At the Council Chamber, *Whitehall*, the 25th day of *April*, 1918.

By the Lords of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

WHEREAS it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation or Order in Council made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, as amended by the Act now in recital, may, whilst a state of war exists, be varied or added to by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade:

And whereas it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation made under Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, may, whether the Proclamation was made before or after the passing of the Act now in recital, be varied or added to, whilst a state of war exists, by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade:

And whereas by a Proclamation, dated the 10th day of May, 1917, and made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, and Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, and Section 1 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, the exportation from the United Kingdom of certain articles to certain or all destinations was prohibited:

And whereas by subsequent Orders of Coun-

cil the said Proclamation was amended and added to in certain particulars:

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Board of Trade to the following effect:—

That the goods mentioned in the Schedule to the Proclamation of the 10th day of May, 1917, as amended and added to by subsequent Orders of Council, and marked "(C)" which are at present prohibited to be exported to all destinations in foreign countries in Europe and on the Mediterranean and Black Seas, other than France and French Possessions, Russia, Italy and Italian Possessions, Spain and Portugal, and to all ports in any such foreign countries, and to all Russian Baltic ports, should be prohibited to be exported to all destinations in European and Asiatic Russia and in other foreign countries in Europe and on the Mediterranean, except France and French Possessions, Italy and Italian Possessions, Spain and Portugal, and to all ports in any such foreign countries.

Now, therefore, Their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into consideration, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the same be approved.

Whereof the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs and Excise, the Director of the War Trade Department, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

The KING has been graciously pleased to appoint the Right Honourable the Earl of Derby, K.G., G.C.V.O., C.B., to be His Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary on Special Mission to the French Republic.

The KING has been pleased to award the Albert Medal in each of the following cases in recognition of gallantry displayed in saving or endeavouring to save life:—

Lieutenant Fred Kelly, 6th Battalion, Duke of Wellington's (West Riding) Regiment.

On the 30th January last, at a camp in England where rifle grenade practice was being carried out, one of the men struck the loophole with his bayonet and caused the fuse of the

grenade to ignite. Lieutenant Kelly, who was in charge, shouted to the man to drop his rifle and get clear, but he lost his nerve and remained in the trench gripping the rifle. Lieutenant Kelly then seized the rifle, and with much difficulty got it out of the man's hands and threw it away. He then tried to push the man out of the emplacement, but before he could get him clear the bomb exploded, and they were both slightly wounded. But for Lieutenant Kelly's courage and resource the soldier would probably have been killed.

Flight-Sergeant Albert Edgar Warne, 24th Wing Aeroplane Repair Section, and Flight Sergeant Horace Cannon, No. 50 Training Squadron.

On the 26th January last, while flying in England, a pilot when attempting to land lost control of his machine, which crashed to the ground from a height of about 150 feet, and burst into flames. Flight Sergeants Warne and Cannon went to the rescue of the pilot at great personal risk, as one tank of petrol blew up and another was on fire; moreover, the machine was equipped with a belt of live cartridges, which they dragged out of the flames. They managed to extricate the pilot, who was strapped to the burning plane, but he died shortly afterwards from his injuries and burns.

Trooper Walter George Gunner, 1st Dragoon Guards, attached Army Pay Corps.

On the 19th August last a tramcar full of passengers was descending a hill at Dover, and got out of control. The driver, finding that the brakes would not act, jumped off the front platform, and Private Gunner promptly took the driver's place on the platform and made every effort to stop the car by the application of the brakes. Unfortunately, in spite of Private Gunner's courage and presence of mind, he was unsuccessful in stopping the car, which ran to the bottom of the hill at great speed and overturned. Private Gunner lost both his feet as a result of the accident.

WELFARE OF WORKERS IN
FACTORIES AND WORKSHOPS.

The Secretary of State for the Home Department hereby gives notice that, in pursuance of the powers conferred on him by Section 7 of the Police, Factories, &c. (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act, 1916, of making Orders for securing the welfare of the workers employed in factories and workshops, he proposes, with the concurrence of the Minister of Munitions, to make an Order applying to all factories or parts of factories in which any process in turning or machining shells or shell bodies is carried on, to require facilities for sitting to be provided for all the female

workers employed in any such process so as to enable them to take advantage of any opportunities for resting which may occur in the course of their employment.

