Orders described in the Second Schedule hereto are hereby revoked; provided that such revocation shall not:—

(i) affect the previous operation of any such Order or anything duly done or suffered under any such Order; or

(ii) affect any right, privilege, obligation or liability acquired, accrued, or incurred under any such Order; or

(iii) affect any penalty incurred in respect of any offence committed against any such Order; or

(iv) affect any investigation, legal proceeding, or remedy in respect of any such right, privilege, obligation, liability or penalty as aforesaid;

and any such investigation, legal proceeding or remedy may be instituted, continued, or enforced, and any such penalty may be imposed as if this Order had not been made.

(2) Every notice which requires an occupier to adopt measures for prevention of the spread of Wart Disease and which has been served under an Order hereby revoked shall have effect as if it were a notice duly served under this Order.

Application of the Order.

18. This Order shall apply to England and Wales.

Short Title.

19. This Order may be cited as the WART DISEASE OF POTATOES ORDER OF 1918.

under Section 5 (1) of the above Act and the regulations made by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries dated the 8th November, 1917, hereby give notice, as required by the Agricultural Wages Regulations, 1918, that they propose to make the following Order under the last mentioned Regulations, that is to say:—

The benefits or advantages which may be reckoned as payment of wages in lieu of payment in cash for the purpose of any minimum rate of wages for time work which may be fixed under the above Act, are hereby defined to be the supply by an employer to a worker of

(1) Milk (including skimmed or separated milk).

(2) Potatoes.

And the value at which they are to be so reckoned for such purpose is hereby defined to be as follows, that is to say:—

(1) In the case of Milk so supplied without payment the current wholesale price in the district.

(2) In the case of Potatoes so supplied without payment, the current wholesale price in the district at the time when the maincrop of potatoes were lifted.

Where any payment is made by the workman for the supply of the Milk or Potatoes an

equivalent deduction is to be made from the value of a supply without payment.

The wholesale prices above referred to shall be ascertained for the purpose of this Order from time to time in respect of the area of any District Wages Committee established by the Wages Board under the above Act, by the District Wages Committee for such area.

The Agricultural Wages Board, as required by the regulations, will consider any objections to the above proposed Order which may be lodged with them within one month of the date of this Notice. All objections should be in writing, and should be addressed to the Secretary, the Agricultural Wages Board (England and Wales), 80, Pall Mall, London, S.W. 1. The objections should state precisely and so far as possible with reasons what is objected to.

SPECIAL INSTRUCTIONS TO MERCHANT VESSELS.

Former Notice.—No. 373 of 1918; hereby cancelled.

(1) *Information respecting War Instructions for Merchant Vessels.*

Notice is hereby given that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Order has been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty and is now in force:—

The Orders contained in Admiralty War Instructions for British Merchant Ships or in any instructions or advice, confidential or otherwise, issued or given to Masters of vessels by British or Allied Naval Officers, or by other duly authorised Officers or Officials, as to routes to be taken and other precautions to be observed to avoid capture or destruction by the enemy, are to be observed even when they are in conflict with the provisions of the Regulations for preventing Collisions at Sea, and every vessel observing such regulations, instructions or advice shall be deemed to be taking measures to meet "special circumstances" within the meaning of Article 27 of the Regulations for preventing Collisions at Sea.

(2) *Caution as to obeying Orders received from H.M. Ships, &c.*

The attention of all Masters or other persons in command or charge of vessels is directed to the duty of obeying promptly and strictly all orders, whether by way of signal or otherwise, given by any Officer in Command of any of His Majesty's Ships or by any Naval or Military Officer engaged in the defence of the coast. Cases have been reported to the Admiralty in which British Merchant vessels have wilfully disregarded the Orders given by Patrol Boats, &c., and it is therefore considered necessary to

remind all persons concerned of the penalties provided for such acts of disobedience.

Where vessels neglect to obey Orders so given the person in charge is liable to prosecution under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, and upon conviction to be fined £100 or imprisoned for six months or, where the disobedience was of an aggravated kind, to suffer both penalties.