Copies of the draft Order can be obtained on application to the Home Office, Whitehall, London, S.W. 1.

Any objection to the proposed Order must be sent to the Secretary of State at the Home Office, Whitehall, London, S.W. 1, within 21 days after the date of this notice. The objection must be in writing, and must state:—

- (a) the specific grounds of objection to the draft Order; and
- (b) the modifications asked for.

Where an objection is made jointly on behalf of a number of occupiers, the names of the occupiers and their addresses must be stated, or, if the objection is made by an association of occupiers on behalf of its members, the number of the members affected by the Order.

COAL MINES ACT, 1911.

TOBACCO PRICES.

Schedule of Maximum Prices on Sales by Manufacturers, Wholesale Dealers and Importers.

Pursuant to Paragraph 1 of the Tobacco Restriction Order (No. 5), 1917, the Tobacco Control Board hereby give notice as follows:—

From and after the date of this notice, and subject to the provisions hereinafter contained, the maximum price at which a Manufacturer or Importer may sell the Tobaccos, Cigarettes and Cigars of the qualities and descriptions set

out in the Schedule shall be at a price which, with all discounts deducted, is less than that at which such Tobaccos, Cigarettes and Cigars may be retailed to the public under the provisions of any Order in force for the time being by at least the amount shown in this Schedule.

THE SCHEDULE.

Cigarettes manufactured in the United Kingdom, sold in Packet, Box or other Container.

Cigarettes sold up to the rate of 4d. for 10 to show at least 21 per cent. on the Manufacturers' Price.

At over the rate of 4d., but not exceeding 5½d. for 10, 25 per cent.

At over the rate of 5½d., but not exceeding 7d. for 10, 27½ per cent.

Cigarettes sold at over the rate of 7d. for 10, 30 per cent.

Cigarettes sold by weight.

The maximum price at which a Manufacturer may sell Cigarettes manufactured in the United Kingdom and sold by weight, shall be such that the difference between the Manufacturers' price and the retail selling price shall be 5 per cent. less than the difference which obtained between such prices on 20th April, 1918, provided that the difference shall not in any case be less in pence per lb. than it was on that date.

Imported Cigarettes.

The gross difference between the Importers' selling price (with all discounts deducted) and the price authorised by the Schedule of Prices referred to above, shall not be less than 25 per cent. on the net cost to the Retailer.

Cigars manufactured in the United Kingdom.

The gross difference between the Manufacturers' selling price per box of 50 (with all discounts deducted) and the price authorised by the Schedule of Prices referred to above shall not be less than 30 per cent. on the net cost price.

Imported Manufactured Tobaccos and Snuffs.

The gross difference between the Importers or Dealers in bond or duty paid price and the price authorised by the Schedule of prices referred to above, shall not bear a less profit in pence per lb. to the Wholesaler and Retailer combined than they did at 20th April, 1918.

British Manufactured Tobaccos and Snuffs.

The maximum price to be charged by the Manufacturers of Tobaccos and Snuffs retailed on 20th April, 1918, at 6d. and 6½d. per ounce—and now to be retailed at 8d. and 8½d. per ounce respectively—shall be a price which will allow a profit to the Retailer or to the Wholesaler and Retailer together of not less than 3d. per lb. more than was allowed under the Schedule of Wholesale Prices dated 13th August, 1917.

The maximum price to be charged by the Manufacturers of Tobaccos and Snuffs retailed on the 20th April, 1918 at 7d. per ounce and upwards and now to be retailed at 9d. per ounce and upwards, shall be a price which will allow a profit to the Retailer or to the Wholesaler and Retailer together of not less in pence per lb. than was allowed under the Schedule of Wholesale Prices dated 13th August, 1917.

Imported Cigars.

The gross price, duty paid, charged by any Importer shall not be more, on Cigars up to 90s. per 100, than 6s. per 100, and on Cigars over 90s. per 100 than 10s. per 100 over the

price charged by that Importer for the same Brands and quantities on 20th April, 1918.

The above margins of profit, where goods are sold to a Wholesale Dealer and by him to a Retailer, includes both the Wholesale Dealers' and Retailers' profit, that is, the Retailer obtains the percentages of profit stated, less the Wholesaler's profit.

The maximum price at which a Wholesale Dealer sells to a Retailer shall be the price at which he bought from the Manufacturer with the addition of not more than the same proportion of the profit provided for the Wholesale Dealer and Retailer together which it was customary for him to retain at 20th April, 1918.

Where a Manufacturer sells to a purchaser a quantity of tobacco which under the conditions existing on 20th April, 1918, would not have entitled the purchaser to the maximum discount allowed by the Manufacturer, such Manufacturer shall be entitled to retain a pro-

portion of the maximum discount not exceeding that which it was customary to retain at 20th April, 1918.

The net price at which a Manufacturer or Wholesale Dealer sells any tobacco shall not exceed the price ruling at 20th April, 1918, for the same or similar qualities sold by him under similar conditions of sale by more than the amount by which a Retailer is entitled to increase the price of the same goods sold by him under any Schedule of Prices issued by the Board of Trade, or the Tobacco Control Board on their behalf in force for the time being.

THE RETAIL TOBACCO PRICES NOTICE DATED THE 23rd DAY OF APRIL, 1918, ISSUED BY THE TOBACCO AND MATCHES CONTROL BOARD PURSUANT TO PARAGRAPH 1 OF THE TOBACCO RESTRICTION ORDER (No. 3), 1917, DATED 13th AUGUST, 1917.

No Tobacco, Cigarettes, Cigars or Snuff may be sold on or after the date of this Announcement, by retail at a price exceeding the price at which such goods were sold, at the same establishment under similar conditions on 20th April, 1918, by more than the amount shown in the following schedule.

Where Tobacco, Cigarettes, Cigars or Snuff of a particular brand or quality were not sold at an establishment previous to the date of this Schedule, the price to be charged for the same at such establishment shall be the retail price as fixed by the Manufacturers' Price List unless the Tobacco and Matches Control Board otherwise order, and if not included in any such Price List, the price shall be fixed by the Tobacco and Matches Control Board.

Where Tobacco, Snuffs or Cigarettes were on 20th April, 1918, sold in packets of varying quantities, the increase in the price of the larger packets shall be at a rate, whether per ounce or

per number, not greater than that of the smallest packet (for instance, where the same Cigarettes were sold at 4½d. per 10, 8½d. for 20, 1s. 9½d. for 50 and 3s. 5d. for 100, the new maximum price will be 5½d. for 10, 10½d. for 20, 2s. 2½d. for 50 and 4s. 3d. for 100).

This Schedule must be displayed in a conspicuous position in the shop, bar, store or place where Tobacco is sold. An innkeeper shall also exhibit it in the Hall of his Inn.

This Schedule is in substitution for the Schedule dated the 13th August, 1917.

Paragraph 9 of the Tobacco Restriction Order (No. 3) 1917 provides that "No person shall, after the date of this Order sell or offer for sale any new brand of Tobacco, Cigars, Cigarettes or Snuff, or describe any brand by a name other than that by which it was known at the date of this Order, or alter the packing of any such goods, or vary the weight per thousand of Cigarettes, without the consent of the Tobacco Control Board."

The Timber Order, 1918, dated the 25th day of April, 1918, made by the Board of Trade pursuant to Regulations 2E and 2JJ of the Defence of the Realm Regulations.

The Board of Trade deeming it expedient to make further exercise of their powers under the Defence of the Realm Regulations as respects timber, hereby order as follows:—

1. Until further notice no person shall in the United Kingdom, buy, sell, or receive, or enter into any transaction or negotiation in relation to the sale, purchase, or transport, of any Timber grown outside the United Kingdom which is not actually in stock in the United Kingdom at the date of this Order, except under and in accordance with the terms of a Permit granted by or on behalf of the Controller of Timber Supplies subsequent to the date of this Order.