It should also be noted that failure to obey orders may necessitate the seizure and detention of the vessel, when found in any port of the United Kingdom subsequently to the time at which the act of disobedience was committed.

(3) *Use of Mine Protection Gear by Vessels.*

Notice is given that under the Defence of the Realm Regulations, the following Regulation has been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty with a view to protecting vessels navigating within certain areas from the risk of damage by mine, and is now in force:—

British vessels equipped with the "Otter" protection gear are to stream their Otters whenever they are within 10 miles of a navigational fix in European or Mediterranean waters, also when approaching Allied Ports abroad and in the North Sea, when to the southward of the parallel of 59° N., provided in each case that the depth of water exceeds 5 fathoms; except:—

(a) Vessels in Ocean Convoy, who will receive their instructions from the Senior Officer of the Convoy or Escort.

(b) When exemption for certain voyages or part of voyages is granted by a Senior Naval Officer.

(c) Vessels hugging the buoys of the war channel by day, unless specially ordered to use Otters by local patrols.

Note.—Vessels which leave the buoyed war channel by night or in thick weather should immediately stream their Otters.

Senior Naval Officers at ports from which ships are sailing will modify or augment these orders as necessary, to suit local conditions or suspected mine-laying outside this 10-mile limit.

To secure the efficient working of the Otter gear it must be properly adjusted, actually running, and adequately manned.

Entry is to be made in the ship's log regarding the streaming and taking inboard of Otters.

The master or other person in command or charge of any British vessel who neglects to see that the apparatus is so adjusted, running, manned and worked, shall be guilty of an offence against the Defence of the Realm Regulations, subject, however, to the exceptions set out in the foregoing sub-paragraphs (a), (b) and (c).

(4) *Procedure for Visit and Search of Vessels by H.M. Ships.*

In view of the danger of H.M. Ships closing Vessels, apparently Neutral, British or Allied traders, but which are in reality German raiding cruisers, it is necessary to adopt a special Boarding procedure as a measure of precaution.

When it is desired to put into force the special Boarding procedure it will be as follows:—

A red pendant of a specially large size will be hoisted by the man-of-war exercising the right of visit and search. The hoisting of

this pendant will be accompanied by the string a ricket. This will signify that the merchant ship is to close the boat lowered by the man-of-war, whether the man-of-war remains in the vicinity of the boat or not.

(5) *Regulations with regard to Vessels' Lights.*

Notice is hereby given that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Orders have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty and are now in force:—

In areas in which submarines or raiders may be met vessels are to be carefully darkened from sunset to sunrise and are to proceed without navigation lights. These lights must be so arranged that they can be instantly shown to avoid collision and extinguished as soon as the danger of collision is past. Navigation lights when specially ordered to be shown must be dimmed to a visibility of less than two miles—(Admiralty War Instructions for British Merchant Vessels).

1. *Masthead Lights.*—No Masthead Light of a brilliancy exceeding $2\frac{1}{2}$ -candle power is to be exhibited. Lights are to be shaded with plain opal glass and the reflectors are to be removed from the lanterns. Masthead Lights are never to be used unless the Master considers it absolutely necessary. The use of Masthead Lights is to be discontinued until provision has been made for their being dimmed in accordance with this Order.

2. *Side Lights.*—No Side Light of a brilliancy exceeding 8-candle power shall be exhibited.

In clear weather, and when specially ordered, 5-candle power lamps are to be exhibited.

Plain coloured glass is to be fitted to the lanterns, but where already placed dioptric lenses may be continued in use until the plain glasses can be fitted.

Oil Side Lamps are only to be exhibited if electric lights are not available.

Reflectors are to be removed from the lanterns.

3. *Stern Lights.*—No Stern Light is to be exhibited except to avoid danger of collision, and such light is to be extinguished as soon as the danger is past.

Such light shall be electric of $2\frac{1}{2}$ -candle power shaded with a plain opal glass and is to be controlled from the bridge.

In ships fitted with dimmers bulbs of a higher candle power may be used, but lights are not to be shown of a brilliancy exceeding that quoted in this Order, except in special circumstances, such as imminent danger of collision, thick weather or while navigating in and entering or leaving harbours, &c.; such ships are to be supplied with bulbs of the prescribed candle power, which are to be inserted and used in the lamps should the dimmers fail from any cause.

In vessels where electric light is not installed, a noil lamp or electric torch or equivalent brilliancy may be substituted.

Vessels in Convoy which on occasion necessarily have to exhibit a Stern Light are to have such lights screened so as to show not more than three points from right astern on each quarter.

This Order applies—subject to any directions that may be given in any particular circumstances by the Commanding Officer of the Con-

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voy or Senior Naval Officer present—to all British Merchant Vessels, and if

(a) the owner of any British Merchant Vessel, or where such owner is a Company, the Managing Director of other responsible person, fails to provide such vessel with the lights hereby prescribed and/or the means of shading the same; or if

(b) the Master or other person in command or charge of such vessel so provided fails to comply with any of the directions in this Order stated or referred to; then such Owner, Managing Director or other responsible person, and such Master or other person in command or charge shall respectively be guilty of an offence against the Defence of the Realm Regulations.

1. *Anchor Lights.*—No electrically-lit lanterns are to be employed as anchor lights. The normal brilliancy of all other anchor lanterns is to be reduced by 50 per cent.

All anchor lanterns are to be fitted with overhead screens, so arranged as to cut off the light at an angle of between 20 and 25 degrees above the horizontal.

NOTE.—Specimen screens can be viewed at the Board of Trade Surveyor's Offices at Leith, North Shields, Hull, London, Plymouth, Cardiff, Liverpool, Glasgow and Dublin.

2. *Other Lights.*—No light, either aloft, on deck or below, except those authorised by the Admiralty Confidential Instructions, and such as may be necessary for authorised signalling purposes, are to be permitted to be visible from outboard. This applies to vessels whether under way or at anchor.

3. The above Order applies to vessels of every description, other than H.M. ships and the vessels mentioned in the succeeding paragraph, in the waters of the United Kingdom.

4. Vessels carrying volatile oil or spirits in bulk are, notwithstanding the above orders, to exhibit (in lieu of oil lamps) electrically lit lanterns not exceeding in brilliancy 50 per cent. of the brilliancy of the normal oil lamps.

Note.

This Notice is a revision of the former Notice quoted above.

Caution.

Sections (1), (3) and (5) of this Admiralty Notice to Mariners are issued under the provisions of the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, and failure to comply strictly with the directions contained in them will constitute an offence against those Regulations.

Any person found guilty of such an offence is liable to severe penalties both of imprisonment and fine.

Any person aiding or abetting the commission of such an offence is himself guilty of an offence against the Regulations.

Attention is also drawn to the fact that any infringement of the directions contained in sections (1), (3) and (5) of this Admiralty Notice to Mariners is liable to result in the detention of the ship or vessel.

TRAMWAY BYELAWS AND REGULATIONS UNDER THE PLYMOUTH CORPORATION ACT, 1915, s. 86 (2), AND THE TRAMWAYS ACT, 1870.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the following Tramway Byelaws and Regulations were made and sealed by the Plymouth Corporation at a meeting of the Council held on the 8th day of April, 1918, viz. :—

BYELAWS AND REGULATIONS MADE BY THE MAYOR, ALDERMEN AND BURGESSES OF THE BOROUGH OF PLYMOUTH (HEREINAFTER CALLED THE CORPORATION) WITH RESPECT TO THE TRAMWAYS, UNDER THE POWERS CONFERRED ON THE CORPORATION BY THE PLYMOUTH CORPORATION ACT, 1915, s. 86 (2) AND THE TRAMWAYS ACT, 1870.

1. The Byelaws and Regulations hereinafter set forth shall extend and apply to all carriages of the Corporation and to all places with respect to which the Corporation have power to make Byelaws and Regulations.