2. Infringements of this Order are offences against the Defence of the Realm Regulations.

3. This Order may be cited as the Timber Order, 1918.

ORDER.

TIN.

The Minister of Munitions, in exercise of the powers conferred upon him by the Defence of the Realm Regulations and all other powers thereunto enabling him, hereby orders as follows:—

1. No person shall, as from the date hereof until further notice, purchase, sell, or—except for the purpose of carrying out a contract in writing existing prior to such date for the sale or purchase of Tin—enter into any transaction or negotiation in relation to the sale or purchase of Tin situated outside the United Kingdom, except under and in accordance with the terms of a licence issued under the authority of the Minister of Munitions.

2. No person shall, as from the date hereof until further notice, purchase or take delivery of any Tin situated in the United Kingdom,

except under and in accordance with the terms of a licence issued under the authority of the Minister of Munitions; or sell, supply or deliver any such Tin to any person other than the holder of such a licence and in accordance with the terms thereof.

3. No person shall, as from the date hereof until further notice, except under and in accordance with the terms of a licence issued under the authority of the Minister of Munitions, use any Tin for the purpose of any manufacture or work except for the purpose of a contract or order for the time being in existence certified to be within Class "A" in the Order of the Ministry of Munitions as to priority dated the 8th March, 1917.

4. All persons shall in the first seven days of each month commencing with the month of May, 1918, send in to the Director of Tin Supplies, 1, Metal Exchange Buildings, White-
 tington Avenue, E.C. 3, monthly returns of:—

(a) All Tin held by them in stock or otherwise under their control on the last day of the preceding month, specifying the quality thereof.

(b) All Tin purchased or sold by them for future delivery and not yet delivered on such last day, specifying the names of the sellers to or purchasers from them, and the quantity and quality, and time and place of delivery in each case, and the position of the Tin at the date of the return.

(c) All Tin delivered to them during the preceding month, and from whom purchased.

(d) All contracts or orders existing on the last day of or entered into during the preceding month requiring for their execution the use of Tin, specifying the purposes thereof and the quality of the Tin to be used.

(e) Such other particulars as to Tin as may be required by the Controller of Non-Ferrous Materials Supply.

Notwithstanding the above, no return is required from any person whose total stock of Tin in hand and on order for future delivery to him has not at any time during the preceding month exceeded 5 cwt.

5. For the purpose of this Order the expression "Tin" shall mean Tin of all qualities, and shall include Sheet and Rolled Tin, Tin-

foil, Scrap Tin, Tin Ores and Concentrates, Tin Residues, or any of them.

NOTE.—All applications for licences should be made to the Director of Tin Supplies, Metal Exchange Buildings, Whittington Avenue, London, E.C. 3, and marked "Tin Licence."

Every applicant for a licence must state the amount and quality of metal required by him per month, and the use to which it will be put.

Any person acting in contravention of or failing to comply with the above Order, or making a false return, will be guilty of an offence under the Defence of the Realm Regulations, and be liable to penalties of fine and imprisonment.

DEFENCE OF THE REALM REGULATIONS.

ORDER MADE BY ADMIRALTY UNDER REGULATION 45r.

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by Regulation 45r of the Defence of the Realm Regulations and of every other power enabling them in that behalf, the Admiralty hereby order as follows:—

1. Any members of a naval force of an Ally may if authorised by the proper naval authority of that Ally arrest and hand over to that authority any other member of the naval or military force of such Ally whom he finds committing or has reason to suspect of having committed an offence for which he is amenable to the naval or military courts of the Ally.

2. Any police constable and any officer or petty officer of His Majesty's Naval Forces may arrest any member of a naval or military force of an Ally whom he finds committing or has reason to suspect of having committed a civil offence, if the offence is such that if such man had been a member of His Majesty's Naval Forces he could have arrested him.

3. Any police constable and any officer or petty officer of His Majesty's Naval Forces may on the request of the proper naval or military authority of an Ally or any person authorised by him arrest any person whom he has reason to believe to be a member of a naval or military force of that Ally and who is alleged by such authority to be guilty of an offence for which he is amenable to the naval or military courts of that Ally.

4. Subject to any general or special agreement any member of a naval or military force of an Ally arrested under this order by a police constable, or by any officer or petty officer of His Majesty's Naval Forces for any offence for which he is amenable to the naval or military courts of that Ally shall as soon as practicable be handed over to the proper naval or military authority of that Ally whether within or without the United Kingdom, to be dealt with according to the law of that Ally applicable to the case and in the meantime may be kept in civil or naval custody.

DEFENCE OF THE REALM (CONSOLIDATION) ACT, 1914, AND ORDER MADE THEREUNDER.

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by Regulation 45F of the Defence of the Realm Regulations, and of every other power enabling them in that behalf, the Army Council hereby order as follows:—

(1) Any members of a military force of an Ally may, if authorised by the proper military authority of that Ally, arrest and hand over to that authority any other member of the naval or military force of such Ally whom he finds committing or has reason to suspect of having committed an offence for which he is amenable to the naval or military courts of the Ally.

(2) Any police constable and any officer or non-commissioned officer of His Majesty's military forces may arrest any member of a naval or military force of an Ally whom he finds committing or has reason to suspect of having committed a civil offence, if the offence is such that if such man had been a member of His Majesty's military forces he could have arrested him.

(3) Any police constable and any officer or non-commissioned officer of His Majesty's military forces may, on the request of the proper naval or military authority of an Ally or any person authorised by him, arrest any person whom he has reason to believe to be a member of a naval or military force of that Ally, and who is alleged by such authority to be guilty of an offence for which he is amenable to the naval or military courts of that Ally.

(4) Subject to any general or special agreement, any member of a naval or military force of an Ally arrested under this order by a police constable or by an officer or non-commissioned officer of His Majesty's military forces for any offence for which he is amenable to the naval or military courts of that Ally shall, as soon as practicable, be handed over to the proper naval or military authority of that Ally, whether within or without the United Kingdom, to be dealt with according to the law of that Ally applicable to the case, and in the meantime may be kept in civil or military custody.

ENGLISH CHANNEL, NORTH SEA SOUTHERN PORTION, WITH RIVERS THAMES AND MEDWAY AND APPROACHES.

Pilotage and Traffic Regulations.

Former Notice.—No. 448 of 1918; hereby cancelled.

Mariners are hereby warned that, under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, the following Regulations have been made by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty and are now in force:—

I. ENGLISH CHANNEL AND NORTH SEA SOUTHERN PORTION—PILOTAGE REGULATIONS.

1. All ships (other than British ships when trading coastwise or to or from the Channel islands, or to or from the Port of Brest, or any French Channel Port north and east of Brest, or any Netherlands Continental Port, and not carrying passengers) whilst bound from, and whilst navigating in the waters from, the Downs Pilot Station to Gravesend or *vice versa*, must be conducted by Pilots licensed by the London Trinity House.

2. All ships (other than British ships when trading coastwise or to or from the Channel islands, or to or from the Port of Brest, or any French Channel Port north and east of Brest, or any Netherlands Continental Port, and not carrying passengers) whilst bound from, and whilst navigating in the waters from, Gravesend to Great Yarmouth or *vice versa*, must be conducted by Pilots licensed by the London Trinity House.

3. Clauses 1 and 2 above do not apply to British ships whilst navigating in the waters between the Downs Pilot Station and Gravesend, or between Gravesend and Great Yarmouth or between Great Yarmouth and the Downs Pilot Station, provided that they do not make use of any port in the London Pilotage District within these limits.

4. All ships (other than British ships of less than 3,500 tons gross tonnage, when trading coastwise or to or from the Channel islands, or to or from the Port of Brest or any French Channel Port north and east of Brest, or any

Netherlands Continental Port, and not carrying passengers) whilst navigating in the waters from Gravesend to London Bridge or *vice versa*, must be conducted by Pilots licensed by the London Trinity House.