2. The expression "conductor" shall include any officer or servant in the employment of the Corporation, and having charge of a carriage.

The expression "interior of a carriage" shall not include the upper deck of covered carriages.

3. Every passenger shall enter or depart from a carriage by the hindermost or conductor's platform and not otherwise. Provided that this bye-law shall not apply to carriages which can with the approval of the Board of Trade be worked by one man in charge only. When a carriage stops, no person shall board the carriage until all passengers desiring to alight therefrom shall have done so.

4. No person shall enter, or mount, or leave, or attempt to enter, mount, or leave, any carriage in motion.

5. No passenger shall smoke in the interior of any carriage, and no person shall spit in, on, from or against any carriage.

6. No passenger or other person shall, while travelling in or upon any carriage, play or perform upon any musical instrument.

7. A person in a state of intoxication shall not enter or mount upon any carriage, and if found in or upon any carriage shall leave the carriage immediately on being requested to do so by the conductor.

8. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language whilst in or upon any carriage, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.

9. No person shall commit any nuisance in, on, or against any carriage, tramway station, waiting room, or premises used in connection with the Corporation tramways.

10. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil, or damage the cushions or the linings, or remove or deface any number plate, printed or other notice, in or on the carriage, or break or scratch any window of or otherwise wilfully damage any carriage. Any person acting in contravention of this Regulation shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by these Byelaws and Regulations, in addition to the liability to pay the amount of any damage done.

11. A person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the conductor, soil or injure the linings or cushions of the carriage, or the

dress or clothing of any passenger, or who, in the opinion of the conductor, might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not mount, enter or remain on or in any carriage, and may be prevented from so doing, and, if found on or in any carriage, shall, on request of the conductor, leave the same upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned. Provided that on carriages specially run for artisans, mechanics, and daily labourers no person shall be prevented from entering or remaining in or on a carriage under the provisions of this Bye-law on the ground of the condition of his dress or clothing if such condition is solely due to the nature of his employment.

12. Each passenger shall, either on demand or before leaving the car (whichever first happens), pay to the conductor or other duly authorised officer of the Corporation the fare legally demandable for his journey, and shall accept a ticket therefor. Any person leaving a car shall be deemed to have completed his journey.

13. Each passenger shall show his Ticket (if any), when required so to do, to the conductor or any duly authorised servant of the Corporation, and shall also, when required so to do, either deliver up his Ticket or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled over by such passenger.

14. A passenger not being a seaman, a soldier, or a marine in H.M. Service below the rank of Warrant Officer, an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer, within the true intent and meaning of the statutory provisions relating to the Corporation, shall not use or attempt to use any Ticket intended only for such seaman, soldier or marine in H.M. Service below the rank of Warrant officer, artisans, mechanics, or daily labourers.

15. Personal or other luggage (including the tools of artisans, mechanics, and daily labourers) shall, unless otherwise permitted by the conductor, be placed on the front or driver's platform, and not elsewhere.

16. No passenger or other person not being a servant of the Corporation shall travel on the steps or platforms of any carriage, or stand on the upper deck, or sit on the railings, guards, or buffers of any carriage, and any person so travelling, standing, or sitting shall cease to do so immediately on request by the conductor.

17. No person, except a passenger or intending passenger, shall enter or mount any carriage.

18. No person shall hold or hang on by or to any part of any carriage, or travel therein, or thereon otherwise than on a seat provided for passengers, except in the interior of the carriage with the consent of the conductor.

19. When any carriage contains the full number of passengers for which seating accommodation according to the notice thereof attached to the carriage is provided, no additional person shall enter, mount, or remain in or on any such carriage when warned by the conductor not to do so.

20. No dog or other animal shall be allowed in or on any carriage.

21. No person shall travel in or on any carriage of the Corporation with loaded firearms.

22. No passenger shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the Corporation in the execution of his duty upon or in connexion with any carriage or tramway of the

Corporation, and no person other than the conductor or driver shall change or remove the route indicators or destination boards or interfere with the controllers, brakes, lights, ventilators, trolley cord, or any other part of a carriage or its equipment.