5. All ships (other than British ships) whilst navigating in the waters between the Downs Pilot Station and Great Yarmouth and *vice versa*, and between those places and the Sunk light-vessel, or any intermediate pilot station that may hereafter be established, and *vice versa*, must be conducted by Pilots licensed by the London Trinity House.

6. The Trinity House Pilot Station at Dungeness having been discontinued, pilotage is therefore not compulsory between the Downs Pilot Station and Dungeness, except for ships bound into or out of the Harbours of Dover and Folkestone.

7. Trinity House Pilot Stations have been established at the undermentioned places, and merchant vessels not under compulsion of pilotage are very strongly advised to take pilots:—

(a) THE DOWNS, where ships proceeding north can obtain Pilots capable of piloting as far as Great Yarmouth, and also pilots for the River Thames, and for Folkestone and Dover harbours. The Pilot Steamers attached to the Downs Station will cruise in the vicinity of a position two miles south-east of Deal Pier.

(b) GREAT YARMOUTH, where ships from the North Sea bound for the River Thames or the English Channel can obtain Pilots capable of piloting as far as the Downs.

The Pilot Steamer attached to the Great Yarmouth Station will cruise in the vicinity of St. Nicholas light-vessel.

(c) THE SUNK LIGHT-VESSEL, where ships trading with Netherlands Ports, but *no others*, can obtain Pilots for the River Thames and the Downs.

The Sunk Pilot Steamer will be on her station and available for shipping and landing Pilots between the following hours (G.M.T.):—

From the date hereof until the 30th April, 1918, between 6 a.m. and 7 p.m. only.

From the 1st May, 1918, until further notice, between 5 a.m. and 7 p.m. only.

(d) Pilots can also be obtained at LONDON for the Downs and Great Yarmouth (including the River Thames and approaches).

Note.—The Pilots referred to in this Notice are the pilots licensed by the London Trinity House and no others.

II. RIVERS THAMES AND MEDWAY, &c.—TRAFFIC REGULATIONS.

1. All traffic into and out of the River Thames must pass through the Edinburgh Channels, or through the Black Deep south of the Knock John and Knob Light-Buoys, and through the Ooze Deep until further notice.

No vessels are to remain under way in the above-mentioned Channels between a line drawn from London Stone to No. 3 Sea Reach Light-Buoy and thence to Canvey Point on the west, and the Sunk Head Buoy or a line joining the positions of the South Long Sand and East Shingles Buoys, on the east, from one hour after sunset until one hour before sunrise.

Vessels at anchor within these limits must not exhibit any lights from one hour after sunset until one hour before sunrise.

No merchant or other private vessel is to be at anchor in the Black Deep, and the Main Channel of the Thames, to the Southward of a line joining a position in lat. $51^{\circ} 39' N.$, long. $1^{\circ} 23' E.$, D3 Buoy, a position in lat. $51^{\circ} 33' 08'' N.$, long. $1^{\circ} 13' 03'' E.$, Knob Light-Buoy, a position in lat. $51^{\circ} 31' 45'' N.$, long. $1^{\circ} 04' 48'' E.$, South Shoebury Light-Buoy, a position in lat. $51^{\circ} 29' 15'' N.$, long. $0^{\circ} 49' 45'' E.$ and Nos. 1, 2 and 3 Sea Reach Buoys, except when obliged to anchor on account of fog.

No vessel is to anchor in the Black Deep between the parallel of lat. $51^{\circ} 39' N.$, and the Sunk Light-Vessel, without special orders, except such South-bound vessels as are unable to proceed further south owing to darkness or thick weather; vessels anchoring under such circumstances are only to anchor to the westward of a line joining positions in lat. $51^{\circ} 45' 00'' N.$, long. $1^{\circ} 30' 15'' E.$, lat. $51^{\circ} 42' 00'' N.$, long. $1^{\circ} 27' 30'' E.$, and lat. $51^{\circ} 39' N.$, long. $1^{\circ} 23' E.$, and well clear of the fairway.

All other Channels are closed to navigation.

The Nore Examination Anchorage is reserved for vessels under examination before entry into the Medway, and also for vessels on Government service which have left the Medway and are awaiting orders as to route, &c.

In view of certain difficulty having been experienced in bringing Mercantile traffic into harbour in cases of emergency, a look-out is always to be placed during the dark hours when anchored in the channels or approaches to the Mouth of the Thames in which the exhibition of lights is prohibited. The look-out should always be ready to exhibit a white light at short notice.

2. Coasting vessels are not to be under way nor exhibit any lights in the East Swin or Wallet between sunset and sunrise.

3. No merchant vessel is to be in the following area in the approaches to the River Thames from one hour after sunset to half an hour before sunrise:—

The area is bounded on the north by the parallel of lat. $51^{\circ} 33' N.$

The area is bounded on the east by the meridian of long. $1^{\circ} 35' E.$

The area is bounded on the south by the parallel of lat. $51^{\circ} 16' N.$

The area is bounded on the west by the meridian of long. $1^{\circ} 24' E.$

Any merchant vessel contravening the foregoing regulation will run the gravest risk of being sunk.

4. The use of the Swin and Wallet Channels by sailing barges and small trading vessels engaged in coastwise traffic along the Essex coast is permitted, subject to compliance with the following restrictions:—

(i) Each vessel must obtain from the Customs a special clearance card, which is to be kept available for inspection by the Patrol Officers, on demand.

(ii) A red ensign is to be displayed while navigating the Middle Deep and Swin Channel.

(iii) No vessel may be under way after dark, except as provided for hereinafter.

(iv) When at anchor in the Wallet, Ray Sand, and Whitaker Channels, or in the Rivers Colne, Blackwater, and Crouch, all lights are to be screened so that they will not show outboard.

(v) No vessel may anchor in the River Crouch in the area bounded by lines drawn in a 0° (*N. 14° E. Mag.*) and a 180° (*S. 14° W. Mag.*) direction, through Burnham Coastguard Station and Holliwell point; or in the River Blackwater in the areas bounded by a line drawn in a 0° (*N. 14° E. Mag.*) and a 180° (*S. 14° W. Mag.*) direction, through Ramsey Stone to the opposite shore, and a line drawn through the Tollesbury and Mersea Oyster Fishery Company's Beacon on Thurslet Spit and the same Company's Beacon on the south side of the river.

(vi) To enable vessels to save their tides they will be permitted to navigate the Rivers Colne, Blackwater, and Crouch at night above the following places:—

River Roach above Quay Reach.

River Crouch above Burnham Coastguard Station.

River Blackwater above Ramsey Island Stone.

River Colne above Brightlingsea Creek.

They are to anchor immediately, should they be ordered to do so by the Naval or Military Authorities.

(vii) Vessels are to carry out all instructions received from the Naval Officers in command of vessels patrolling these Channels and Rivers.

(viii.) No vessels are to enter or pass through the defended area in the Middle Deep and Swin Channels until they have been boarded and examined by the vessels stationed there for that purpose. Permission is given, subject to preliminary boarding and examination, for sailing vessels, if they so desire, to pass to the eastward of the Maplin Light-house, but under no circumstances may they pass to the eastward of any of the conical buoys in the defended area.

(Note.—*The Examination Officers will board South-bound vessels in the vicinity of the Whitaker Spit. Those leaving the Thames and Medway will be boarded near the Mouse Light-Vessel.*)

The Boarding Officers will give Masters of vessels instructions as to the course they are to steer when passing through the defended area.

(ix) Vessels reaching the entrance to the defended area within one hour of sunset will not be allowed to pass through till daylight.

5. All vessels, other than those of British Nationality or those of the Allied Nations, are prohibited from entering the Medway and Swale rivers.

All Neutral Aliens are prohibited from entering the Medway and Swale rivers in British vessels, and this applies to Aliens carried in British ships or barges as passengers or part of crew; the limits of the prohibited area are defined as from the Outer Bar Buoy in the River Medway to Rochester bridge, and the whole of the River Swale from the light on Queenborough spit to Columbine spit Buoy. Attention is drawn to the necessity of ship-owners and charterers satisfying themselves

that no Neutral Aliens are on board vessels sent to the Rivers Medway and Swale.