23. If at any time a carriage becomes disabled, or in any way damaged, or from any cause unable to proceed, the passengers shall, upon request of the conductor, leave the same, and if such passengers have paid their fares, they shall not be entitled to demand back the amount of their fares so paid, but on production of their tickets shall be allowed to travel by the next available carriage, the remainder of the distance in respect of which they have paid their fares. No person shall, except with the leave of the conductor, enter a disabled or damaged carriage.

24. Any person who shall commit, whilst in or on any carriage, any breach of these Bye-laws and Regulations, shall, if the offence is continued, be liable in addition to incurring the penalty hereinafter provided, to be immediately removed from the carriage by or under the direction of the conductor, and if such person shall have paid his fare, he shall not be entitled to claim its return.

25. The conductor shall enforce these Bye-laws and Regulations and prevent the breach thereof to the best of his ability.

26. Any person offending against or committing a breach of any of these Bye-laws and Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Forty Shillings.

27. There shall be placed and kept placed in a conspicuous position inside of each carriage in use a printed copy of these Bye-laws and Regulations.

28. These Bye-laws and Regulations shall come into force on the first day of July, 1918.

29. From and after the date of these Bye-laws and Regulations coming into force, the Bye-laws and Regulations made by the Corporation which came into force on the thirty-first day of March, one thousand nine hundred and three, shall be repealed.

THE PLYMOUTH CORPORATION ACT, 1915, s.
86 (2), AND THE TRAMWAYS ACT, 1870, s. 46.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the following
Tramway Bye-laws and Regulations
were made and sealed by the Plymouth Cor-

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poration at a meeting of the Council held on the 8th day of April, 1918, viz.:—

BYE-LAWS AND REGULATIONS MADE BY THE
MAYOR, ALDERMEN AND BURGESSES OF THE
BOROUGH OF PLYMOUTH, AS THE LOCAL
AUTHORITY, UNDER THE PLYMOUTH COR-
PORATION ACT, 1915, s. 86 (2) AND SECTION
46 OF THE TRAMWAYS ACT, 1870.

1. For the purpose of these Bye-laws and Regulations, the term "car" shall mean any carriage using any tramway laid down within the said Borough, and the terms "driver" and "conductor" shall respectively mean the driver and conductor or other person having charge of a car.

2. The driver of every car shall so drive the same that it shall not follow a preceding car at a less distance than 10 yards.

3. The Car shall be brought to a standstill whenever it is necessary to avoid impending danger, in all cases of horses being frightened, and subject to the requirements of Bye-law No. 4, the driver or conductor of a car shall stop the same for the purpose of setting down or taking up passengers, for whom there is room, and to whose admission no valid objection can be made at such points on the routes where an indication is placed upon the Tramway Poles stating that "Cars Stop."

4. Except at a passing place or terminus, no car shall be stopped at the inter-section or junction of two or more streets or roads, nor within ten yards of a car on an adjoining line of rails.

5. The driver of a car, on coming in sight of a vehicle standing or travelling on any part of the road so as not to leave sufficient space for the car to pass, shall sound his bell or whistle as a warning to the person in charge of such vehicle, and that person shall with reasonable despatch cause such vehicle to be removed so as not to obstruct the car.

6. No person shall in any way wilfully impede or interfere with the traffic on the tramways, nor shall any driver or conductor needlessly cause interruption to the ordinary road traffic.

7. Every driver, conductor or other person offending against any of these Bye-laws and Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings for each offence and not exceeding for any continuing offence ten shillings for every day during which the offence continues.

8. These Bye-laws shall come into force on the first day of July, one thousand nine hundred and eighteen.

9. From and after the date of these Bye-laws and Regulations coming into force, the Bye-laws and Regulations made by the Corporation which came into force on the twenty-ninth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, shall be repealed.
